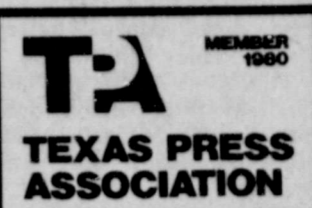

## Lockney junior livestock show to be held Saturday



Local 4-H Club and Future Farmers of America members are busy this week readying their animals for entry in the Lockney Junior Livestock Show and the Lockney County Junior Livestock Show.

Lockney's show will be Saturday and judging by Ernest Kiker, Briscoe County extension agent from Silverton, will begin at 9:30 a.m. Swine judging will be first, followed by sheep and then steers.

LHS ag teachers Elvin Lyon and Mike Glenn expect between 65 and 70 hogs, from 60-70 lambs and 10 or 12 steers to be entered in the show.

The showmen will begin moving their animals into the show barn on the fairgrounds in east Lockney Friday afternoon. Some sheep and hogs will be weighed then. No sifting is done at Lockney except for weight minimums and maximums. Hogs must weigh between 200 and 260 lbs.; sheep must weigh from 80 to 130 lbs, and steers must weigh between 800 and 1250 lbs.

Prize money of about \$600 and ribbons through fifth place in each class will be provided by Lockney Chamber of Commerce. Swine and sheep classes earn from \$6 for first place down to \$2

for fifth place, with the steer prize money going from \$10 for first to \$2 for fifth.

Showmanship trophies will be given by Lockney Cooperatives, Consumers' Fuel Association and Patterson Grain.

Sheep breed champion awards will be donated by H.E. Frizzell, fine wool; JJJ Sheep Farm, fine wool cross; Eddie Teeter, Hampshire; Austin Beedy, Suffolk; Kenneth Holt, Shropshire; Kenneth Brosch, Southdown, and George Sparkman, other breeds.

Grand and reserve grand champion swine trophies are sponsored by Warren Mathis and Four R Irrigation respectively.

Sunday afternoon, the animals will be moved to Floydada for the county show that will be held Feb. 18-20.

The two-year terms of council men J.D. Copeland, Paul Reecer and Pat Frizzell are to expire in April. Frizzell has been serving the unexpired term of Jerry Perry who resigned Dec. 1 to move to Floydada. He is undecided about running for the council.

Copeland immediately signed up for re-election. Plans of Reecer are not known at this time.

March 5 is deadline for filing for the office.

In other business Thursday morning, the council heard Eddie Teeter of

Lockney, a member of the Floyd County Appraisal District board of directors, discuss what the board has done since its creation late last fall.

The council agreed to pay for the city's portion of the cost of appraisal of utilities and personal property. The council had already signed a contract to pay for its part of the cost of appraisal of real estate. Lockney pays 1.44 percent of these costs.

A tape recorder for use by the police department was approved by the council.

Attending the session were Mayor Claude Brown, councilmen J.D. Copeland, Thurman Davis, Bobby McCormick and Pat Frizzell, and city secretary Erma Duckworth.

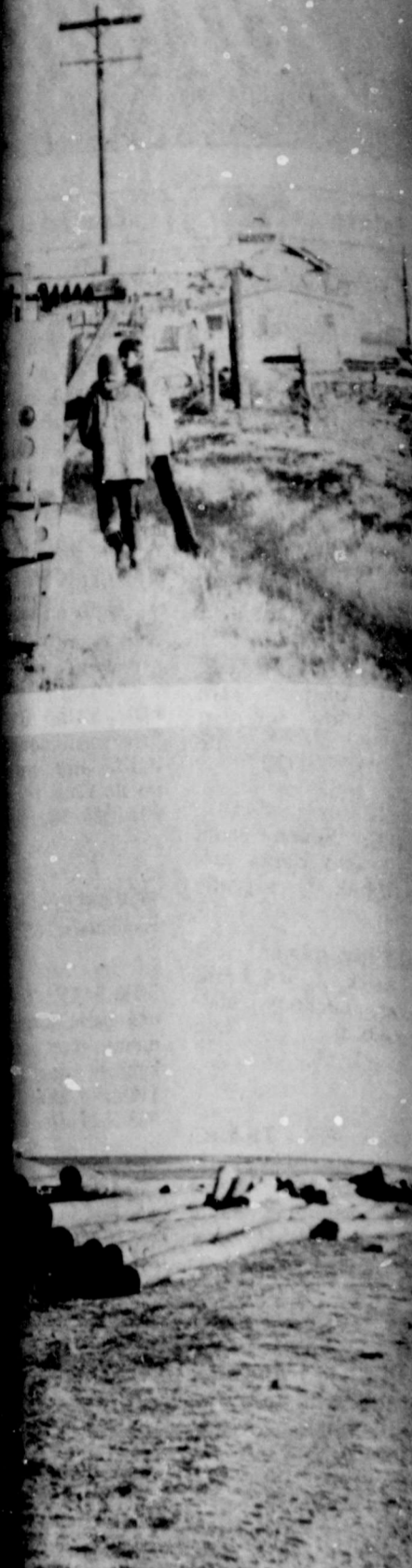

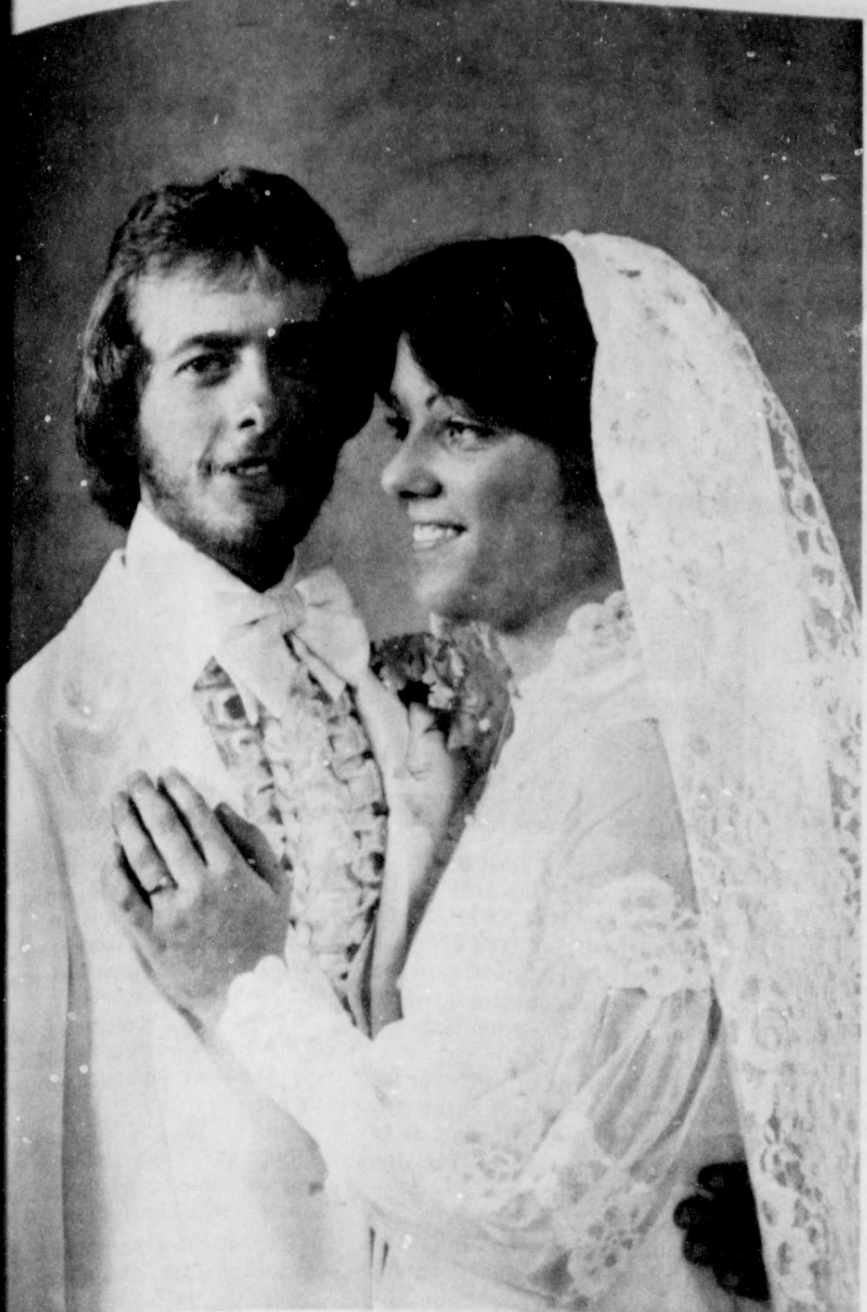

of "Lovers Leap Season," or "Leap Year."

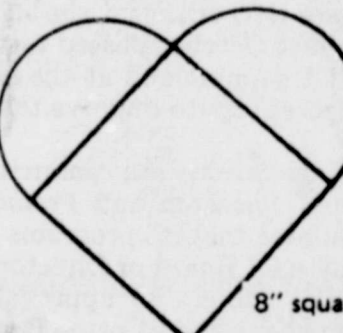
