Revenue Sharing Funds 'Tight' Judge Smith Warns Groups

Floyd County Judge Choise Smith warned groups who appeared at the dations for revenue sharing allocations courthouse Monday to put in requests to the various groups at the special for a portion of the revenue sharing funds that they probably would not get as much as they wanted.

The judge blamed the money shortage on higher-than-anticipated costs for meeting, the commissioners approved a refurbishing the county jail up to state

Judge Smith told approximately a "shocked" at the \$280,000 low bid for the jail construction but the specifications had been cut as much as they could be cut. Earlier bids for a more elaborate construction reached as high as a half-million dollars, Smith said, and the commissioners readjusted their specifications to lower the cost.

'With the jail costs being higher,' Smith told the group, "the revenue sharing funds will be tight for other projects. There will be no excess, but we'll take suggestions for the remain-

In addition to the jail remodeling, the commissioners alredy approved \$60,000 for heating and air conditioning at the courthouse. The jail and courthouse projects account for more than \$360,000 of the available \$388,272.

'There are things we need more than a place to lock a man up," the judge said, "but the state came in and insisted that we update the jail." He noted that the improvements would include facilities for juveniles, women and drunks as well as the emergency life-saving equipment.

Representatives from the Floyd County Museum, the Senior Citizens group and the Friends of the Library. among others, were on hand to state

The judge praised the civic and community groups for their work and promised to to the best he could to meet as many requests as possible

Judge Smith defended the commissioners' decision to allocate the major portion of the revenue sharing funds to the jail and courthouse projects, saying that it was possibly the last opportunity to get outside financing for the work. The revenue sharing program, he noted, was in danger of being cut off next year. "We've already lost the lateral road fund." he said.

'We don't want to raise taxes, we're trying to hold them down," Judge Smith said, but the projects must be paid for somehow.

The judge will present his recommencommissioners meeting Aug. 21. The commissioners will also sign the jail construction contract on that date.

Also accepted was a \$54,630 bid from the Willo Products Co. for detention equipment. A 45-day time limit and 5 percent bond were stipulated on that







With today's interest in generic drugs, consumers should be aware that there are some illegally marketed drugs available for sale. The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) recently issued a warning to people who take the prescription diuretic pill furosemide-primarily older people suffering from heart, kidney or high blood pressure problems. The FDA advised these people may be taking "illegally marketed tablets that could be ineffective and, therefore, harmful to patients who need the drug.

The FDA cautions patients taking furosemide there are an estimated 2.1 million, 80 percent of them over 60 years old-to be sure the name Hoechst is on one side of the tablet and Lasix is on the other. Hoechst-Roussel, the only

manufacturer lawfully marketing furosemide tablets, sells it under the trade name Lasix. FDA advises patients taking furosemide tablets that do not have the name

Lasix on the other should ask their pharmacists for a replacement. People who are unsure whether they have the right product should see their pharmacists

CHRISTMAS TREE. Saint Nick wouldn't recognize this variety. It is the assembly of fittings and valves that caps a completed well. It controls the flow of oil from the well to storage tanks or pipelines.

FIREFLOODING. Although it sounds like a contradiction in terms, it refers to another way to increase production of heavy oil. Oil

deep underground is ignited and fed large amounts of air. This heats and thins nearby oil and provides pressure to move it to producing wells. LIGHT ENDS. Not what

weight watchers hope to achieve after dieting. They are the more volatile products of petroleum refining, such as gasoline, propane and butane.

HOT FOOTING. The application of heat to the lower extremities . . . of a well. Involves installing a heater at the bottom of an input well to thin heavy crude oil and increase its flow to nearby producing wells



CRUDE. An individual who is crude is often said to be unrefined. In the oil industry, crude refers to oil that is unrefined. It is oil just as it comes out of the well.

JOINT. It is not a funny cigarette. It is a section or length of steel pipe or casing from 20 to 30 feet long. Joints are added one at a time to drive the rotating drill bit into the earth. The string of pipe is pulled up out of the hole in

HOUSTON, Tex. — In today's complex world, every business has its own terminology. The oil business is no exception, and the language of the modern oilman is particularly colorful. It is not that so many of the words themselves are uncommon, but the meanings they have taken on in the oilfields give an interesting flavor to the oilman's speech. Aminoil USA, Inc., a subsidiary of R.J. Reynolds Industries, Inc., offers the following listing of some of the more

sections of two, three or four

ROUND TRIP. Describes the voyage of a drill bit when it becomes dull and has to be changed. It is painstakingly pulled up out of the hole - 2, 3 or 4 joints at a time - changed and returned to the bottom. A round trip can take more than 24 hours for very deep wells.

SPUD. No relation to the starchy tuber for which Idaho is famous. To oilmen it is a verb. To spud a well is to begin

HIGH. Has nothing to do with joints. Has everything to do with the uppermost part of an inclined geological structure deep underground where the possibility of finding oil is considered to be the greatest.

DUSTER. Feather dusters and oil field dusters have something in common, both are dry. A duster is a dry hole, one of the 47 out of 48 wildcats that doesn't find oil or gas.



LESSEE. Not the contraction for "let me see," as in "lessee now, where was I?" A lessee is the company or individual that, under the terms of a lease, is entitled to drill and onerate an oil or gas well.



STRIPPER. Of course it's not an ecdysiast. A stripper well pumps (or "strips") oil from a reservoir. The standard definition of a stripper is one that produces less than 10 barrels of oil per day. With average daily production for the 500,000 oil wells in the United States at 16 barrels of crude per day, we have many strippers. By contrast, in the Mideast, the average well produces 5,500 barrels per day.

WILDCAT. When is a wildcat not a wildcat? When it is an exploratory well drilled in an area where there has been no previous oil production. About one wildcat well is 48 finds commercial deposits of oil or gas. At \$3 million per wildcat in an area like the Baltimore Canyon, it is an expensive gamble.

THRIBBLES. They are not the cute little creatures from Star Trek. When drill pipe and tubing are pulled from the well two joints at a time, they are called doubles. Oilfield logic then designates three joints as thribbles. Yes, four joints are called fourbles.

GASSER. This is not a knee slapper on Hee Haw. It is the term for a commercial well that produces natural gas.

DUCK'S NEST. A standby tank or pit used to hold extra drilling mud or the overflow if mud should be displaced from the well by a blowout.

HALF SOLE. When a section of pipeline becomes corroded, it can be patched with a half sole. The patch, cut from a pipe of the same diameter, is securely welded over the defective section.

Income Tax

Managing farm and ranch income properly is vital to managing one's income tax

Dr. Ashley Lovell, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, emphasizes wise management of all types of income during the current tax year.

Often livestock sales can cause problems in income management, says Lovell.

In 1977 and 1978, many Texas cattlemen were forced to sell excessive numbers of breeding livestock because of the drought. Normally, any gain realized would be recognized for income tax purposes. However, due to forced sales caused by the drought, if replacements are purchased within two years of the year of forced sale, producers can defer paying tax on the gain.




