

Local photographer granted certificat Chuck Wilson, Master of Photography, has been named a Certified participate in a periodic critical review founded in 1880, provides Professional Photographer by the Proto establish the consistent quality of his services and establishes

fessional Photographers of America, Inc. and the Texas Professional Photographers Association, Inc. Presently, there are only 425 photographers nationwide and 45 in Texas who have achieved the Certified designation.

The Certification program is a new service provided by the PP of A in cooperation with its affiliated state organizations. According to William J. Anton, executive director of the PP of A, "Our purpose in this vital program is two-fold. Our first priority is to upgrade the professional skills and standards of competence, as well as encourage the understanding of the ethics and business of photography on the part of the photographer. Secondly, the certification program identifies talented photographers whose skills can be effectively utilized by the buying public.

Mr. Anton said not just any photographer can become certified. Certification status is granted to those photographers who successfully complete a rigorous series of tests designed to measure the applicant's understanding of both the technical and business aspects of photography. In addition, a Certified Photographer must be a professional active member of the PP of A and his state organization photographic business. Also, Certified Professional Photographers are bound to a strict code of professional conduct established by the PP of A.





Floyd County students to participate in basic assessment program

All fifth and ninth grade students from the Lockney and Floydada Independent School Districts will participate in the first Texas Assessment of Basic Skills test program scheduled for February 1980.

The assessment plan, first of its kind in this state, will be scheduled once each year under requirements set by the Texas Legislature during its 1979 regular session.

The Lockney and Floydada ISD students will be among 500,000 expected to take the reading, writing composition, and mathematics tests during the February 25-March 12 statewide testing period. Each of the tests will require a maximum of 40 to 60 minutes to complete.

The Lockney and Floydada ISD will report their district and campus aggregate scores to the public at a May or June meeting of the board of trustees, according to W. H. Hallmark and Jerry Cannon, superintendents. However, individual student scores will be reported only to the student, parents or guardian and the school personnel directly involved.

This testing program is designed to help the student and the school improve achievement. For this reason, results will be reported in a manner that will help everyone become more ef-

Third-grade students will be added to the annual sequence during the 1980-81 school year, according to plans announced by the Texas Education Agency. The three tests will make up an annual assessment effort designed to help both state and local school officials improve their services.

Overall student performance, both by campus and by district, will be reported each year to the public by the local board of trustees.

Westinghouse DataScore Systems of Iowa City, Ia., will both help administer the 1980 test program and deve-lop and field test new items for the 1980-81 series under contract to the State Board of Education. The lowa firm will also operate a computerized inventory of all test booklets to assure strict security at all times.

Each test question will relate to a specific objective or skill students are expected to learn by the time they complete the particular

Ninth-grade students who do not make a satisfactory score may re-take the test each year they remain in high school. However, they will not be required to take it more than once. Later attempts to improve their scores and evaluate any remedial programs will be voluntary.

Window shades can be effectively used throughout your home to increase energy savings. They block in heat during winter months and block out heat during the summertime. Opaque, light-colored shades block air flow better than draperies or venetian blinds, saving eight cents on every home-heating dollar, and up to twenty-one cents on each home-cooling dollar.

Since glass in windows conduct heat, window shades save energy by blocking the passage of heat through the glass itself. Shades prevent heat loss in the winter by 24-31 percent and reduce heat gain in a home from the summer by 63 percent.

Raise the shades during early morning, evenings and nights-to allow cooler air inside and reduce the need for air conditioning.
