Red Cross Aid To Military Families

One of the orginal Red Cross services is Service to Military Families. This past fall, when Jim Gollihar's son was seriously injured in an automobile accident in Germany, the Floyd County Red Cross assisted the military in flying Gollihar to be with his

Gollihar was then Floyd County Deputy Sheriff. Due to the emergency nature of the problem the military officials requested financial assistance from the Red Cross to provide transportation for Gollihar from Floydada to New Jersey. He was then flown to Germany via military craft.

For the first time in 20 years, the Red Cross is conducting a drive in Floyd County. "We'll be winding the drive up the end of the week," Olin Watson, Drive Chairman, said.

The Red Cross was chartered in 1905 by Congress to provide emergency communications for military per-sonnel and their families back home. The service has developed into a series of Red Cross offices on every U.S. military base in the Messages relayed may be

to obtain emergency leave for a service member due to critical illness or death in the immediate family or the message may announce the birth of a child. Service members may also receive financial counseling and guidance. Many of base Red Cross offices offer Safety courses in First Aid and CPR. Red Cross also sponsors large volunteer programs that help staff military

In 1979 there were 738,395 separate services provided to help military personnel.

Legislation Signed By Carter For VA

An estimated 29,000 World War I and Mexican Border campaign veterans in Texas are now eligible for outpatient care (except dental treatment) at Veterans Administration clinics without regard to whether the medical problem is related to their military service.

A VA official said legislation signed by President Carter in December will enable these veterans not needing bed care to avoid hospitalization if they can be treated effectively as out-

Veterans of that period already had the right to treatment for non - service connected conditions as bed patients in VA medical cen-

There are some 600,000 veterans who served during the periods to which the new provision applies.

The legislation, known as the "Veterans Health Pro grams Extension and Im-

provement Act of 1979," also expands the eligibility of veterans served by VA outpatient clinics to receive government-paid emergency care at non-VA hospitals. The law gives VA the

authority to contract for such care when the eligible veteran patient is at a clinic where there is no nearby VA medical center and there is a serious threat to his life or health. VA could pay for this

kind of care previously in much more limited circumstances involving only veter-Other provisions of the

1979 act are: * Eligibility for care under VA's Civilian Health and Medical Program, called





VA News

Many veterans and widows of veterans are now learning that they were paid larger disability or death pension benefits, according to D.G. Ayres, Veterans Service officer for Floyd County, are paid by the Veterans Administration to eligible wartime veterans and to the unremarried spouses of such veterans.

Most cases involving the overpayments are occurring where a veteran or widow elected to change from an old pension to the new one which went into effect January 1, 1979. Under the old pension laws administered by the Veterans Administration, certain types of income were not counted, and there were certain percentages of some income which were disregarded. Under the new pension law, provided by Public Law 95-588, practically all types of income are counted when determining pension is eligibility. In addition, the new law calls for "family income," where previous laws referred to the countable income of the individual veteran or widow.

Under the new pension law, it is important that claimants keep the VA advised of any change in their income. This applies to all types of income with the exception of Social Security. Under the new law, VA pension benefits are geared to the current cost of living index, and when Social Security payments are increased on June 1 each year, the VA benefits are also increased. Thus, the VA knows when Social Security benefits are increased, so a claimant is not required to advise the VA of their particular change

in the exception of Supplemental Security Income (SSI) it is the claimant's responsibility to notify the VA when income is increased. Under the law, the necessary change in payment rates of VA pension must be taken on first day of the month following the date on which the income was increased. Thus, if the VA is not notified immediately, an overpayment will be created in the VA pension account, and future benefits will be withheld until the account is cleared. All new pension law recipients should be certain to notify the VA immediately when their income is increased for any reason other

than for the Social Security

increase. Early notification

will prevent an overpayment

and interruption of VA bene-

ZINC NUTRITION FOR

Beautiful pecan trees and pecans begin each spring with frequent zinc sprays. Good foliage is the secret to optimum growth, healthy trees and regular production. Mature pecan trees can have double the amount of foliage with three or four zinc sprays in April and May. Leaves on mature trees are full grown by June, so spray early and frequently. Young pecan trees can grow six feet instead of six inches in one year if zinc is sprayed onto the foliage every two to three weeks from April until August. This is of course in combination with a good

management program. There are two types of zinc which can be used in Texas, zinc sulfate or NZN. Each is effective. Commercial pecan producers have used zinc sulfate with good results for over 40 years. Caution will need to be used however because zinc sulfate can kill many types of plants, so spray it only onto pecan foliage. NZN is a new type of zinc which is a liquid. It was developed by Dr. J. Benton Storey of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. NZN is a soluble, less toxic to other vegetation and readily available at many garden

The commercial rates of zinc for spraying pecan foliage in Texas are 2 pounds of zinc sulfate or 11/4 quarts

The homeowner should use 2 teaspoons of zinc sulfate or NZN in one gallon


Other forms of zinc, such as zinc chelates or tree injectors, have been tested but have not been found to be an effective source of zinc for pecans in Texas.

Zinc is utilized by pecan foliage for the manufacture of a growth hormone called indole-acetic-acid. Without zinc and indole-acetic-acid pecan growth is greatly reduced. The leaves will be small and the shoots will be short and in clusters forming what is commonly called "zinc rosette". Zinc is not readily translocated from shoot to shoot; consequently. frequent zinc sprays are needed if new growth is to receive zinc. This is also why good coverage is important. Since aerial application does not give complete tree coverage, commercial growers have to depend on ground sprayers for zinc applicat-
