The publication was developed by the State Property Tax Board in accordance with the provisions of Senate Bill 621, passed by the Texas Legislature in

Homeowners are eligible for a \$5,000 school homestead exemption, and certain disabled persons are those aged 65 or older may qualify for additional exemptions from the value of their

Also, farmers and ranchers have the option of having their agricultural land taxed at its productive rather than market value.

To qualify for exemptions and productivity valuation, however, application must be made to the school tax office before the district's rendition period ends on April 1, 1980.

District residents are encouraged to review the pamphlet and make application for all tax relief to which they are entitled before the rendition period

LHS Senior English Class Takes A Trip

the Twelfth Annual Shakespeare Festival in Odessa. Students that attended were Troy Turley, Dean Molinar, Randy Davis, Sylvia Rendon, Gay Frizzell, Katheryne Moore, and Vicky Ortegon. Sponsors for the trip were Mrs. Gwen Woodard, senior English teacher, and C.L. Record.

Since the senior English class has recently completed a study of Shakespeare's play "Macbeth," the trip came at a most appropriate time. Two plays, "Much Ado About Nothing," a comedy, and "Julius Caesar," a tragedy, were presented by the National Shakespeare Company at the Globe of the Great Southwest Theatre on February 27 and 28.

The actors were well worth watching; and the Globe of the Great Southwest, located on the Odessa College campus, was the perfect setting for the festival. This theatre is an authentic replica of the original theatre built in London, England, in 1598, for William Shakespeare's company. The building of Tudor architecture has been constructed during the last decade and a half as funds became available.

The students met Mrs. Marjorie Morris, the founder, whose work toward building the theatre has been highly accredited. She has been presented with an official historical marker for "the most nearly authentic replica of Shakespeare's theatre yet attempted.'

The idea behind building the Globe of the Great Southwest came when Mrs. Morris was teaching in Odessa High School. One of her students made and brought a model of Shakespeare's Globe Theatre to school. He then commented that it would be exciting to

have an actual life-size replica of the Globe Theatre to be able to see actual plays by Shakespeare. Although this was just a remark, Mrs.

Morris did not give up making her dream become a reality until the fall of 1968 when the Globe of the Great Southwest assumed full-time theatre activity. The trip to Odessa was enjoyable and educational and is highly recommended for anyone who appreciates Shakespeare.



They recommend a 36-inch clearance between a stove and any combustible surface to the front, back, sides and above. Insulating stoveboard or a non-combustible surface, such as brick or ceramic tile, is required un-

If the stove will connect to an existing chimney, make sure the chimney is sound and has a flue lining. Fire in a cracked or unlined chimney can spread to the house. On the other hand, if you connect the woodstove to a fireplace chimney, always seal off the opening around the stovepipe to keep toxic gases from backing up into

Catholics Raise *9 Million To Continue Cambodian Relief

Contributions to the Catholic Relief Services Cambodia Emergency Fund now exceed nine million dollars, it was announced today by CRS Executive Director Bishop Edwin B. Broderick. Of that total, \$6.5 million was donated in Catholic churches throughout the United States in response to an urgent request by Archbishopo John R. Quinn, President of the National Conference of Catholic Bishops. Bishopo Broderick said

that the monies would be used to expand and continue CRS' ongoing effort on behalf of the Cambodians. "The conditions and needs of the displaced people are expected to remain critical for two years. I anticipate

that we will need \$15 million to fund the relief effort," he Since June, 1979, CRS has

brought 51 mercy convoys of food, medicine, clothing and cooking utensils to 35 refugee enclaves along the Thailand-Cambodia border. The convoys, ranging in size from one to 23 trucks, have distributed supplies to every reach able refugee enclave on both sides of the border, including locations 22 miles inside of Cambodia. The contents of the convoys are valued in excess of six million dollars. In two of the major refugee camps in Thailand, Sa Keo

and Khao I Dang, CRS continues to be the only agency actually purchasing, cooking and distributing meals to all refugees in the medical and hospital programs of all the international agencies. In addtion, CRS is responsible for all child nutrition in Sa Keo and Khao I Dang. This nutrition aspect has been a top riority for CRS, which recently sent its senior nutritionist to Thailand to assist in all camps and provide all the camps and provide special training Dambodian refugees

A total of 49 CRS medipersonnel, comprising teams of doctors, nurses and paramedics, are currently working in Sa Keo, Khao I Dang and the border refugee enclaves. These medical volunteers include religious sisters, priests and lay people from the U.S., Australia, India, Switzerland and the

At Khao I Dang, CRS has assumed total responsibility for the care of 700 children who have either lost their parents or been separated from them. CRS has divided them into small groups and provides them with individual feeding, activity programs and a "group mother" who insures that each child gets a healthy dose of

is the individual," said Bishop Broderick. "We have touched the lives of 1.4 million Cambodian refugees. The number is impressive, but we can only realize its full meaning when we consider the unspeakable struggles and personal hardships endured by each individual.

"It is the individuals in the U.S.," continued Bishop Broderick, "who have responded to the plight of the Cambodiams. People from every walk of life have expressed their concern through CRS. Donations range from one dollar to \$50,000 and each is generous in its own right." He noted that many represent real



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
