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**NATIONAL COTTON WEEK** is being observed this week by Dimmitt merchants who are promoting the use of cotton through special prices on cotton merchandise. Local business people are acutely aware of the importance of cotton to the local and national economy, and their awareness is reflected in their desire to promote the use of cotton. Texas is the leading state in the nation in cotton production, and Castro County is one of the leading cotton producing counties in the state despite its severely limited acreage. The production of cotton in Castro County has resulted in huge investments in all types of machinery in the production, processing, and service areas connected with the industry. The fourteen gines in the county represent, at a conservative estimate, represent an investment of one and a half million dollars; to cultivate the 56,000 acre allotment two and a quarter million dollars worth of farm machinery is required, figuring that machinery at \$40.00 per acre. The 70,000 bales produced in the county last year added a gross of twelve million dollars to the county's income. It is said that a dollar received from the sale of a farm commodity turns over seven times before leaving the county, we will let our readers figure that one out. There is no doubt that cotton is really King in our agriculture and economy.

## Coach Covington Resigns To Accept Position In Alamogordo Schools

Coach J. D. Covington submitted his resignation Monday night to Superintendent Paul Hilburn, and announced that he had accepted a position with the Alamogordo, New Mexico, school system. In a statement to the News Tuesday, Covington declared that he would be employed at Alamogordo in one of two positions, and that was either on the coaching staff, or in an administrative capacity.

While serving as Athletic Director and head football coach in the Dimmitt Schools for the past nine years, Covington mentored teams have won three district championships, and have placed second in district standing four years. One of Texas' best known athletes, Junior Coffee, gained fame under the coaching of Covington, and went on to gain national recognition as an outstanding football player with Washington University.

Coach Covington requested the News to convey his thanks to everyone for their assistance and support during his stint as coach and athletic director in the Dimmitt Schools, and that it was his opinion that his resignation and move to Alamogordo would be to his advantage and to the advantage of the Dimmitt High School athletic program.

## Runningwater Draw Watershed Project Making Good Progress

The Watershed Project on Running Water Draw in Castro and adjoining counties is coming along at a very good rate of progress according to local Soil Conservation Service personnel. Phil Grazer, Acting Watershed Planning Party Leader estimates that 15 percent of the Work Plan Development in the Lower Running Water Draw Watershed has been completed and the 35 percent of the Upper Watershed Work Plan has been completed.

At present, the planning is working in Castro County making site-selections for floodwater structures and making geologic, hydrologic, and economic studies for the project.

In addition to the flood prevention and watershed protection aspects of the program, there has been some indication of interest in the installation of a multi-purpose structure for recreation and municipal water uses by the Cities of Earth and Dimmitt. The City Councils of both towns are studying the possibility of including such a structure in the project and the Planning Party is gathering information for them in regards to such an inclusion.

The land treatment phase of the project, which is one of the main local responsibilities of the Running Water Soil Conservation District, is continuing at a high rate. Local landowners cooperating with the District have applied and are applying

needed conservation measures to the land. This phase of the project is of utmost importance since the length of life of the structures is basically dependent on the amount of erosion control applied on private lands. Much remains to be done in this phase of the project before the watershed can be ready for any construction. Present requirements as set forth in P. L. 566 call for 75 percent of the land under a Basic Conservation Plan with the Running Water Soil Conservation District and a minimum of 75 percent of the land adequately protected through the application of needed conservation practices. The local work Unit of the Soil Conservation Service is providing needed technical assistance to District Cooperators in this phase of the project.

At present, it is anticipated that a minimum of two floodwater structures will be built in Castro County. There is a possibility of a third, but this is dependent on the results of yield studies and whether or not a multi-purpose dam for recreation and municipal water is included by the Cities of Dimmitt and Earth.

Additional information on this project can be obtained by contacting members of the Board of Supervisors of the District, from members of the Commissioners Court, or from personnel of the Soil Conservation Service.

"This method of raising funds is being used by the County Activities Committee to defray expenses of Round-Up Week in order to curtail the solicitation of funds from local merchants for this purpose. With the proceeds from the carnival last September, coupled with the anticipated proceeds from this year, it is felt that no solicitations from merchants will be needed when Round-Up Week rolls around in August," stated Pete Wright, Chairman of the County Activities Committee.

In other business at their meeting Monday night, the County Activities Committee will be finalizing the schedule for Round-Up Week, dates of which will be August 7 thru August 14. First event of the week will be the Miss Grain Sorghum Pageant and the final event will be the last performance of the Rodeo on August 14. Final details will be forthcoming in the very near future.

The two little girls, ages three and four, remained with their father until investigators arrived on the scene.

### Farming Discussed As A Vocation

To get a farm job does not require much schooling. However, in farming as in other occupations those who have the most training are apt to be the most successful. You should not think of becoming a farmer unless you have completed high school or its equivalent.

Modern farming is a science. The farmer must be well acquainted with soils, crops, animals, fertilizers, and crop-rotation. He keeps abreast of new agricultural developments by taking courses at an agricultural college, either by attendance or correspondence. He puts his name on the agriculture mailing lists thereby receiving many bulletins that will tell him how to solve many of his problems in the most efficient way. Federal and state government agencies have done a vast amount of research work to ascertain the best methods for growing certain crops, the best localities to grow them in, how to cultivate and irrigate properly, and many other facts about farming that can be scientifically determined. Then, too, the farmer subscribes to farm magazines which contain articles on the most up-to-date farming methods written by practical farmers and agricultural experts. If you attempt to farm, you must know how the most successful farmers are accomplishing their work.

A hired-hand's job is easy to get, especially during the busy seasons. Many of the men who are successful farmers today began as hired hands. You should look upon employment on a farm as an apprenticeship by which you can learn the rudiments of the work. If you have been brought up on a farm, it should be relatively easy for you to determine whether you like farming. If you are a lousy young fellow from the city, you can easily induce some farmer to hire you for a few weeks in the summer to do general work around the farm. Following that period of work, you should plan to rent a farm and later on accumulate or borrow sufficient money to purchase your own farm. The federal government has been encouraging ownership of farms and has made available capital on easy terms that will enable any responsible individual to buy a farm. If you buy a farm, you must be careful to keep down your expenses. As a small farmer you should try to do without certain kinds of machinery or plan to buy it in partnership with others.

Another avenue open to you is to become a farm manager. If you are well trained, with a college education, you can apply for this type of work. Your job will be to plan the work and supervise those who will perform it. As a farm manager you will receive a good salary plus board.

To be a successful farmer, you must be fond of outdoor life and be able to work outdoors in all kinds of weather. You must prefer country to city life, and should have a fondness for animals. You must be able to do hard manual labor and have the physical stamina to withstand long hours of work. However, not all the work is hard, as machinery has been replacing much of the work formerly done by hand and by horses. You must be able to work alone at monotonous jobs and should be endowed with some mechanical ability to make minor repairs on farm machinery. You need patience to await the results of your work. You must be shrewd in your business dealings and be a careful manager, able to work with figures, very much like a bookkeeper, in order to calculate your costs. You should have selling ability in order to dispose of your produce and be aware of market demands, of how to prepare your crop for the market, of how to approach people, and of how to deal with other business men.

As a farmer you will always derive enjoyment from the fact that what you produce is vitally essential for clothing and feeding other human beings. Another factor to consider is that the financial returns of farming must be considered to include what you save by raising your own food and being largely self-sufficient. If life on a farm is the only kind that you feel is worth living, then do not lose any time in preparing yourself to enter it. The returns in health, satisfaction, dignity and independence are great indeed.

### Rural Mailbox Improvement Week Is May 17-22

Please check your boxes on the different Star Routes to see that they are in good serviceable condition and meet all requirements.

"Boxes and supports should be kept painted and free from rust. The name of the owner and box numbers should be shown on the side of the box visible to the carrier as he approaches or on the door where the boxes are grouped. The box should be securely attached to the support and of correct height. Patrons should group boxes wherever this is practicable, particularly when adequate turnouts can be provided. 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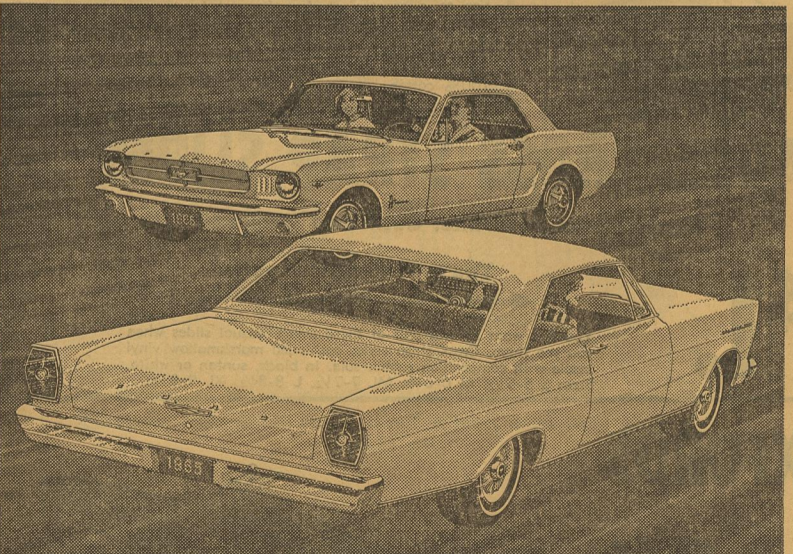
