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

Floydada Men Cooperate In Jungle Rain Forest Mission

"We were in the jungle rain forest in Guatemala," either Dr. Jack Jordan or Dr. Charles Craig will answer when asked where they went in February this year on their 13th annual flying mission trip." Their first trip was in February

This trip was made, like others, with the Flying Dentist Association under the auspices of the Christian Dental

With the doctors making the trip for his 6th time was Jack McIntosh. Also, making the trip for the 5th time was Louis Lloyd, a former spray pilot. These two men know "about planes, know how to keep things going" in village work. An example: this year, they fixed an electric generator that had been inoperative for 5 months. They rewound

The 4 men left Floydada on February 7th in 2 single-engine 4-place private aircraft. Each plane carried 2 men, medical

supplies and equipment. 'Our destination was Nuevo Vida in the Peten Jungle of northern Guate-

This small country-properly called the Republic of Guatemala- has a 70-mile coastline on the Caribbean and 220 miles on the Pacific. It is bordered on the west and north by Mexico and on the east by British Honduras and El

After taking off from Floydada, they flew to Brownsville, then to Tampco, Mexico and on to Vera Cruz and the Isthumus of Thuantepec where they crossed from the Gulf to the Pacific. Their last stop before Guatemala City

was Tapachula. We were in Guatemala City 2 days waiting for the weather to better. While there we did renew our relationship with the Wycliff Bible Translators and Mission Aviation personnel.

"On Saturday, we were able to get to Coban where we were another 2 days because of a heavy mist called "cheapie cheapies." Here we met missionary pilot, Royce Riggs.

"The airport runway in Coban is long and extremely rough and is uphill one way. You land uphill and take off down

A Guatemala twin-engine aircraft lies on its back a few hundred feet from the runway because it had tried taking off

"We waited for a clear ceiling for us to take off and were able to do so Monday morning. Our destination was Sayaxache where the road that leads toward Nuevo Vida, which was 18 miles

After leaving Coban, there is nothing but jungle vegatation.

"For 1/2 to 3/4 of an hour, we saw nothing-no trails, no Indians, no houses just flat rolling jungle. The heavy vegetation had mahogany trees 60 to 70 feet high mixed with banana, other trees, and vines.'

The trees were so close together that their tops formed a solid canopy. Young trees can grow only where an old tree falls to let in the light. The broad leaves are always green.

Most of the land along the rivers in the Peten of Northern Guatemala has been taken by people who were starving at some other place. These people come in and clear a place leaving the banana trees standing. They then plant corn and beans between the trees in the clearings.

There is a choice in going to Nuevo Vida between going by boat or going by bush-type aircraft. The Floydada men

"We were flown by a missionary aviator air plane in five minutes. The boat trip takes 6 hours going down stream.

"Nuevo Vida was a pleasant sight to us with its 35 acres of cleared land including the runway which was short and undulating bearing a couple of trees that prevented a straight final approach.

"It's a Mennonite settlement. A Mennonite missionary named Stolzfus with his family from Pennsylvania formed the settlement 7 years ago. They had first settled on a small

island in the river but soon found that during the rainy season, they were

They then machete-hacked a more livable space not far from the island on the bank of the river.

Most of the Indians who moved here were from the mountains to this government settlement project. Most of Stolzfus had found that he could not

separate himself from doing medical first aid along with establishing church work. He was limited in this endeavor because of lack of equipment. He had one dental instrument that he used to take his children's teeth out. The Mennonites had access to boats

that passed up and down the river. These boats were made in Sayaxache and were 35 feet long, 7 feet wide and could carry 20 tons. They were propelled by an 18-horse-power outboard motor engine and moved very slowly.

"We had our own bed rolls and a back-pack tent. We also had back-pack food. Since they had made a tent for us, we slept in it.

Here as in other sections, the vegetation had been cleared leaving selected trees.

One of the trees commonly found is the ceiba tree. They are usually about 70 feet tall. The limbs on this tree come out at the same place on the trunk, but opposite each other at a 90 degree

They also leave the nut palm tree when making a clearing. It bears an edible nut about the size of a bantam egg. These nuts grow in large clusters. On arrival in the village, the medical group set up for work.

They were shown a pretty, young girl in the village who had been brought to them about half dead a little while before. For some reason she had been left in the care of her grandfather and had been neglected.

When she was brought to the Mennonite village, she had no skin left on the top of her feet. During the time that she had lain ill, the chickens had come along pecking at her feet until the





The G.L. Burns Collection, new at Floyd County Historical Museum, includes points and artifacts found by Burns in the early 1900's.

These interesting items were recovered from the Pease River, Tule Canyon, Palo Duro Canyon, on the old Crawford Ranch northeast of Lockney, along the Canadian River in Texas and New Mexico, at Roaring Springs and several other Floyd County locations.

The Obsedian point was given to Burns by an Indian in New Mexico. Pottery and a piece of a peace pipe also were from New Mexico. Some of the points are from Indiana and Alabama.







ted since 1963, is quoted throughout the United States as the most authoritative source as to the production of fat cattle in the Southern Great Plains area. "During the 1978 period, the feedlot

capacity came to 2,728,400, which reflects a reduction of about 6,000 head over 1977. This also represents the consolidation of feedlots and the conversion to growing operations," Thomas

The total impact of the feedyard industry on the business community exceeded 8-billion dollars for the second

year," Thomas said, "and the farm sale value exceeded 2-billion dollars. Profits on feedlots or fed cattle have ranged from a low of \$3.33 per head to a high of \$137.00 during the last 120 days.

The survey also showed that the packing plant annual slaughter capacity continues to exceed 5-million head. "The only foreseeable limitations on

the future of the fed cattle industry is the possibility and probability that the customer's ability to buy may be exceeded, however, this is not in sight," Thomas said.

The survey has made a major contribution to the development and growth of the industry and has been especially valuable in the vertical integration that has occurred in the SPS service area.

Copies of the survey will be available at Southwestern Public Service Company offices in about 60 days.

Larger Cotton Crop To Dampen Prices

season will likely fall if plantings increase as expected," says Dr. Carl G. Anderson with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The marketing specialist says pros-

pects for more education, small U.S. 1978 cotton supplies, and strong export demand will highlight this year's cotton

"With normal yields, this year's production could develop into a 13-million-bale or larger crop, thus pushing prices down. Plantings should total 13.5 to 14.2 million acres compared to 13.4 million last year. Prices could approach the 1979 Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) loan rate of 50.23 cents a pound for Strict Low Middling, 1-1/6-inch cotton by late this year," projects the economist.

With prospects for lower cotton prices, producers may want to consider forward contracting or hedging in the futures market during the next several months when and if a favorable price can be established, says Anderson.

He expects exports to total six million bales this year, with cotton disappearance for the 1978-79 marketing year reaching 12 million bales. The estimated 1978 crop was 10.8 million bales.

"Cotton stocks will total about four million bales by Aug. 1, down 1.3 million bales from last year. However, carryover stocks will remain close to the average since 1974," believes the

U.S. cotton supplies will likely increase from one to two million bales during the 1979-80 crop year, resulting in a carryover of five to six million bales

Foreign cotton supplies are also smaller, with carryover declining one million bales to 18 million. This is the smallest foreign carryover since Aug. 1, 1971, notes Anderson.

"Cotton prices strengthened last fall largely because of the small U.S. crop and strong foreign demand. Yet heavy sales in January contributed to a sharp slump in prices. Average prices to Texas growers dropped from about 60 cents a pound in November to around 52

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"Cotton prices for the 1979 harvest cents in February. Currently, overall demand for existing cotton supplies appears soft," says Anderson.

> Over the short run, spot prices will probably move up and down several cents a pound as new developments (reflecting supply and demand) surface.

Use Of Fungicides Helps To Prevent Seedling Disease

cotton are lost because of seedling with fungicide can partially compensate disease across the Cotton Belt. Re- for reduced seed quality, he reported. search which may save these lost bales is being conducted here by a plant pathologist with USDA Science and Education Administration (SEA).

The work, to give cotton seedlings the best chance to produce a high quality crop, is being done by Dr. Earl B. Minton, in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. It is being conducted at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center north of the Lubbock

'Getting a uniform stand of vigorous cotton seedlings is critical in producing a profitable cotton crop," Dr. Minton said. "Healthy plants are more productive that diseased plants because they can better utilize soi! nutrients and moisture." Vigorous cotton seedlings may produce more bolls and mature the crop before the onset of adverse weather, he added.

"For the best possible cotton crop," the plant pathologist said, "the highest quality seed available should be planted." However, seed quality is often not as good as desired, he added. The best alternative is to plant seed properly treated with fungicide, Minton said.

"The ideal treatment has not yet been developed," Minton said, "but progress is continuing to be made." Laboratory and greenhouse tests being

Seed with mechanically damaged coats, when treated with fungicide, attains greater increases in seedling emergence and seedling survival than untreated seed with intact coats. "However", he cautioned, "intact seed treated with fungicide should be planted since fungicides will not completely compensate for damaged seed.' Seed dressing also reduces the seed

rate for planting because it increases seedling emergence and survival. "This saving in planting seed has more than paid the cost of seed dressing in many instances," he said. "Until about 15 years ago," Minton said, "only seed protectant fungicides
