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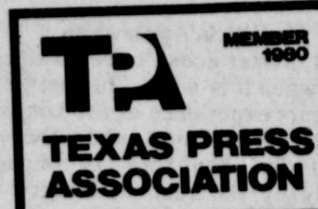

## Council Hears Gin Views On Rate Increase

Lockney City Council met Thursday at 9 a.m. in the City Hall. Don Marble and Lester representing the gins of Lockney presented to the Council to present about the rate increase being made by Southwest Public Service.

Kenneth Tate of Southwest Public Service defended the request for the rate increase. The Council agreed to write a letter to the Texas Public Utility Commission asking that they review the gin rate and forward a copy of the letter to Southwest Public Service.

New City Council members, J.D. Copeland and Paul Reece were administered the oath of office. Roy Holly, who was out of town had been sworn in earlier.

Mayor Claude Brown announced the following committee chairmen: Roy Holly, Police Dept., Thurman Davis, Fire Dept.; J.D. Copeland Street and Alley, Paul Reece, City Farm and Bobby McCormick, Water Works.

J.D. Copeland was elected to serve as Mayor Pro-tem.

Engineer A.C. Bowden, engineer for the city, met with the council to discuss the seal coating of the streets for 1980.

His estimate for this work was approximately \$17,250. The Council voted to accept bids at their next meeting and to

advertise for bids. Owen Thornton was reappointed to the McKenzie Municipal Water Authority Board of Directors to serve a two year term.

Plans were made to set the annual Clean-Up Campaign for the first of second week in May.

In attendance at the meeting were Mayor Brown, Aldermen Frizzell, Reece, Davis, Copeland, and city secretary Erma Lee Duckworth.

### Budget Approved

The next order of business was the final approval of the City budget for 1980-81 in the amount of \$293,465.

The April 5th, election was canvassed and declared legal and valid.

Normally minor diseases of childhood can become deadly illnesses. In spite of intensive care, Lisa was unable to overcome the effects of this common disease, and she could not be saved.

In sorrow, we ask that rather than riding for Lisa, you work in memory of Lisa so that someday, no child will be lost as she was.

## The Operator Is A Computer Now

A computer's voice is now greeting Long Distance callers at coin telephones

The computer's voice, which is not a recording but a voice produced by a computer, is part of the new Automatic Coin Toll Service (ACTS) being introduced by Southwestern Bell.

The female-voiced computer is programmed to tell coin telephone customers the amount of money needed to

complete 1-plus Long Distance calls, said Southwestern Bell spokesman Jim West, Manager.

"The computer also tells customers when the initial calling period is over and how much money to deposit for longer calls," West said.

"The computer is programmed to calculate the cost of a call and verbalize that calculation to the customer. And, like operators, the computer is polite, saying 'please' and 'thank you,'" West said.

Floydada was the site Monday and Tuesday of training for fourteen census enumerators who will begin working this week in Floyd and Crosby counties.

Households which returned census forms that had been received in the mail will not be visited by the enumerators.

Households which did not receive a census questionnaire and households which did not return a questionnaire will be visited by an enumerator.

Receiving training at the Floyd County extension office meeting room were the following Floyd County residents: Carolyn Burton, Sally Green, Diana Prock and Phyllis Reeves, all of

Floydada; Bettye Jackson, Sally Reyes, Owen and Kathleen Thornton, all of Lockney. Grace Zabielski of Roaring Springs will be working one area of Floyd County.

Crosby County residents who were trained as enumerators include Lorene Blagg of Crosbyton, Bonnie Gallegos and Diana Vasquez of Lorenzo, Minnie Torres and Sylvia Vasquez of Ralls.

Training was directed by Gayle Jackson of Lockney, enumerator crew leader for Floyd and Crosby counties. She stressed that enumerators have been sworn not to reveal census information to anyone but their super-

visors. "The enumerators have been trained to be courteous and to complete the questionnaires in the least possible time. We would appreciate the cooperation of the public in completing the census quickly."

Provision for taking of the census was made in the constitution of the United States. Apportionment of seats in the U.S. House of Representatives is made using the population totals made by the Census Bureau. Texas is expected to pick up two more representatives this time. It is especially important that rural Texans be counted so as to retain representatives in the less-populated counties.

## Youth Keep Cooper Young

Violet Cooper doesn't need a clock to tell her when it is noon. She just knows by 17 years experience at the Longhorn Inn to be on the alert when the west door of the Longhorn is impacted suddenly by the rush of hungry students, each trying to be first.

She has been feeding the Longhorns since 1963 when she bought the Inn directly across the street east of Lockney High School. Each school day, she feeds between 150 and 200 students of all ages as well as a sprinkle of teachers.

Violet, Nellie Webb, Mildred Reagan and Jean Sparkman line up behind the long counter near the kitchen to take care of the onslaught of orders. They have three high school and three junior high school people lined up with them to hurry things along. Lunch time is short at the Lockney schools and everybody comes at one time. It takes organization to cut down on noise and confusion.

"Noise does not bother me. It is when they rush and shove and fight each other that I have to step in. Other than that, I tune them out and don't hear. It is a matter of adapting myself to the situation and keeping my mind on the business. We do not let them do anything in the store that is not done in school. We do not let them skip out of school and hide here. We work as closely with the school as we can," says Mrs. Cooper.

One time, she asked a little boy to leave with the understanding he could come back when he learned not to swear.

Once when a "bunch of them" were saying over and over, "I want a hamburger," "I want a hamburger," a boy changed the rhythm by saying, "Hey, fat lady, I want a hamburger." Violet stopped what she was doing and asked, "Which fat lady are you addressing? We are all over weight." The boy was embarrassed, so the next day, he changed his tactics by saying, "Hey, beautiful, I want a hamburger."

Each day she uses a dozen packages of hamburger buns and two or three packages of hot dog buns. She orders 450 hamburger patties and 30 pounds of bulk hamburger at one time. The bulk is used for chili, made fresh every day. Sometimes 10 pounds is made into hamburger sandwiches.

One of the best helpers that Violet has ever had was Elsie Pate, who helped her for years. The "kids loved her and wouldn't let her retire." Mrs. Pate could remember how each child wanted his hamburger. Violet says of her, "I can not praise her enough. She remembered the likes and dislikes of people in a way that I can not do."

Mrs. Cooper, Lockney's Outstanding Woman of 1977, had an introduction to food for the public at an early age when she grew up at Edgin or Grey Mule just below the Cap near Quitaque. Her parents, Otis and Bessie Purcell moved to Edgin and built a little store. They lived in the back of it with their two daughters Violet and Bettye. Her father also worked at a cotton gin for a salary of \$125 which he used to pay for the first grocery stock.

This background was good schooling for Violet's dealing with the public. She understands people and their forgetfulness. She is in a good position in the Longhorn to deal with the forgetfulness of school people. She usually has a collection of forgotten items that have been left behind when feeding is over. Books are the main objects that are left with her; but band instruments, coats and sweaters are also left.

One incident she well remembers. One day not long ago when everyone had gone back to classes and the tables were cleared at the inn, a little girl in the eighth grade came running in breathlessly to report that she had taken her dental braces out while she ate and had folded them in a napkin and left them on the table while she ate. Of course there was nothing left on the tables. The only thing to do was to go to the incinerator to look for the braces.

One barrel of trash was burning. Violet and the child began searching piece by piece in the other barrel. Down to the very last of the trash, they carefully examined each napkin then found the missing braces still folded in a napkin.

The Longhorn does not run a charge account by choice, but "we have quite a credit business for a little hamburger joint." She says that people lose money or get it stolen, so she gives such unfortunate people credit, but she has to have parent's permission.

About half of all who get food at the Longhorn, eat on the run. However

there is room for 60 to 75 to sit to eat. Recently room for more seating space was made by removing partitions in a tacked-on room on the east side. All the booths are maroon and white-school colors. White waste baskets are located conveniently near.

When they first opened the store, the plan was to sell hamburgers and hot dogs, candies, drinks and school supplies. Now burritos, nachos, tacos, taco rolls and barbecue sandwiches have been added. Nachos are gaining in popularity. They have "cut in" on hamburger. At least 50 nachos a day are sold.

"I like it here because I am my own boss. To start with, I liked it because it was a job where I could be with my children," she says. Of the four children, three are adopted. She said her husband had approved her buying the Longhorn at the time she bought because he hoped it might prevent her adopting more children. Now the children have all finished the 12 years schooling at Lockney and gone away to college. Tim, the youngest, is in his freshman year at Tech where he is majoring in agriculture. Glenda is teaching in the Lockney school system. Besides the four, a foster son lives with the Coopers one year. He was a junior in high school from Buckners in Lubbock. He still comes home to the Coopers to visit.

Violet's vacation from cooking for school children is spent in "running the swimming pool as manager from June to August, seven days a week."

At one time, she owned Mrs. Allen's little store in east Lockney just for three weeks. Mrs. Allen decided she wanted the store back, Violet received \$400 profit in the trade back. She took her children to Disney Land on the money. It wasn't long before the school in the east side of Lockney moved, which closed the Allen store.

Sometimes, the last thing that takes place at the Longhorn Inn each day is the appearance of a delivery truck bringing boxes of Mr. Goodbar, Sixlets, Snickers, bubble gum, Rolo, Square Shooters, blow pop candies and various other candies along with school supplies.

After 17 years experience managing the Lockney Longhorn Inn, Violet Cooper has changed her reason for having a job so she "could be with her children." Now, she likes her job because she loves young people.

Dear Editor and Citizens of Floyd County,

As we survey the energy situation and the economy, we tend to wonder just what the rural towns and communities have before them. We could grow discouraged, or we can look forward with anticipation to the future. This is one of the very greatest things that God has done for us, in that, we cannot foresee the future with any great degree of success.

However, I will assess the picture of the price of gasoline, the economy, and then we will look at what this could mean for Floydada and Lockney. Since the price of fuel has gone up, we will plan our trips more carefully, everything we need done in one trip, instead of going to Lubbock several times a week as we have in the past. We will find, that since it takes \$10.00 worth of gasoline to go to Lubbock and back, that frequently, we can buy what we want at home and save money. Although the Federal Government will not allow us to deduct it, they recognize that it costs 32 cents per mile to operate the average car today. Couple that 32 cents per mile to a minimum of 120 miles when we go to Lubbock and back, we see that expense is not just \$10.00 for our gasoline, but a total of \$38.40. This makes the expense of going to Lubbock to save a few bucks prohibitive in cost. Then if we recognize the cost of going to Lubbock, we can appreciate the merchants of our towns that provide us with needed goods and services. We can take that same \$38.40 that we would have spent going to Lubbock and apply it to or expenses, enjoy a meal or two out a week, and still be able to come out ahead.

Floydada and Lockney merchants should begin to gear up and plan to be able to handle this new increase in local business, and put on part time people to be training so that when the time comes, they will have a trained staff to take care of the customers. The workers in a place of business are an extension of the owner or manager's ability and capacity to do work. Just as a piece of farm machinery enables a farmer to farm more land, employees in a store enable the merchant to wait on more customers and move more merchandise. The 40 hour week was designed to give more people more jobs so that all would have more money to spend and less would be on welfare. The Holy Scripture tells us of this in Proverbs where Solomon stated "Where there are no oxen the crib is bare." Where there are no workers, there is no work produced, no income, and no need for anything to be in the crib. There is a need in these small towns to develop the working force. We have the greatest talent in the world, but much of it is latent. It is going to waste for a place to use it.

I hear merchants say, "I can't find anyone that wants to work." The problem may not be with people not

wanting to work, but that there is some condition that needs to be reminded so that working conditions could be more satisfying and appetizing to the needed employees.

The future is great for the cities of Floydada and Lockney at this time, for it is no more economically feasible to go to Lubbock for a \$5.00 part or a \$30.00 bill of groceries or just to go to Lubbock to eat.

The attitude of the merchants and residents of these communities will do more to determine how great the economy is in the '80s than any other factor. The question is, "How bad do we really want business?" Do we want it bad enough to plan, advertise, and go after it?

It can be done, you know it can.

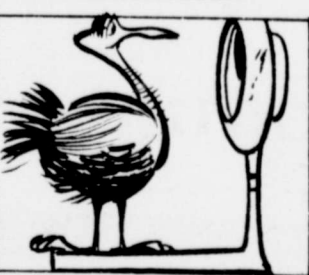

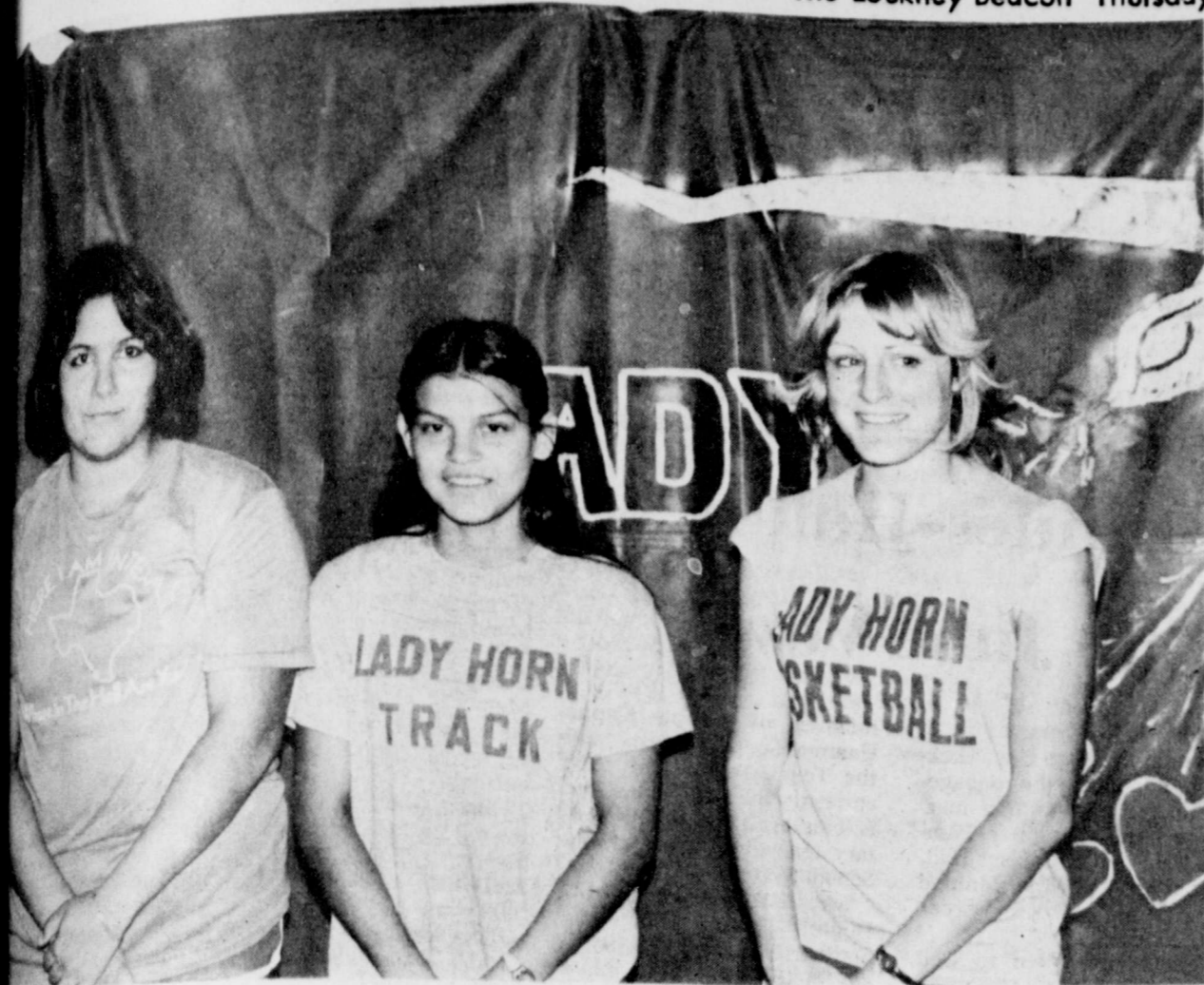

You can't be admitted to West Point, Annapolis, or the air force academy; but you can enlist in the military service...and be assigned to a labor battalion.

### LOFTY WAYS WITH EGGS

The egg is the cement that holds the castle of cookery together. The leavening ability of stiffly beaten egg whites imparts an airy lightness and tender goodness to many popular items—omelets, souffles, meringues, popovers, muffins, angel food, sponge and chiffon cakes.

As the whites are beaten they literally fill up with tiny air bubbles. When gentle heat is applied to the mixture, the air bubbles increase in size, the product rises, and the albumen of the whites becomes firm causing the product to hold its lofty shape.

Separate eggs as soon as you remove them from the refrigerator since cold yolks are less likely to break. To store the yolks cover with a small amount of water and return to the refrigerator.

Let the whites stand at room temperature about 45 minutes before whipping. Egg whites whip to a larger volume when at room temperature.

The leavening power of egg whites depends on the amount of air beaten and retained when preparing the food. For best results, beat the egg whites until they are just stiff enough to stand in peaks that fold over ever so slightly when the beaters are removed. They should appear moist and glassy, not dry. Over-beating beats out some of the air bubbles and creates a product with less volume, which may also divide into layers with the

also be overdone on the outside before the interior is set.

Regardless of size, eggs are usually a good buy. A dozen large eggs weigh 24 ounces or 1½ pounds. One serving (two eggs) weighs ¼ pound and costs only 13 cents when eggs are 78 cents a dozen. At this price one pound of eggs costs 52 cents. This is very reasonable when compared with meat, cheese and other high-quality protein foods.

## GI Loan Eligibility

Due to the recent increases in home mortgage interest, many veterans are now expressing sudden concern about their entitlement to GI home loans. According to D.G. Ayres, Service Officer for Floyd County, a veteran's GI loan eligibility remains good until it is used. There is presently no deadline date for veterans to use their home loan entitlement.

Eligible to participate in the GI home loan program are veterans with honorable military or naval service during World War II, the Korean Conflict or the Cold War and Vietnam Era. For GI loan purposes, World War II extended from September 16, 1940 to July 25, 1947; the Korean Conflict began June 27, 1950 and ended January 31, 1955; the Cold War period commenced February 1, 1955 and ended August 4, 1964; the Vietnam Era dates from August 5, 1964 to May 7, 1975. Also eligible are persons service 181 days or more (honorably) during the Post-Vietnam Era, which began May 8, 1975, and continuing until such time as the Congress changes the laws.

Also eligible to participate in the GI Home loan program are the widows of persons who died on active duty and of veterans whose deaths are shown to be caused by service-connected conditions.

## Taxpayer Can Extend Their Filing Deadlines

Taxpayers who need more time to complete their Federal income tax returns may request an automatic 2-month extension of time to file by filing a Form 4868 with the Internal Revenue Service.

Taxpayers who receive the extension must use the Form 1040 and must compute their own tax. The IRS said that the extension applies only to the time for filing the return and not to payment of the tax. Any tax due must be paid at the time the Form 4868 is filed.

Later, when the actual return is filed, the amount of tax previously paid with the Form 4868 should be entered on the appropriate line of Form 1040.

If the amount of tax paid with the Form 4868 does not cover the taxpayer's total liability, the taxpayer is required to pay interest on the remaining tax due. In addition, if the unpaid tax is over 10 percent of the total tax bill, the law provides for levy of additional penalties on the taxpayer, the IRS said.

U.S. Citizens outside the U.S. or Puerto Rico on the date of their tax deadlines can receive an automatic 2-month extension of the filing deadline without filing Form 4868, the IRS said.

This provision applies both to taxpayers whose deadline is April 15 and to those who file returns on a fiscal year basis. Taxpayers who qualify for this type of extension must attach a statement to their tax return when they file stating they were outside the U.S. or Puerto Rico on the date of their filing deadline.

Taxpayers who expect to qualify for exemption of (or deductions from) income earned abroad for special tax treatment can get an extension of time to file. These

taxpayers should use Form 2350, Application for Extension of Time to File U.S. Income Tax Return.

Additional extensions are granted only under unusual circumstances, according to the IRS. Taxpayers can apply for such extensions by letter or by filling out Form 2688, Application for Extension of Time to File U.S. Individual Income Tax Return. The statement must include the reasons why the additional extension is necessary.

The IRS cautioned taxpayers to file requests for additional extensions early enough to be able to file their return on time if the request is rejected.


