## Good Fire Record Credit Up Again In Lockney

Effective April 1, fire insurance premiums in Lockney will be subject to a 20-percent "good fire record credit," according to Bob Miller, local insurance agent. The good fire record credit is for insurance only, and only for insured homes and businesses inside the Lockney city limits, Miller emphasizes. The 20-percent credit represents a five-percent increase in credit over last

year, when Lockney qualified for a 15-percent credit. The increase in credit is due to low losses in Lockney, Miller says, largely because of the efficiency of the Lockney Volunteer Fire Department. The good fire record credit figures are from the new "Key Rate and Fire Record Data" published by the State Board of Insurance, effective April 1, 1979.

"Set the Pace! Take the

 tion" is the theme to be  
 emphasized during the sev-  
 enth annual National Nutri-  
 tion Week, March 4-10.  
 Exercise and a sound diet  
 are the cornerstones of good  
 health. Good nutrition and  
 regular exercise that you  
 enjoy can cut the cost of  
 health care.

Your knowledge about  
 food and their nutrients can  
 sponsored by the American  
 Dietetic Association and its  
 affiliates, the United States  
 District of Columbia and the  
 Puerto Rico, Nourish, the  
 association's symbol of good  
 nutrition, helps to carry the  
 message. This year he's  
 running with it and here  
 discusses food additives.  
 Despite recent consumer  
 concern, food additives are  
 necessary to furnish the en-  
 tire nation quality food.  
 Before a processor can  
 use an additive, he must  
 present information to the  
 Food and Drug Administra-  
 tion.

As such, he shows a  
 particular additive will ac-  
 complish its intended effect  
 in food—and that the amount  
 used doesn't exceed what's  
 reasonably necessary.  
 Spices natural and synthe-  
 tic flavors, such as liquid  
 derivatives of onion, garlic,  
 cloves and peppermint, make  
 up the largest group of ad-  
 ditives.  
 Stabilizers on the other  
 hand, prevent oxidation and  
 spoilage of food.  
 For years, people have  
 used salt, sugar, vinegar,  
 heat, baking, smoke and  
 heat to prevent food spoila-  
 ge. Modern food develop-  
 ments brought preservatives  
 such as antioxidants, mold  
 inhibitors and fungicides on  
 the scene.  
 "Without such anti-oxi-  
 dants as BHA and BHT,  
 baked goods and other foods  
 using oils and fats—would  
 turn rancid in a short time."  
 Another group of addi-  
 tives, non-nutritive sweet-  
 eners, are sugar substitutes.  
 They're used in foods inter-  
 tended for people who can't  
 tolerate sugar. Certain ad-  
 ditives actually  
 alter food quality.  
 "For example, bleaching  
 and maturing agents speed  
 up the aging process of  
 wheat—improving bread-  
 making quality of flour.  
 Freshly milled flour is  
 yellowish in color and makes  
 poor quality bread.  
 Although they don't im-  
 prove eating quality, colors  
 play a very important role.  
 They're used in foods accom-  
 panied to food, giving a certain  
 color—and refusing to eat if  
 it looks too pale.  
 Additives have other uses  
 besides those mentioned.  
 These include hardening,  
 drying, firming, whipping,  
 anti-sticking, whipping,  
 creaming and sterilizing.

## WAGE INSURANCE

President Carter had better start looking for life insurance for his "wage insurance" plan.

A few days before its birth, the plan, a vital part of the President's fight against inflation, looks as if it won't be long for this world.

Wage insurance would work this way: Groups of workers would take out the policy by agreeing to hold this year's pay raise to 7 per cent or less, if consumer prices rose more than 7 per cent this year, policy holders would get a tax cut or tax refund in 1980.

Carter maintains that this would give workers "an additional incentive" to take part in this program of voluntary wage and price standards. It "will remove their only legitimate reason not to cooperate," the President said.

Since then, the administration has been struggling to get some kind of legislation in shape that would put this issue to Congress. Thus far, it doesn't look as

though the measure will see the light of day.

For one thing, this wage insurance plan is so complicated that it is just about unworkable. And so few workers seem interested in it that the net effect would be zilch upon inflation.

For another thing, a lot of workers wouldn't be eligible for his tax benefit. This includes farmers, self-employed persons, those making the minimum wage.

Organized labor doesn't buy it because they have their sights set much higher than 7 per cent wage increase when contract talks come up this year.

And a lot of other people, in and out of Congress, are turned off the entire plan. To them, it smacks of another type of government intervention and regulation, of wage earners looking to Uncle Sam for a guaranteed income when they ought to take their chances in the free market.

The wage insurance plan may be dead, and nobody is mourning about it.

Life eases out a little when man decides his taste for fresh garden vegetables—the radish, the onion, the tomato—are not worth the battle with the weed.

Death creeps up when a man decides that it's time for younger men to coach the baseball team, meet with scouts, or get engaged in the hassle of community improvement.

He lost a lot of life when he decides that the status quo is good enough for him and it is not worth his time to change things to try to make them better.

When a man—or a town—decides that things can't or won't be better some other way, he's a long way gone toward dead already.

Death begins with a man or a town is born, or formed, and declines all of the rest of the way after the ambition and desire to change—to gamble on something better—stops.

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## STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

**AUSTIN**—What Virginia Stacey, president of the 125,000-member Texas State Teachers Association, had to say this week after studying Gov. Bill Clements' budget proposal stopped many Texans in their tracks.

If Clements' plan were followed, Stacey predicted Texas "would have poverty and chaos in a school system which is already underfinanced."

Last year, Texas ranked 31st in teacher pay. Texas educators fell \$1,713 below the national average in salaries. The Texas Education Agency estimates that teachers in 1978-79 will receive an average salary of \$12,975, ranking them even further down the scale, 33rd among the states.

Such numbers alarmed Stacey and the teachers she represents. The TSTA president urged her colleagues to look ahead and see what economic hardships might be in store for them, but Stacey also warned parents to consider what the consequences might be to the future of education in the state if present salary practices continued.

The governor eliminated the 5.1 percent pay increase for teachers recommended by the Legislative Budget Board. All state employees would be the beneficiaries of a 5.1 percent boost in pay, including teachers, if Clements' ideas are followed. But teachers would not receive the 5.1 percent hike on top of 3.2-4.9 percent raises they will already get under existing laws.

Sen. Pete Snelson's TSTA-backed school finance bill would give teachers a 15 percent increase in pay over the next two years. Stacey left the impression that teachers would take no prisoners in their struggle over higher wages. "TSTA intends to fight with all its strength," she declared.

# Walter Hollums Appointed Justice Of Peace For Precincts One And Four

### Succeeds Late H. E. Porter

Walter Hollums, sheriff of Floyd County for 16 years, was appointed Monday by the commissioners court to succeed the late H.E. Porter as justice of the peace for Precinct One and Four in this county. The appointment is effective until the next general election, November 1980.

Judge Hollums was sworn in about 8:45 a.m. Tuesday by County Judge Choise Smith. The brief ceremony was conducted in Judge Smith's office.

Hollums began his duties immediately. The commissioners court late last week called the special meeting for Monday to consider the vacancy. Nine applicants were interviewed by the county governing body before a decision on the appointment.

Judge Porter was sworn in Jan. 2 of this year to his second term as justice of the peace for Precincts One and Four. A J.P. will be elected in the November 1980 general election to complete the final two years on Judge Porter's unexpired term.

#### LONGTIME RESIDENT

Hollums has been a Floyd County resident since 1919. His first experience as a peace officer came when he served as a deputy sheriff under Sheriff Fred N. Clark from Jan. 1, 1937 until May

1942. He moved to Amarillo in 1942 and worked almost two years as a security guard at the Pantex defense plant. The Hollums family returned in late 1943 to this county, where he farmed until 1954.

At that time, he became a deputy under Sheriff Earl Cooper, a position he held for over a year before joining the Floydada Police Department. Hollums was a Floydada city officer until taking office Jan. 1, 1957 as Floyd County sheriff.

For 16 years Hollums was sheriff in this county until his retirement Jan. 1, 1973. He has done some farm work since that time.

Hollums and his wife Gertrude reside at 228 West Kentucky in Floydada. They are parents of three sons: Melvin Hollums of Oceanside, Calif., a retired Marine; Gene Hollums of Anderson, Missouri, assistant manager of an auto parts store; and Don Hollums of Bloomfield Hills, Mich., a naturalist in the public schools. The Hollums also raised a grandson — Mike Hollums, who is associated with an automotive supply house in Petersburg — from infancy following the death of his mother.

Before 390 persons heard "the nation's number one sportscaster" Monday evening at the 31st annual Floydada Chamber of Commerce Banquet in Duncan Elementary Cafetorium, they were informed that judges failed to

select an "Employer of the Year." Instead, the judges declared dual winners as the top "boss": Gene Ehler and Donnie Galloway. Galloway manages the Piggly Wiggly store in Floydada, and Ehler is local manager for

Pioneer Natural Gas Co. The pair were chosen by out-of-town judges from letters submitted by respective employees. "Employer of the Year" award is sponsored by the Women's Division of Floydada Cham-

ber of Commerce. **SPORTSCASTER DELIGHTS GUESTS** George Allen Summerall, product of a small Florida town which "reminds me

of this (Floydada)", was the guest speaker. He is better known as Pat Summerall of CBS Sports.

The fabled sportscaster, who told Floydada community residents and guests at the banquet that "it is good to be with nice people like you", relived some of his most unforgettable — and embarrassing — moments as an sports figure before answering questions from the audience.

This brought out some truths about other nationally known sports personalities. Lynn Swann, receiver for the Pittsburgh Steelers, reportedly told Summerall after this year's Super Bowl against the Dallas Cowboys that "when I saw the flag (on the controversial interference call against a Cowboy defender) I thought it was against me." Asked by Summerall if he would report that on the air, Swann smiled and replied "no, sir!"

**WHAT ABOUT HOWARD?** "What is the consensus among sportswriters of Howard Cosell?" was another question from a man in the audience. Thinking a moment, Summerall stated that "he has a wonderful wife!"

The banquet speaker, a former neighbor of the Cosells and a longtime acquaintance, remarked that Cosell has a "high IQ and is a hard worker...you have to have some degree of admiration for the job he does," adding that Cosell apparently had no desire to win a popularity contest. He also noted that a personal guest in the Cosell home "never met a nicer fellow or a better host."

What about the "nicest person" in sports? Without pause to ponder, Summerall said that "number 12 with the star on his helmet" is hard to beat. That obvious compliment to Cowboy quarterback Roger Staubach drew applause from the audience.

The CBS sportscaster admitted that after being associated with Staubach, Coach Tom Landry, and others, "it's hard not to be a Cowboy fan. However, he quickly added that anti-Dallas fans are "pretty vicious."

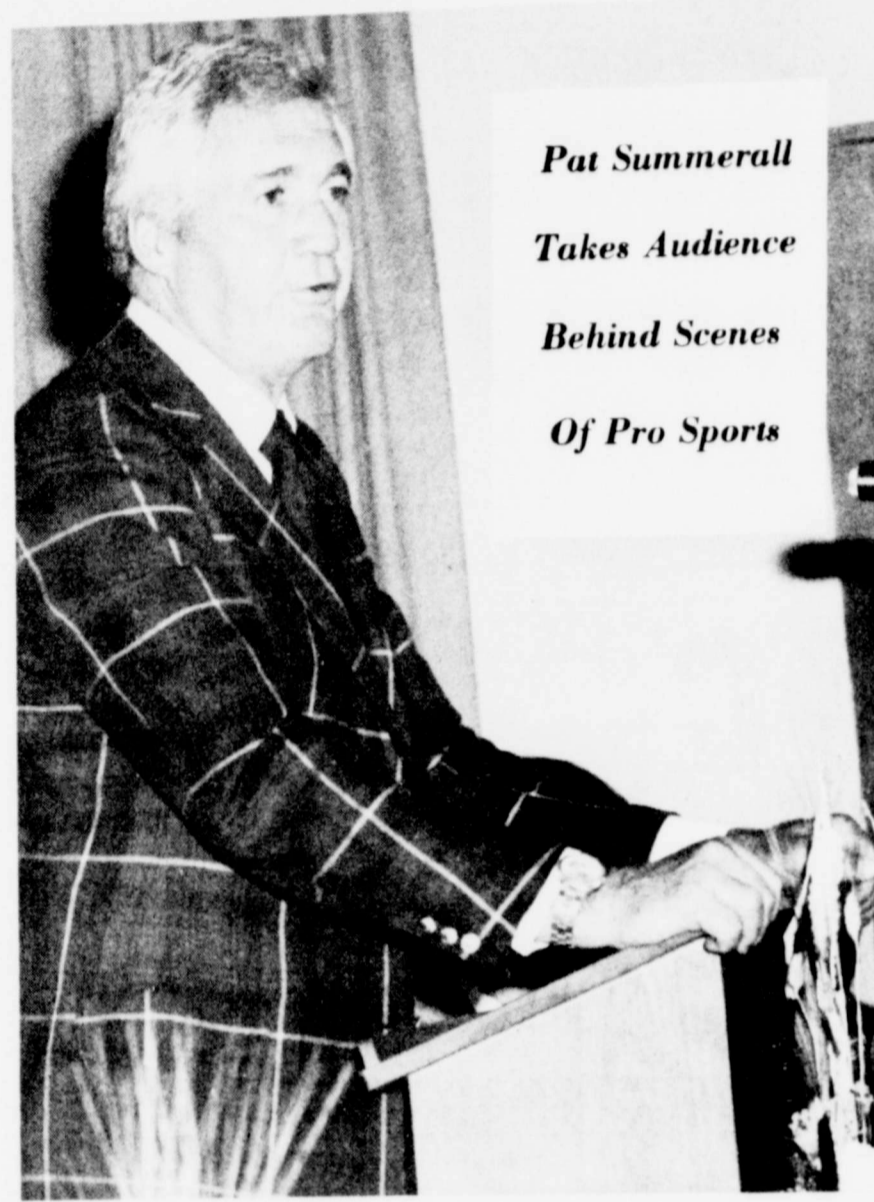

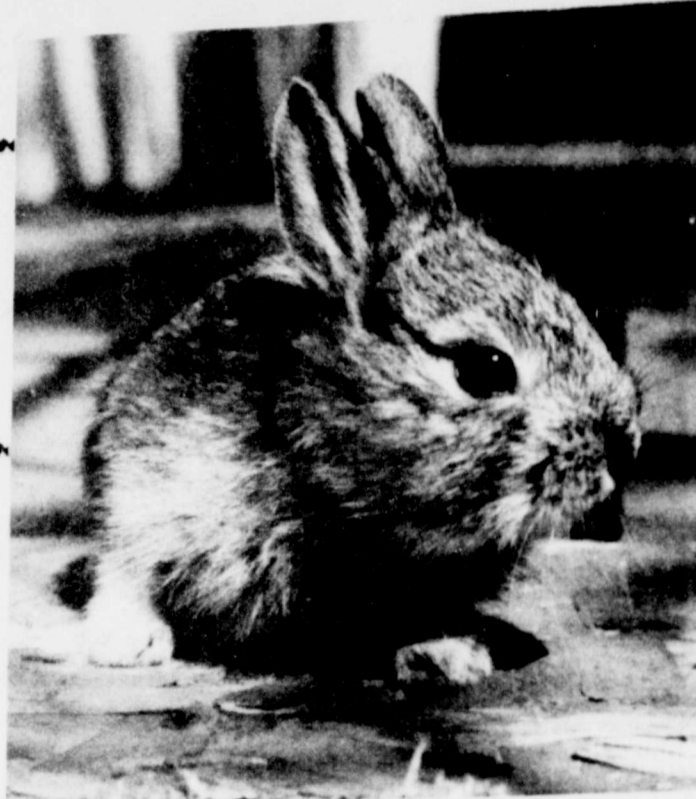

### Tuesday Night In Crosbyton

## Murder Defendant Takes Own Life

John Thomas Carter, who was charged with capital murder in the deaths last Fall of an elderly Lorenzo couple, Mr. and Mrs. Valton V. Gandy, took his own life Tuesday night.

He was being incarcerated in the Crosby County Jail in Crosbyton.

Two jurors had been selected Monday and Tuesday to hear Carter's trial.

Carter's suicide plot was carried out when he apparently shot himself one time in the right temple with a .22 calibre pistol. The weapon was found in the cell.

Deputy Sheriff Rayburn Flitts found Carter's body when he took the prisoner his breakfast at 8:10 a.m. Flitts immediately notified Sheriff Fred Owen and District Attorney Bill Marley, with the latter contacting the Department of Public Safety to conduct an investigation.

Due to remodeling underway at the jail, the murder defendant was the only inmate in the Crosby County Jail. Paula Bruce, who has been charged in the Gandy murders along with Carter, was moved three weeks ago to the Lubbock County Jail.

Carter was moved Sunday afternoon from the Lubbock County Jail to Crosbyton in order to stand trial.

The body was taken to Lubbock for an autopsy. At this time an oil-stained, hand-made holster and "over \$100" was found on Carter's body. The serial number had been filed from the .22 pistol.

Texas Ranger Jackie Peoples is heading the investigation. He and another Ranger were to "hand deliver" Carter's clothing and the pistol Thursday morning to the DPS laboratory in Austin for further analysis.

Editor's note: The Floyd Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm looks at the 55 mile an hour speed limit this week.

Dear editor:  
I've been trying to figure out a Washington ruling on the 55 mile an hour speed limit and may need your help.

As I understand it, Washington has found out — I don't know who spilled the beans — that about three-fourths of the drivers in this country ignore the 55 mile an hour limit and has announced that if this continues it'll shut off any more highway funds to any state that doesn't crack down on the speeders.

Washington can do that because it controls Federal funds doled out to the states to build Federal highways for better speeding. I'm told more funds come from taxes collected by the states from the states. I didn't know it. I figured since Washington has an iron-fisted control over the money it was Washington's money, that politicians there just chipped in to supply the funds.

I hope Congress doesn't use up the quota before the rest of us have a chance to get in on it.

By the way, I heard a rumor that a big truck, an 18-wheeler loaded to the gills, was stopped for going 75 miles an hour one day last week while passing a bus going 74. It's probably just a rumor. Nothing to it.
