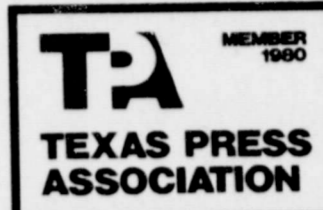

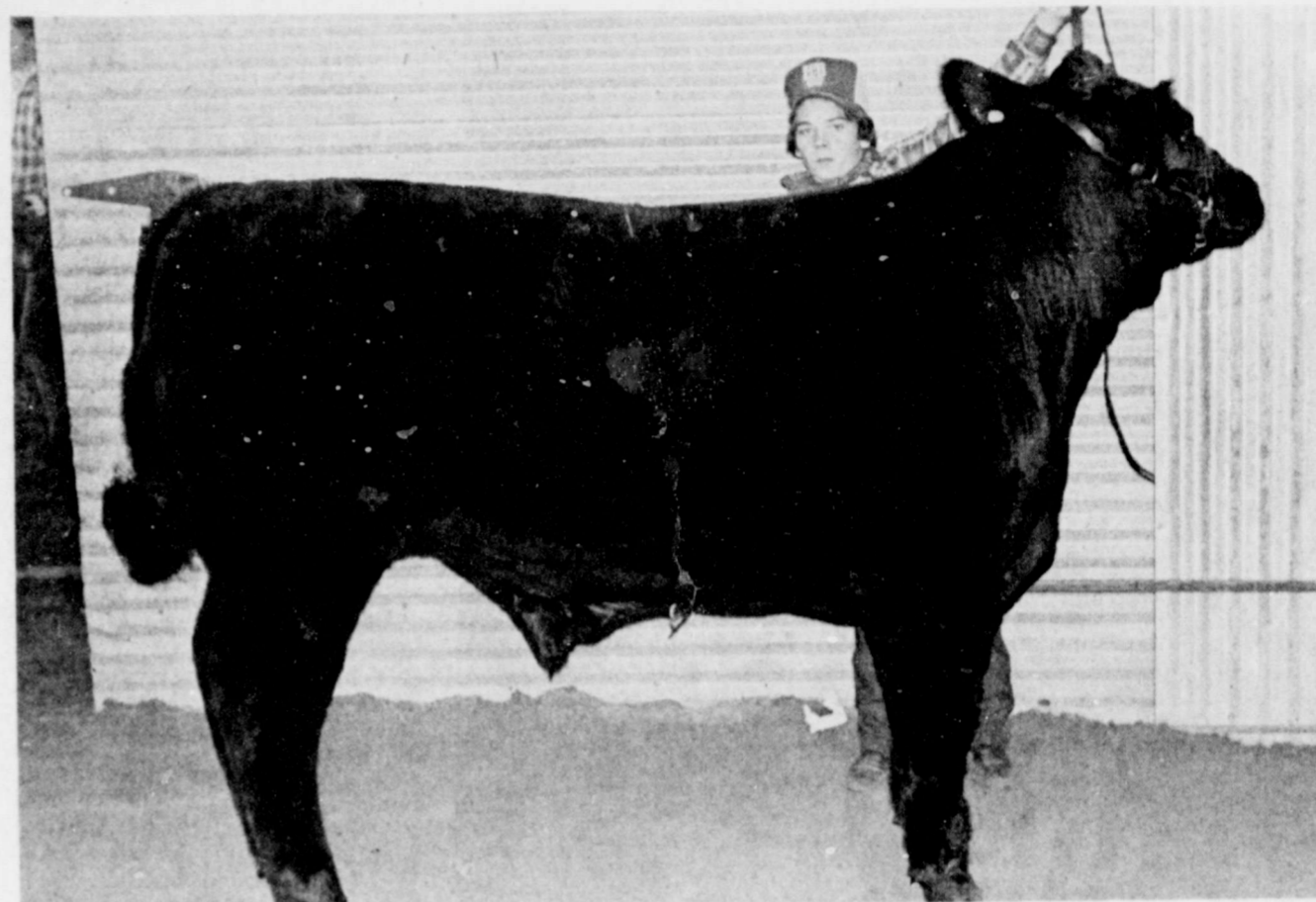

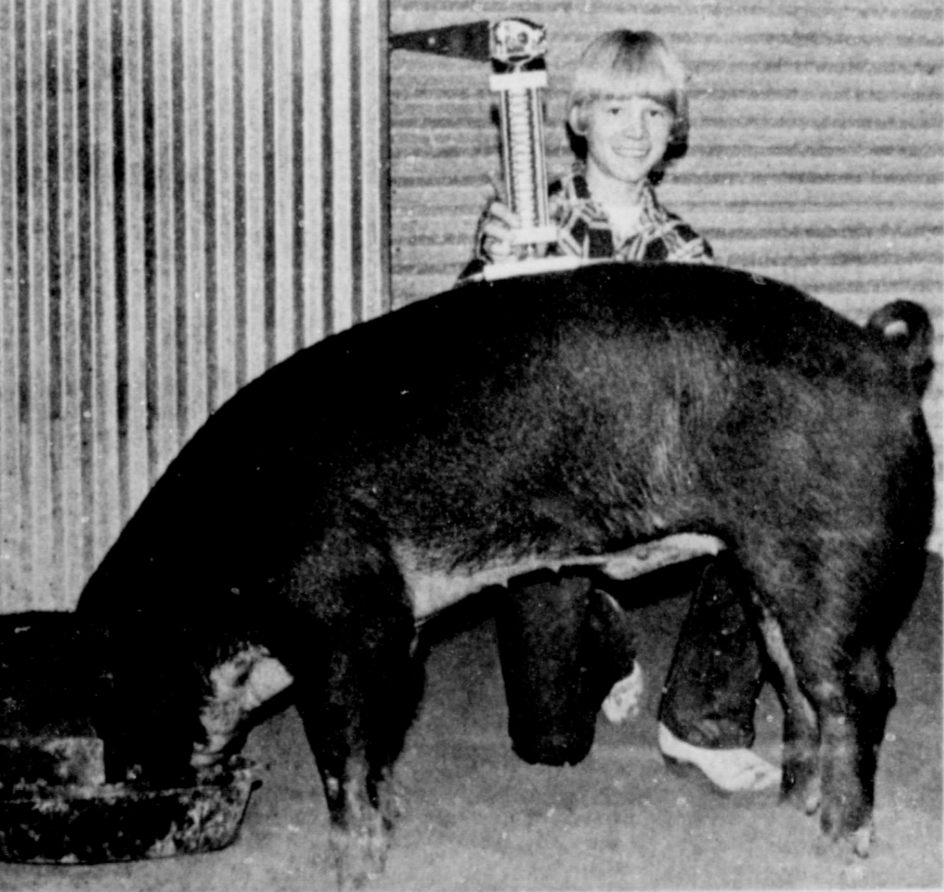

DIMMITT WINS BI-DISTRICT GAME

Lady Horns Beat Abernathy In 4-AA Playoff

Lockney High School girls won the District 4-AA basketball championship Friday night when they defeated Abernathy 49-47 in the district playoff contest at Tulia.

The Lady Horns were six points behind going into the final period, but instead of giving up, they had a "tremendous fourth quarter" (coach Marsha Sharp's description), showed a lot of poise, and outscored the Lady Lopes 19-11 in the final eight minutes to post the two-point victory.

The Lockney girls held a 17-12 lead at

the end of the first quarter, but Abernathy was ahead 26-22 at halftime and 36-30 after three quarters.

Rebecca Evans led Lockney in scoring with 16 points. Tammy Hayes added 11, Penny Sterling 10, Connie Coffman nine, and Julie Frizzell three in the balanced Lockney effort.

"It had to be one of the best efforts we've ever had," Sharp said after the game. "Everybody on the team had lots of poise at the end. Evans and Sterling played with four fouls most of the fourth quarter and still played good defense.

Frizzell handled the ball well. Coffman made three crucial shots, and Hayes made the two free throws that gave us a four-point advantage at the end," Sharp said. Tammy's free throws made the score 49-45 with 29 seconds left in the contest. Abernathy managed to score two more points before the contest was over, and they threatened to send the game into overtime when the officials called an offensive foul on Frizzell with one second on the clock.

The questioned call gave Abernathy possession but not enough time to work for a good shot, and the Lady Horns claimed the gold basketball.

"Abernathy had a tremendous basketball team," Sharp said. "They finished 24-7 and were ranked 13th in the state." She said the Abernathy coaches and players showed a lot of class after the game.

"Everything that had to happen in the last few minutes happened for us," Sharp said. "Our fans gave us unbelievable support Friday night, and the things that happened earlier Friday and Thursday made a lot of difference."

The Lady Horns had the same kind of fan support Monday night in Hutcherson Center on the Wayland Baptist College campus in Plainview when they met the Dimmitt Bobbies in the bi-district game. This time, however, it just didn't happen for the Lockney girls, and Dimmitt earned the trip to the regional tournament with a 49-47 victory.

The ball just wouldn't go in for the Lady Horns. "I thought we did exactly what we wanted to do on defense, and we got after the ball hard the whole game," Sharp said afterwards. "We played well — we just didn't shoot well," she explained. Actually, the Bobbies didn't do much better from the field, but they outshot the Lady Horns from the free-throw line, making 12 of 17 to Lockney's four of 12.

Dimmitt led 14-12 at the end of the first quarter, but the halftime lead (22-20) belonged to Lockney. The third quarter and early fourth period spelled disaster for the Lady Horns, however. It was 36-25 Dimmitt at the end of the third quarter, and the Bobbies led by 13 points once before the Lady Horns started a comeback which fell two points shy. Hayes and Frizzell were top Lockney scorers with 12 each. Coffman put in 10, Sterling seven, Evans three.

Sharp again expressed appreciation to the Lockney fans for their "tremendous support."

"They showed up in full force and helped us rally," she said. The Lockney coach said she was proud of the fourth-quarter comeback. "It would have been easy to sit back and get whipped when we were 13 points down, but the team fought back and almost tied the score time ran out," Sharp

noted.

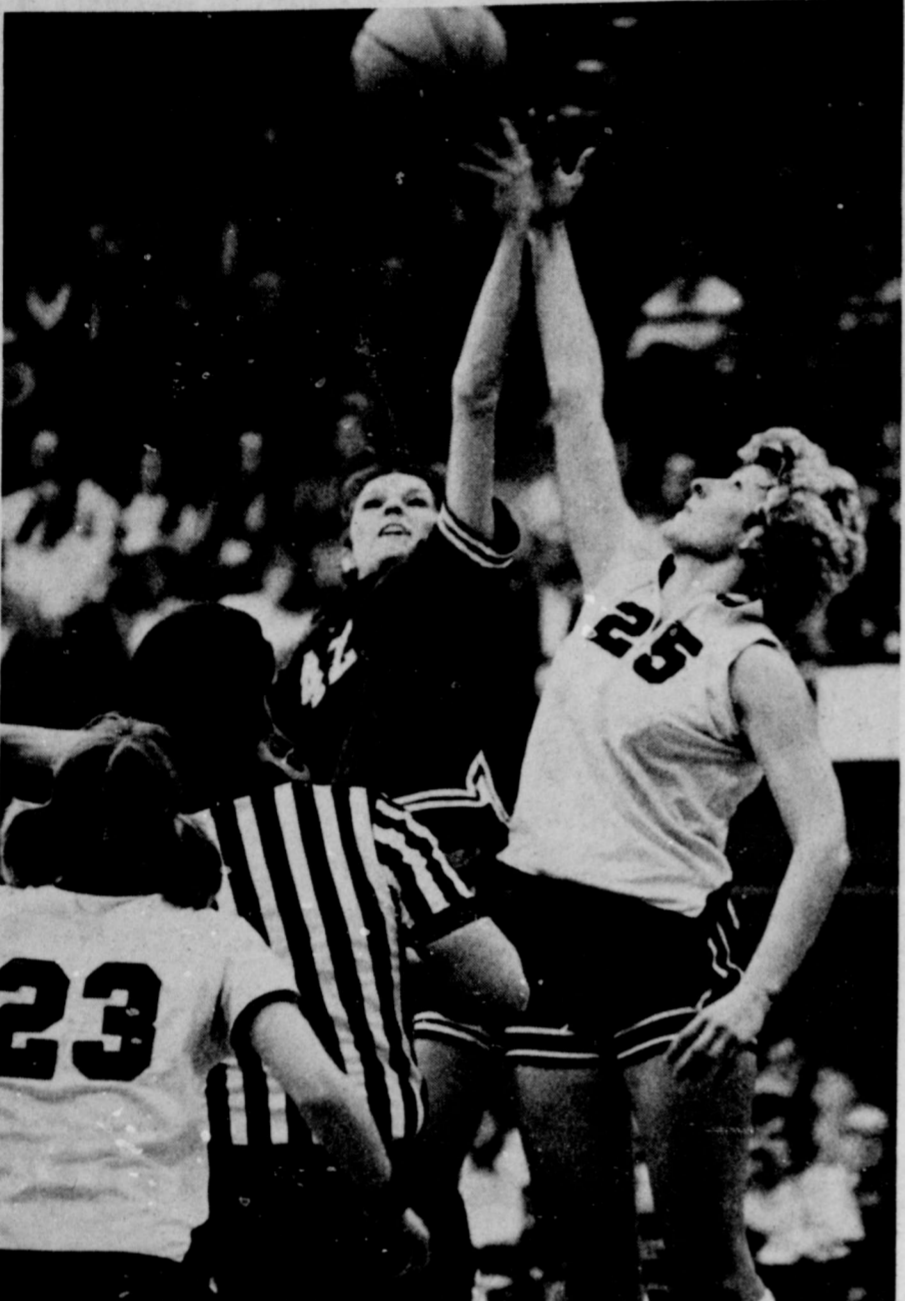
Coach Sharp had a final word on the game and the season:

"It was an extreme honor for me to

get to coach a group of kids that have the attitude about basketball — and life — that these kids have. Everything they do, they do hard. That makes it a lot of

fun for me to work with them every day."

The 4-AA champions finished the season with a 21-10 record.

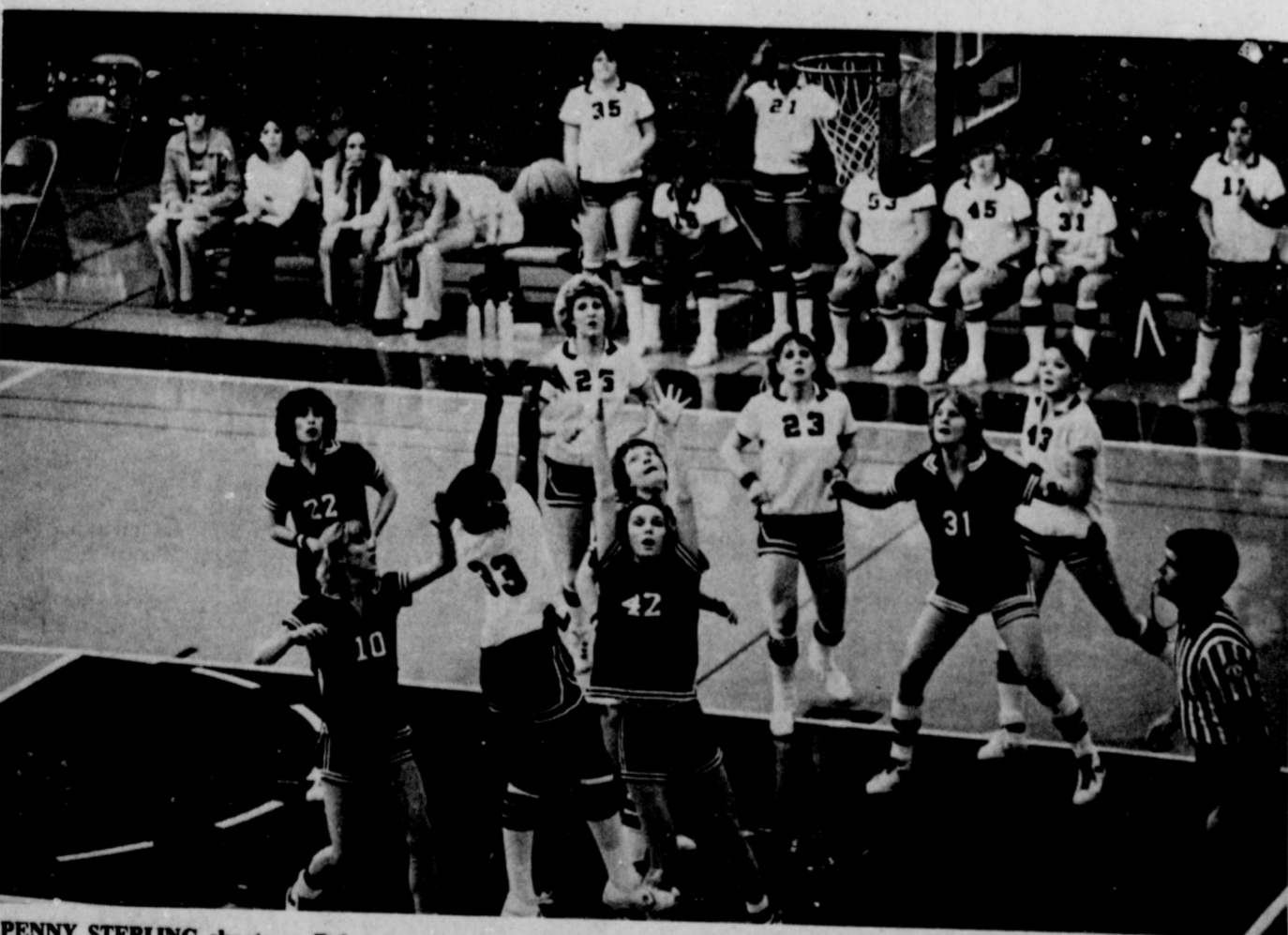

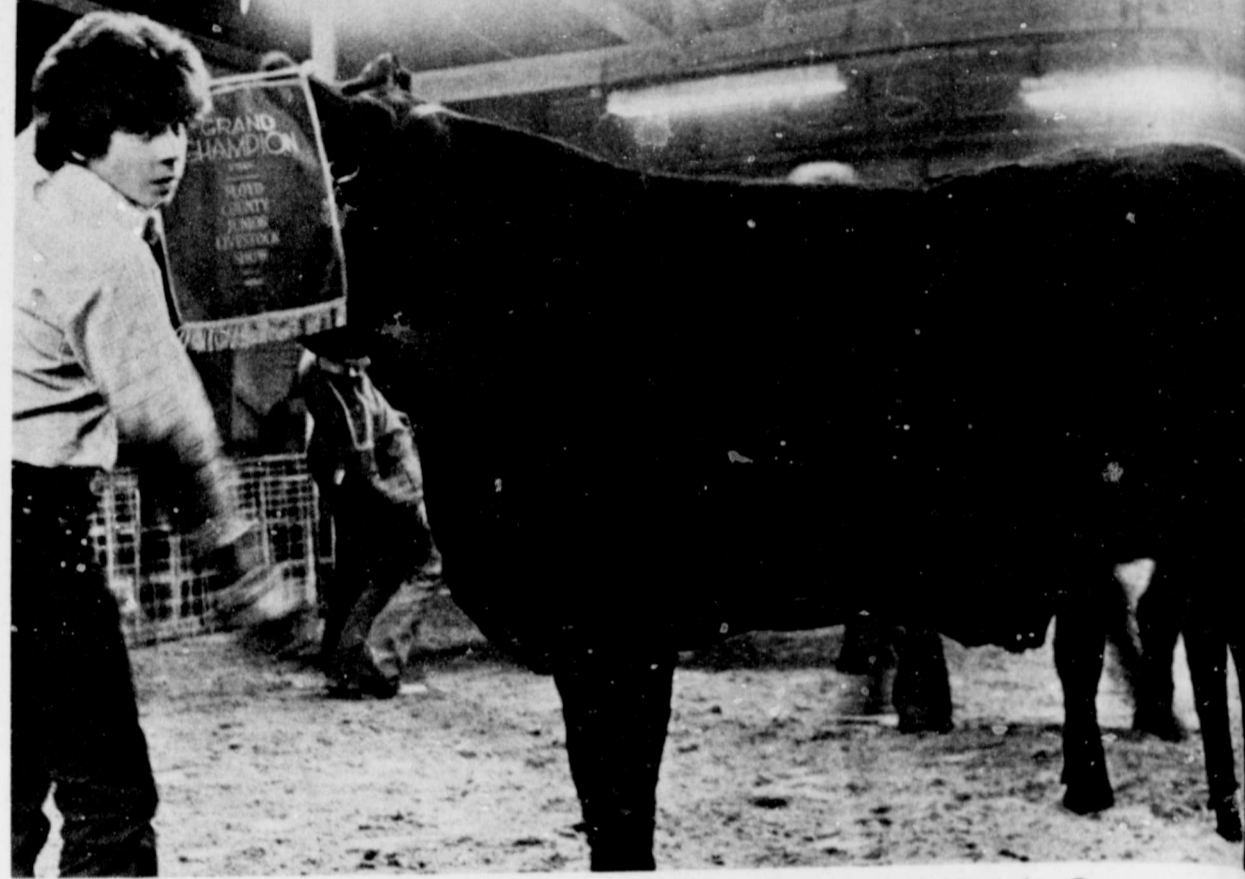

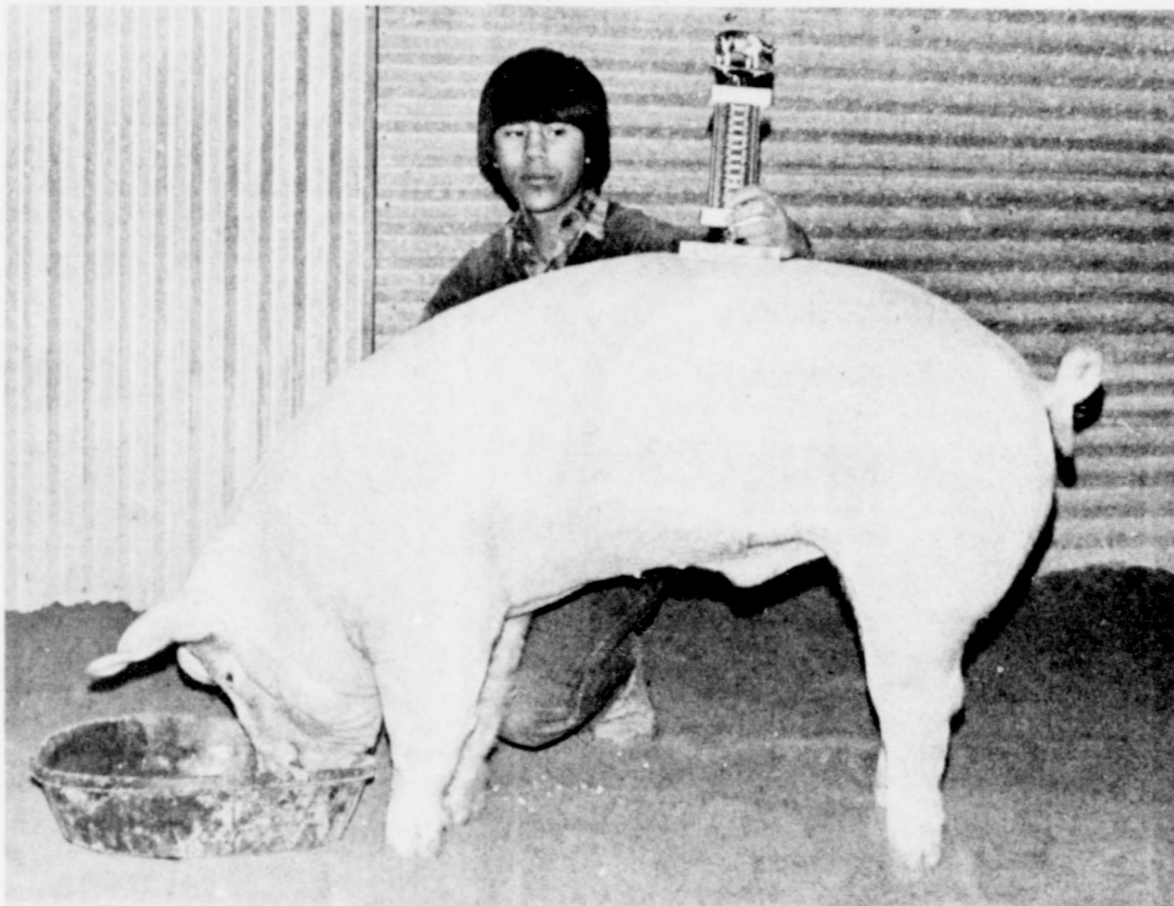

INSIDE BLANKETS LUXURIOUS AND WASHABLE

Among the novel bed linens which have surfaced over the years, plush, colorful and cozy blankets are still a traditional favorite. Add to this a wide range of fibers which boast machine washing and drying -- the blanket combines beauty and practicality!

Electric blankets have become popular in view of saving energy on home heating. They are fashioned in 100% acrylic and in blends such as 50% polyester/50% acrylic. Muted plaids and solids are in vogue. One manufacturer offers a reversible blanket -- solid on one side, plain on the other. Most blankets can be machine washed and dried. Electric blankets should also be laundered at home, since dry cleaning can ruin the insulation on wiring. Check that wools can be washed and dried, some labels may specify dry cleaning.

Measure a woolen blanket before washing. It should be blocked or stretched to original size after laundering. Pretreat spots and stains. If the bedding is heavily soiled, brush it prior to laundering with a liquid detergent or a paste made of detergent granules or soap and water. Or use a prewash soil and stain remover. Wash only one large blanket at a time.

Fill the washer with warm or cold water depending on the degree of soil, and a cold water rinse. Add detergent

or soap. Agitate briefly to dissolve the product completely. Stop the washer; add the blanket. Distribute it loosely and evenly around the agitator. Soak for 10 to 15 minutes, depending on the amount of soil. Start the washer and advance the control until agitation stops and wash water has been pumped out of the tub. After about a minute spin, slowly advance the timer to the deep rinse cycle. Allow washer to finish the wash cycle automatically.

A fabric softener may be used in the washer or dryer to help reduce static cling and make a blanket soft and fluffy.

Depending on the construction of the blanket, synthetics and those made of cotton can be washed on a permanent press, knit or delicate cycle.

Dry a woolen blanket on the high temperature setting. To absorb moisture and dry a blanket more quickly, place 3 or 4 dry towels in the dryer. Preheat the towels for 3 to 5 minutes. This helps absorb moisture, dry blankets rapidly and avoid pilling caused by long tumbling. Place the blanket in the dryer with the warm towels. Set dryer control for about 20 minutes. Check the blanket after 10 minutes. Remove while still slightly damp to avoid shrinkage.

Place blanket on flat surface or over two lines to finish drying. Stretch it to its original shape. When the blanket is completely dry, brush gently to raise nap. Press binding with a cool iron, if needed.

Tumble drying knitted woollens is not recommended. Instead, trace the outline of the blanket on

a piece of paper. After washing, block by finger pressing gently to this outline. Let the garment dry to this shape.

Synthetic blankets and those made of cotton may be dried using the permanent press cycle and temperature. Use highest heat setting if the dryer has no permanent

press setting. Dry completely; do not overdry to avoid wrinkling. Remove blanket from dryer as soon as the machine stops.

To line dry a blanket, hang it over two parallel lines. Smooth and straighten edges. Change the position and straighten again, when partially dry.

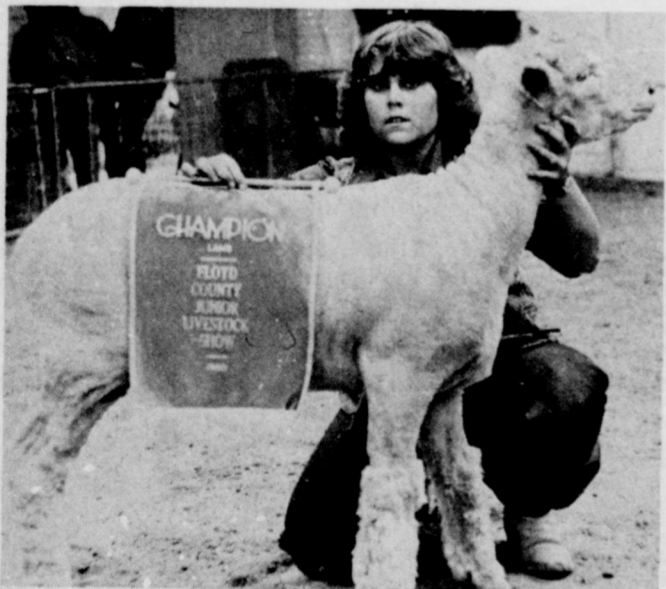
