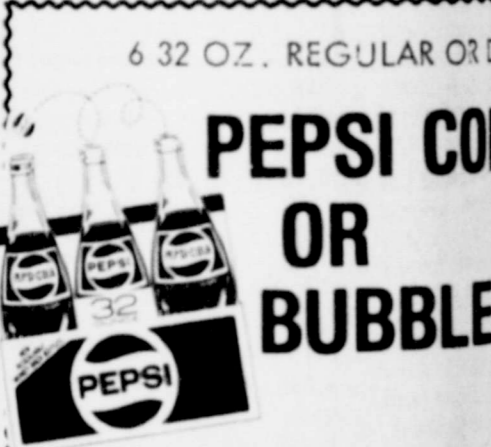

able blood donors are encouraged to give blood Tuesday at the Junior High School cafeteria. The Junior Study Club of Lockney is sponsor of the blood drive. Personnel from South Plains Blood Service in Lubbock, will be on hand to collect the blood. The local drive will be conducted from 4 to 6:30 p.m. Donors are asked to enter the building through the north side doors and go through the cafeteria. Plains Blood Service is a sponsored, non-profit organization whose main purpose is to provide blood components to all local hospitals as it is needed. Blood is donated on a voluntary basis, and there is no monetary value for the blood given. Donation is a selfless act for the benefit of others in need of this precious "Gift of Life." Plains Blood Service serves 38 in 22 counties of West Texas from New Mexico, including General Hospital.

**WHY SHOULD YOU BECOME A VOLUNTEER BLOOD DONOR?**

As a volunteer blood donor you will be helping to meet a vital need within your community. You will also be deriving benefits yourself. Before you give, a careful medical history will be taken. Your temperature, blood pressure, pulse and hemoglobin level will be checked. After the blood is drawn it is typed and tested for diseases which might be transmitted to the receiving patient or patients (yes, as many as four persons may benefit from your one donation). Should any of these tests indicate the need for medical attention, you will be referred to your personal physician. Also, after donating you will receive a card which lists your ABO and Rh blood type.

What is more, the need for blood is constantly increasing. The delicate balance between supply, demand and human life depends on blood donors.

At first many people are apprehensive about donating blood; however, millions of individuals are living today because of donors who realized the importance of giving "The Gift of Life."

## Dimon Schacht, Teacher By Profession, Homemaker By Choice

Felicia Appiewhite, a one-time school teacher, but a woman, church member, and a neighbor. She is Dimon (pronounced with long i as in diamond) Mrs. Henry Schacht in the phone directory. She lives in her house by going west on the Lockney-Plainview road. It makes all the difference in going there as to where off the highway to her house. You might find yourself through the Schacht farm if you sense of direction. The first road off the highway come one-fourth mile. I live in a house that faces the north. The house is brown and tan in color. It is not to confuse the one-fourth mile.

The first things to catch the eye when you see the Schacht house is a large tree. These 30-year-old trees are "watered every day" with patient, loving care. Living in a half-homesick recollection of the wooded area around her in McKinney prompted the trees in the growing of those trees, your interest will go to that yard growth around that "all need trimming and care."

"Hackberry and oak were good for fire, but boys' d' arc was very good. Boys' d' arc made a popping sound and had to be screened, but it made a hot fire."

Dimon remembers the week-end trips to grandfathers 2½ miles north of their house.

"We liked going on Friday afternoon and coming back late Saturday afternoon. We had to come back on Saturday to be home for church Sunday.

Her family was fortunate when they were growing up to have a mother who was a good seamstress who sewed, not only for her own family but for neighborhood children as well.

"Even when I was in college, she'd send me a dress and include one for my roommate. However, my last year in college, I made a middy suit with a braid-trimmed collar and a pleated skirt.

"Mother was also a practical nurse. She was so careful. She never came in the house with the clothes on that she wore while nursing.

"In 1918 in the "flu" epidemic, she was so careful that none of us had the 'flu'. Neighbors died all around us. There would be three and four in a family to die.

"When she would be gone, Father would get me and my sister up to help get breakfast. He would say, 'come help because Mother has gone to nurse a neighbor.'

"In those days, children were given responsibility. I believe that should be a part of their growing up. We practiced it in bringing our own children up."

When it was time for college, she left

McKinney.

She was in Commerce at the time of receiving a letter from her friend Maggie Crosswhite, telling her of an opening in the Erick school for an elementary teacher.

She was finishing her college work for a teacher's certificate. In all, she had done enough summer college study, together with her regular term study, to complete the hours to receive credit in home management and public school music.

Since she was qualified to teach and since such an appealing offer was made her, she came to Erick to teach.

This part of the world was "so different" in many ways. Besides the many other differences from home, there were the windmills. She just could not get used to those unusual things called windmills.

"Maggie and Ann Crosswhite and I did light housekeeping."

Not long after she came as a teacher in Erick, she attended a Teacher's Institute at Canyon the first week in September.

The Teacher's Institute was a forerunner of the present teacher's day once a year, where all the teacher's in a district meet together.

At the Institute, she had "quite an experience". A thunderstorm came up, with the thunder rolling down the canyon. This frightened her and added to her already homesick and unhappy state.

At Erick, school work was interesting. It was the best country school in the county. There were 10 grades with 100 children enrolled. Daily attendance was encouraged.

Of course, daily attendance was expected of the teachers. A 2½-mile walk was made by the two teachers in the elementary grades. Rain, snow or sunshine, they walked to school.

"The first year I was here, there was not so much snow, but in the fall there was so much rain.

"I had heard that there were lots of snakes here, so I wouldn't take my eyes off the road as I walked. I was so scared."

"Each October, school was dismissed for the children to pick cotton. Maggie and I picked some cotton," she remembers.

"Teachers were expected to spend the night in the home of each child in the room. The community expected it and the children looked forward to having 'teacher' go home with them for a visit."

The school had the backing of a lively, interested community.

The community took part in all the school activities. On trips to Palo Duro Canyon or the Linguish Falls, or on

Adhermen Jerry Perry, who is in charge of the police department, recommended approving the \$257.45 purchase, and all councilmen voted in favor of the measure. Another recent

(Old time delicacy from Scotland—crisp, thick, buttery) Mix together thoroughly 1 cup soft butter, 5/8 cup sugar (1/2 cup plus 2 table-spoons.) Stir in 2 1/2 cups sifted flour. Mix thoroughly. Chill dough. Roll out 1/4 to 1/8 inch thick. Cut into

desired shapes. Place on ungreased baking sheet. Bake in 300 degree oven 20 to 25 minutes. The tops do not brown during baking... nor does the shape of the cookies change.

### GINGER CRISPS

2 cups sifted all-purpose flour

1 teaspoon soda  
1 teaspoon cinnamon  
1/2 teaspoon ground cloves  
1/4 teaspoon ginger  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup lard  
1 cup sugar  
1 egg  
1/4 cup molasses  
1/2 cup nuts  
1/2 cup sugar for coating cookies

Sift together flour, soda, spices, and salt. Cream lard, sugar and eggs — add molasses. Beat well. Add dry ingredients to creamed mixture. Mix well. Shape dough into balls about the size of a walnut and roll in sugar. Place on a cookie sheet about 2 inches apart (do not flatten balls). Bake in 350 degree oven for 15 minutes.

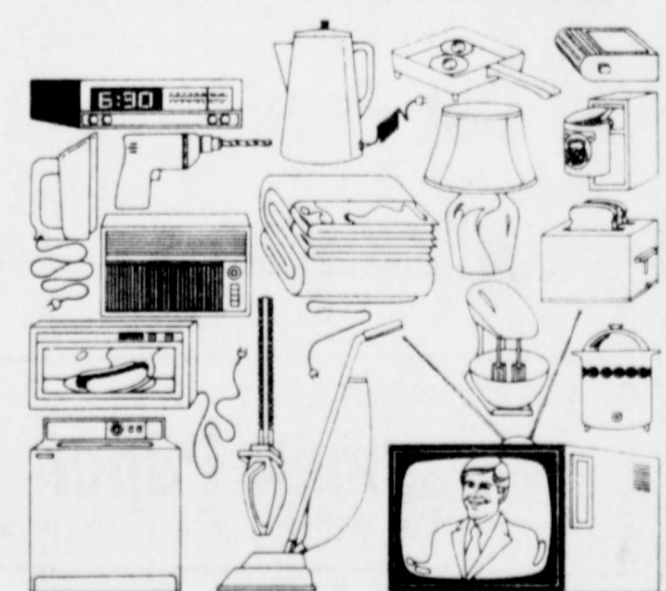

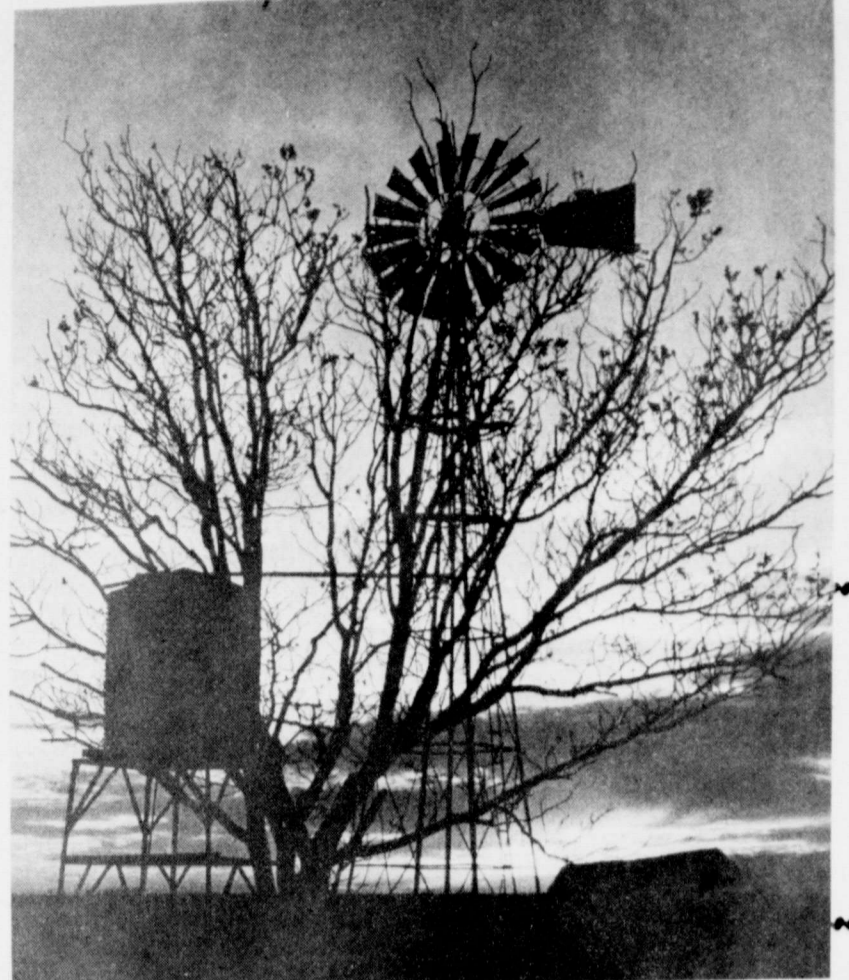

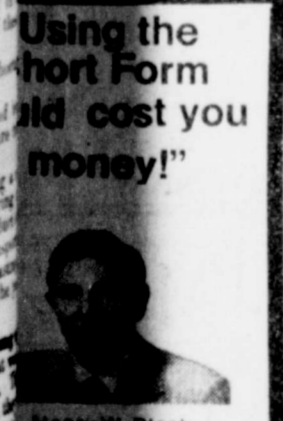

Top Qualifier For Derby Morris Filly Equals World Quarterhorse Speed Record

Quick Victory, a three-year-old filly co-owned by Linda S. Morris of Floydada, became the second Quarterhorse in history to register a 114 speed index. The feat was accomplished last Sunday when Quick Victory won her trial heat of the Lubbock Downs Spring Derby.

Mrs. Morris and her father, C.B. Koontz of Chillicothe, own the filly. She is leased to the Floydada woman.

The only previous Quarterhorse to post a 114 speed index was Dash for Cash, when he won the Champion of Champions two years ago in California. In addition to Quick Victory, which covered the 400-yard dash in 19.81, another horse owned by Mrs. Morris also won her trial heat and qualified for the derby finals this Sunday at Lubbock Downs. Her name is Stimasea, and she posted a 96 speed index.

Thus, two of the 10 Derby finalists will be Morris horses. The estimated gross purse is \$25,000.

Linda S. Morris has white and green silks, adorned with a bearing a hybrid ensignia.

The trials represented the second out this year for each filly. Quick Victory and Stimasea were limited to a single race as two-year-olds, due to illness. Quick Victory had a chip removed last year and also suffered a rattlesnake bite in September.

Linda Morris stayed 'night and day' with her valuable filly following the snake bite.

After the Lubbock Downs Spring Derby finals this Sunday, Mrs. Morris plans to send her horses to Centennial Race Track in Colorado for the Denver Derby. Trials are slated April 13.

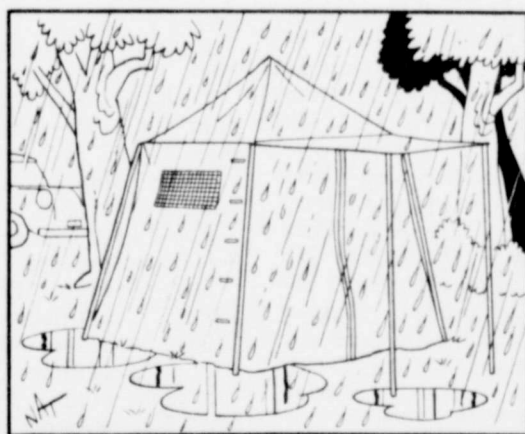
Quick Victory and Stimasea then are scheduled to be taken to Ruidoso Downs.

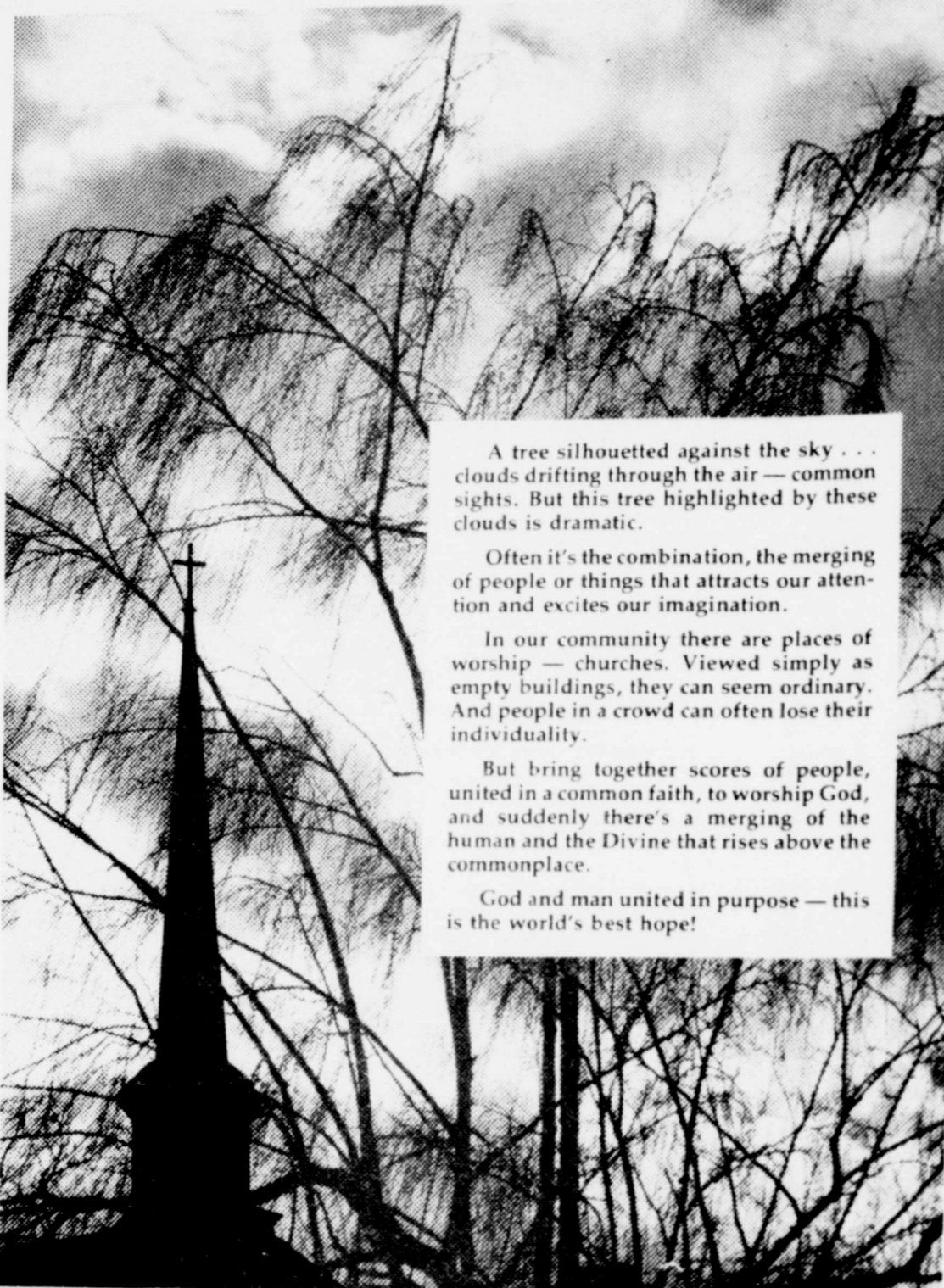
