ates said that carbohydratesensitive people may have several exaggerated metabolic responses to sugar in the diet. One of the most common and noticeable responses is an exceptionally high level of blood triglycerides--if a diet high in sucrose (table sugar) is eaten. An estimated 20 million Americans have some degree

of carbohydrate sensitivity. The 24 people ate diets with 5, 18, or 33 percent of total calories in the form of sucrose. All ate diets at each

sugar level for six weeks. A five percent sugar diet, the nutritionists said, is far below the U.S. average, which is estimated at near 18 percent; 33 percent is above average but may be about the intake of many individuals who like sweet foods.

Besides Dr. Reiser, members of the research team were Otho E. Michaelis IV, Ph.D., and biochemists Judith F. Hallfrisch and Mary C. Bickard of the USDA carbohydrate laboratory; Elizabeth S. Prather, Ph.D., chairman of the University of Maryland department of food, nutrition and university administration; and biochemists Mark Keeney, Ph.D., Karen D. Israel and Ellen L. Bohn of the university's biochemistry de-

## **Research Confirms Nutritionists Views**

New research findings back up nutritionists who say that individuals with a disorder called "carbohydrate sensitivity" should not eat

high levels of sugar. This was reported here today at the annual meeting of the Federation of American Societies of Experimen-

Scientists of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Science and Education Administration and the University of Maryland did the results. Sheldon Reiser. Ph.D., chief of the USDA carbohydrate laboratory at Beltsville, Md., coordinated

Twenty-four volunteers took part in the study. All had been tested and identified as carbohydrate-sensi-

In the tests, each volunteer drank a solution composed of two grams of sucrose per kilogram of body weight (equivalent to about five ounces of sucrose for a 150-pound person). After that, blood samples were taken and analyzed for insulin levels. An exceptionally high insulin response, or a prolonged high insulin level, was regarded as an indicator

of carbohydrate sensitivity. Dr. Reiser and his associ-

They reported:
--Six of the volunteers who

consumed the highest level of sugar (33 percent calories) developed a "type IV hyperlipoproteinemia pattern". In this condition, blood carries amounts and kinds of fats that have been linked with heart disease.

-- Blood triglyceride levels in both men and women increased as the amount of sugar in the diet increased, and the increases were much greater in men than in women. Triglyceride levels were normal in the men when they had the five percent sugar diets. Elevated triglyceride levels also have been associated with heart

-- When sugar provided 18 or 33 percent of the calories, compared with five percent, blood levels of total cholesterol were significantly higher. Higher sugar diets also caused an undesirable increase in the men's blood levels of low-density-lipoproteins, contrasted with high - density - lipoproteins. Recent evidence suggests that high levels of high-density-lipoproteins, relative to low-density-lipoproteins, re-duces the risk of heart di-

-- Levels of blood insulin following a fast were related to the amount of sugar in the diet; insulin was significantly higher when sugar provided 33 percent of the calories as compared to 18 percent and was higher during the 18-

percent sugar diet than during the five percent sugar diet. Glucose levels followed a similar pattern during fasting. Insulin and glucose responses during times when individuals were eating the two highest levels of sugar indicated glucose intolerance--a warning that diabetes may develop.

-- Uric acid levels in the blood were correlated with the amount of sugar in the diet. Men showed a greater response than women. The blood uric acid level in met was above normal when the were on the 33 percent sugar diet and close to abnormal when they were on the 18 percent sugar diet. Abnormally high levels of uric acid are considered a risk factor in heart disease.

Dr. Reiser suggested that health officials may wish to consider a screening program to identify carbohydrate-sensitive people, in view of the risk a high sugar intake might impose on these people. He said he bases this suggestion on an accumulation of data as well as the new data presented here.

-- Testing could help identify individuals at a higher than normal risk of developing diseases such as atherosclerosis and diabetes--those whose likelihood of disease is heightened if they eat a lot of sugar. Informed of the risk, these persons might modify their sugar intake and reduce the risk," said Dr. Reiser.

increase in credit-financed consumer spending. Constant-dollar sales of food stores and eating and drinking establishments have been weak for the past year or two. Retail food sales--in constant dollars--are not expected to increase until real disposable income begins to rise

Retail food prices, as measured by the Consumer Price Index (CPI-U), rose 0.5 percent from January to February--an annual rate of 6.2 percent. This was less than a third of the 21 percent annual rate of increase in nonfood prices. On a seasonally adjusted basis, the food price index was unchanged from January to February-the second month in a row this has occurred.

Grain harvest in the Southern Hemisphere is now in full swing, and total production appears about equal to last year's output. However, a record soybean crop in Brazil is contributing to downward pressure on world prices for soybeans and products.

As the 1979/80 production year draws to a close, international markets will become more sensitive to prospects for 1980/81 crops. Prospects currently are good for 1980 grain crops in the Northern Hemisphere, and world grain production for 1980/81 could be larger than in 1979/80, especially if crops recover in the Soviet Union.

This program will continually pull fluid milk into manufactured dairy products which will be controlled by the federal government regulations. There are now strong lobbying activities in Washington to remove regulations with regard to combining and reconstituting dairy products, in an effort to lower the price of milk and milk products to the consumer. Government will always manage that which it subsidizes, as directed by the majority of voters, as determined by Congress.



Farmers have long viewed income from cottonseed as a means of paying ginning charges. But as values rose in recent years many became more aware that seed represent a distinct source of income from cotton production and have expressed concern about the "farmer's share" of increased revenue from the seed's

four major products — oil, meal, linters and hulls.

To shed light on the subject, Dr. Dean Ethridge,
Associate Professor of Agricultural Economics at
Texas A&M University, has published a paper entitled
"A Regional Economic Assessment of Cottonseed:
Whelevel Value F. F. State of Cottonseed: Wholesale Values, Farm Prices and Impact on Producer Incomes.

An analysis of Dr. Ethridge's figures, which represent averages for the 15 crop years 1962-1976, reveals a number of interesting and informative facts and comparisons. The figures are broken down by regions, including the Southwest, Southeast, South Central and West. None of the regional figures would accurately reflect the High Plains situation, of course, but those for the Southwest, on which the High Plains exerts a

heavy influence, would come closest of the four.

Here a few of the things from the publication that caught the eye of officials at Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

Seed from the Southwest yielded an average of 322 pounds of oil per ton, seven pounds less than the South Central area, nine pounds less than the Southeast and 25 pounds less than the West.

Oil is the most valuable of the seed products, so the low yield of oil in the Southwest accounts for the fact that the wholesale value of all products in this area averaged only \$115.64, compared to \$124.10 in the West, \$123.05 in the Southeast and \$117.06 in the South Central area.

The farmer's share of total product value in the Southwest over the 15-year period came to 57.1 percent, well above the 50.8 percent received by farmers in the Southeast, slightly below the 57.4 percent received in the South Central area and just above the 56.5 percent paid to farmers in the West.

Oil mills in the Southwest received an average gross margin (wholesale value of products minus price paid to farmers) of 50.5 percent, 10 percent below the 60.5 percent margin in the Southeast, about the same as the 59.9 percent gross of the South Central region, and a little below the Western margin of 53.3 percent.

The \$65.09 average price per ton paid to farmers in the Southwest was a bit better than the \$62.52 price realized in the Southeast, just below the \$67.07 figure for the South Central area but over \$5.00 below the

average \$70.78 paid in the West. And, as would be expected in the area where lint value is generally lowest, the percentage of total bale value accounted for by the seed in the Southwest was

well above the other three areas. Seed accounted for 15.7 percent of the Southwest bale value, 13 percent in the Southeast, 14.1 percent in the South Central area and 13.9 percent in the West. The chart below shows the 1962-76 average figures from which these observations were made plus others from Dr. Ethridge's paper, a copy of which is available from PCG's Lubbock office.

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**GRAIN SORGHUM PAYMENTS** 

Farmers who complied with the 1979 sorghum set-aside program are to receive approximately \$61 million in deficiency payments. For eligible 1979 grain sorghum acreage, the deficiency payment rate is 13 cents per bushel, the difference between the \$2.34 per bushel target level and the \$2.21 per bushel average market price computed by the department.

There will be no corn deficiency payment in that the average market price of \$2.31 per bushel exceeds the corn target level price of \$2.20 per bushel, as computed by the depart-

#### CCC INTEREST RATES ANNOUNCED

Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland today announced the interest rate on all 1980 crop loans made by the Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) will be 13 percent.

Bergland also announced the 13-percent rate would apply to any new 1979-crop loans and new farm storage facility loans made after today.

Bergland said the new rates are based on the cost of borrowing money from the U.S. Treasury. Continuing interest rates at the earlier level, he said, would result in losses to CCC.

Farmers who already have CCC commodity or facility loans would not be affected by the new interest rate, Bergland said.

The interest rate for 1979-crop commodity loans had been 9 percent until today. The interest rate for farm storage facility loans had been 10.5 percent since March 22, 1979.

#### **CORN RESERVE**

USDA announced, on March 28, that eligible corn producers who are unable to place their 1978-79 crop in the reserve because of a shortage of local storage space will be offered financial assistance to move the grain to areas where space is available.

Corn moved more than 20 miles is eligible for payment as computed by USDA. For example, a producer moving corn 150 miles would be eligible for a payment of 13 cents per bushel per mile. Producers interested in this program should contact their local ASCS office.

#### FEDERAL STUDENT ASSISTANCE

The U.S. Congressional Budget Office released a pamphlet entitled "Federal Student Assistance: Issues and Options: The paper concluded that there were two post-secondary educa-

1979 FEED GRAIN PROGRAM NON-PARTICIPANTS MAY PLACE CORN IN GRAIN RESERVE

Corn farmers who did not participate in the 1979 feed grain program will be allowed to place a limited quantity of corn in the farmer-owned grain reserve, according to Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland.

Bergland, who took the action following the April 11 signing of authorizing legislation by President Carter, said he did so to help farmers isolate additional corn stocks from the marketplace and strengthen market prices.

Bergland said this option for previously ineligible corn farmers will be available on a first-come, first served basis until approximately 295 million bushels (7.5 million metric tons) of previously ineligible corn have been placed in the reserve, or May 15, vhichever comes first.

Bergland said farmers who did participate in the 1979 feed grain program and who currently have corn under a regular 9-month price support loan will continue to be eligible to enter their grain into the reserve, regardless of how many bushels of previously ineligible corn go into the reserve.

Farmers who wish to take advantage of this change should contact their local county office of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. Program non-participants will receive the same reserve loan rate for their corn (\$2.10 per bushel) as do program participants, but will not be eligible for the waiver of first-year interest charges. Non-participants will remain ineligible for USDA's regular 9-month price support loans, Bergland said.

USDA has been purchasing corn to help support prices, following the Jan. 4 announcement by the president to suspend grain shipments to the Soviet Union in excess of 8 million metric tons per year. Since that announcement, the department has purchased approximately 59 million bushels (1.5 million tons) of corn and accepted into the farmer-owned grain reserve 197 million bushels (5.0 million tons) of corn. The total quantity of corn now in the reserve is approximately 812 million bushels

The economic survival of a farmer during a drought depends on the physiological survival of a crop and its ability to use water efficiently. But droughts are highly variable in

terms of when they occur, how long they exist and thus how severe they are, and all plants do not respond to droughts in similar fashion.

Plants, like humans, have genes, which provide them certain characteristics. The expression of those characteristics, such as a response to drought, depends on the environment, according to agricultural scientists.

Studying drought tolerance and water-use efficiency is a complex process, but the ultimate aim is to produce a better seed.

According to Dr. Daniel R. Krieg, Texas Tech University crop physiologist, the problem lies in identifying the genes, or plant genotypes, which con-trol mechanisms that lend drought tolerance characteristics and water-use efficiency in plants.

Krieg is interested in understanding those mechanisms in cotton and sor-

"The studies are critical for the Great Plains, which cover more than 600 million acres of semi-arid crop land from western Texas to the Dakotas. The area is continuously faced with droughts and the problems of declining under-ground water supplies," Krieg said.

"Progress has been made in defining the mechanism used by cotton and sorghum in controlling water-use efficiency and drought tolerance, but we are yet to understand how much genetic variability exists in the control of those

mechanisms," Krieg added. "Once we understand how genotypes differ, we can then try to match a specified genotype with a particular soil type in a particular climatic region," Krieg added.

"Matching the genotypes with the environment will allow expression of the drought-tolerance and water-use efficiency characteristics in the plant."

Ultimate result of the research, he said, will be the incorporation of water-use efficiency and drought tolerance characteristics into desirable crop varieties and hybrids by the commercial seed companies.

With \$170,300 provided by the United States Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Science and Education Administration (SEA), Krieg and a team of scientists are investigating genotypeenvironment interactions and soil and climate variations, and how these effect water-use efficiency.

Krieg, project leader, will be assisted by Dr. Frank M. Hons and Dr. Richard Zartman, both of the Texas Tech Plant and Soil Science Department. Dr. Bobbie L. McMichael and Dr. Jerry Quisenberry, USDA scientists, will also work with the team.

"The research will be conducted under semi-controlled greenhouse conditions and natural field conditions. At least two field sites will be used to provide different soil and climatic influences," Krieg said.

The project, which began March 21, will continue through September 1982. Krieg has been working on drought tolerance in cotton and sorghum since 1973 with funds from the federal government and the Texas Legislature.
