



Families with "ailing" budgets will get free advice on how to "cure" them during "Dollar Watch," a new computer program for

Floyd County residents. "Dollar Watch" is set from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. on April 5, 6, and 7 at the Lubbock Civic Center.

During the program, a computer will look at spending habits - and set up a new personalized budget for families who request one.

"Dollar Watch" is sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. It is open to people of all ages regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, sex, religion or national origin.

In addition, those attending will receive order blanks for several different types of publications designed to help them study their budgets and develop stronger spending habits.

Among the publications is a "financial Record Book," (MP-1304), available for one dollar from the Department of Agricultural Communication, Texas A&M University, College Station, Texas.

This publication helps families figure out where their money is going - the first step in discovering what is "ailing" the family bud-

During "Dollar Watch," families will learn how to analyze their current spending habits in detail - by using checkbook records or cash register receipts or the "Financial Record Book.

Then they will learn how to examine family goals and set realistic goals.

BUDGET 'CHECK-UP'

In looking at spending habits and in setting goals, families must do several things - steps we will teach during the "Dollar Watch" program. Some of those things include the following:

A Look At Spending Habits Before looking at goals and resources, first get down to the nitty-gritty: where is your money really going?

How much do you spend on the so-called fixed expenses - rent or mortgage payment, installment payments, utilities, taxes, insur-

What do you spend on flexible expenses - food, clothing, household furnishings and improvements, gifts, health care, entertain-

Study Current Goals

Next, examine family goals - both short-range and long-range.

Short-range goals may include anything from new tennis shoes for the kids to paying off your revolving charge account bill.

Long-range goals may include a house, a new car or security for your retirment

> Resources, Goals Must 'Match'

In view of the resources you have to work with, are your goals realistic? Can you honestly hope to have a home, two cars, a boat, new furniture, a new coat as well as a secure retirement and college for the kids? If you had to set priorities, what would you be willing to do without? Are you already in over your ears trying to accomplish goals that you really can't afford?

Finances Set Goal Limits Setting goals requires answering the question, Where do I want to go? For an answer to "How am I going to get there?," take a close look at your family finances.

How To Look At Finances Estimate your total income for the coming year. Be realistic. If a year-end bonus is

'iffy," don't count on it. Also, exclude overtime, which may or may not be available, and include a raise only if it's a sure thing. Is unemployment a possibility? Then find out what your income would be if you


