**County Jail Open For Public View Saturday**

**By Shelly Harris** Those of you who have never seen the inside of a jail will be able to indulge your curiosity Old Settlers day by attending the Open House at Floyd County's newest facil-

It's no Cell Block 8, and it's no Holiday Inn. It is a stripped-down, functional combination of concrete and steel built to the exacting standards of the Texas Commission of Jail Standards. It is that and no more.

In 1977 when the Jail Standards went into effect the Floyd County Building was short on all counts. The county was given a time limit to modernize the jail. Rather than float a bond or operate in the red, the Commissioners pledged the county revenue sharing money they had on hand and went about re-constructing the jail at a minimum cost to the taxpayers.

The Commissioners have been able to conduct the county business and comply with the State mandate on

the jail without raising taxes or going into debt. They cut every cost they could and still meet the Standards Code. They have overseen the remodeling of a fine structure for which the County can be proud.

A new jail was needed. The old one was unsafe and nonfunctional. In the old jail, with all the cells on the second floor, it sometimes took four men to hoist a 200-pound drunk up the narrow flight of stairs. If a fire had broken out, very likely lives would have been lost.

In the new jail the drunk tank or detoxification unit is on the first floor right off the booking area. The benches are made of concrete and only eight inches off the floor. This is a jail standard so that the inebriate won't roll off a higher bench and hurt themselves. The floor gently slopes to a flushable drain in the middle. The

flush control is on the outside of the unit. The room is windowless and bare and can be easily hosed down. Intoxicated people are often sick.

Does that give you some idea of the other world you'll be entering when you go

An intercom system allows the dispatcher to listen or communicate with persons in any part of the building. The sound system is so finely tuned that they can hear the pen scratching on paper if one of the prisoners is writing a letter. Vocal harrassment of the jailers by prisoners is a common thing and this system allows the dispatcher to keep in touch with the prisoners without having to run up a flight of stairs, as they had to do in the old jail.

There is a panel that controls the lights in the entire building as well as heat and air conditioning. The smoke removal fans are also operated from that


At the first sign of redness, get out of the sun. It isn't easy to confine sun on the grass in the back yard, time to only half an hour on the first day at the vacation resort. But you can't stretch it very much. If you try to double the exposure time to hurry the tan, you'll burn. And then return from vacation with a peeling skin instead of a tan.

Time of exposure also should be adjusted to time of day. The sun's rays are hottest between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. After 5 p.m. you aren't likely to burn much.

There are creams and lotions that screen some of the rays and reduce danger of burning. But if the cream should screen all rays, there would be no tanning. You can still burn through creams if you stay out long enough. Also, water in the pool or perspiration washes away much of the cream in a short

Tanning removes most of the natural oils from the surface of the skin and many sunbathers find it helpful to use a cream or oil to relieve dryness

Enjoy the outdoor life of the summer months. Don't overdo the suntanning.





these markers give a brief history of the county in which they are located, telling the origin of the county name and the first elected officials. Historical grave markers are smaller Medallions and interpretive plates at graves of individuals who made lasting contributions to Texas history, locally or statewide.

Granite markers are also found every five miles along the route of the former El Camino Real. These markers were placed between 1916 and 1919 by the state with the help of the Daughters of the American Revolution to commemorate the first long highway on the American continent. State Highway 21 often coincides or parallels this historic route.

Historical markers are placed as near as possible to the historic site or event they honor. The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation has cooperated extensively in the placement of markers along highways and has designed other roadway signs indicating location of markers. If you are interested in

commemorating a person, event, or historic site with a Texas Historical Marker, contact your county historical commission chairman. Every marker application submitted to the Texas Historical

Commission must bear the signature of the county chairman or designated marker committee chairman. The county chairman can help you understand the procedures in applying for a marker and often can assist in gathering research, photographs and other materials. 


