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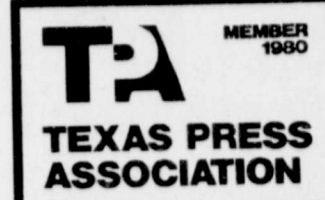

Chamber Banquet Tonight

Lockney's outstanding citizens will be recognized, new Chamber of Commerce officers and directors will be installed, and a top speaker will address the crowd tonight at the Lockney Chamber of Commerce banquet, scheduled to begin at 7:30 tonight (Thursday) in the elementary school cafeteria.

A.D. "Dean" Rippetoe, often called "the Will Rogers of West Texas," will be featured speaker at the Chamber banquet. Rippetoe's presentations are described as "80 percent humor and 20 percent serious."

Rippetoe joined Shell in Denver City in 1956 and served in various assignments at Shell's Wasson Gas Plant

there. He was transferred to Ozona in 1964 as inspector for the construction of Shell's Northwest Ozona Gas Plant and remained there after construction as plant foreman.

In 1960, he was made LPG sales representative for Shell's Southern Marketing Area operating in the West Texas and New Mexico territory. Rippetoe

was made senior sales representative for commercial accounts in West Texas in 1973. He assumed his present position in August 1974.

Rippetoe has spoken to civic groups in West Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma for the past 16 years, appearing before some 15,000 people each year. He is a speaker for the Oil Information Committee where he has received outstanding service awards for 1974 and 1975, and the outstanding performance award for 1976. He is active in church, school, and civic affairs.

Rippetoe reports that he and his wife Jean have a daughter, Kaye Cowden, who resides in Midland, and a beagle named Chris, who has a PhD in voice. He lists golf as a "hopeful pastime," since he never has time to play. He reads a lot, enjoys being at home with his family, and is an avid Dallas Cowboys fan.

The topic of Rippetoe's speech will be "The Condition of the Country."

Kenneth Wofford and Marjorie Ferguson, recognized as "man and woman of the year" at last year's banquet, will relinquish their trophies to the latest outstanding citizens tonight at the banquet. The man and woman of the year were chosen Monday night by a selection committee headed by Boyce Mosley.

New Chamber officers who will be installed tonight are Lawson Rowell, president; Kenneth Holt, vice president; and Gayle Fortenberry, secretary. New directors Gail Kring, Sam Fortenberry and Mike Perry will be introduced at the banquet.

Warning To Speeders

Warning!!! If you are a driver who is using the 55 mph speed law, you are caught and required to appear in court," stated Major C.W. Bell, Banding Officer of Region 5 of the Department of Public Safety.

Major Bell announced today that an enforcement program is being initiated at the deliberate and determined law violator who seeks to defeat enforcement efforts of the 55 mph law by employing police scanner detectors and CB radios.

Major Bell said, "Our troopers are going to be aggressive and will work in unmarked vehicles as well as marked." He stated that all means available will be used to the use of the radar unit more often.

Major Bell stated several reasons for this special effort. One reason he gave was the 4,000 plus deaths which occurred on Texas streets and highways last year. He said, "The thought of over 20,000 accidents and over 1,000 deaths involving speeding over the limit last year should be cause for every Texas motorist to slow down and observe the speed limit."

He added, "Another reason, in addition to saving the lives of many Texans, is that many disabling injuries can be prevented. Also, achieving a greater compliance will have a beneficial effect on gasoline conservation."

The Federal Surface Transportation Act of 1978 established national levels of compliance that each state must meet or face sanctions. For instance, had we not met 30 percent compliance with the 55 mph speed limit by September of 1979 Texas could have lost 8 million dollars. By September of 1980 40 percent of Texas drivers must be in compliance or we will be subject to similar sanctions.

Major Bell said, "We hope that by providing this special effort we can save precious lives, conserve fuel and comply with the 40 percent mandate."

Residents Receive Questionnaire

According to the U.S. Department of Commerce Bureau of Census, your household, and all others in the area, will receive something in the mail this Friday, a questionnaire from the U.S. Bureau of the Census for the 1980 Census of Population and Housing.

District manager of the census urges that you watch for the large white envelope with blue lettering. The census questionnaire for your household will be delivered by address, not on the basis of name. Below the address will be a telephone number to call if help is needed in answering any questions. With the questionnaire will be a yellow instruction guide that gives examples on how to fill out, and a

pre-addressed, postage-paid envelope for mailing it back.

The 1980 census symbol — a pencil inscribed "April 1" filling in the zero of "Census '80" — appears on the envelope with this message: "This envelope contains your official census form. Please fill it out and mail it back on Tuesday, April 1."

The manager asks that you pay particular attention to his message, because April 1 is Census Day, the day of the official count of the U.S. population. That is why it is essential that every questionnaire list all persons in the household on that day, and does not list anyone who moved away or died a day or so before, but does include

anyone who just moved in, or a baby born on that day. The mother and baby are to be listed even if they are in the hospital.

The manager suggests that filling out the census form be made a family project, with everyone supplying the correct information about themselves. Be sure to mark your answers with a black lead pencil, so if you make a mistake, you can erase it.

The Floyd County Fair Board met Monday March 24 at Lockney High School. Included on the agenda was discussion of the current board project of bettering the fair grounds. This year's improvement will be new curtains in the entertainment building, where the annual queen's pageant is held. Cost for the curtains will be \$1800.

The board also voted on this year's fair theme — "Decade of the 80's — Peace and Progress." The 1980 Floyd County Fair will be September 11, 12 and 13.

In Pickup Crash Near Idalou

Two men were killed early Saturday when the driver of the pickup truck they were in apparently lost control on a curve, sheared a utility pole, and burst into flames in U.S. 62 about two miles east of Idalou.

The driver, Daniel Quiroz, 19, of Petersburg, and a Floydada native, was pronounced dead at the scene of the accident.

Johnny Manuel Quilantan, 22, of Floydada was also pronounced dead at the scene of the accident.

Quilantan was employed at Piggly Wiggly in Floydada and was a member of the Catholic church.

He was married to Carmen Morales November 15, 1977 in Floydada. Members of the Idalou fire and police

departments, the Lubbock County sheriff's office and Emergency Medical Services assisted Trooper Richard Addenbrook of the Department of Public Safety at the accident scene. Addenbrook reported that it took authorities almost an hour to remove the bodies, which were both burned beyond recognition.

The vehicle, which was traveling northeast, overturned after shearing the utility pole, DPS reported.

Addenbrook said authorities are not sure when the pickup truck caught fire when it hit the utility pole or whether electrical wires which fell on the truck started the blaze.

The problem is, where's the rest of the down payment coming from?

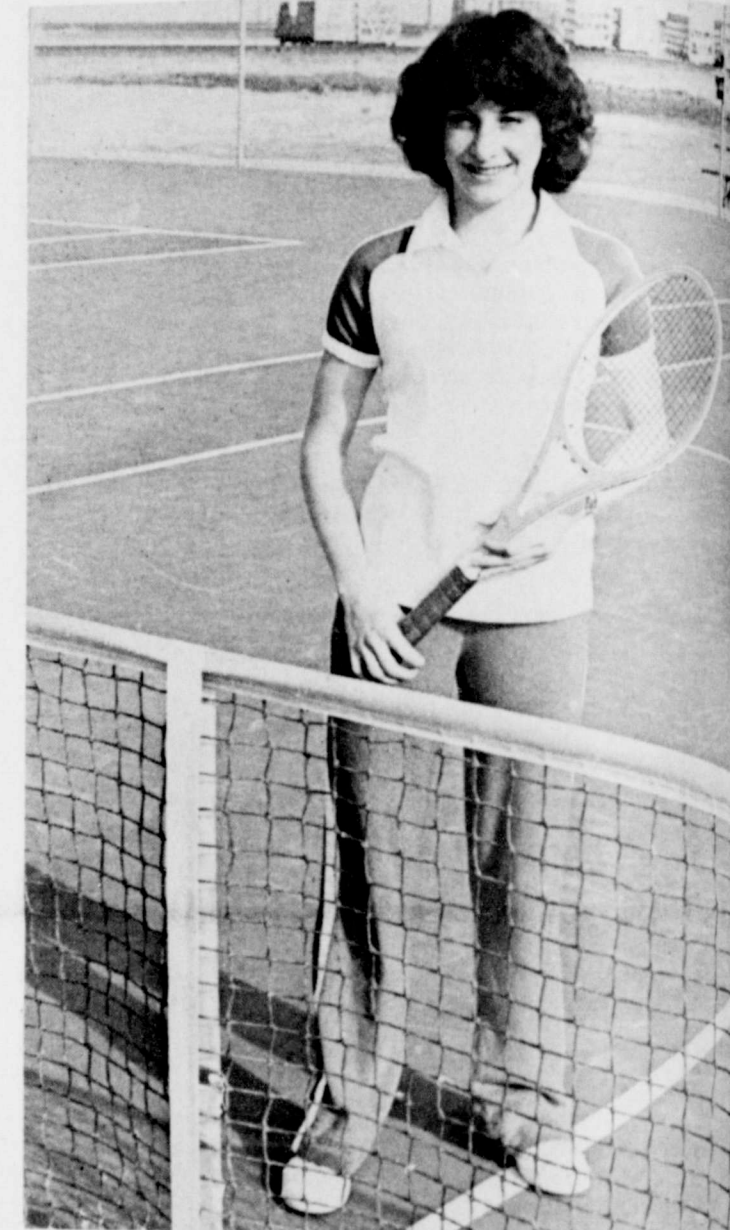

Lockney High School girls' tennis members have competed in three matches and three tournaments so

far this season. The Lockney girls defeated Silvertown 5-2 in a dual March 3. In singles matches, Kay Reay

defeated Sally Northcutt of Silvertown 6-3, 6-3, Melissa Dudley was beaten 5-7, 4-6 by Silvertown's Missy Brown, and Julie Frizzell lost to Northcutt 7-8 in a pro set.

Lockney won all the doubles matches. Frizzell and Sharon Spencer defeated Strange and Whitfield 6-3, 6-4; Barbara Moore and Julie Reecer defeated J. Northcutt and Perkins 6-3, 6-2; Robin Hardy and Amy Shaw beat J. Northcutt and Perkins 8-5; and Moore and Reecer downed Strange and Whitfield 8-2.

March 6 at Petersburg, the Lockney girls won two singles matches but dropped three doubles contests. Reay defeated Jana Heigi 4-6, 6-2, 6-2, and Spencer beat Pamela Smith 8-6.

Frizzell and Spencer lost 3-6, 3-6 to Nave and McLaughlin of Petersburg; Moore and Reecer were defeated 8-1 by the Nave-McLaughlin duo; and Shaw and Hardy were edged 9-8 by Smith and Brown.

At the Brownfield Tournament March 7 and 8, Reay was defeated in the third round by the number-three seed, Lisa Herrington of Valley. Shaw went out in the first round, losing to the number-one seed, Sheila Knight of Dunbar.

Spencer and Frizzell lost in the third round to the number-three-seeded team, Hernandez and Dutton of Lamesa, and number-one-seeded Cabé and Knox of Brownfield took out Moore and Reecer in the first round.

March 14 and 15 at the Plainview Tournament, Reay was defeated in the second round by Madrigal of Hale Center, 2-6, 3-6. Dudley lost in the second round to Northcutt of Silvertown, 0-6, 2-6; and Spencer and Moore advanced to the third round before losing 2-6, 7-6, 4-6 to a Dimmitt pair.

Last week in a tournament at Abernathy, Reay lost to Lynne Jacques 2-6, 3-6; Moore got to the third round before falling 2-6, 4-6 to first-seeded Madrigal of Hale Center; and Spencer and Frizzell won third in doubles by defeating New Deal 2-6, 7-6, 6-3. They defeated Crosbyton and were beaten by the tournament champions, Nave and McLaughlin of Petersburg.

And Tuesday in a dual meet with Valley, Reay lost 1-8 to Valley's Lisa Herrington; Spencer and Frizzell defeated the Valley duo of Turner and Clay 8-4; Turner and Clay downed Moore and Reecer 8-3; and Shaw and Hardy lost 3-8 to Valley's Adams-Chadwick duo.

The LHS girls host Silvertown in a dual meet today, go to the Amarillo Tournament this weekend, and compete in the district tourney April 9.

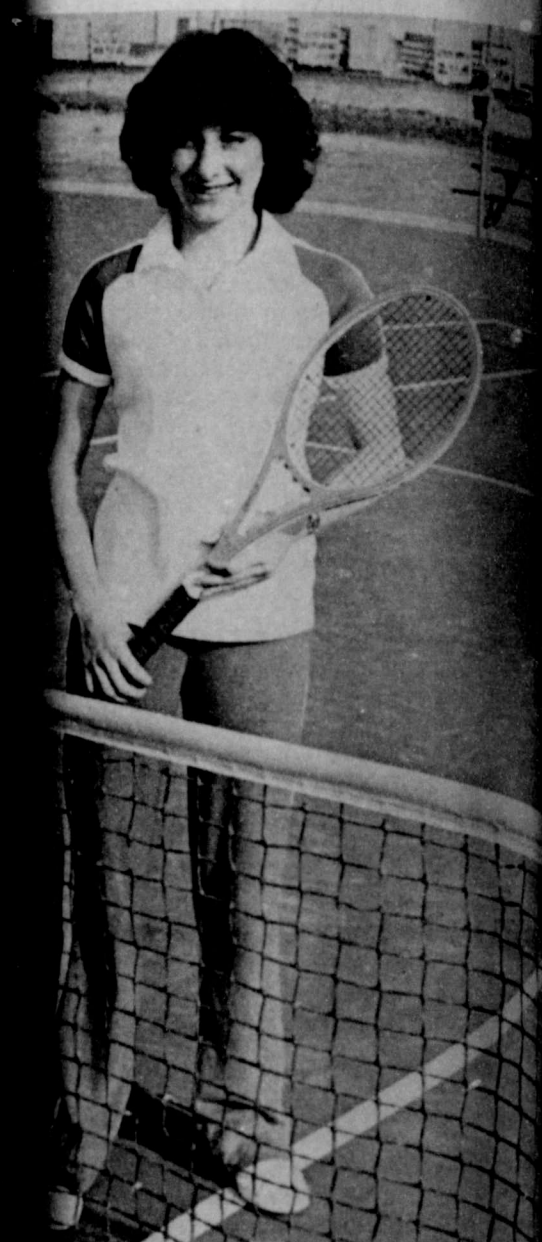

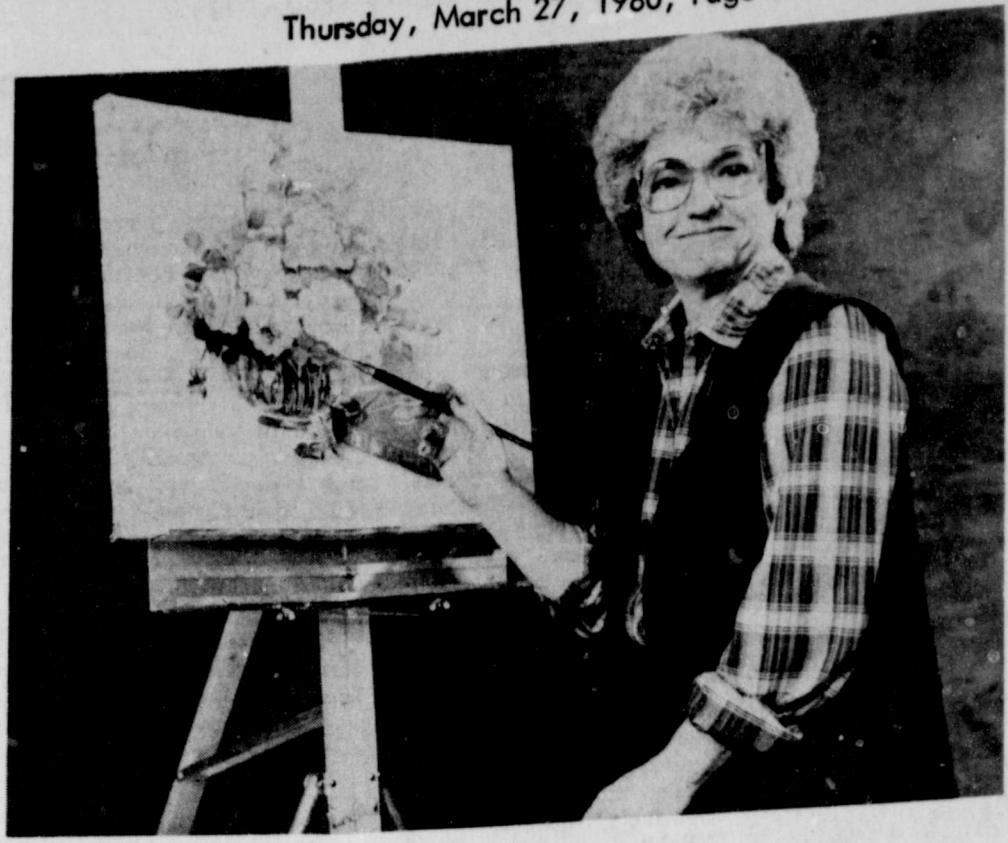

THINK "ENERGY" BEFORE BUYING CLOTHES DRYER

Shopping for a new clothes dryer—wonder if it should be gas or electric? Make energy-conscious decisions when shopping for a new clothes dryer. First, check out installation requirements. Electric models will require a 120/240 volt, 3-wire A-C circuit of 30-AMP capacity. Gas models usually require a three-eighth or one-half inch gas supply line, but you will want to check the manufacturer's instructions and local plumbing code. Gas models need a properly grounded 120-volt A-C, 15-AMP circuit. Before buying a dryer, determine the cost of providing the proper electrical and gas installation if the home is not already equipped to use a clothes dryer. If the home is equipped for either a gas or an electric dryer, then a gas dryer will probably cost less to run. If energy in your area costs the nation's typical rates, then an electric dryer will cost about four times more to operate than a gas model. This cost is based on the U.S. Department of Energy's estimate that 416 wash loads per year is typical. If this is the case, a year's worth of laundry would cost about \$40 to dry in an electric dryer and only about \$11 in a gas dryer. However, the initial cost of gas dryers is generally higher than a comparable electrical model made by the same manufacturer—but the extra cost of buying a gas machine would be made up in about one year in the above example. If energy rates in your area are different from the national average, there's still a way to figure your gas or electricity costs. It's really not so hard to figure, either. First remember that gas is measured by therms—or by cubic feet. If gas is measured by cubic feet in your area, simply divide the cost of 1,000 cubic feet by 10, and that will give you the cost per therm. Electricity on the other hand, is measured by kilowatt hours. So you'll be comparing therms of gas with kilowatt hours. Now here's the rule of thumb for comparing costs: a gas dryer will cost as much to operate as an electric dryer when the cost per therm of gas is about 25 times the cost per kilowatt hour of electricity....if the cost per therm of gas is less than 25 times the cost per kilowatt hour of electricity, then gas will be cheaper....if the cost per therm of gas is more than 25 times the cost per kilowatt hour, then electricity will be cheaper. If all of this still sounds a little complicated, just remember, the more energy-smart we become, the more comfortable we'll feel about making some of these comparisons.

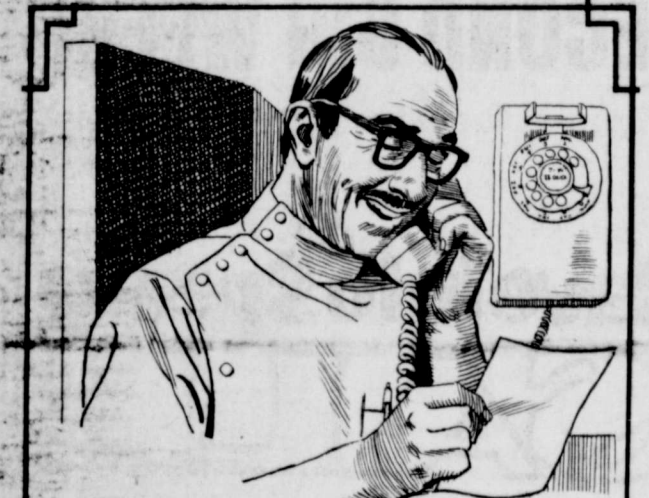

Electric Energy Research And Development

The Electric Power Research Institute (EPRI) has authorized a key project to develop and test a multiple-function meter for measuring electricity used at customers' premises. This electronic meter is a potential replacement for the conventional induction watt-hour meter presently installed in millions of homes and businesses throughout the country.

The so-called smart meter will contain programmable logic that will help utilities to control electricity loads automatically. Among other functions, the meter will measure how much energy is used per hour, how many hours it was used and at what time of day, and the total energy consumption. In fossil fuel research, EPRI authorized nearly \$6 million to design and construct the nation's first facility to test new coal-



cleaning technologies. The facility will allow testing of many different fully integrated coal-cleaning processes with relative ease. It is hoped that data from the facility will help utilities meet air emission requirements for coal-fired power plants, while improving boiler reliability. EPRI, supported by more than 500 of the nation's electric utilities, funds and manages electric energy research and development. The group has budgeted \$234 million for its 1979 quests for progress.

Tax Breaks May Be Available To Employers

A new federal program to give tax breaks to employers is expected to provide additional job opportunity for thousands of Texas Vietnam Era veterans and veterans of all eras who have received rehabilitation training for service-connected disabilities.

The program is sponsored by the Department of Labor and the Internal Revenue Service and is supported by the Veterans Administration through its regional offices, according to Jack Coker, Director of the Waco VA Regional Office.

The program offers employers a "targeted jobs" tax credit for hiring individuals from seven groups the government is seeking to help. Coker explained. The credit can amount to 50 percent of the first \$6,000 in qualified wages paid employees during their first year on the job and 25 percent of the first \$6,000 paid the second year. Eligibles sought by the VA include economically-disadvantaged Vietnam Era veterans under age 35 at the time

of hiring and service-disabled veterans who have completed or are receiving VA rehabilitation training. Tax credit is based generally on wages paid to qualified employees first hired after September 26, 1978, and earned between January 1, 1979, and December 31, 1980.

Applicants who qualify for the tax credit program are given a voucher that explains to prospective employers the individual's eligibility for certification if hired before a certain date. To receive certification, the employer completes the declaration on the voucher and returns it to the local Department of Labor Jobs Service Office.

Individuals who believe they can qualify for the program are urged to contact local state employment offices. Veterans may also receive assistance from VA regional offices in determining eligibility.

Regional office staffs are working with on-the-job training and apprenticeship employers as potential program users.

Operation Lifesaver Has Reduced Accidents At Railroad Crossings

The number of car-train accident deaths in Texas dropped from 96 in 1978 to 69 in 1979.

Operation Lifesaver, a program promoted by the Railroad Section of Texas Safety Association to help reduce accidents at railroad grade crossings, assisted in reducing this fatality figure by nearly 30 percent.

With the aid of television programs, news articles, films, bumper stickers, brochures and workshops, the "message" of Operation Lifesaver—observance of all grade crossing signs—was spread to well over 36,000 Texans last year.

Statistics illustrate the importance and validity of this Operation Lifesaver message.

Although all of the 14,700 grade crossings in Texas are marked by at least one "Lifesaver" sign—the octagonal stop sign, the X-shaped crossbuck, the yellow and black advance warning sign, flashing lights, bells and/or automatic gates—one half of all grade crossing collisions are a result of drivers violating mechanical crossing protection indicators.

"The greatest killer at crossings is a habit pattern slowly developed over a period of time by drivers who fail to slow down and look for trains," Jim McGee, supervisor of Accident Records for

the Texas Department of Public Safety, said. "In fact, nearly all car-train accidents occur within a 25-mile radius of the driver's home."

Because a motorist crosses the same railroad track several times a day without ever seeing a train, he or she is conditioned to a secure feeling that train will not be there the next time, and his or her vigilance is relaxed, McGee explained.

"The best safeguard for motorists is to slow down when approaching a railroad warning sign," he added.

Other forms of prevention suggested by the DPS and Operation Lifesaver are awareness of these common causes of crossing accidents:

- Motorist races train to crossing.
- Motorist overrides his or her headlights.
- Motorist stops or stalls on tracks.
- Motorist fails to look both ways after train clears track.

Texas Safety Association urges all motorists to consider these instances when nearing grade crossings and to obey all black and gold warning signs.

"There will be a need for the Operation Lifesaver program until every Texas motorist approaches crossings with a healthy respect, obeys the rules, and deaths and injuries drop to zero," Tom Murphy, Operation Lifesaver chairman, said.

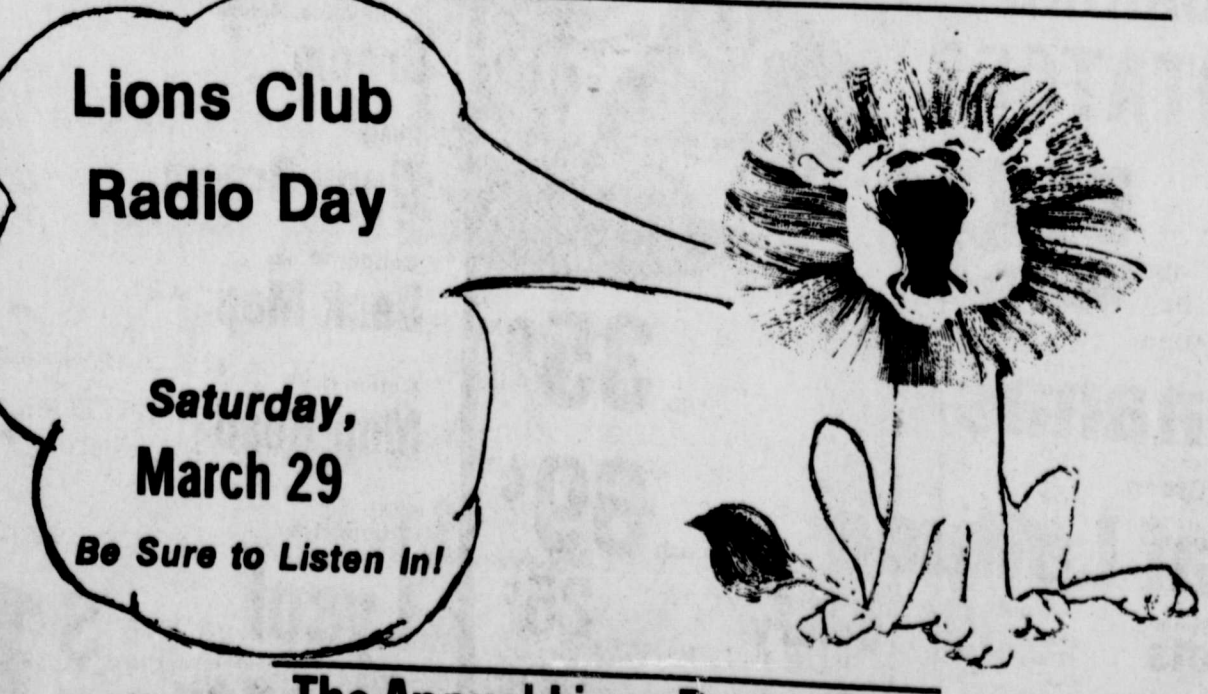

Taxpayers May Designate To Presidential Campaign

Taxpayers who wish to participate in the 1980 Presidential Election Campaign Fund can do so again this year by designating a dollar of their taxes on their Federal income tax return, according to the Internal Revenue Service.

The Presidential Election Campaign Fund was set up under 1971 legislation. By permitting taxpayers to designate \$1 of their tax each year to the Fund, a larger portion of the American public can play a part in financing candidates running for the nation's highest office.

The IRS that designating to the fund will not decrease any refund a taxpayer may be coming.

On joint returns, each spouse may designate \$1 to the fund. If the spouses differ, one can designate the "No" box on the return and the other taxpayer who wishes to participate should check the "Yes" box on the return.

For additional information on the 1980 Presidential Election Campaign on tax deductions for political contributions, taxpayers should write to IRS Publications, "Voluntary Taxpayers' Help Finance Public Campaigns." Free available at many offices or by mailing a blank form in the envelope.
