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WAGE INSURANCE

President Carter had better start looking for life insurance for his "wage insurance"

A few days before its birth, the plan, a vital part of the President's fight against inflation, looks as if it won't be long for this

Wage insurance would work this way: Groups of workers would take out the policy by agreeing to hold this year's pay raise to 7 per cent or less, if consumer prices rose more than 7 per cent this year, policy holdes would get a tax cut or tax refund in 1980.

Carter maintains that this would give workers "an additional incentive" to take part in this program of voluntary wage and price standards. It "will remove their only legitimate reason not to cooperate," the

Since then, the administration has been struggling to get some kind of legislation in shape that would put this issue to Congress. Thus far, it doesn't look as

For one thing, this wage insurance plan is so complicated that it is just about unworkable. And so few workers seem interested in it that the net effect would be zilch upon inflation.

For another thing, a lot of workers wouldn't be eligible for his tax benefit. This includes farmers, self-employed persons, those making the minimum wage.

Organized labor doesn't buy it because they have their sights set much higher than 7 per cent wage increase when contract talks come up this year.

And a lot of other people, in and out of Congress, are turned off the entire plan. To them, it smacks of another type of government intervention and regulation, of wage earners looking to Uncle Sam for a guaranteed income when they ought to take their chances in the free market.

The wage insurance plan may be dead, and nobody is mourning about it. Perryton Herald



The newspaper obituaries are bad about telling you that a man 'died suddenly'

They don't. And neither do towns. Maybe the heart stopped suddenly, the breathing quit without preliminaries, and the brain waves stopped all at once but no man-and no town-dies suddenly.

A young boy dies a little bit when he throws away his toy trucks and gives up the fantasy of herding his big machine over long stretches of highway as king of the road. He dies a little more when he forgets he wants to be a fireman or train engineer and picks up his first football, his first baseball and bat.

Dying is a gradual thing.

Death creeps closer for a man when he starts counting the cost of the fish he caught and not the thrill of the fight. He dies a little more when he decides some days are too hot or too cold to fish at all and goes only on those perfect days in the spring and fall.

Life eases out a little when man decides his taste for fresh garden vegetables-the radish, the onion, the tomato-aren't worth the battle with the weed.

Death creeps up when a man decides that it's time for younger men to coach the baseball team, meet with scouts, or get engaged in the hassle of community He lost a lot of life when he decides that

the status quo is good enough for him and it is not worth his time to change things to try to make them better. When a man-or a town-decides that

things can't or won't be better some other way, he's a long ways gone toward dead

Death begins with a man or a town is born, or formed, and declines all of the rest of the way after the ambition and desire to change-to gamble on something better--Breckenridge American

'The Dunlaps were blessed with two children; a son, John, who is a successful farmer in Floydada, and a daughter Becky Culp, of Amarillo who is a much sought-after clothing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Exten-

'Many will attest to Helen Dunlap's skill and dedication in her teaching career. She taught all levels at South Plains in 1945-46, in Parker County from 1946-48, and in Floydada elementary and junior high from 1959-70. In all, she taught for twenty-two years. touching the lives of hundreds of pupils. scores of teachers, and numerous administrators. Murder Defendant Takes Own Life

John Thomas Carter, who was charged with capital murder in the deaths last Fall of an elderly Lorenzo couple, Mr. and Mrs. Valton V. Gandy, took his own life Tuesday night.

He was being incarcerated in the Crosby County Jail in Crosbyton. Two jurors had been selected Monday and

Tuesday to hear Carter's trial. Carter's suicide plot was carried out when he apparently shot himself one time in the right

temple with a .22 calibre pistol. The weapon was found in the cell. Deputy Sheriff Rayburn Fitts found Carter's body when he took the prisoner his breakfast at 8:10 a.m. Fitts immediately notified Sheriff Fred

Owen and District Attorney Bill Marley, with the latter contacting the Department of Public Safety to conduct an investigation. Due to remodeling underway at the jail, the murder defendant was the only inmate in the Crosby County Jail. Paula Bruce, who has been charged in the Gandy murders along with Carter,

County Jail. Carter was moved Sunday afternoon from the Lubbock County Jail to Crosbyton in order to stand trial.

was moved three weeks ago to the Lubbock

The body was taken to Lubbock for an autopsy. At this time an oil-stained, hand-made holster and "over \$100" was found on Carter's body. The serial number had been filed from the .22

Texas Ranger Jackie Peoples is heading the investigation. He and another Ranger were to "hand deliver" Carter's clothing and the pistol Thursday morning to the DPS laboratory in Austin for further analysis.

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Floyd Philosopher

Editor's note: The Floyd Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm looks at the 55 mile an hour speed limit this week.

I've been trying to figure out a Washington Dear editor: ruling on the 55 mile an hour speed limit and

may need your help. As I understand it, Washington has found out - I don't know who spilled the beans that about three-fourths of the drivers in this country ignore the 55 mile an hour limit and has announced that if this continues it'll shut off any more highway funds to any state that doesn't crack down on the speeders.

Washington can do that because it controls Federal funds doled out to the states to build more highways for better speeding. I'm told the funds come from taxes collected by Washington from the states. I didn't know it. I figured since Washington has an iron-fisted control over the money it was Washington's money, that politicians there just chipped in to supply the funds.

Anyway, what interests me is Washington's ruling: everybody in a state isn't required to stay with the 55-mile an hour limit all at once. One third has to be doing it by Sept. 30, 1979, and at least 70 per cent by 1983.

This means 30 per cent never will have to do it and what I want to know is where do you apply to become a member of that 30 per cent? This is an intriguing interpretation of law

enforcement with unlimited possibilities. If the ultimate goal is to get only 70 per cent of the people obeying a law, you can't imagine the mad rush there's going to be to get into the remaining, scott-free 30 per cent. I hope Congress doesn't use up the quota before the rest of us have a chance to get in on it.

By the way, I heard a rumor that a big truck, an 18-wheeler loaded to the gills, was stopped for going 75 miles an hour one day last week while passing a bus going 74. It's probably just a rumor. Nothing to it.
