Three Floyd County races in the 1980 Democratic primary election are contested, and three incumbents are running unopposed for county office on the Democratic ticket. There are no Republican candidates for county office, so the Democratic nominees are virtually certain to win the November general election.

Monday was the last day for candidates to file. The first primary election

is May 3. If runoffs are necessary, the second primary will be June 7. Races for two county commissioner

Running unopposed on the Democra-tic ballot are sheriff Fred Cardinal, county attorney Kenneth Bain, and tax assessor-collector Jonelle Fawver.

The Administration's \$616 billion budget for fiscal year 1981 is a nightmare of deception, unrealistically optimistic projections, inadequacies concerning our defense budget and irresponsibly high domestic spending. One hardly knows where to start in to solve the problems it would create if enacted.

But let's look for a moment at what the budget means to you the taxpayer. The President is projecting a \$16 billion deficit, based on his assumption revenues will be up by more than \$75 billion. Where does the extra money come from? Some \$19 billion will come from a Social Security tax increase.

But that's only the obvious tax increase. Everyone who has received a cost-of-living pay raise will pay more both in terms of numbers of dollars and percentage of his salary because he'll be pushed into a higher tax bracket.

Then, of course, the windfall profits tax will further bloat the federal treasury, and ultimately will be paid by the consumer.

The Administration is predicting a recession for this year, and there is serious question whether the revenue projections can be reached, even with the near-draconian tax burden working Americans will have to bear. And that tax burden will work against recovery from the recession.

If we are to solve the economic problems of the 1980's, we need new tax policies which place greater reliance on the private sector by expanding its productive capacity and efficiency. And the starting point is to give the American taxpayer greater control over his hard-earned income through substantial tax reductions for individuals and business.

A cut in tax rates will generate more jobs, greater economic activity and an expanded tax base which, over time, will yield the same or higher revenues, even with lower tax rates.

Just as important is readjusting, or "indexing," tax brackets so that cost-of-living wage increases are just that, and not an excuse for the federal government to grab a higher percentage of income.


We must also encourage personal savings and investment through tax exemptions and take other action to stimulate capital formation. Giving tax breaks to businesses so that they can accumulate money to invest may sound like only a way to help business, but it really would benefit everyone through improving productivity. In 1979, the productivity of the American worker actually declined by .9 percent. And without increasing productivity, there can be no real growth in the economy.

In short, we must restore a pattern of growth to the American economy through prudent but people-oriented tax policies.

drink tax rebate

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Wednesday said Texas collected \$77.9 billion in gross receipts taxes on mixed drinks during the last year.

He said the mixed drink taxes for the year's last quarter reached 20.3 million and that his office was mailing checks totaling \$5.8 million to 358 cities and 204 countries as their share of the 10 percent gross receipts tax.

Mixed drink taxes for the first three quarters totaled \$ 18 million, \$19.8 million and \$19.8 million, respectively. Texas cities and counties receive a 15 percent rebate of the tax collected on

mixed drinks sold within their boundaries under the law that legalized the sale of mixed drinks. Floyd County's 15-percent rebate for the furth quarter came to 223.21. Total county tax revenue from mixed-drink sales was \$1.488.05.

The year-end total of mixed drink taxes means more than \$779 million was spent during 1979 to purchase mixed drinks in Texas.



University has shown that the two renewable resources can be used for producing substitute natural gas and other valuable chemicals at competitive prices. The study of a simulated

large-scale commercial plant is the next step for Dr. Steven R. Beck, chemicai engineer, and Dr. Richard A. Bartsch, chemist, both at Texas Tech.

If a large scale model is feasible, the process will reduce demand for crude oil and yet produce energy and (DOE). etilylene from renewable resources now being wasted. Natural gas is used for heating and in chemicals. while ethylene is used in the entire plastics industry.

"At the experimental level, using a 30-foot biomass reactor system that burns manure and sawdust. we have been able to produce substitute natural gas at \$4 per million British Thermal Units (BTU's) and ehtylene at 15 cents a pound," Beck

The figures are identical to prices of gas and ethylene recently produced from crude oil, he added.

The proposed large scale unit will produce 40 million cubic feet of substitute natural gas and 50 tons of ethylene per day from 1,000 tons of dry manure or saw-

dust, according to Beck. Estimates show that an average head of cattle produces about 3,000 tons of manure during its entire stay in a feedlot. Two-thirds of that is water, with 1,000 tons of dry matter remaining. Beck works on the design

and operation of the experimental unit, while Bartsch studies the waste products resulting from the conversion process. "The waste products,

which contain waste water and tars, have to be carefully examined for chemical composition to determine the presence of environmental or health problems," Bartsch

His research indicates that the waste products are che-mically safe if manure is used to produce natural gas, but minute concentrations of hazardous carcinogens are

The experimental unit used at Texas Tech is a leader in the second genera-tion technology of biomass gasification reactors.

Gas burners are used to fire the reactor containing the manure of sawdust. Air is then injected into the reactor, which causes internal combustion and increases the temperature of the manure or sawdust to start a chemical process which pro-duces the substitute natural

of a large scale commercial model the Texas Tech researchers will run the experimental unit continuously for seven days and examine its performance.

Other aspects of studying the simulated large scale model will include the economics, waste water treatment and use of oxygen instead of air in the combustion process, Beck said.

The nitrogen in the air dilutes the gas produced in the reactor. If oxygen is used, we hope to get a better final product," Beck added. More than 10 graduate students in chemical engine-

ering and three graduate students in chemistry have No. worked with Beck and Bartsch on this project. The research was started in 1971, "but at that time the emphasis was on disposal of feedlot waste. Now the emphasis has obviousley

changed to the production of energy and chemicals from the waste," Beck said. A portion of the initial funding was provided through state monies appro-priated for the Center for Energy Research at Texas Tech.
