

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

> One weapon that is being used against weeds is the modern herbicide. Herbicides, explains Price, are chemicals developed to control weeds and brush. The manufacture, sale and use figures for herbicides shows it is the most rapidly expanding segment of the general pesticide industry both in terms of pounds and dol-

lar value, says Price. From 1961 through 1965, sales figures for US made pesticides, other than herbicides and hormones, have remained relatively constant. Sales of herbicides and plant hormones jumped from 95 million pounds in 1962 to 184 million pounds in 1965. While this total is still well below the 440 million pounds of organic insecticides, fumigants, rodenticides and soil conditioners, sales values in terms of dollars are much closer with herbicides and plant hormones accounting for 42 percent of the total of all organic pesti-

cides produced in the US in 1965. Where are these products used? In 1961, the latest year totals available, Price says herbicides were used in the continental US on 85 million acres of agricultural land; on four million acres of home gardens; and on 30 million acres of highway and utility
