

Floyd Livestock Show Next Week



LIMITED - Friday-morning snowfall cut down y, as is evident in this picture, shot in downtown t about 11 a.m., before it really got bad. Tires on the Tire Company form the foreground; the old house on

the corner of Locust and East First Streets, about half a block away, is visible through the snow; and if you look close at the top center, you can see the water tower about a block from where the picture was taken.

From the four corners of this county. groomed and sleek steers, lambs, and swine will be loaded onto pickups and trailers Sunday and Monday enroute to Floydada.

The goal of their proud owners — 4-H and FFA members - will be grand champion banners at the 25th annual Floyd County Junior Livestock Show.

The five-day event begins Sunday with weighing of barrows and continues through next Thursday when exhibitors and their parents are honored with a banquet in Duncan Elementary Cafetorium in Floydada. Floyd County Farm Bureau is sponsoring the banquet.

In between will be two days -Monday and Tuesday — of judging plus one day - next Wednesday - devoted to judging by FFA and 4-H members and the auction of animals.

James McNeill will serve as general superintendent of the '79 Floyd County Junior Livestock Show. Assitant superintendents are to be Orville Harris and James Cleveland of the Floydada High vocational agriculture department; Elvin Lyon and Mike Glenn, vo-ag instructors at Lockney High School; Steve Herber and Birch Lobban, county Extension agents.

ACTIVITIES OUTLINED

Weighing of barrows will begin when the barn opens at 2 p.m. this Sunday. All swine are to be in place by 6 o'clock

Monday activities begin with the weighing of steers at 7 a.m. One hour later, at 8 o'clock, weighing, classifying and toothing of lambs starts. All steers

must be in place by 9 a.m. and steer classifying is slated for 10 o'clock. Judges for this year's show include:

Jerry Adams, steers; Scotty Windham, swine; and Buddy Logsdon, lambs. Ed Garnett will classify steers and

Windham will be the first to judge as he begins to examine barrows at 2 o'clock Monday afternoon.

Selection of lamb winners leads off the Tuesday agenda at 9 a.m. Steer judging is scheduled for 2 p.m. that

Notification to sell non-placing floor bid animals must be made to officials one hour after completion of the judging schedule. Swine exhibitors are reminded that barrows may not be returned home after the show, due to a new federal regulation.

Youth livestock judging is scheduled for 7:45 a.m. Wednesday.

AUCTION WEDNESDAY

Exhibitors begin to reap the benefits of their efforts during the Wednesday afternoon auction. Raymond Akin will begin the auction by selling champion stock to high bidders at 1 p.m.

Floyd County Junior Livestock will offer for sale 32 steers, 70 barrows, 70 lambs or 50 cent of the total lambs and barrows with the total not to exceed 140. The 7 p.m. banquet is the only

JUDGING DIVISION

Thursday activity.

Steers are to show in three classes light, medium, and heavy - per breed. Prizes will include: first place, \$5: second, \$4; third, \$3; fourth, \$2; fifth \$1; and sixth through tenth, ribbon. Breed champions and reserve champions are to receive rosettes.

A banner and \$5 will be received by the grand champion steer's owner. A banner and \$3 goes to the reserve champion steer.

Swine are to be exhibited in light, medium, and heavy classes for the following breeds: Berkshire, Chester, White, Duroc, Hampshire, Poland Chinas and Spotted Poland China crossbreeds, and other breeds. Any of these which have fewer than 10 barrows entered will be shown with "other breeds" rather than as a separate

breed. In the event of 20 or fewer entries, a breed is to be divided into two rather than three classes.

CHAMPION LAMBS

There will be no grand and reserve champion lambs, but the following class champions and reserve champions are to be declared:

Finewool - Rambouillett, Merino or cross between these two finewool breeds.

Finewool crossbred - typical first cross of a Suffolk, Hampshire, Corriedals, Dorset or Columbia.

Shropshire - purebred Shropshire lambs only.

Southdown - purebred Southdown lambs only.

Medium wool - Hampshire, Suffolk and all other medium wool are not eligible for the above mentioned class-

Last year when the Lady Horns and the Lady Lopes met in the conference playoff game, the Abernathy team prevailed by a three-point margin, 36-33. Earlier this year, Abernathy downed Lockney by a single point, 37-36, in an overtime game in the first round of district play and went on to win the first round with a 4-0 record. Second time around, the Lady Horns won by two, 48-46, and took the second round with a 4-0 mark. So look for a close game again Tuesday.

Lady Horn Coach Marsha Sharp expects a two-point ballgame, she says, if both teams continue to play the way have to hit a better percentage of free throws, Sharp warned, to win this one. department.

Rebecca Evans is Lockney's highscoring post sophomore. She's hitting some 13 points and grabbing an average of 15 rebounds per contest. That's probably one of the highest rebounding averages on the South Plains this year, Sharp says. And in eight district games Evans has been double-teamed all the time and sometimes triple-teamed. She's one of the top five post people in

the district, Sharp believes. Sophomore Penny Sterling has really showed improvement since stepping in for Rise Taylor midway into district play. Sterling has really come on strong

in the last month, according to Sharp. And Tammie Hayes, also sophomore, is averaging eight rebounds per game. She hasn't had a really high-scoring game, but she's always a threat to

Matter of fact, anyone of the five starters is a threat to score, any time they touch the ball.

He praised the Lockney Volunteer Fire Department for the way they handled the situation. While there was a great deal of smoke damage to the house and its contents, there was hardly any water damage, Stapp said. And several personal items and some furniture was saved from the blaze. "The fire department did a tremendous job," Stapp told The Beacon. "It couldn't have been handled any better," he

The Stapps are thankful, too, to the many people who gave them money, clothing and other items after hearing of their misfortune. He expressed special appreciation to the congregation of the West College and Third Street Church of Christ, where the family attends, church, and to the individuals, many of whom never even saw the fire-damaged

home, who helped out. "These are the greatest people in the world," Stapp said.





members was when he was 10 years old. 'My dad took me to drive a wagon when he went on a freight trip from Charlie, where we lived, to Wichita Falls. He freighted quite a lot then.

'That was a very exciting trip. He took me to a show which was an unusual experience. More unusual, though, was the grasshoppers that came into town about 10 o'clock. There were so many of them that they stopped the street cars from running. The street car wheels were so slick with grasshoppers that they couldn't do anything but spin on the tracks. Too, doors had to be closed to keep them out of the stores and

"Once while we were there, I was standing on the street looking at the city lights, and my father stepped behind some boxes to hide from me. I didn't panic, I didn't run. I just stood there and looked.

"On that same trip, Dad also took me to the fire station. It was a very impressive sight. The fire wagon was pulled by a team of horses that were so well trained that they would run and back into the harness that was hanging above them. The firemen would snap the harness right quick and be on the wagon and rush to the fire. The pressure for the water was furnished by a steam motor on the fire wagon.'

There are two outstanding experience on the road from Wichita Falls to Charlie that he remembers well.

One of these was that as he sat on the spring seat of the wagon with his feed propped on the front end gate facing the sun, his legs took on a very bad blister from his knee britches to his feet.

Another experience was while crossing the Red River. The hill was so steep into the river that they had to tie all four wheels to the wagon to prevent the wagon from running over the horses. The rims on the tied wheels became very hot from the friction of sliding along the sand down the steep hill.

While the family was living in Charlie, the town burned to the ground. A hardware store, drug store, two grocery stores and a post office were burned as a result of a cigarette in a wastepaper basket. Some local boys came in from a dance one night and were at the drug store. One of them carelessly dropped the cigarette. The about a year, we cut the fire spread quickly.

After the fire, the druggest set burned candy out and "kids ate all they could hold" of chocolate candy. It was "real good."

Naturally, the first train ride is remembered. "My mother had a sister in Clarksville. Daddy put us on the train to go for a visit in Clarksville. It was my first train ride.

"In Ft. Worth, I was not scared, but Mother was. I was 10 then. I went to one

of the conductors and told him that my mother was crying. He came over and helped us because Mother had us three small children. It was such a large

"To begin with, Mother did not want to go on that trip, but Daddy put us on the train. When we left home, Mother had no idea that we would change trains in Ft. Worth.

"Our folks dressed us up pretty nice for the trip. I wore knee pants.

"Some time after that the parents at Clarksville died. We have not heard of the rest of the family. I have mailed letters and in every way tried contacting them but have had no word.

"When Dad sent us on that trip, he believed he was giving his family an educational trip-and he was. That was his way. He was a good father.

"Father practiced thrift in many ways. He bought all of his sugar and flour by the barrel. He grew the rest of what we lived on at home. He believed that living above our means was wrong.

"When I was 12 in school in Charlie, they dressed me in knee pants with black-ribbed stockings for school and added a suit and cap for special occasions.

When it is known that the family had 8 children with A.O. as the oldest, it is easy to see how hard it was to clothe them. Even though hard, they "had plenty to eat and got by real good." At times it was hard.

Those early childhood experiences furnished a background for A.O. Foster's determined efforts in educating his own children, years later.

"When we first came to Lone Star, they were trying to change to bussing and consolidation between Lone Star

"One of our girls was in a higher grade that was taught at Lone Star. I took them both to Lockney. That was before a pavement. When the roads were muddy, we often had deep ruts all the way. Sometimes, it was difficult to get out of those ruts when meeting an-

'Ben McGhee and I took week about driving the children in.

"Finally, I leased a room from the Rose rooming house for the last two months. We really did not miss much school. Of course, there were mornings that we had trouble getting there.

"Later, when the bus was running, a snow storm came during the day. Bus travel taking the children home was difficult. In fact, G.A. McAda had to leave the bus he was driving at Foster's while A.O. took his home in a pick up. A.O. took the bus in the next day.

"I have had a good, happy life. I have enjoyed it. Of course, there has been a little static all along, but as far as trouble, we have never had it. Well, there was the heart attack, but that was over after a time. I have continued to work as I have always.

"I have gone to church all my life. I was Sunday School Superintendent for six years at Lone Star and missed only two Sundays. If we went off somewhere, we always came back in time not to miss church.

He continues operation of his farm, his hogs, his cows and sees no reason to regret his 1945 move from Petersburg to irrigated land.

Business Incorporation Discussed By Texas Tech Professor Reserve discount rate so high that

Farmers, ranchers or others who are incorporating small businesses should beware of a "knee jerk" recommendation to take advantage of Subchapter S of the Internal Revenue Code, according to a Texas Tech University professor

who teaches tax law. Dr. David C. Cummins, of the Texas Tech Law School faculty, said that incorporation under Subchapter S often is recommended in the belief that shareholders can avoid double taxation, a belief he calls "more myth than

It is possible, he said, to manage a regular corporation's relationship to its stockholders so that the burden of double taxation does not apply.

"There are no blanket answers to the manner of incorporation," Cummins said, "but too many people automatically choose Subchapter S thinking there is a tax advantage, and they should look closely at the disadvanta-

Among the disadvantages, Cummins said, is that a very restrictive buy-sell plan for stock transfers is required by

"Probably the best first step for the individual wanting to incorporate a closely held business," he admonished, "is to find a tax expert-accountant, lawyer or other specialist-to study the past performance of the business and the future plans of the individual who will be the principal stockholder. Then follow that expert's advice.

"The earlier advice is sought, the cheaper the fee and the fewer the pitfalls," Cummins said.

Unless paperwork is carefully drawn, he said, it is possible for the corporation

shareholders pay taxes also on their dividends, but there can be a pitfall if shareholders are required to pay taxes on dividends that have not been distributed, "in effect paying taxes on income they haven't received.'

In Subchapter S, he explained, there is only one class of stock and none of it can be put in a trust. In a regular corporation, however, there can be more than one class of preferred and more than one class of common stock.

This protects the will of the patriarch or matriarch of a corporation in keeping the controlling interest in the hands of capable stockholders, whether relatives or key employees, and at the same time caring for bonafide stockholders who should have no share in controlling the corporation, whether for lack of interest

Another significant incorporation pitfall to avoid is Section 341 of the Internal Revenue Code, he said. This applies to a business incorporated for one reason only-for instance, to continue a line of credit-that is, a company incorporated only to be collapsed when its reason for existence disappears.

The penalty section in 341 is designed to be a shoe two sizes too small, and it will pinch," he warned. "The point is to not sell shares and

liquidate the corporation but continue to operate until the business loses its status as a collapsible corporation.

"A tax expert will discuss Secion 341 before the incorporation papers are drawn," Cummins said, "and plans can be made to avoid the penalties this section calls for.'

County Agent's Column

Winter and early spring are good times for collecting soil samples, says

At present, Extension Service laboratories are processing samples as soon as they arrive, and reports are mailed within one week.

Stephen H. Herber, county agent with

the Texas Agricultural Extension

Prompt service is an important requirement for an effective soil testing service, says Herber. However, waiting until the planting season can cause delays and results may not get back to producers in time.

Sampling well in advance of planting offers the advantage of allowing time to obtain needed fertilizers. Early sampling also is advised to avoid wet soil later in the season. If soils are muddy and sticky, it is difficult to obtain a good sample. And, excess moisture adds to

shipping costs. To reduce shipping weight, samples can be air-dried for a day or two. Heating should be avoided, however, since it fixes potassium in some soils so it cannot be removed by laboratory procedures for testing.

One of the keys to a good soil test is collecting a representative soil sample of a field. From 10 to 15 samples should be collected from an area as large as 40 acres. These should then be mixed together for a composite sample. Also, the area tested should be divided according to soil type as well as past and future cropping practices.

Take time to collect representative soil samples and carefully complete the information sheet that must accompany each sample, advises Herber.

Collection and mailing instructions, mailing cartons and information sheets are available at the county Extension

Cummins said that the advantages and disadvantages of incorporating are particularly important now to farmers and ranchers who are faced with a cutoff in their lines of credit. Texas law limits to 10 percent the amount of interest that can be charged an individual borrowing money while the prime rate is 11.75 percent and the Federal

banks don't lend money at 10 percent. A corporation, unlike an individual, can borrow at a higher interest rate. The Texas usuary law does not apply

to all kinds of credit but does apply to the production loans required by farmers and ranchers to operate their businesses.

Gasohol: What Are the Facts?

AUSTIN--One of the products recently in the spotlight as an alternate energy source is "gasohol," a blend of unleaded gasoline and alcohol which can be produced from agricultural crops and by-products, advises Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V.

Here are some of the answers to questions often asked about gasohol, compiled by the Texas Department of Agriculture:

1. What is gasohol? Gasohol is a type of fuel utilizing a blend of unleaded gasoline and ethyl alcohol-generally 10 per cent alcohol. 2. Can any automobile use gasohol?

Yes. In fact, cars with carburetor adjustments can be operated with 100 per cent alcohol. Researchers at Texas A & M University report that three test cars driven for three years with 100 per cent methal alcohol have shown no adverse effects. Economically, however, the 90 per cent gasoline, 10 per cent alcohol mix is the most feasible at present.

gasohol is commercially available, does it cost more? Yes. Present technology can produce one gallon of pure fuel ethyl alcohol for between 80 cents to \$1.25 per gallon. The blended gasohol would cost around four to eights cents per gallon more than unleaded gasoline after tax exemptions, but there are definite advantages -improved mileage, less engine wear, and higher octane,

therefore no pinging. 4. How is this alcohol" produced?

Scientists can distill alcohol from any agricultural material which contains sugar or starch--corn, grain sorghum, below-grade fruits and vegetables, citrus peels, sugar cane, sweet sorghum, wood wastes, and on and on.

5. Isn't there a lot of waste, using corn for instance, just for alcohol production?

No. Residues produced make excellent livestock feed, since the protein in the corn is not destroyed or used in the distillation process. In fact, some operations could be almost "perpetual motion"

operations: Corn is used to make the alcohol. The residue is used to feed cattle. Cattle wastes can then be used to produce methane gas to power the alcohol-distillation

6. Will fuel alcohol eventually completely replace gasoline in American cars? That's highly doubtful. The

alcohol is, most practically, used as an additive to gasoline, but any volume marketed would certainly help alleviate the fuel shortage. 7. Would using agricul-

tural materials for alcohol production cause less food to be grown in Texas? Again, probably not. Due

to vast carryover stocks of grain, millions of acres of Texas farmland are currently not in production. This "setaside" land can, under the Federal farm program, be used to grow energyproducing crops. Some experts estimate that Texas could double its production of grain, supplying plenty of material for alcohol production, as well as for food use and for exports, if there was a profitable market for their product.

And don't forget the use of other agricultural byproducts, an important source of material for alcohol production. The tops of harvested vegetables, or substandard fruits and vegetables that cannot be marketed for food use-these, too, can be used for alcohol.

8. Are there any commercial fuel alcohol plants in operation in Texas at present?

No. Actually, there are no fully-established, commercial plants producing volume amounts of fuel alcohol in the U. S. at all.

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
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
