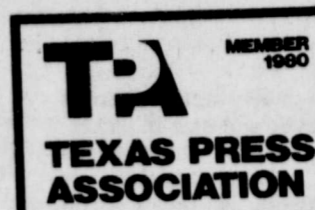

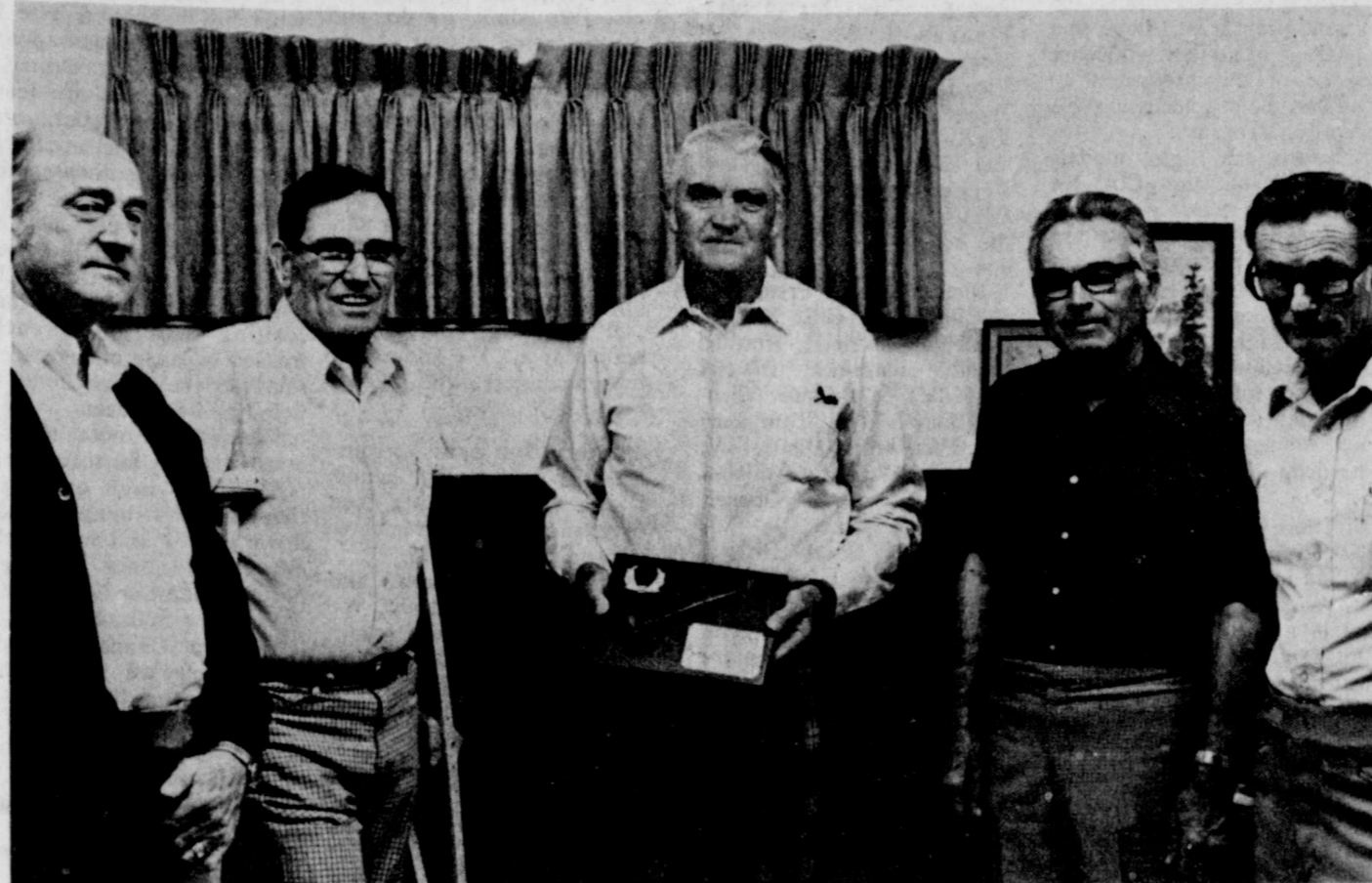
## Red Cross Opens 1980 Campaign

## Ricky West Named Floyd County Trapper

Ricky West has been appointed by the U.S. Department of Fish and Wild life to the position of Government Trapper for Floyd County. West replaces Mike Eckland who has been promoted to District Trouble Shooter for the San Angelo District.

The control of predators will be West's main duty. In this area, the coyote creates the major damage. West will also destroy skunks when they get under peoples houses and create a nuisance. Skunks and coyotes are the only two animals West is permitted to trap, but he can control other animals that create a problem.

"I've been hunting all my life," West said, "I guess I'm a hunting fanatic, but this will be my first experience with trapping."

West is working out of his home. Anyone having a problem with animals may contact West at 983-3301.

The major part of West's work will be on ranch land, controlling the coyotes. "The only time I can kill a skunk is when they are under a house or rabid."

West must have written permission, a signed agreement to go on any ones land. West uses two types of traps on ranch land. One is a M44 or cynaide gun, and the other is a live trap or cage. The steel traps are used for skunks only because the coyote is too smart to be trapped in one.

The steel traps are baited with sardines or most any food will attract a skunk. West lays the trap in the path or route the skunk is known to travel all the time.

If there are dogs in the vicinity he does not use the steel traps; he uses a live trap.

The bait used for the coyote is generally dead rabbits put inside the live trap. A cynaide gun is a tube stuck in the ground, then bait is put around it, the coyote bites and pulls on the gun and a dose of cynaide is shot into the animals mouth.

After the animal is destroyed it is left at the site. "We are on salary, and it is considered a conflict of interest for us to sell the hides," West said.

## Lighthouse Deficit Demands Increase

An increase of rates will go into effect July 1 for rural electric cooperative patrons, said Alton Higginbotham, manager of Lighthouse Electric Cooperative, at the annual meeting Saturday.

The increase will primarily affect minimum rates, he explained, and some will see no actual increase in their electric utility bill. Contracts will be renegotiated in 1982 for the purchase of wholesale power. Higginbotham said, pointing out that the last contract was signed in 1972 before the sharp rise in fuel costs.

"Freight is costing more to haul coal to the power plants than the cost of mining the coal," Higginbotham related.

Weather-related problems resulted in an operating deficit for the first time since 1962, Higginbotham told the stockholders.

"It will take three or four years to take the \$129,000 deficit off the books with

non-operating margins which we will use instead of patronage dividends," he said.

Shorty Neff, an employee with Lighthouse since 1949, was awarded recognition for 30 years of service.

Directors elected at the meeting were Tom Porter, District seven; Henry Scarborough, District six; and James Richberg, District nine.

S.M. True of Plainview surprised the directors and employees with a verbal tribute. He said, "Good electricity and good service are the result of good management, well-qualified boards and good patrons."

Cooperative members and guests began arriving at 11 a.m. at the high school in Floydada for a barbecue meal. Entertainment was provided by a lively musical group from the Lubbock area known as the Flatland Bluegrass.

Member families received a ticket at the registration desk and drawing of prizes was conducted at intervals throughout the meeting. Master of ceremony for the meeting was Keith Thomas of Floydada.

Mrs. C.M. Miller held the winning ticket for the grand prize. Registered for the meeting were 230 members and guests.

# Commentary:

Sen. Lloyd Bentsen

There are some heroes who never will star in ticker-tape parades. Their deeds will go unsung. It is this way for officers in the Central Intelligence Agency.

Public acclaim could harm the outcome of delicate, dangerous missions which CIA officers perform worldwide.

Ever since George Washington first sent Americans behind the British lines, we've recognized the crucial need for intelligence information.

When information provided by CIA officers helps to anticipate crises, our nation can prevent them or be better able to cope. We live in an increasingly hostile world. We confront a Soviet Union that shows contempt for human rights, national sovereignty and international law.

Individuals who perform hazardous intelligence work deserve our support and appreciation. They serve at great risk, doing vital tasks. The anonymity of their profession mandates that their work often go unheralded. While their failures are frequently criticized, their successes are generally unknown.

I have introduced before the Senate a bill to provide benefits for dependents of those officers who die in the service of their country. It would give one year's salary to widows and children of CIA officers killed in the line of duty.

I hope no money will ever be paid out under this bill. However, our nation owes a debt to those who are killed. We can only begin to repay that debt by providing benefits to their dependents. Such benefits are already available to employees of the State Department killed under similar circumstances.

The bill has been carefully drafted and is narrow in focus. I fully expect it to become law this year.

The need for such a law is long overdue. Two displays at the CIA headquarters remind officers daily of the purpose and risk inherent in their work. On the south wall of the central lobby in that building are carved the words from the Book of John, Chapter Eight, Verse 32:

"...ye shall know the truth and the truth shall set you free."

On the north wall of the lobby are 35 stars. Each of those stars is a memorial, honoring a CIA employee whose life was lost in service of country. The names of many of these dedicated Americans can never be revealed.

But we are familiar with the name of one: Richard Welch, CIA Station Chief in Athens, Greece. Terrorists assassinated Welch in December 1975 as he and his wife returned to their Athens home from a Christmas party.

Welch had been listed officially as a special assistant to the U.S. Ambassador. But shortly before his death the Athens News, an English-language newspaper, identified him as a top CIA official in Greece.

Officers like Welch risk their lives on a daily basis. They often work under extreme pressures. I hope that passage of my law will cease some of the pressures an officer feels concerning his family's security.

There are eight medals awarded by the CIA for heroism or meritorious service. All of the medals are anonymous; recipients, or their survivors, can't tell anyone about the award.

The highest medal they can bestow is the Distinguished Intelligence Cross, awarded for "...a voluntary act or acts of exceptional heroism..."

There is also an Exceptional Service Medal, for those killed in the line of duty. When that particular medal is awarded, God forbid, let's see it accompanied by a full year's pay. It's a small enough gesture of gratitude for the sacrifices our intelligence officers may be called upon to make for their country.

If we want to have a good, capable intelligence service, we must show the people in that service that we stand behind them.

# Editorial

This week we received a report on testimony given before a House subcommittee in Washington by Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association President John S. Cargile of San Angelo.

Cargile strongly endorsed legislation that would strengthen controls on the needless slaughter of livestock by predators.

Calling for control and not total eradication of predator species like the coyote, he said existing programs are ineffective in stemming the multi-million dollar problem.

Until animal damage control programs are extended to public lands like Fort Hood, in Central Texas, no effort to stop free-roaming predators will be successful, Cargile said. The mammoth military reservation, like other federally-controlled land pockets, represents a breeding ground from which predators can reinfest control areas.

In the Southwest, as documented by a 1978 study conducted by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, an estimated 92,000 baby calves out of 8.38 million born annually are killed by predators. On today's market, these calves have a value of \$350.00 a head. The resulting loss to cattle producers alone then is \$32,268,000.

"Economists agree that increased productivity is one of the best tools we have to combat inflation. It is the public interest to control predators effectively, so the livestock can help stem unnecessary losses and can do its part in producing more food for our country. H.R. 6725 provides the direction for an effective ADC program and we urge your support of its passage," Cargile said.

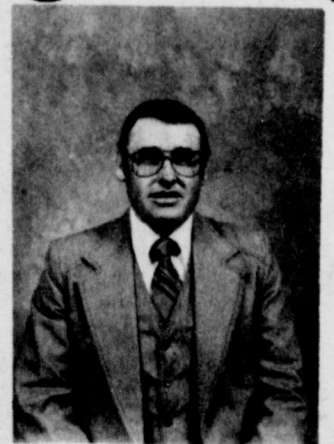

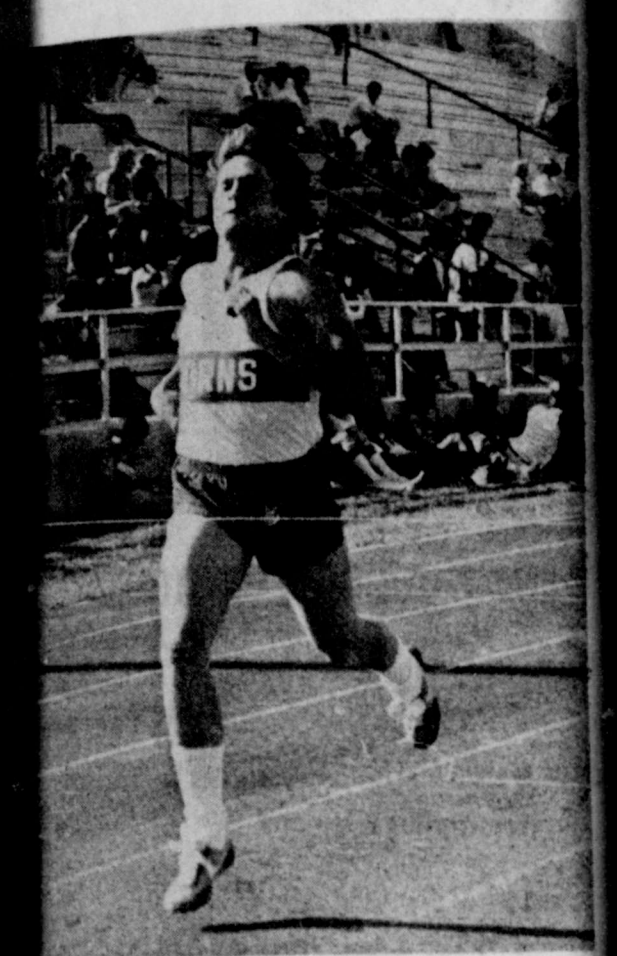

## Man Found His Marbles

Charley McDonald of Colorado Springs, Colorado was born between Lockney and Floydada in 1918. This past weekend he returned to the old farm where he was born in search of a buried treasure.

One day he decided to bury the small can of marbles near a cedar post dividing the yard from his mother's garden.

McDonald had shared the story with his family about how in 1926 as a boy of eight he had played with marbles on the yard at the Muncy School.

In 1928 the McDonald family moved to Lockney and later sold the farm to Ervin Bennett who cleared the place of buildings, leaving only a windmill. The place has been in cultivation since. While visiting in Floydada over the weekend of April 20,

McDonald, his son Phil and his family drove out to the old farm hoping that they might locate some of the marbles.

Using the old windmill to measure the distance, McDonald went back to that day over 54 years ago when as a lad he placed the can in the earth. Visualizing with his minds eye, then bending down and searching the ground he soon found nine of the old marbles scattered over a small area close to the place where they were originally buried.

"Through the years I have heard of people losing their marbles, but never able to get them back. You will never know how much better I feel since finding my marbles!" laughed McDonald.

#### A Few Words Of Caution About Running

Listen to your body when you run. If you develop pain, or any other unusual symptom, slow down or stop. If the problem persists, see your doctor before running again.

Don't compete with others until you are an experienced, well-conditioned runner.

Your objective in the beginning should be to steadily improve your own performance, not to run faster than someone else.

Running is a great endurance exercise, but it is not a complete exercise program. People who limit themselves to running tend to become stiff and inflexible, with short, tight muscles in the

back and in the backs of the legs. They also may lack muscle tone and strength in the trunk and upper body. These conditions, according to the President's Council on Physical Fitness and Sports, "can lead to poor posture and chronic lower back pain, a condition that partially cripples or disables thousands of middle aged and older Americans."

The stretching exercises you do before and after running will give you needed flexibility. In addition, you should do some strength exercises, such as pushups and bent-knee sit-ups, to give your fitness regimen proper balance.

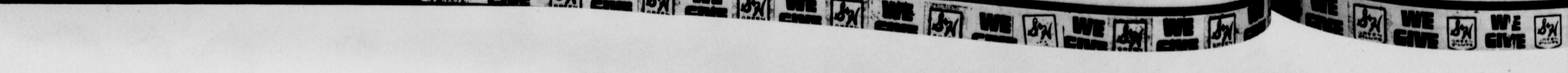
