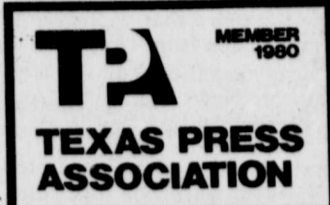

Commissioners Stall On Library

The Floyd County Commissioners in regular session last week met with Mrs. Janice Lloyd and several community leaders about the O.A. & P. Depot as a proposed library for Floyd County. Judge Smith presented to the court and group a letter which he received March 18, 1980 from Donald E. Ransom, Assistant General Counsel of the St. Louis-San Francisco Railway Co., stating that they would donate the O.A. & P. Depot at Floydada to Floyd County. Mrs. Lloyd, representing "Friends of the Library", stated that it would be possible to get a government grant of matching funds to renovate the depot to be used as a county library. The approximate cost of the project would be \$60,000. The "Friends of the Library", she stated, would be able to raise the \$30,000 necessary for the matching of funds.

She asked the commissioners to approve a budget enlargement for the county library to maintain the building. This would include the heating and cooling for the building, janitorial service and insurance.

Commissioner Jack Lackey brought up the question of land deed; how many years would be included in the lease agreement and at what price. Judge Smith said he thought the lease would be for a number of years and that the price would be nominal.

Mrs. Lloyd said that the Friends of the Library would not be able to get the government grant themselves because it has to be submitted by the Floyd County Historical Commission. She stated that many people are denied access to the county library in the court house because of the stairs and that a small child had fallen down the stairs recently. She also stated that the present site of the library allows no room to expand the library facilities. She said that all her group was asking for was the maintenance funds.

Commissioner Jack Lackey stated flatly that the County does not have the extra funds for the maintenance of the building. The county has loaded themselves down with the remodeling of the jail house, and didn't have any choice in the matter of redoing the jail. Lackey also said that this is one of the few counties that can pay their bills.

Jim Word, representing the Floyd County Historical Commission brought up the fact that the library has to continue to grow and that if it doesn't it will stagnate. The longer library expansion is put off the more it will cost, he said.

Commissioner Aaron Carthel voiced doubts about the run-down condition of

the area around the depot. Mrs. Lloyd said that proper landscaping around the depot would be part of the renovation and that a fence would be built.

Word suggested that if the depot were renovated it might attract other new buildings or remodelings in that area.

Mike Hale, architect, stated that it would be hard to duplicate the structural quality in the depot.

Judge Smith suggested that the matter be put before the public. Let the taxpayers decide about the location and maintenance costs. He asked Mrs. Lloyd to meet with the members of her group. Then if they want, they could come to his office and write up the proposals to put on the ballot.

Commissioner Bob Jarrett also said that in his opinion it should be put on a ballot to see if the majority of the people of Floyd County want to get behind it. No further action was taken.

In other business the court, in a motion by Aaron Carthel and seconded by Bob Jarrett, voted to allow Mrs. Gienna Miller to purchase 3 3/10 acres of land out of the northwest quarter, survey 28 block G, at a cost of \$250, the purchase price of the land to Floyd County in 1921. It was stipulated that Mrs. Miller is to pay all the legal costs to close the transaction. The vote was unanimous.

The commissioners unanimously agreed to hire Ricky West as County Trapper for Floyd County upon the recommendation of James Winnat, the District Supervisor of the Texas Animal Damage Program.

The court members supported a motion by Grigsby Milton that \$40,000 be transferred from the Road and Bridge fund to the Precinct. Each Precinct is to receive \$10,000.

A motion by Aaron Carthel that \$10,000 be transferred out of the general fund to the officers salary fund and \$10,000 from the general fund transferred to the permanent improvement fund.

Fred Cardinal, Sheriff of Floyd County, met with the Court to present bids from the local appliance dealers of Floyd County for a new stove, ice box and freezer for the Floyd County jail house. A decision was not reached concerning these bids.

Board Approves

Tuition Fee

The Lockney School Board met in regular session on April 14, at 7:30. The Board first acted an old business; approving payment of bills, investment of \$37,000 and approval of the tax report.

The Board then canvassed the election results and organized the new Board: Tom Duvall, President; Kenneth Broseh, Vice-President; Eugene Tannahill, Secretary; Eddie Joe Foster, Assistant Secretary.

Marsha Sharp, high school coach, requested, in behalf of the GAB that the gym be open Tuesday and Thursday night throughout the summer. The Board granted approval.

Coach Sharp also requested use of the gym for a Basketball Camp this summer. Request was granted.

Dewayne Sexton presented the total athletic budget for 1980 - 81. Board members were to take the budget and study it.

The Board approved a \$30.00 per month tuition fee for transfer students during the 1980 - 81 school year. At present there is no tuition fee. There are fourteen transfer students in Lockney schools at this time.

Resignation of David Fletcher, a special education teacher at high school, was accepted. Carolina Castro was hired as bi-lingual teacher.

The Board approved the sale of 1964 International school bus.

Principals, R.L. Knox, James Poole and Jim Warren gave an enrollment report for this year and a projected report for next year.

Board members present were: Tom Duvall, Kenneth Broseh, Jerry Williams, Eugene Tannahill, Kelson Shaw, Eddie Teeter, Eddie Joe Foster, Carl Racc and Superintendent, W.H. Hallmark.

Lab Week Observed

The purpose of National Laboratories Week, is to help make the public aware of the different aspects of the Clinical Laboratory.

There are several mistakes views seen by the patients who have contact with the laboratory. The Laboratory is not a part of the nursing service, it is a separate entity and separate personnel.

The lab technician does more than just draw blood or swab a throat for culture. She or he must know how to perform most tests with reasonable speed to help the doctor make a diagnosis. Many diseases have the same symptoms only a lab test can differentiate the diseases so the doctor can treat the correct ailment, such as strep throat. This has clinical symptoms similar to many other throat ailments. Only a lab test can distinguish between the separate diseases, allowing the doctor to prescribe the medicine or treatment for that specific disease, instead of a general prescription that may not be as effective.

Tom Lovell said that "at Lockney we try to perform most of the tests ordered in the lab. However, some types of studies are impractical for us to perform. These we send to Dallas to a lab that has more equipment and personnel. There are specialists in that area. It usually takes three to five days for a result to return. Most of the tests performed in the hospital are done the same day as the patient comes in."

There are three employees working in the lab here, at Lockney General Hospital. Estafana Gatica, who has been working for 17 years in the lab. Josefina Hernandez, who has been in the lab field for 8 years and Tom Lovell, lab and x-ray supervisor, who has also been in the lab field 8 years. He is also a graduate of Texas Tech University with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Zoology and a registered Medical Technologist for 3 years.

People Key To Allsups Success

People - the more than 1,300 employees and customers from Grants to west of Fort Worth - get the credit for helping write one of New Mexico's biggest retailing success stories.

The first chapter began in October 1956 in Roswell with the opening of Lonnie's Drive-In Grocery at 1500 W. Second St.

Now, Lonnie and Barbara Allsup have put together the 24th largest chain of convenience stores in the nation, with 168 Allsup's Convenience Stores helping form a \$50 million business.

Before the final chapter is written Allsup's Convenience Stores Inc. will have some 400 stores selling items ranging from garden hoses to barbecued chicken throughout New Mexico, West Texas and parts of Oklahoma. In conversation, Mr. and Mrs. Allsup speak repeatedly of motivated employees, long-term workers, loyal customers and consumer convenience.

"Anybody can have buildings, fixtures and merchandise, but if they don't have good people to run those stores - all the way up and all the way down - you won't be successful," explained Allsup, president of the corporation which he and his wife started building alone.

"I'd look pretty funny trying to run 168 stores," he added with a chuckle.

"Anyone who gets negative on people won't grow with the business. You really have to be optimistic and you have to think that people are good," Allsup said. "If we decided that people are no good, we'd have to get out of the business."

As chief executive officer of a major chain, Lonnie Allsup looks back nostalgically to the time not so long ago when he was waiting on customers.

"One of the parts I enjoy most about the grocery or convenience store business is meeting the customers, taking care of the customers. I really enjoy that," he said. "I really enjoy that. Now I don't get enough contact with the customers; it's all employee contact now."

"I always enjoyed the customers and the customer was No. 1. That's your business, that's all you've got is the customer," Allsup added.

Barbara Allsup, financial vice president of Allsup's echoed the same thoughts.

She fondly recalls their Roswell customers when they were starting out. "They were really receptive about what we were trying to do. A lot of people were very helpful," Mrs. Allsup added.

In addition to what she describes as "Lonnie's vision," she attributes the chain's success to Allsup employees through the years.

In fact, they opened their second store - also in Roswell - with money borrowed from an employee.

"We've been lucky to get good people and to keep them," Barbara Allsup said, pointing out that some of the current employees of Allsup's Convenience Stores Inc., started with the first stores in Roswell.

"They're very loyal, it's almost like a family relationship," she added.

The Allsups began putting their present chain of 168 stores together shortly after selling their 12 initial stores to Southland Corp. in 1963.

At that time, the couple owned eight stores in Roswell, two in Ruidoso and two in Alamogordo.

These dozen convenience stores had been built up since 1956 when Lonnie Allsup opened Lonnie's Drive-In Grocery after his discharge from the Air Force.

Allsup's infatuation with grocery retailing, however, began many years before that.

"I started out standing on a box, sacking groceries when I was 10 or 11," he recalled.

"It's a fast business," he added, explaining how he "liked the fast part of the grocery store business."

Working in the grocery business, he said, was much faster than working for his father's Chevrolet dealership in his hometown of Morton, Texas.

That was more a work real hard and trade cars, maybe make a sale of one a day or two," he added.

Allsup also recalls working in the maintenance area of his father's automobile dealership, around the oil and grease.

To this day, he insists that all stores in the Allsup's chain be virtually spotless.

At the age of 16, Allsup graduated from Morton High School; married Barbara, his school sweetheart, who also was 16 years of age; and moved to Abilene, Texas, so he could attend Hardin Simmons University.

While Lonnie was studying business and medicine at the university, Barbara was finishing high school in Abilene.

She said that when they left Morton she "only lacked one credit for graduation."

But the new school raised requirements and eliminated some credits.

"I ended up going to school all day long," she said. "I was taking more hours than he was. Unbelievable!"

Barbara recalls, with a laugh, that "we never saw each other. It was just a mass of books. It was a hectic year, but we made it."

While in Abilene, Lonnie Allsup's interest in grocery retailing surfaced.

"There was a little grocery store nearby and he'd go down and buy a loaf of bread and he'd come back and say,

"I'd really like to buy that grocery store," Barbara recalled. But he didn't.

Instead, the couple moved to Lubbock, Texas, where Lonnie enrolled in Texas Tech. Then the Korean war started and he enlisted in the Air Force.

When discharged in Las Cruces in 1956 at the age of 23, Allsup held the rank of staff sergeant.

Barbara Allsup recalled that her husband looked into purchasing land in Las Cruces for a store, but "it was extremely expensive, like it was \$200 a front foot even back then.

"We couldn't afford to buy it new and start building a store, so he found, a store for sale in Roswell," she said.

"His father cosigned the note or we wouldn't have been able to borrow the \$6,500," Barbara said.

Lonnie Allsup, thinking back to that time, recalled that "my ambition was five stores. If I just had five, I think I could run five."

Today, with a goal of adding 25 stores to the chain this year, Lonnie regards building up to 12 stores in eight years as "pretty slow."

But, he adds, "it was pretty fast for me" at the time.

"After selling the 12 stores to Southland Corp., which operates 7-Eleven Stores, Allsup "took the week off and went fishing," his wife recalled.

"I was still buried in paperwork, trying to close out with Southland, and he called me out with Southland, and he called me from Clovis and told me he'd bought three stores," Barbara said. "I could have killed him I never had had a day off."

Rebuilding the chain went rapidly. "Then he bought one in Portales and then we built the one here," she said, motioning toward an Allsup's Convenience Store near the company's Clovis headquarters. "We started construction right away."

"That gave us seven pretty quickly, within three months of when we sold," Barbara said.

In the convenience store field, Allsup is an innovator, willing to try new ideas in retailing.

And he usually is followed by the larger, national chains.

It was Allsup who started selling cooked foods through convenience stores and he was one of the first operators to sell gasoline - a concept he and other convenience store owners initially had pooh-poohed.

"The first time that a fellow came in here and asked me why didn't I put a set of pumps out in front of my store, I said,

"That won't work, you can't sell gasoline with groceries."

"And now I won't build a store without it," he volunteered.

It's easy to understand why, too. Allsup's Convenience Stores Inc., sells more than two million gallons of gasoline a month, he estimated.

Long hours and hard work are a reality to Lonnie and Barbara Allsup. Lonnie's ultimate goal is to "cover every town in New Mexico and every town between Clovis and Fort Worth, Texas." His short-term goal is 25 new store locations within the next 12 months.

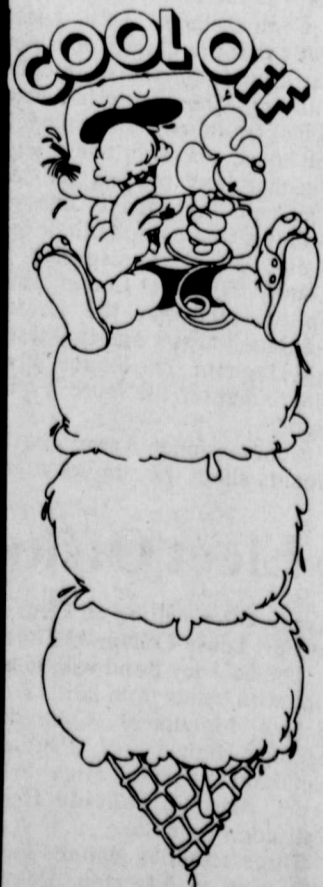

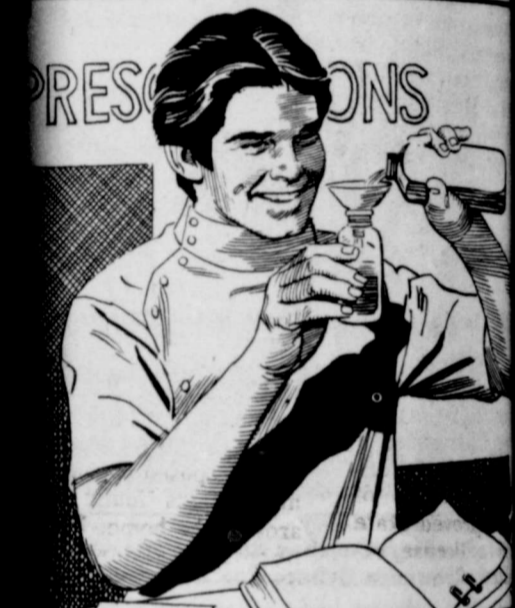

Removing Traffic Lane, Gum From Carpet

Our carpet has a noticeable traffic lane starting in the entrance hall, also a gob of chewing gum in this otherwise clean carpet. Can you help with an answer to this spring clean-up mess?

Sounds like the old winter boots and over-shoes trail. A spray or granular carpet cleaning product is recommended for the traffic lane. The granular type of cleaner for small areas is preferred.

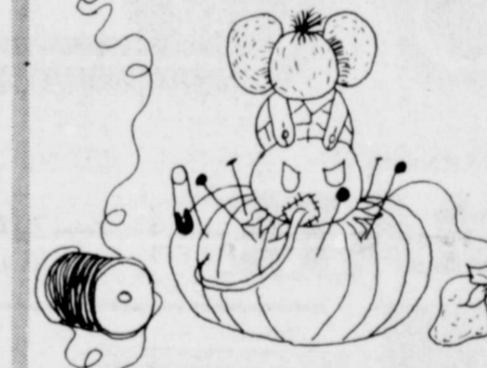
The chewing gum can be removed by placing ice cubes in a plastic bag and laying them on the gum. After thirty minutes, remove the bag and crush the gum with a pair of pliers. If the gum is cold enough, it will shatter into small pieces. Repeat this process until most of the gum is removed. Soak a cloth with dry cleaning solvent and squeeze the soiled tufts of pile between the cloth, pulling up gently. Repeat until the stain is removed.

Every few years we paint the trim on the outside of our brick home. The front porch is paneled with wood. Before the paint has a chance to dry, gnats and other small insects stick to the surface. Is there anything we can do to repel the insects?

Wet paint has the tendency to attract all the insects in the neighborhood. It is very disturbing when you spend a lot of time in the application of the paint. Add two tablespoons of citronella oil to a gallon of paint and stir well. The scent of the citronella oil will repel most of the insects.

Accident Takes Life

Odell Thompson, 53, of Petersburg was killed Wednesday when he was trapped by grain while cleaning out an elevator.

Abernathy Justice of the Peace Jean Marr pronounced Thompson dead at the scene and ruled the death accidental. She said the man died of suffocation.

Hale County deputy sheriff Tommy Thompson said that Thompson and several other employees were scooping out grain that had clogged up at the bottom of an elevator, at Heard Elevator, when the accident occurred. Thompson was trapped by hundreds of pounds of maize which suddenly fell on him, the deputy said.

The accident reportedly occurred about 3 p.m., and it took several fellow employees about three hours to dig the victim out.

Services for Thompson were at 2 p.m. Thursday in the First United Methodist Church.

The Rev. Bob Brown, pastor of the First United Methodist Church, officiated and Jim Fullington of Petersburg assisted.

Burial was in Petersburg Cemetery under the direction of Lemons Funeral Home in Plainview.

He was born in Petersburg, grew up in the Petersburg area and had attended school at Lakeside. Thompson had been employed by Heard Elevator since 1944.

Thompson attended the First United Methodist Church here and was a member of the Petersburg Masonic Lodge.

He married Dorothy Anderson Aug. 4, 1950, in Littlefield.

Survivors include his wife; a daughter, Vanda Collins of Petersburg; a son, Ryan of Lubbock; four brothers, Bud, J.C., Coyt and Donald, all of Petersburg; and three sisters, Mrs. H.G. (Lucille) Oden of Earth, Mrs. H.G. (Laurie) Smith and Betty Motley, both of Petersburg.

He was the brother-in-law of Floyd, Otis and Louis Anderson, all of Floydada.

Nature Gives Clues

Scientists at the University of Texas' vast cancer research complex here have found inside each cell a "micro-dot" where nature has hidden a secret message that tells when cancer occurs.

Dr. Potu N. Rao, Professor of Cell Biology and Chief of Cellular Pharmacology at M.D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute, and his colleague, Dr. Frances Davis, have discovered a method of "reading" an antibody message originating in the nucleolus, a little-known speck in the nucleus of every cell.

When the microscopic ovals — measuring about 15 one-thousandths of an inch across — were isolated from cancer cells, they were found to be biochemically different from normal cell nucleoli.

The "micro-dot's" or nucleolus' message was "read" by interpreting a built-in antibody reaction. This testing method was created by injecting the nucleoli from cancer cells into animals to produce antibodies. Their reaction was compared with an antibody reaction produced by normal placenta cells. A technique was used, treating the cells so those giving positive reaction would fluoresce.

So far the investigators have looked at 60 different kinds of tumor cells and all showed reactions, indicating that each nucleolus was different from that of a normal cell. The distinguishing antigen has been called TANA, for "tumor associated nuclear antigen."

Three goals have emerged from the preliminary discoveries. First is a method of using the TANA test on bone marrow cells of leukemia patients to reveal progress of treatment and perhaps predict relapse.

The second goal, a long term one, is development of a possible blood test for cancer, if present evidence is confirmed that circulating blood cells of patients with early cancer contain altered nucleoli.

A third objective is to discover the genetic control of a changed nucleolus. An ultimate solution to the cancer problem is knowing and manipulating the genes that "order" the malignant change.

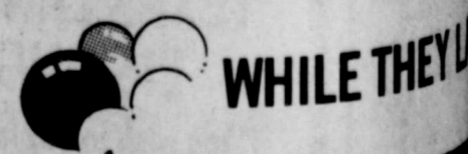
