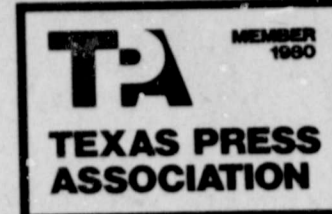

## Lady Horns win district second round



Playoff game set  
Friday at Tulia

Lockney's Lady Horns had two games they had to win for the round two title when the showdown with Abernathy came last Friday night at home. And the girls managed both to surprise Abernathy 55-50 and then to Idaho Tuesday night to beat 58-39. The playoff game between Abernathy, winner of round one in district play, and Lockney will be Friday night in Tulia at 7 p.m. Gymnasium doors will be opened at 6 p.m. Coach Marsha Sharp said that the Abernathy game Friday night was the team's best-all-around game for the year. She was pleased that the girls reacted so well under pressure. She cited in particular Connie Coffman, a freshman who was Lockney's high point girl for the night with 14 points, who played her best game for the year. Abernathy was ranked 13th in state and was 6-0 in district play before the Lockney win. Another fact that pleased Coach Sharp was that her five starters all produced good point totals. Rebecca Evans had 12 points; Julie Frizzell, 11; Penny Sterling, nine; and Tammy Hayes, eight. After Sterling, Evans and Coffman fouled out, the team got good help from substitutes Susan Fitzgerald (one point), Donna Moats and Rosalind Hill.

The Lady Horns hit 27 out of 41 free throws Friday night. Julie Frizzell, who had missed only two free throws in district play until this game, was nine out of 13 against Abernathy. Free throws were about all the scoring Lockney could muster Tuesday night in the first quarter against Idaho. The host team was behind only one point at the end of that quarter. Coach Sharp admitted her team didn't shoot well the first half, but pointed out that the Lady Horns scored 10 points in both the second and third quarters. Halftime score was 27-20, and the end of the third quarter saw Lockney ahead 47-31. Sharp believes that those prolific quarters forced Idaho to do things they didn't want to do. "And our defense was good the whole game. Both offense and defense was extremely good the second half." Rebecca Evans whipped the cords for 19 points Tuesday night, while Frizzell had another good night with 16 points. Two other starters, Tammy Hays and Connie Coffman, tossed in 10 points each. Penny Sterling hit two points, and Susan Fitzgerald got one. And Coach Sharp, and the Lady Horn fans, are looking forward to Friday night and the confrontation with Abernathy.

The Lockney-Abernathy playoff game has been set at 7 p.m. tomorrow (Friday) in the Tulia High School gymnasium. The winner will represent District 4-AA girls in the bi-district contest. The gate opens at 6 p.m. tomorrow. Admission prices are \$2 for adults and \$1 for children. Lockney fans will sit on the south side of the gym.

Laura Manning of Lockney had home Friday form Dallas when she had been a patient in Bryan Hospital since undergoing surgery Jan. 29. A corneal graft was done on her eye in preparation for a corneal transplant to be in six to eight months. The graft was from a deceased donor. She was two years ago Mrs. Manning

went through the same procedure for her first corneal transplant. She is a victim of the eye disease keratoconus which causes the corneas to become elongated or almost conical-shaped. As the disease progresses, vision is lost. Mrs. Manning's problems with the disease began when she was a teenager. For this last surgery, Mrs. Manning

has to try extra hard just to get to Dallas. She and her daughter Mrs. Bill (Mary Louise) McCarter started for Dallas Jan. 28 by car, but hit an ice slick nine miles west of Paducah, slid off the road and hit a tree. A couple from Lubbock saw the accident and brought the woman into Floydada. Mrs. Manning then made the trip by airplane the next day.

## Lockney junior livestock show to be held Saturday

4-H Club and Future Farmers of America members are busy this week getting their animals ready for entry in the Lockney Junior Livestock Show and the County Junior Livestock Show. The show will be Saturday and Sunday by Ernest Kiker, Briscoe extension agent from Silverton, begins at 9:30 a.m. Swine judging will be first, followed by sheep and then

The showmen will begin moving their animals into the show barn on the fairgrounds in east Lockney Friday afternoon. Some sheep and hogs will be weighed then. No sifting is done at Lockney except for weight minimums and maximums. Hogs must weigh between 200 and 260 lbs.; sheep must weigh from 80 to 130 lbs. and steers must weigh between 800 and 1250 lbs. Prize money of about \$600 and ribbons through fifth place in each class will be provided by Lockney Chamber of Commerce. Swine and sheep classes earn from \$6 for first place down to \$2

for fifth place, with the steer prize money going from \$10 for first to \$2 for fifth. Showmanship trophies will be given by Lockney Cooperatives, Consumers' Fuel Association and Patterson Grain. Sheep breed champion awards will be donated by H.E. Frizzell, fine wool; JJJ Sheep Farm, fine wool cross; Eddie Teeter, Hampshire; Austin Beedy, Suffolk; Kenneth Holt, Shropshire; Kenneth Broseh, Southdown, and George

Sparkman, other breeds. Jerry Williams gives the grand champion steer trophy and L.N. Johnson donates the reserve champion steer trophy. Grand and reserve grand champion swine trophies are sponsored by Warren Mathis and Four R Irrigation respectively. Sunday afternoon, the animals will be moved to Floydada for the county show that will be held Feb. 18-20.

## Local photographer granted certification

Chuck Wilson, Master of Photography, has been named a Certified Professional Photographer by the Professional Photographers of America, Inc. and the Texas Professional Photographers Association, Inc. Presently, there are only 425 photographers nationwide and 45 in Texas who have achieved the Certified designation.

The Certification program is a new service provided by the PP of A in cooperation with its affiliated state organizations. According to William J. Anton, executive director of the PP of A, "Our purpose in this vital program is two-fold. Our first priority is to upgrade the professional skills and standards of competence, as well as encourage the understanding of the ethics and business of photography on the part of the photographer. Secondly, the certification program identifies talented photographers whose skills can be effectively utilized by the buying public."

Mr. Anton said not just any photographer can become certified. Certification status is granted to those photographers who successfully complete a rigorous series of tests designed to measure the applicant's understanding of both the technical and business aspects of photography. In addition, a professional active member of the PP of A and his state organization photographic business. Also, Certified Professional Photographers are bound to a strict code of professional conduct established by the PP of A.

When renewing certification status between the third and fourth year, a photographer must provide evidence of

a continuing education program and participate in a periodic critical review to establish the consistent quality of his work.

The PP of A is the oldest and largest association of professional photographers in the world with headquarters in

Des Plaines, Illinois. The organization, founded in 1880, provides services and establishes a professional performance for more than 17,000 members and state and regional and international affiliates.

## Census workers needed; testing set Tuesday in Floydada

The U.S. Department of Commerce Bureau of the Census is seeking to hire enumerators, crew leaders and clerks from Floyd County for the 1980 Census, which starts April 1.

Testing for persons desiring the temporary employment is scheduled to begin at 2 p.m. Tuesday, February 19 in the county courtroom, on the second floor of the court house in Floydada.

Anyone 18 years of age or older who take the test, and only persons who are currently employed, are eligible for employment. Salaries start at \$4.50 an hour.

The test consists of 54 questions designed to measure the skills and knowledge required to perform a variety of census jobs. Only those who score 75 percent or better are allowed to complete the test.

WINDOW SHADES—POWERFUL ENERGY SAVERS

Window shades can be effectively used throughout your home to increase energy savings. They block in heat during winter months and block out heat during the summertime. Opaque, light-colored shades block air flow better than draperies or venetian blinds, saving eight cents on every home-heating dollar, and up to twenty-one cents on each home-cooling dollar.

Since glass in windows conducts heat, window shades save energy by blocking the passage of heat through the glass itself. Shades prevent heat loss in the winter by 24-31 percent and reduce heat gain in a home from the summer by 63 percent.

For maximum energy savings, install window shades inside the window frame about one inch from the glass. This sets up an effective barrier between the glass and the shade. The one-inch dead air space acts as insulation. Be sure the shade "fills" the window space as much as possible, leaving only the narrowest margin possible between the shade and the window frame.

For big energy savings during the winter, keep shades down during the coldest hours of the day—early morning, evenings and nights—to keep indoor heat locked inside the home. Raise the shades during the warmest parts of the day and let the sun's heat help warm the house.

For the biggest energy savings in the summer, pull shades down during hot, sunny parts of the day. That will deflect the sun's hot rays and keep their heat from building up inside the house—and that will save home-cooling energy. Raise the shades during early morning, evenings and nights—to allow cooler air inside and reduce the need for air conditioning.

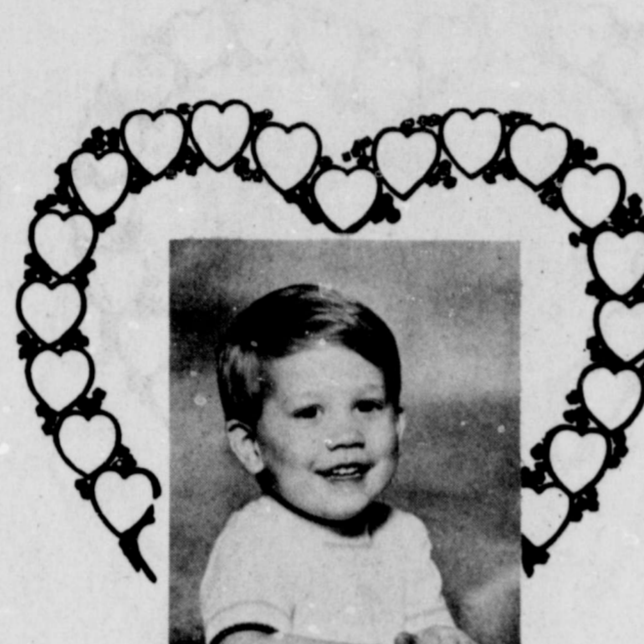

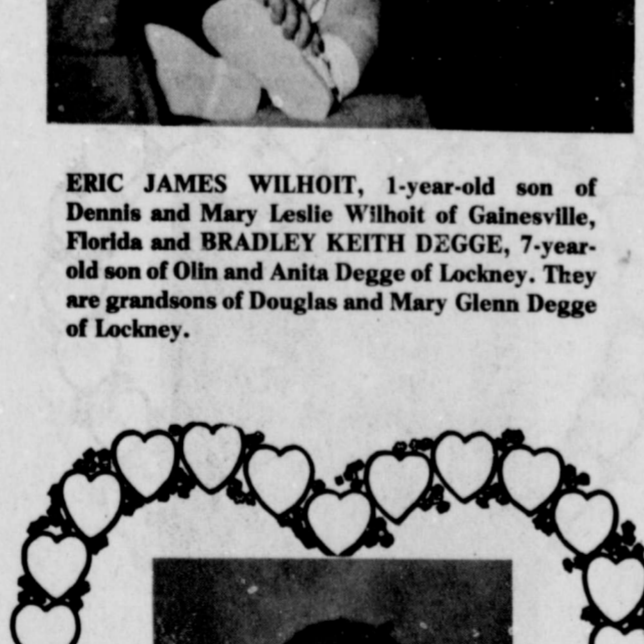

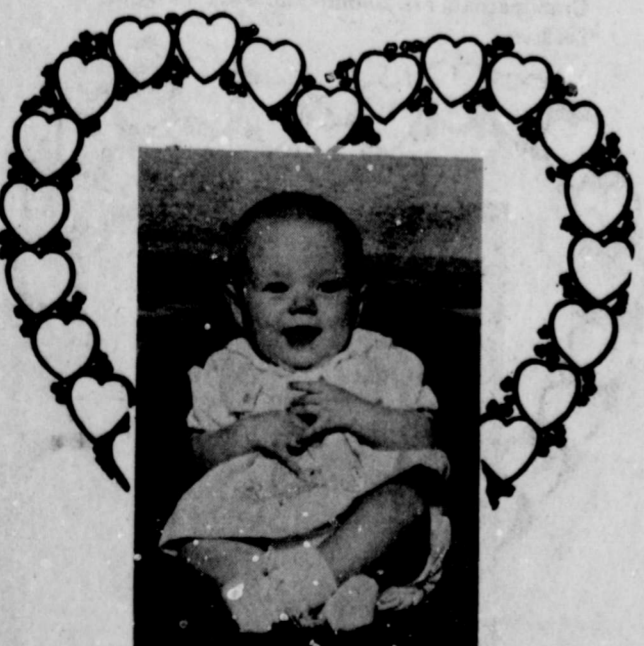

Auto fumes fatal to former Floydada resident

Carbon monoxide poisoning apparently killed a 41-year-old woman found dead in her home Sunday evening, Justice of the Peace Silas Clark said.

Funes from a running car may have overcome Alma O'Neal Waters of 642 Harwell, a six-year employee of Texas Instruments.

She was discovered dead by her husband, Jerry, when he returned from an out-of-state trip Sunday night, Clark said.

Clark pronounced the woman dead at 7:20 p.m. Sunday.

Apparently, Mrs. Waters left her automobile running in the closed garage to warm it, and the home heating-ventilation system carried the fumes into the house, Clark said.

"From all indications, the death appears to be accidental," Clark said.

The house was locked, Clark said, and the woman's husband had to break into the home, where he discovered his wife lying dead on the floor.

The woman's car was in the garage, the gas tank

empty and the ignition turned on, Clark said. The home was still full of fumes Sunday evening, he said.

Clark said the woman probably died sometime Sunday morning, as her husband had talked to her on the telephone Saturday night.

Services for Mrs. Waters will be at 3 p.m. Tuesday at Elliott-Hamil Chapel of Faith, Highway 277.

The body will be cremated. Born April 28, 1938, in Saltillo, she attended schools there and in Mt. Vernon.

She came to Abilene from Lubbock in 1978. She married Jerry Waters Sept. 3, 1978, in Abilene. She was a member of Floydada Methodist Church. She had worked in quality control at Texas Instruments for six years.





