Steve Herber Offers Tips On Plant Care

Indoor plants do not have the advantage of the cleans-ing effect of rainfall to keep their leaf surfaces free from dust. To keep them looking their best a careful cleaning once or twice a month is helpful.

For smooth-leafed plants, a wet sponge or soft cloth rinsed frequently in clean water is a dependable method. For specimens having many small leaves it may be best to take the plant outdoors and syringe with plenty of water.

Plants with hairy leaves require special attention. A camel hair brush used carefully to avoid bruising the leaves works well.

If commercial leaf polishes are used, be sure to water the plant thoroughly several hours before application.

Floyd Cities Show Slight Decrease In Tax Rebates

Bullock Friday said rebate to Texas 10 percent ahead of payments for the cities of the one-percent optional city same period last year.

> Bullock said Texas cities have received \$241.5 million in rebates for the first seven months of this year compared to \$216.3 million through July of 1978. Both Floyd County cities, however, show slight decreases from last year for the seven-month period.

Lockney's July rebate check will be for \$1,341.39, bringing the 1979 total to \$19,377.22. The city's seven-month total last year \$19,512.34.

Floydada will get \$3,092.36 this month, bringing the 1979 total to \$44,724.02, some two percent lower than last year. Floydada's 1978 pay ments through July totalled \$45,717.62.

Abernathy, \$23,381, up 10 percent from last year; Dimmitt, \$55,629, down 16 percent; Crosbyton, \$18,430, down three percent; Hale Center, \$13,715, up 12 percent; Idalou, \$10,993, down one percent; Littlefield, \$108,072, up four percent; Lorenzo, \$6,467, down 33 percent; Lubbock, \$4,189,863, up four percent; Matador, \$7,110, up one percent; Olton, \$21,252, up six percent; Petersburg, \$9,069, up five percent; Plainview, \$400,381, up one percent; Ouitaque, \$5,582, down two percent; Silverton, \$8,382, down 10 percent; Tulia, \$59,994, down four percent; Turkey, \$5,331, down two percent.

Houston's rebate for this month will be \$5 million. The city has received \$50.8 million in tax rebates for 1979. Dallas will get a July rebate of \$2.7 million, bringing the city's year-to-date payments to \$28.6 million, a 12-percent



Many Floyd County farmers are saving money, energy and underground water supplies by making use of lake water irrigation.

Above average rainfall during the late spring and early summer months (some 10 inches in June alone) filled most area

lakes to capacity.

The availability of surface water for irrigation purposes is welcomed by most farmers because it provides a method for watering crops that nets definite monetary savings. Estimates on savings vary because cost of fuel and other expenses depends on many variables, such as the type of motor and size of pump involved.

Estimated cost per month to run a 6 inch, 400 gallon per minute under-

ground irrigation well on natural gas is about \$1,500 plus (figured at \$2 per hour, 24 hours a day). Operating expense for a 30 h.p. four inch submergible with a 350' lift and pumping approximately 250 gallons a minute is estimated at \$500 per month.

Comparatively, one area farmer who is using a 292 Chevrolet six inch lake pump, pumping 1000 gallons a minute and fueled by 38-cents-a-gallon butane, is estimated to run in the neighborhood of \$1,368 a month. Monthly operational expense estimate for the same farmer using a four cylinder Leroi motor from an old combine, using about two gallons of fuel per hour and pumping about 800 gallons a minute, is \$545. Savings in this instance are evident in the amount of water pumped - 800

the Texas Department of Health.

The one case discovered in Floyd County this year showed up in a skunk. Another case, this one dog rabies, was reported in Dickens County, the other member of TDH's Region Two.

Through the first six months of 1979, the TDH reported, the rabies total statewide reached 613 cases. Last year's complete total was only 563 cases.

Three children from the Eagle Pass -Piedras Negras area on the Rio Grande have died from rabies, the first outbreak of natural exposure in Texas since

AUSTIN .- The recent decision to suspend the priority of farmers to receive 100 percent of their fuel needs "further threatens the nation's food supply. The suspension could create chaos in Texas, with dollar losses in the millons," Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown said recently.

The special rule issued by the U.S. Department of Energy gave priority in the allocation of all fuels to farmers, Brown said. That rule was suspended June 22, after pressure from the truckers' strike.

"At the time of planting, the farmers were assured that they would receive all the fuel they needed," Brown said. "Now billions of dollars are tied up in crops in the fields, some of which are rotting right now because of the truckers' problems.



He said his second bill would change a provision in federal law that, for practical purposes, permits a judge setting bail to consider only whether the accused will show up for trial. Bentsen proposes that judges, in crimes involving terrorism, be permitted to also consider whether the defendent poses

Senator Bentsen noted that a study of individuals being prosecuted under the Career Criminals Program in Dallas indicated that more than 36 percent of them were out of jail on bail for previous crimes at the time of their

"I would urge the Judiciary Committee to carefully evaluate my bills and conduct a full review of bail laws, to determine how community safety can best be protected in accordance with our laws. Crimes are committed every day by violent,

dangerous people who are out on bail," Bentsen said. "I look forward to working with the Judiciary Committee on this important task and I believe that in the coming year we have an opportunity to pass important reforms," Senator Bentsen said.







AUSTIN-Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown recently announced regulations which allow certain retailers in Texas to price petroleum fuel products in

one-half gallon increments. The action was taken to ease the growing problem of dispensing fuel costing \$1 or more a gallon through pumps which can register only 99.9 cents. An estimated 90 percent of retail pumps in the state fall into this category, Brown said.

The regulations will become effective on July 3, after publication in the Texas Register.

"The emergency rule will provide for a uniform method of sale where fuel prices are \$1 or more a gallon," Brown said. "It will help eliminate confusion for the consumer about the per-gallon cost of fuel and the methods of calculating this cost at the



A federal law that is a tradi major bastion of American free enterprise is under heavy attack in the U.S.

It is the Davis-Bacon Act, which since its enactment in 1931 has helped American working people become independent business owners through the skill of their hands and the drive of their ambitions. The stated purpose of the Act is to require that contractors on federal and federally financed construction pay wages prevailing for the same type of work in the locality of the construction.

Davis-Bacon was enacted. in part, because of the abuses of predatory contractor sharks who fleeced the federal government and taxpayers, exploited their workforce, and brought misery to the communities which public works were supposed to enhance.

Since it was signed into law by President Hoover, the Act has worked to require honest bids on government contracts. It has put a premium on good work and managerial efficiency in the American free enterprise




