The rotary blade lawn mower is a dangerous piece of machinery and should be treated with great respect. While running your mower be very careful to keep hands and feet from under the mower or near the blade cage. Everyone should check their lawn for rocks, sticks, bones, nails, wire or anything the mower blade will pick up. I'm sure most everyone at some time or other has read a report of someone being hit by an object thrown from under a running mower. Some cases have been fatal, while others left the victim crippled. In all cases they were subjected to a great deal of pain and possibly a stay in the hospital. This of course would mean loss of income plus the other expenses involved. We must also think of our neighbors and innocent by-standers. We have read reports of objects thrown from under mowers that had traveled a distance of 150 feet or more with enough force left to hurt someone or shatter a plate glass window. So let's all be safe and check our lawns before we mow them. A few other tips, always ground the spark plug or remove the plug wire while working on the mower blade.
