

"I like to think of those people back there who worked hard and made plans for the future. They worked to build. I like to think of my father as a man of principle," says Agnes Cooper, daughter of Floyd County's first rural mail carrier.

Her father was Luther A. Cooper, who was "considered one of the best rural carriers in the state" and always gave his many patrons the "very best possible service," according to newspaper reports of him.

'My dad was born in Stephens County, Texas. When he was quite young his father moved the family to near Quanah. I heard him speak of Quanah Parker, the old Indian Chief.

They lived not far from Quanah. "I used to think that Indians were to be feared. I supposed you were to be scared to death of them. But my daddy and my grandfather had a good association with Quanah. He was their friend, and what a wonderful man he was."

The Cooper family did not live near Quanah long. They soon moved to Lockney. The move was in 1906.

"My grandfather was on the first City (Vernon) Cruse of Fort Worth; Mrs. Council in Lockney. He was also active Johnnie (Barnhart) Hilliard (class sponin Methodist Church work. For a while the parents went to their separate churches. The children went first with one, then the other of the parents. The mother made the decision that brought unity.

"I saw there was one way to be united and that was for me to join the Methodist," her daughter quotes her mother as saying. "That was the only solution because my father would never have left the Methodist Church," she adds.

"Both my parents were such hard workers. I always dreaded the day when they would retire. The solution for their retirement came when they joined other Lockney couples each year to go to the Valley and to Rockport. I found they could play as hard as they had worked. "Dad lived ten years after retire-

ment. He died in 1958. Mother lived sixteen years longer. She died in 1974." Luther Cooper "amassed quite a bit of property." On the days he returned early from the route, he ate lunch and spent the afternoon working on the

"W.T. Cooper, my uncle, who was the only child of Grandfather's second marriage, is making his forty-third crop on the place my dad bought near Barwise.

Because of the record number of years of service and because of his dedication to his work, Luther Cooper was publicized in area papers.

One paper wrote: "The horse-trader mail man has dropped the flag on his last rural mail box. He has made a final trip on Route 1 between Lockney and Silverton. His forty-year record is believed to be the longest of any rural carrier in the Panhandle of South Plains.'

The newspaper continues, "In the horse and buggy days, Cooper was known as a man who would trade horses at the drop of a hat. The only one who ever got the best of him in a trade was

'When I took the saddle off that horse, he was so sway backed I was ashamed to take him home.'

The man who traded that horse to Luther Cooper still lives on the place where he was living at the time of the trade.

"Luther was so aggravated with that horse that he was working that he was more than willing to trade with me.

"The horse was so full of pep the morning of our trade that he wouldn't stand. That horse would pull up and Luther would have to back him up, or he would back up and Luther would have to make him move forward to get him in a position to put the mail in the boxes.

"I had been watching Luther's pony as he drove him each day and I liked the pony. I was on a one-eyed horse the day of the trade. When I rode up to the mail boxes. Luther was filling boxes and trying to make the pony stand. He asked me, 'How would you trade horses?' I told him that I would trade even. 'What would your dad say? Luther wanted to know.

"When I told him that the horse was mine and that Dad didn't care what I did with him, the trade was made by Luther's saying, 'All right, just pull the saddle off.' Later, Luther told that that horse was

so slow, he was until eleven o'clock getting back to town that night. The other of the two traders says, "I

rode the pony that I got from Luther four years. He never did stop pitching, so I sold him to a bucking-horse show. Luther and I did that trade over there at

the corner that had become a popular meeting place when people went for their mail. That served as a good meeting place. It was a place where community news and gossip was passed from one to the other. Some funny

things happened there, too. One was after cars came into the community.

"Wiley Nance's father came early once in his car to get the mail. He was one of the first people in the community to own a car. While he was waiting for the mail, he went to sleep. The kids pushed him way down the road away from his mail box. Mr. Nance never did wake up. Later, when he did wake up, he just got out and went in front of the car and cranked it and came back for his work with people throughout the mail.'

Luther couldn't deliver mail because of illness, "they picked up some old boy in town" to take his place. This "old boy" messed things up. It seemed, he put a little mail in each box regardless of the name written on the mail. Mail was delivered all over the country. "That day a little of ours was

delivered over near Providence. I don't know whether that boy could read or not." says a man whose family mail box was on the route.

Luther Cooper began driving a car as soon as he could buy one. He still had to use the horse and buggy or use the horse at least during muddy or snow drift days.

"I don't remember what year dad began using a car. Fords and Chevrolets were the ones he used. I remember during World War I when you couldn't get a car. He had a Ford that he drove 100,000 miles and never had trouble with it. He used Amalie oil, and he thought it was the best in the world. I remember he bought a Chevrolet from Mr. Barker.'

The last vehicle that the carrier used was a Jeep. A Jeep was good on muddy roads. Finally, he sold the Jeep to Langford, another carrier. In all, he had had fifteen or eighteen cars. The Jeep was a little better "Mudder" than any of them. After he bought the Jeep, he said, "Mail carrying is not near so much a nightmare in bad weather." He had had some "rough" experiences at times with weather, regardless the mode of travel.


"I have been pulled out of mud holes and shoveled out of snow drifts many times. I am anxious to see a big rain when I retire. I have not been in a position to enjoy a good rain in forty years," he said about the time he was retiring.

H.B. Manches, Lockney postmaster, accompanied Cooper on his last trip on the route. Other postmasters he had served under were Homer Howard, Mrs. Dell Fowler and C.J. McCollum. At the time of his retirement, George Mahon wrote him, "Congratulations on a great job. You have served the people well and faithfully in an important capacity, and I know it must give you much satisfaction to contemplate your vears.'

Grasshoppers Plaguing West Ter

Hordes of grasshoppers are strip-ping rangelands in the Texas Panhandle and have their sights on pastures, ranges and crops to the south and east.

Some 1.5 million acres of rangeland have already been treated or will be treated shortly in the Texas Panhandle, report Dr. Mike McWhorter and Dr. Phil Hamman, entomologists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Counties in the spray area have a grasshopper count ranging from 32 to 54 per square yard. A count of eight adult grasshoppers per square yard is consid-ered enough for control measures.

According to McWhorter and Hamman, the spray program for rangeland involves use of the insecticide malathion and is being conducted on a cost-share

basis with ranchers, the Texas Department of Agriculture, and the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Spray applications are made after grasshoppers hatch and before females start laying eggs.

The entomologists encourage farmers and ranchers as well as homeowners to check for grasshopper infestations along roadsides, fence rows or idle, undisturbed ground where the pests may be hatching. A key to effectively suppressing grasshopper numbers is to treat these hatching areas early before young hoppers begin to migrate. A bait mixture using toxaphene has

been effective in controlling grass-hoppers along field margins and roadsides, point out McWhorter and Ham-man. The formulation calls for 100 pounds of mill-run bran, 1¹/₃ pints of Toxaphene 6E, 7 to 8 gallons of water, Sorghum-Malathian U 4, Sevin 80S and Sevin Silv Wheat and Other Smalls athion EC or ULV, Pen 4 and Sevin 4 Oil; Rangeland-Diazinon A

Personal Protection - Defense Against

Hard hats, protective eyewear, safety shoes-farmers and ranchers are not fully prepared for a day's work unless they're wearing them. Industry has found that safety apparel has paid off in fewer and less serious on-the-job injur-ies. Farm safety leaders believe that agriculture can also benefit from routine

use of protective equipment. According to William D. Hanford, manager of the National Safety Council's Farm Department, an analysis of data derived from farm accident surveys suggests that nearly half of the work injuries might have been prevented or made less severe if the victim had been

needless accidents. Farmers and ranchers simply can't afford not to make safety a part of their working day.

"Of course, the best safety device is to work in a way that reduces the chance of accidents. But, for the best possible job of injury prevention, we must urge the use of personal protective equipment.'

The cost of the equipment is reasona-ble and, said Hanford, "downright cheap when you consider the money and misery it could save."
