Safety at the accident scene. Addenbrook reported that it took authorities almost an hour to remove the bodies, which were both burned beyond recognition.


The vehicle, which was traveling northeast, overturned after shearing the utility pole, DPS reported.

Modern paint and varnish removers, when applied correctly, will soften even four or five layers of old paint or varnish. A rinsable remover loosens the old finish quickly and can be cleaned off with little effort. If possible, keep surface on which you are working horizontal. Lay on a thick coating of remover with brush, making just one swipe. Let sit about five minutes. If surface then looks dull, apply second layer of remover. Repeat applications, letting remover sit between each application, until surface no

wet look. Scrape off bulk of old finish with a putty knife, scraper, or other dull straight edge. Wear rubber gloves to protect your hands. Steel wool holds just the right amount of water to complete the job, and it gives the needed gentle abrasion. When all the old finish is off, rinse the piece with water and wipe with a
