Bids sought to build and lease new post office building in Lockney

U.S. Postal Service is asking for bids to build and lease a new post office building in Lockney, Tex., according to Postmaster Meriwether.

Bids will be opened at 2:30 p.m., November 20, 1979, in Room 523, Downtown Station, U.S. Postal Service, Bryan and Ervay Streets, Dallas, TX.

The proposed building will have 4,440 sq. ft. of interior floor space. It will be

built with private funds and leased to the Postal Service for a basic period of 10 years with renewal options for 20 additional years.

The Postal Service has acquired options to buy a site for the new main post office which will be assigned to the successful bidder.

The site contains approximately 31,200 sq. ft. of land and is located on the west side of Main Street between Locust and Washington.

Longhorns lose to 'Lopes, 34-24

The Abernathy Antelopes handed the Lockney Longhorns their second district loss of the season here Friday night. The 34-24 loss practically eliminates the 'Horns from the running in the District 4-AA title race.

The Longhorns scored first and last, but in between there was just too much Antelope power. Much of the Abernathy punch was provided by the passing-receiving combination of Tony Heath and Dean McGuire. Quarterback Heath connected with tight end McGuire on five passes for 108 yards and two touchdowns.

John Fortenberry claimed the ball for Lockney when Abernathy fumbled on the first play after the kickoff. Two quick handoffs to fullback Roel Rodriguez netted the Longhorns 32 yards and six points. Rodriguez burst through the line for 19 yards on his first effort and scored on his second carry, from 13 yards away.

Kevin Evans, with the wind at his back, kicked into the end zone. The Antelopes drove the 80 yards to paydirt in seven plays, the last of which was a 41-yard pass from Heath to McGuire with only 52 seconds remaining in the opening period. Willie Betts kicked the point.

Junior McDonald gave the 'Horns good field position with a kickoff return to the Lockney 42-yard line, and the Big Red offense drove to the Abernathy 23 before losing possession on downs, just a yard shy of a first. Warren completed

penalty against the Longhorns and a 16-yard Heath-to-McGuire "bullet." They had to punt, and the Longhorns went from the 20 after the touchback.

On third down, the Longhorns lost the first of six fumbles, and the Antelopes cashed in six plays later. It was fourth

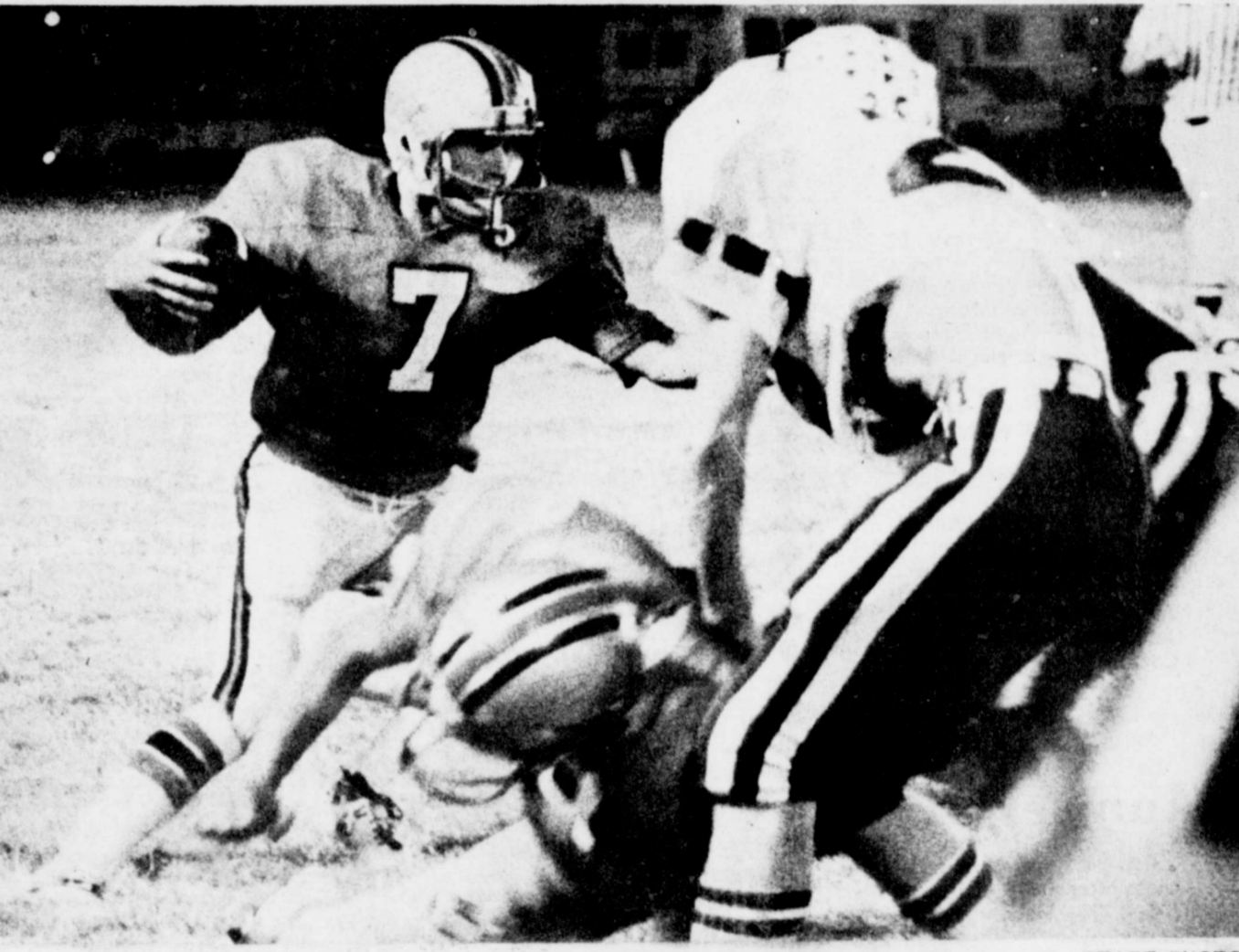

SBA disaster loan program explained in meeting at Floydada

Approximately 100 Floyd County and other agribusinessmen gathered in the auditorium of the Floydada High School Thursday night to hear members of the Small Business Administration's disaster loan team explain the benefits of the SBA program.

Fred Hodges, the disaster loan supervisor for the Lubbock area, led off the meeting by explaining to the farmers why the SBA was making agricultural loans.

"The SBA was always in the business of administering disaster programs to businesses," Hodges told the farmers. "About three years ago, someone determined that farmers were small-business men and therefore came under the SBA program."

Hodges noted that Floyd County and 45 counties in the Texas Panhandle that were declared eligible for disaster loans because of bad weather in June and July.

The maximum limit for loans, Hodges said, was generally \$500,000, but even that amount could be stretched in extreme cases.

To get a loan, he said, a farmer must first be located in a disaster-declared county or an adjacent county. Then he must submit to the SBA office a form declaring the number of acres that he planted. Finally, the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office must establish the average yield.

The SBA will then determine by formula the extent of the eligible loss, Hodges said.

If a farmer was unable to obtain credit from conventional sources, he said, loans would be made available at five percent interest. Those farmers and businessmen who were eligible for conventional credit would receive their disaster loans at seven and three-eighths percent interest.

Each individual farmer's terms would depend on his individual ability to repay the loan, Hodges said. Most loans are on terms from five to 10 years duration but some could be stretched out to 15 or 20 years.

On what collateral the agency would need, Hodges said they would "take the best collateral available."

He added that the loan money could be used for 100 percent crop production or as much as 50 percent could be used to pay back debts and living expenses, "but under no circumstances could the money be used for capital improvements." Capital improvements would be tractors, equipment or livestock, he said.

"We've tried to make the forms simple enough for the individual farmer to complete by himself with an acceptable degree of accuracy," Hodges concluded.

Ford got to the three, but a procedure penalty wiped out the gain. The Antelopes took over after four plays netted the 'Horns a yard.

The 'Lopes couldn't move and punt-nath 43, but a clipping call moved the 'Horns back to their own 33, where they fumbled. Heath lost tnoon a keeper, kept again — only this time it worked for a 35-yard touchdown. The conversion was no good, leaving it 20-10.

The Longhorns battled back, driving 65 yards in seven plays. Big gainers were Warren passes to Arnold Alaniz (a 38-yarder) and Kevin Evans (a 12-yard conversion pass fell incomplete, and the count was 20-16.

It didn't stay that way long — Abernathy made their position more comfortable with another Heath-to-McGuire touchdown pass, a 35-yard play immediately following another Longhorn fumble.

Late in the game, still another Lockney miscue led to seven more Abernathy points. The Antelopes claimed a fumble at the Longhorns 18-yard line and sent Sanders into the line twice — 14 yards on the first try and four on the second — for their final TD of the night.

The Longhorns put together a scoring drive. It was too late to win, but the final score wasn't as lopsided as it could have been.

Warren clicked with a couple of passes to Evans and one to Ford,

33-yard gainer which put the ball on the two-yard line. A late-hit penalty moved it a yard closer, and Ford scored from the one. The Longhorns faked a kick, and Alaniz passed to Danny Delgado, bringing the count to 34-24.

Gregg Taylor Helps Wyoming At Center

Wyoming center Gregg Taylor admits his introduction to major football was an eye-opening one.

"We went to Washington I dad and told him this old boy was in tall cotton," Taylor said. "We just got through flying all country (to Seattle) and we got to go to the hotel. Then what do we get a police escort. Let me see something. Where I'm from, a 6-foot-1, 240-pound junior transfer, is from Lockney, Tex. It's a farming and ranching community with a population of 2,000 miles south of Amarillo. It's a lot to do with Taylor's destination — Wyoming.

"I explained both ways (on offense and defense) my last two years of high school. 'And I got some good experience playing major college football so I knew my way around college would be my first experience.'"

"The fact that our town and our community were so small had something to do with it. We were a (class) Double-A school and unless you made it to the state championships nobody paid much attention."

So Taylor opted for New Mexico Military, where he lettered twice in football and began to get noticed by more college recruiters.

"I'm glad I went there," Taylor says. "Military school wasn't all that great, but I enjoyed playing football there. I got a lot of experience instead of sitting on the bench somewhere else."

A number of Division II and NIAA schools talked to Taylor following his junior college career, and so did West Texas State, Kansas and Wyoming.

"Like I said before, I always wanted to try major college football," he said. "So I didn't really consider most of the smaller schools. And I wasn't crazy about West Texas State because it's only 90 miles from Lockney and I never did like it that much."

"So I talked with Coach Lewis and visited here and really like it. I thought the program was good and I liked the facilities and I just thought it would be a good place to go to school and try football. So far, things are turning out real well."

He admits, however, there was one disappointment.

"Well all along I felt like I would have liked to try Texas Tech," Taylor says. "But they never did offer any scholarship. They looked at some film last year, and I thought they were going to offer me something. But I guess they decided I wasn't what they need. I couldn't be happier that's history now. I couldn't be happier the way things have worked out."

Neither could Lewis or the rest of the Wyoming coaching staff. Taylor has stepped in and played well at center — a position that has caused considerable worry at Wyoming since standout Ray Davies graduated following the 1976

season.

In Lewis' first season, defensive end Dave Clements was forced to move to center midway through the year. Clements had never played the position before, but he was the best the Cowboys had at the time.

Last year, nose guard Greg Chytka became the emergency center. He moved into the position early in the season and eventually became an All-Western Athletic Conference selection while playing both ways.

While Lewis couldn't argue with the results, the flip-flopping at center had to be worrisome. And the Cowboy recruiting efforts last year were directed at solving the two-year old problem.

Taylor and another junior college transfer — Jeff Pace — were brought in to try and fill the void once-and-for-all. To give the position depth, freshman recruit Rick Farnsworth was switched from guard to center, where he figures to step in after Taylor and Pace graduate.

"They (the Wyoming coaches) told me center had been a problem," Taylor says. "I guess they hadn't really recruited a center and they had to move guys in there the last couple of years. Sure it got me thinking. It was something I considered because it looked like I would get a pretty good shot."

"I know a lot of other schools I talked with had two or three centers sitting on the bench. Fortunately, things have worked out for me and I'm playing here. I like center. I always have. I played guard and tackle for a year at junior college before switching to center, and it is different. But it's also fun."

Taylor came to Wyoming last Christmas — like most jaycee transfers — and participated in spring practice. It was an important time for the center candidates, although both he and Pace were injured and missed much of the session.

"I stretched some ligaments in my knee," Taylor said. "And they decided I shouldn't try and play on it. I was down for awhile, but then I decided to get my head up and come back this summer. It's worked out, and I haven't had any trouble with the knee since."

Since Taylor has moved into the starting role at center, his image as a leader of the offensive line has become more defined. With it, comes more and more kidding from his teammates as Wyoming's Texas country boy.

"I get it for both," he says, laughing. "They tease me about being from the country and they tease me about being from Texas. I don't mind though. I'm proud of being from a small town and I've been teased since I was a little kid about being from Texas. I think it does everyone some good. The kidding helps everyone get along."

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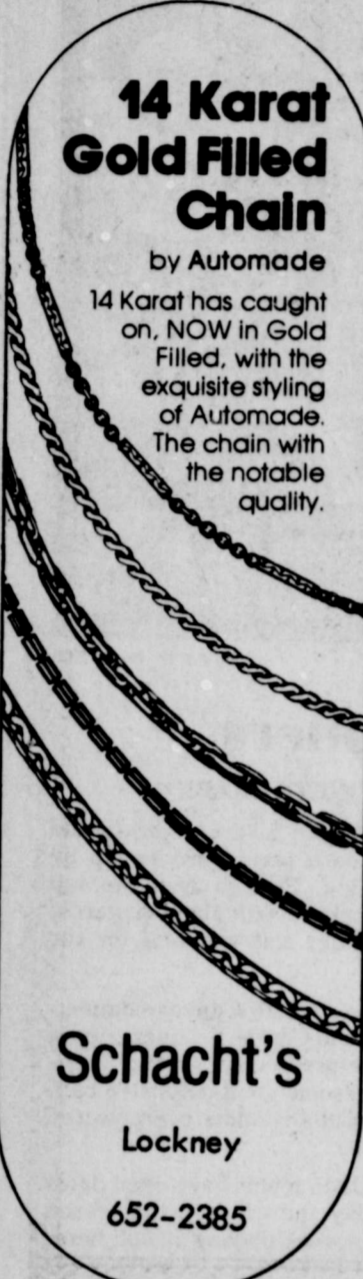

Libraries are essential

There is an understandable but alarming Proposition 13 fever in the country

today — a revolt by taxpayers against the burdens of regressive taxing of middle-income people to provide the funds for local services that

are available to everyone. Public libraries should not be dependent upon the good will of local taxpayers; nor should those local taxpayers bear the lion's share of the cost of operation institutions for all. The long-term importance

of public libraries is not in providing information and books for the popular majority, but rather in opening doors for the individual user, and for citizens who have special needs—such as literacy, self-education, inspiration, freedom to dissent.

Public libraries are no longer a privilege of the many. In an age where the ability to read and have access to information of all kinds is a necessity, public libraries have become an essential right.

In what may prove to be the most important legislative initiative for libraries in recent Congressional history, Senators Jacob K. Javits and Edward M. Kennedy have proposed a new National Library Act to insure a minimum standard of public library services throughout the country.

What makes this proposal significant is that it marks a shift away from the view that public libraries are primarily a local responsibility. The bill corrects an accident of history, when public education was converted from being primarily a local

concern into a matter of national priority. The need to protect public libraries was not yet apparent at the time several years ago, when parents, teachers and community leaders traveled to Washington and their state capitals by the busload demanding more dollars to educate their children.

Now, with budget cuts hurting those same children in their independent research projects, continuing self-education, career information search, and other taken-for-granted library services, citizens have suddenly awakened to the fact that public libraries are every bit as important a national education resource as schools and colleges.

Looking toward the White House Conference on Libraries and Information Services, which will convene this coming Nov. 15, Senators Javits and Kennedy have made available the basic framework for a comprehensive national program to support public library operations. Their study bill for a National Library Act is expressly intended to be a

focal point for debate and discussion at the Conference, to permit the library community — including especially library users — to have a chance to provide some input before the legislation is put in final form for floor debate and vote. Powerful library groups have already expressed support for the general concepts in the bill. Now is the time for members of the public to be heard. Anyone who is concerned about our nation's public libraries should find out about the bill and speak up in its support.

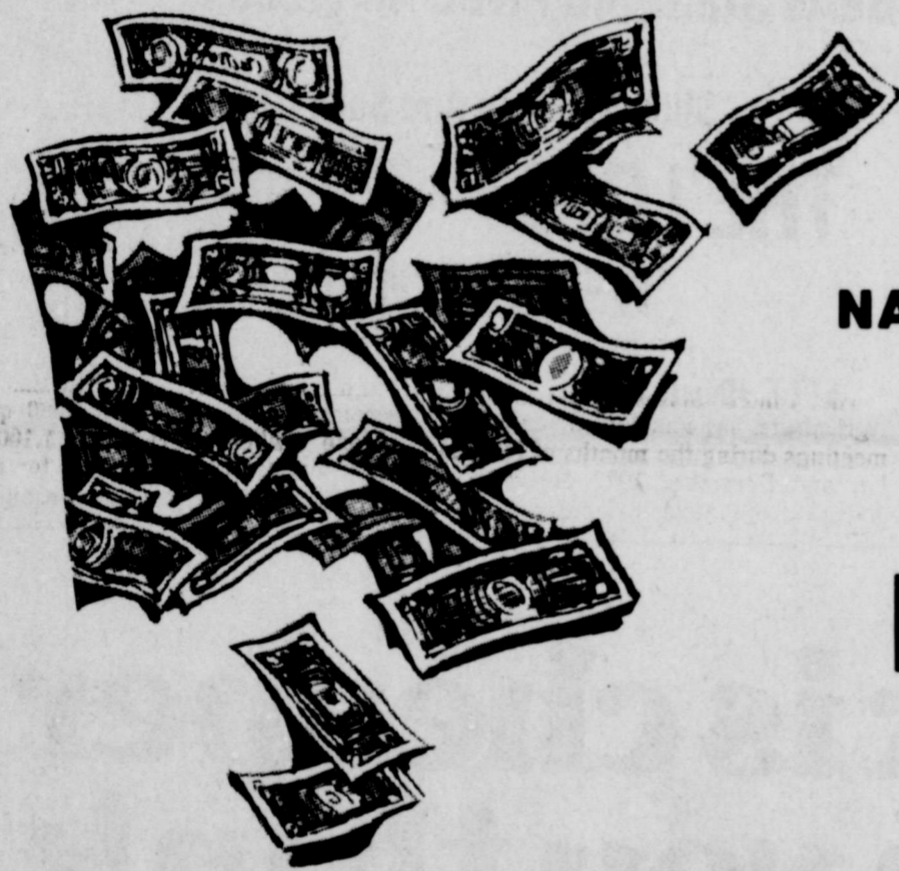

What to do in burn accidents

SEVERE BURNS

If you are at the scene where a person is badly burned, there are some things you can do to prevent further complications until emergency medical help arrives.

EXTINGUISH FLAMES

First, make sure that the flames on the person are out. The advice of "stop, drop, and roll" is a good rule to follow. The natural reaction of a person on fire is to run, but that provides more oxygen for the flames.

The person should stop, drop to the ground and roll. A blanket or other covering thrown around him will also smother the flames.

REMOVE SMOLDERING CLOTHING

Remove any smoldering clothing. The longer it remains in contact with the skin, the more severe the burn will become.

However, do not remove the clothing over the head — pulling a burning or smoldering tee-shirt over the head could cause the hair and face to become burned.

Pull the clothing directly away from the skin.

COVER VICTIM

Once you are sure the fire is completely out and no smoldering clothing remains, cover the victim with a clean linen cloth. No salves or ointments at

this time are recommended. Actually, the burned area is sterile and it is necessary to keep from infection from the surrounding environment.

REASSURE VICTIM

Reassure the person that help is on its way and comfort him as much as possible.

Don't put soaked sheets on the victim. This can increase the chance of hypothermia or loss of body heat which is very critical at this time.

DON'T GIVE FLUIDS

Don't give a severe burn victim anything by mouth, although they may ask for it. The reason for this is a condition called acute gastric dilation which may happen after a trauma.

In this condition, the stomach fills with air and fluids. Giving the victim any fluids by mouth will only add to the problem.

LUBBOCK — Seed for next year's cotton crop on the South Plains will have to come largely from this year's yield, and handling of this seed will be crucial, area cotton specialists say.

There were 17,642 oil well completions including dry holes in Texas during 1978, an increase of 443 from the 17,199 registered in 1977. These 17,642 completions included 3,765 wildcat wells of which 464 were oil; 1,059 were gas; and 2,242 were dry (59 percent of total).

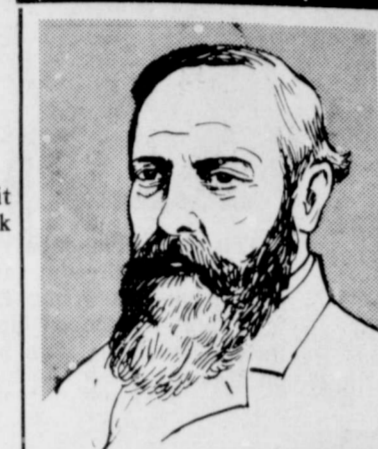

"The crash of '29" can it happen again?"

On Monday, October 29, exactly 50 years from the date of the Wall Street Stock Market Crash, KTXV-TV at 8:30 p.m. will present a special program "The Crash of '29."

Louis Rukeysar the host of "Wall Street Week," examines the causes and effects of that fateful day in stock market trading history. The program will include old motion picture new-reel

footage of what life was like 50 years ago. It also includes graphic statistics that show the magnitude of the economic disruption that took place.

Rukeysar talks with Arnold Bernhard, now Chairman of Value Line Investment Services, who was a railroad stock analyst for Moody's in 1929.

Given today's economic problems, some experts be-

lieve that "The Crash of '29" was only a rehearsal for what lies ahead.

Can it happen again? That question and many more will be posed by Louis Rukeysar to a panel of three noted economists: Beryl Sprinkel, chief economist for Chicago's Harris Bank, Charles Kindleberger, professor of Economic Panics, and Peter Bernstein, one of Wall Street's leading private economists.

Baptist General Convention to meet

A major facet of the ambitious mission goal will be consideration of a proposed \$34 million Cooperative Program budget for Texas Baptists' share of the worldwide mission efforts of 13 million Southern Baptist.

Other major business will include the election of a new president to succeed Dr. Cunningham who has served the maximum two terms. More than 6,000 people are expected to pack the Lubbock Civic Center to hear

"Bold Mission" challenges to help share Christ in Texas and around the world. Speakers include Cunningham, Dr. Harold C. Bennett, Nashville, Tenn., executive secretary-treasurer of the Southern Baptist Executive Committee; Dr. James H. Landes, Dallas, executive director of the BGCT; Dr. Russell H. Dilday, president of Southwestern Baptist Theo-

logical Seminary, Fort Worth; Dr. Nilson Do Amaral Fani, president of the Brazilian Baptist Convention; and Dr. William G. Tanner, executive director-treasurer of the Southern Baptist Home Mission Board, Atlanta, Ga.

Preceding the convention will be annual meetings of Woman's Missionary Union and Texas Baptist Men on Oct. 29-30.

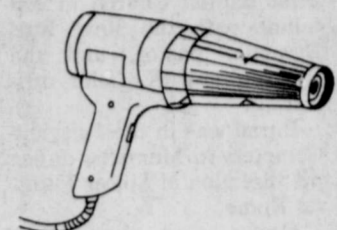

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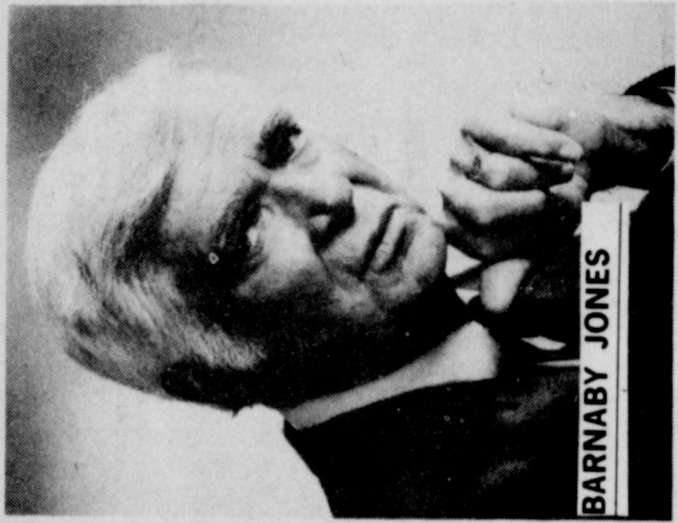
