Let's fact it...this country is in no shape to fight anybody on land, sea, or air...we've been busy for two decades on cutting defense expenditures in order to distribute more to those without enough self-discipline to compete economically

This nation currently is a sprawling giant whose strength has been sapped by self-indulgence, intelligence drained by sapless guilt-ridder do-gooding, and rendered weak and ineffectual by perpetual verbal diarrhea at both ends.

Two good examples come to mind. Parents love to hold up our public schools as doing a lousy job of educating today's youngsters...and

But the primary reason our schools are doing a lousy job is because of an even lousier job our parents are doing

The prestigious Carnegie Council on Policy Studies in Higher Education recently produced a major report on the nation's high schools called "Giving Youth a Better Chance," and the report sums up what most teachers have been shouting for a long time

It's the plain and simple fact that it is impossible to teach students in the absence of discipline.

And discipline, first, last, and always youngster doesn't get it there first, he's not going to get it in the school or in the

And to compound the problem, our Supreme Court, our government, our official policies have made discipline at any level a no-no.

The second example that comes to mind is the Texas Prison System.

For many, many years, the prison system in Texas was recognized as one of the best in the world...and the state was treated to a constant stream of prison officials from other states and nations coming here to study and try to emulate the system in Texas. One of the vital ingredients in any prison system in the fundamental responsibility of insuring that prisoners can serve out their sentences in safety.

A noted prison authority wrote: 'There can be no hope of reform, no chance of making prisons more decent and humane without order and discipline. Conjugal visits, work-release programs, home furloughs, receation fields, vocational training,

psychological counseling -- all are useless without discipline. Yet early this year the federal government is suing the Texas prison system in Ruiz, et al versus W.J. Estelle, the prison system chief...and the crux of the suit is to bring about


relaxation of discipline. In other words, the feds want to bring about the same situation that between 1973 and 1975 brought about the slaying of 66 inmates in California prisons, 12 in San Quentin alone. In the same period, 350 were stabbed in Louisiana prisons--29 fatal, 15 were murdered in Massachusetts, in Rhode Island prisons 40 to 50 sexual assaults are reported each year and in Illinois, some cellblocks are so completely under the control of gangs that guards and prison officials won't enter them-and priso-

ners are afraid to leave their cells. Discipline is as necessary to nemocracy as treedom to speak. assemble or vote. You can't rear children, leare, fight, or punish without

And before we try to stop the Russians, we had better realize it.



**Congressional Comment** 

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Probably no government program is as misunderstood or mistrusted as the 1980 Census which will get underway in March. And yet, the information received during the census taking is far more important and far-ranging than just an officiai count-

ing of American noses. Census statistics are critical components in the distribution of federal, state and local funds--\$50 billion annually in Federal spending alone is allocated according to census population figures. Land management, highway repairs, job training, revenue sharing, the Cooperative Extension Service and Agricultural Experiment Stations and 100 other federal programs - use

census statistics in allocating funds. With that in mind, perhaps we should look at the census as our vote to receive our proper share of federal spending, rather than, by default, allowing our money to be distributed elsewhere.

Of the 24 Congressional Districts in the State of Texas, our district received the lowest amount of General Revenue Sharing Funds in fiscal year 1979 -\$11.9 million compared to \$13.6 million and \$13.7 million for two neighboring districts. With the district's high population of elderly and minority citizens. both groups that mistrust the intrusion of census takers, an accurate that we receive our fair share of Revenue Sharing Funds.

Allocation of federal money under the nutritional and social services program for the elderly is based solely on a state's population over age 60. Again, we gain by an accurate evaluation of the

number of persons in that catagory. The second issue to note is an experimental program in which resi-


dents of Abilene and four other American cities will be participating during this year's census. During this experiment, questionnaires will be handdelivered by census takers, rather than mailed to each household as is the procedure in most of the nation. The hand deliveries will take place between March 11 and March 28 and the experiment has been set to see if this method is more accurate than the traditional "by-mail" method.

I question the cost-effectiveness of such a program, however, since a regular army of enumerators seems both a costly and cumbersome approach to what should be a problem best solved by extensive education of the public as to the need for the census.

The original and most important reason for the census is an accurate accounting of the population of Congressional redistricting. In this respect, each person is literally a vote counted to determine an equitable Congressional District.

To those who oppose the census on the basis of loss of privacy and confidentiality. I would point out that the Census Bureau has an unblemished record for keeping confidential the personal information gathered during the census. Actually, the information requested is often less personal than that demanded for credit applications, school enrollment, medical forms and so

forth - and a lot more private. In the final analysis, would you spend a few minutes, or perhaps an hour, filling out a form if you knew your answers were secret and that your participation would bring some of your tax dollars back to your community? Most people would, and that's one way to look at the census.

When winter came the ant was able to get by on his savings while the grasshopper, who had saved nothing, was left shivering and hungry out in the

For many years now, even as individual American parents told their children the story of the ant and the grasshopper, trying to encourage them to save, U.S. government tax policy has had the opposite effect.

A popular and prevalent theory among economists has been that one of the factors causing the Great Depression of the 1930's in this country was

excessive savings. According to this theory Americans were saving too much and spending too little and this helped bring on the hardships and dislocations of the depression

The theory may, or may not, have been valid 50 years ago. In any event it most certainly has no validity today. Americans are assuredly not saving too much today, yet tax policies that discourage savings and encourage consumption continue in force.

Let's look at the record. Last year we saved only 4.5 percent of disposable income. That was our lowest

savings rate in 30 years. By comparison, the Japanese are saving at a rate of 25.3 percent. The French save at a 13.1 percent rate. Even the British rate of savings, at 6.6 percent exceeds ours.

Inflation, of course, does make it difficult to save. Prices in this country rese last year by more than 12 percent.

Yet, other countries are suffering the ravages of inflation, too, and their savings exceed ours, so inflation can't

be the sole cause of our situation The problem is that on top of inflation

With savings accounts paying interest rates of only 5 or maybe 6 percent you can't make much headway in time of double-digit inflation.

# **Public education** hearing set in Lubbock

Governor Bill Clements has recently announced that the Governor's Advisory Committee on Education will conduct a public hearing in Lubbock. The Lubbock hearing will be on Monday, February 25, at the Lubbock Memorial Civic Center, Room S-107, 1501 Sixth Street.

The Committee is composed of 21 persons from throughout the State with recognized interests and/or expertise in education. Dr. Willis M. Tate. # Corn in grain reserve eligible for interest waiver

Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland announced this week that farmers who placed corn in the grain reserve program between Oct. 22 and Jan. 7 will be eligible for waiver of the first year's interest charges. Oct. 22 was the date that immediate entry of 1978 and 1979 crops was authorized. Jan. 7 was the day new reserve rules became effective. To qualify for the interest waiver, farmers effected by the new annouce-

ment must contact their county office of

the Agricultural Stabilization and Con-

servation Service to sign a new reserve agreement. Interest that will be waived is that which accrued beginning Jan. 7. Interest that accured before Jan. 7 will still be owed by the farmer.

Bergland said today's decision was made as a matter of equity for those famers who earlier had placed grain in ther reserve. On Jan. 7, as one of the moves in response to suspension of grain sales to the USSR, first-year interest on grain in the reserve program had been waived.



# February 15 is bobcat pelt tagging deadline

The dealine for obtaining bobcat pelt 'ags and for tagging the pelts will be Feb. 15, according to the Texas Parks

and Wildlife Department. Every bobcat pelt taken in the state during the current tagging period (Nov. 15, 1979 to Feb. 15, 1980) must be tagged prior to purchase or sale. Pelts tagged during the legal tagging period may be purchased or sold at any time of the year, the department said. Pelts

from cats taken prior to or after these dates will not be eleigible for tagging under the Texas Bobcat Pelt Tagging Program. Untagged pelts cannot be

The bobcat pelt tagging is a part of a program by the federal Endangered Species Scientific Authority to monitor nationwide bobcat harvesr rates. Tagged pelts are eligible for export. except those tagged in a 28-county area of the High Plains, including Floyd County. These pelts may be sold only on the domestic market.

That means a minimum of 0.80 ounces and 1.6 ounces of meat per 16-ounce can, respectively. Ready-to-Eat poultry soups contain two percent poultry meat and condensed, four percent poultry meat, or 0.32 ounces and 0.64 ounces per 16 ounce can, respectively.

The label on meat or poultry products tells you what the major ingredients

are by listing them in descending order of predominance by weight. Knowing what is in a processed product and how much meat and poultry it actually contains can help you plan well-ballanced satisfying meals. For example, even though chili con carne has more meat than chili con carne with beans, both items are a good

source of protein. Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion or origin.





Specialists with USDA's Food Safety and Quality Service check each name against the recipe to be used before the name ever goes on the label — to see that it tells what's really inside the pack-

For example, did you know you can expect about the same amount of meat in chili con carne with beans as you could find in beef stew? USDA standards require both items to contain at least





State champion was Joe Schwartz of Rt. 1, Hale Center (Hale County), with a yield of 72.9 bushels per acre. He received a state plaque and a trip for two to Acapulco.

Second place vinner was Worth Matteson, III, of Rt. 4, De Kalb (Bowie County), with a yield of 65.8 bushels. Third in the state was Harold Weiblen of Rt. 1, Dunlay (Medina County), with a 64.8 bushel average.

Both second and third place winners received a state plaque as well as an area plaque and their choice of an amount of either Treflan or Surflan herbicide for being named top producers in their respective areas of the

Winners were announced by R.J. Hodges, agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, which conducts the production contest, and Jim Forrest, district sales manager with Elanco Products Co., contest sponsor. The contest is designed to recognize

top prodcuers in each of the major soybean growing areas of the state-High Plains, Gulf Coast and South Texas, and Northeast Texas. State champion Schwartz planted the

Joining Schwartz as top producers in the High Plains were Max Marble of Hart (Castro County) with a 64.7 bushel yield with the Mitchell R.A. variety and John Dee Walker of Olton Rt., Plainview (Hale County), with a 64.2 bushel yield with the Mitchell variety.

Along with being named state champion, Schwartz was also initiated into the Texas 70 Bushel Soybean Club. He was the only producer to break the 70-bushel mark in 1979.

A host of growers, including Matteson, Weiblen, Marble and Walker, were initiated into the Texas 60 Bushel Soybean Club. Others were Charles Noel, Rt. 1, Plainview, 63.5 bushels; Bill Williams, Plainview, 62.3 bushels; James Campbell, Hart, 61.8 bushels; Emmet Pittman, Star Rt., Kress (Swisher County), 61.62 bushels; Donals Lee Terrell, Plainview, 61.61 bushels; and Alfred Sammann, Rt. 4, Dimmitt (Castro County), 61.5 bushels. "Try it, you'll like it." That's the message the Textile Research Center (TRC) at Texas Tech University and Plains Cotton Growers, Inhhock, are conveying to textile mills and cotton merchandisers about the 1979 High Plains crop of predominantly low micronaire cotton. 'And we have test results to show that this is no idle claim," emphasizes TRC Director James Parker.

A great number of people on the Plains and elsewhere early in the 1979 harvest season were surprised at the low microniare readings from what appeared to be a mature crop. This plus fiber strength values that failed to register a proportionate decline, led to speculation that textile performance of the crop might not be as low as the poor

micronaire would indicate. Parker and Donald Johnson, PCG Executive Vice President, discussed this possibility with others in the industry and Johnson, who is also Chairman of the Natural Fibers Advisory Committee of the Texas Natural Fibers and Food Protein commission, (NF&FPC) proposed that NF&FPC provide TRC with the necessary funds for spinning tests.

### AERIAL PESTICIDE APPLICATORS REGULATIONS

A "citizens interest group," Friends of the Earth, has filed a petition with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency seeking amendment to aerial pesticide applicators' regulations.

CONSERVATORSHIP BOARD

January 9, 1980, Governor Clements appointed Frank Junell. Chairman of the Board of Central National Bank of San Angelo, to the newly created State Conservatorship Board. ("Conservatorship" is a broad legal term referring to persons who are appointed by law to be temporary guardians or custodians of property.) Mr. Junell's term would expire on January 31, 1981. Two members had been previously appointed to the three-member board: William M. Noble, President of the American Bank of Commerce in Victoria, on December 13, 1979 for a term to expire on January 31, 1983; and the Board's intended chairman, Jack N. Roper, Sr., President of Bearing Chain and Supply in Dallas, on November 30, 1979, for a term to expire on January 31, 1985. However, all three of the appointments will require the advise and consent of

the state senate when the legislature returns to session. After the initial appointments, all subsequent appointments to the board will be for a term of

The State Conservatorship Board came into existence when Governor Clements signed Senate Bill 1266 into law on June 6. 1979. The new law is found in Vernon's Annotated Civil Statutes Article 4413(203), Sections 1-12. While it nowhere directly defines the word "conservatorship" it gives the newly created board potentially great powers over any statewide executive agency, department, commission. board, or office created by statute and directed by an appointed officer, or

Specifically, the statute requires the Legislative Audit Committee to notify the governor if it finds that a condition of "gross fiscal mismanagement" exists in agencies of the type described above. The Legislative Audit Committee consists of the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, the Chairman of the House Revenue and Taxation Committee, the Lieutenant Governor, the chairman of the Senate Flnance Committee, and the Chairman of the Senate Committee on State

On receipt of the notice the governor by proclamation may order the State Conservatorship Board to act as "conservator" of the agency, "Gross fiscal mismanagement' includes failure to keep adequate fiscal records, failure to maintain proper control over assets. failure to maintain proper control over assets, failure to discharge fiscal obligations in a timely manner, and misuse of state funds, all as determined by the Legislative Audit Committee. While acting as "conservator" of a

state agency, the newly created board may employ personnel for the agency. fire employees which it determines were responsible for the "gross fiscal mismanagement," make other necessary organizational or structural changes in the agency to achieve the purposes of the new law, contract with public or private entities or persons for management or administrative services, and delegate any part of its powers, other than rule-making powers to public, or private, entities or persons. The board's 'conservatorship" of an agency continues until the governor issues a later proclamation declaring that the condition of "gross fiscal mismanagement" in the agency no longer exists, or until the Legislative Audit Committee determines and reports to the governor a similar finding. In both cases, the "conservatorship" is then dissolved. and presumably the state agency would then be back under the laws which

### created it, and previously regulated it. OSHA DEVELOPMENTS

The United States Department of Labor has announced its plans for international involvements by OSHA in job safety and health activities for the year j1980. The plans include: an international workshop, joint technical meetings, conferences and seminars with the Commission of the European Communitites, representing the nine member nations of Belgium. Denmark. France, Germany, Ireland, Italy, Lux-embourg. The Netherlands, and the United Kingdom; participation by OSHA in the International Labor Organization hazard alert system and the United Nations International Registry of Potentially Toxic Chemicals; an OSHAconducted seminar in Israel; the establishment of a joint research committee with the Israelis; joint seminars in Mexico in April 1980; special trianing sessions at the OSHA Training Institute in Des Plaines, Illinois, for specialists from Mexico in such fields as ventilation and noise control; and periodic exchange of visits by researchers and administrators with Japan, including experts in the handling of industrial accidents and disasters, and in epidemiological surveys of occupational cancer.

### METRIC GAS PRICING

The Texas Department of Agriculture's Weights and Measures Division is proposing to adopt rules that will permit gasoline distributing agencies to use any one of the following three methods of pricing gasoline: (1) price per gallon; (2) price per half gallon and (3) price per liter. Gasoline is now being dispensed on the basis of price per gallon and price per half gallon. The change in current rules proposed by the Texas Department of Agriculture is scheduled to become effective on February 11, 1980.
