

to the researchers, will help in understanding the adaptive powers of all ants in West Texas. Then researchers can focus on the possibility of future establishment of one specific variety, the red imported fire ant.

The fire ant mounds are as hard as cement, and farm equipment, being driven against them unexpectedly, can be damaged. The health problem is serious for people who are sensitive to the ant's venom, as bites could be

can adapt to a wide variety of soils. The ant has already infested more than 40 million acres in Texas.'

Sanders and other researchers in entomology and biology are working on a continuing project to control the spread of the fire ant. The Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) provided \$200,000 to Texas Tech in 1977 to begin a fire ant research program, and TDA Commissioner R e a g a n Brown recently announced an additional \$200,000 for

the 1979-81 period. The ant collection, made by Dr. Daniel Bartell and Dr. Oscar Francke, represents ants from 8,000 nests and includes 140 species. The collection provides information on biology, habitat, food habits and behavior.

"Parasites, predators and diseases can be identified from the base knowledge to control ant populations,' Bartell explained.

This red fire ant was unkown in the United States 40 years ago, but since its introduction near Mobile, Ala., in the 1930's, it has moved westward.

Density surveys conducted by Ashdown indicate that the fire ant is concentrated along highways and that areas five to 10 feet from the paved edge have particularly high populations.

'The fact that the ants are close to the highways is obviously important because the ant could move faster if it gets an accidental lift on commercial or other vehicles," Ashdown said.

A computer model is being developed to predict where the ant is going and how fast it will get there. Pimm, who is developing the model, continuously feeds new data from the other researchers into the model to improve its

Beware of NO-TUX NO-TOX is the trade name for a

product that is supposed to neutralize the effects of trazine herbicides such as propazine (milogard) and atrazine (AAtrex). This product received much attention this year from farmers who wanted to plant cotton or small grains in fields where these relatively long residual herbicides has been used on the previous crop. NO-TOX has been eval-uated by Dr. John Abernathy, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Weed Scientist. None of the studies have shown any positive results. In other words, the product failed to eliminate the harmful effects of the residual triazine herbicides on susceptible crops such as cotton and small grains. Many farmers, tried NO-TOX last year. Because of low residual herbicides levels, crop damage by weather and disease and other factors, many growers are still undecided about the worth of this product to be ineffective. If you have any questions please feel free to contact office Dr. Abernathy in Lubbook or any of our weed specialists in College

Computerized Cattle Service Available A computerized stocker and feeder cattle budget analysis service is now available to producers in Floyd County.

The service is offered by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at no charge to the producer. Many producers are now making management decisions concerning their stocker cattle operations on wheat pasture this fall. Fluctuations in cattle prices and increasing production costs necessitate sound decisions regarding cattle purchases and the use of alternative management

Budget forms can be picked up at my office, that can be filled in by producers to aid in these decisions. The forms can be filled out and mailed to the TAEX center in Amarillo where the information will be processed into a detailed financial breakdown for your evaluation. This service allows producers to determine the economic feasibility of the various options available to them. The processed data will be mailed directly to the producers. Cotton Today

WHAT'S HAPPENING

Cotton fields with open bolls can be found in many parts of Crosby and Floyd Counties at this time. The majority of fields could use several more weeks of warm weather. The cool nights and mild days have greatly slowed lint development. About the only good thing I can say about the cooler weather is that it has also slowed down the

While some eggs are still being laid, bollworm activity has decreased. Nighttime temperatures in the low 50's slows development of both eggs and worms. In many cases eggs are not hatching. Larval growth has been slowed to the point that worms will do less damage to

Some cotton fields have received several heavy egg lays over the past three weeks. In such cases treatment may still be justified if worms are within the treatable size. In most cases only large worms remain and they are already in the bolls. In such cases further control measures would not be

It is only now becoming evident to many area producers and businessmen that they have been through a severe bollworm problem. The damage inflicted by bollworms in Crosby and Floyd Counties will easily run into the millions SORGHUM

Harvest of sorghum has begun in a few fields. Sorghum is rapidly maturing with most fields in the hard dough stage. Headworm numbers have decreased in most cases. Sorghum midge are still being found in blooming heads.

Swenson Ranches, Stamford. Use of accounting records on the ranch will be discussed by Lawrence Harmel, Seymour rancher. Stanton Brown, manager of League Ranch at Benjamin, will speak on "Keeping Good Production Records — Livestock

and Rangeland."

The question of "Can We Utilize Mesquite" will be discussed by a three-member panel. Dr. Willie L. Ulich the Department of Agricultural Engineering and Technology at Texas Tech University will open the discussion with a talk on "Harvesting Mesquite." Edward B. "Bev" Herndon of the Department of Range and Wildlife Management at Texas Tech will discuss 'Impact of Shredding Frequency on Mesquite Control." Dr. Reed Richardson of Tech's Department of Animal Science will speak on "Use of Mesquite as Feed Source.'

It is sponsored by the Texas Section, Society for Range Management, in cooperation with the Extension Service and Experiment Station of the Texas A&M University System, Texas Tech, Abilene Christian University, the Soil Conservation Service and the Rolling Plains Economic Program (R-PEP), one of the state's area income growth programs.



Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland's visit to the Lubbock area September 20, according to Donald A. Johnson, Executive Vice President of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock, may well have an impact on the future of High Plains agriculture far beyond the immediate benefits expected from

The Secretary came primarily to gain first-hand knowledge of hail losses suffered by area farmers in late August. Describing the damage as "horren-dous," Bergland said current FmHA loans to affected farmers could be extended, deferred or ballooned, and promised to use his authority to keep anyone from being forced out of farming by the disaster.

Johnson expressed PCG's gratitude for the Secretary's assurances, and said "I also tend to believe what Bergland saw here may give him a better understanding of the need for continuing programs that give farmers more adequate protection against such disas-

In addition to new disaster loans and extended or deferred current loans, farmers who lost all or part of their crops will be eligible for payments under disaster provisions of the current farm law. On cotton the payment will be equal to 19.2 cents per pound times the difference between actual yield and 75 percent of the farm's ASCS-established

Obviously such a payment will not

fully compensate farmers for losses, 'but they will help," Johnson says. "But unless ongoing efforts to secure an extension of the disaster program are successful," he adds, "we won't have even that much protection for the remaining two years of the present farm

The Senate has passed a bill providing for an expanded Federal crop insurance plan and a two-year extension of the disaster program. But the House has yet to act on a similar but less palatble measure reported by the House Agriculture Committee. The House bill, as now written, would expand Federal crop insurance but would extend the disaster program for only one year. The House is expected to consider the

Committee bill in October, at which time an amendment will be offered to make its extension of the disaster program compatible with that passed by the Senate. "This amendment and the bill itself

are going to need all the support they can get from the Administration,' Johnson believes, "and although the Secretary already has agreed to support the amendment, we're hoping his support will be somewhat more enthusiastic now that he has seen for himself the producer's dire need for protec-Johnson was also encouraged by the

Secretary's remarks on the importance of agricultural exports and the imperative nature of meeting High Plains water needs in the future.

AMENDMENT

The 66th Legislature, by a two-thirds vote, has proposed three amendments to the Texas Constitution which a majority of participating voters may pprove or disapprove on November 6, 1979. FACTS FOR YOU will discuss the three amendments this week September 21, September 28, and October 5, in the reverse order from the way in which they will appear on the ballot.

If approved, the third proposed amendment would authorize the legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans used to purchase farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers. The full text of this amendment is as follows. although only the last sentence will be printed on the ballot, in English and Spanish:

the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article III of the Texas

provide that the commissioner of agriculture shall have the authority to provide for, issue, and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed \$10 million. The bonds shall be called 'Farm and Ranch Loan Security Bonds' and shall be executed in such form, denominations and on such terms as may be prescribed by law. The bonds shall bear interest rates fixed by the Legislature of the State of Texas.

'(b) All money received from the sale

Security Fund shall be used by the commissioner of agriculture under provisions prescribed by the legislature for the purpose of guaranteeing loans used for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate, for acquiring real estate mortgages or deeds of trust on lands purchased with guaranteed loans, and to advance to the borrower a percentage of the principal and interest due on those loans; provided that the commissioner shall require at least six percent interest be paid by the borrower on any advance of principal and interest. The legislature may authorize the commissioner to sell at foreclosure any land acquired in this manner, and proceeds from that sale shall be deposited in the Farm and Ranch Loan Security Fund.

"(d) The legislature may provide for the investment of money available in the Farm and Ranch Loan Security Fund and the interest and sinking fund established for the payment of bonds issued by the commissioner of agriculture. Income from the investment shall be used for purposes prescribed by the legislature.

The basic rule of law under the present Texas Constitution is that, unless there are amendments to the contrary, the legislature has no power to give or to lend, or to authorize the giving or lending, of the credit of the state in aid of or to any person association, or private or municipal corporation. However, several court cases authorize exceptions to this rule if a "public emergency" is involved, such as using the credit of the state for the construction of seawalls to protect a gulf city from storms, or the construction of bridege over the Red River between Texas and Oklahoma. Whenever Article III, Section 50 is amended courts can no onger hear the objection that the new oan program is not justified by a public emergency, since a separate constitu-tional basis for the program would then
