

Two Tornados Tromp Tulia

SUNDAY JUNE 1, 1980

Pinky Moreno stood in his front yard and watched the churning black cloud approach Nazareth three miles away. A funnel developed, touched down, and bounced back up. Moreno gathered his wife and three children, sat them in the corner of an inside room of the house, put a mattress over them, and went back outside to check the storm.

The funnel had reformed and was traveling due east directly toward his brick home. Suddenly the funnel verred south and touched down taking out a line of electrical poles. It struck the grain storage buildings about one half mile down the road and then plowed into the Lakeview gin.

Moreno could see cotton trailers swirl in the half-mile wide cone. The tornado continued on land for five more miles and then Moreno lost track of it in the gathering darkness. The time was 8:30 p.m. Wednesday, May 28.

Spotters had reported a tornado moving east toward Tulia. Five units of the fire department were dispersed the west and the rest went east. They saw two funnels moving parallel, about the same size, one a little in front of the other. The back funnel was much blacker than the

The dispatcher in Tulia radioed to the fire trucks. "Shall I hit the alarm?". "You better believe it"

came the quick reply. Twenty minutes later, what is believed to be the second funnel set down in Tulia's center square. This funnel was not completely organized yet. It knocked out store windows toppled the sheriff department radio tower, tore store front signs, and dropped debris on the show

lot of new Chevrolet cars. Gathering strength it crumbled the back and side walls of a two story brick building, skipped the football stadium and tore up the dressing rooms of the swimming pool, the high school concession stand, and a

fence. Across the street it stripped a house and then reaching full force continued

Tommy Beck had just got-ten home from work when the tornado alarm sounded. He watched the funnel approach for two or three minutes, decided it was coming toward them and warned his wife they'd better leave. She ran inside the house and gathered up an arm load of

things, put them in the station wagon, and ran back for another load.

"Come on," Beck velled. She started back for a third time. Beck grabbed her, put her in the station wagon. "Go" he commanded.

She drove off, he followed her in his pick-up. One half mile down the road they looked back. One funnel had veered off to the south, the other struck their house full force. The back wall crumbled, the roof flew off and then the house was engulfed in a cloud of churning durt, and debris. They watched the quarter-

mile wide funnel continue east, snap a cable tower, tumble sheds and buildings across the road and continue cross country.

Nine miles further, one of the funnels crumbled a new combine like a tin can. And then they were gone.

Neighboring towns tried to radio Tulia. The tower was down and they couldn't get through. Telephone lines were down. No one knew how badly the town had been hit. Disaster units were dispersed from Canyon, Lubbock, Hereford, Happy, Kress, Silverton, Dimmitt,

Olton and Amarillo. Assistant Fire Chief, Milton Simon, with the volunteer fire department said, "Lubbock sent six units from the police department. Canyon units got here so fast they almost beat us back in town. We couldn't believe all the people who came to

help."
"We needed the help" Simon said, "we couldn't get people off the street. They were driving around trying to see the damage. We were trying to block the damaged streets off."

Other counties that will be

precincts in Hale, Lamb and

Two elections will be held in Floyd County during the next two weeks. The Democratic Primary will be a state run-off of three positions and is not expected to generate

The second election has een called by the Plains Weather Improvement Association, Inc. of Plainview to ask voter approval so that they may apply for a permit to institute a program of weather modification.

The hail suppression issue has been the subject of heated debates and called meetings. The controversy is between the farmers and ranchers who believe that cloud seeding stifles rainfall and the opposing farmers who believe that cloud seeding can control hail storms, and avert total crop loss from

Voter interest in the weather modification should be high but only five precincts in Floyd County are involved. Those precincts are Almond, Sandhill, Providence, Harmony and West Lockney. There are 1253 qualified voters in those precincts.

Two years ago voters put a stop to the weather modification program in the South Plains area. A two year waiting period was necessary before the issue could be brought before the voters

In talking about the tornado Simon said that they saw the two funnels. "The first one hit Lakeview, it looked like to us, then it broke up, then it seemed to come down between the radio station and the elevators. When it took out the power lines it looked like fireworks."

The electricity went off at 9:15 someone said. Some said they cited three or four funnels, some said only one. The darkened skies and the nearness of night made it hard for people to tell. Kenny LaGreca and Barry

Allen are graduate students working with the Institute for Disaster Research at Texas Tech. They said the funnel that hit Lakeview was about a 1/2 mile wide. They rated the wind speed of medium intensity.

"This (tornado) is an odd one. It's wide and not as strong as you would expect it to be." LaGreca said. The system that spawned these tornadoes started at Clovis, New Mexico. It was moving in a generally west to east

The Lakeview Gin had belonged to Jack Straw of Olton. He sold the gin to a group of farmers in February

The Gin had been completely overhauled and new equipment had been put in. The work had just been completed and they had two trailers of cotton ready to use to "tune-up" the equip-

According to Jack Link of Paymaster Oil Mill the damage at the gin would run about \$300,000. There were also 59 cotton trailers that had been thrown together making a stack over 30 feet

Across the road two grain storage units were picked up and one was thrown along side the stack of trailers. The other was dropped another 200 yards out in the field.

A corn field behind the grain storage tanks had been mowed to the ground in a perfect circle, the rest of the field was standing.

In town, about a quarter mile from the Beck home a storage barn was de-molished. Three horses were pastured between the house and the storage barn. One was killed, the others injured. There were no other casu-

alities in Tulia. Mayor T.A. Hayhurst attributed that to the early warning the residents had. "We were very give any estimated figure for



FLOYD COUNTY EXTENSION AGENT

An alcohol fuel symposium that will key in on small-scale production of ethanol from grain will be held at Texas A&M University July 1-2.

Floyd County Farm Report

The area has received several rains this past week and the wheat and corn crops have benefited from them. Cotton planting is almost over and good stands are reported all over the county. There may have been some wind damage to the young plants from the recent storms. Milo planting is underway and some of it is up. Over all the county crops are in good shape.

Sorghum Irrigation System

Doubles Water Efficiency

A new system of furrow irrigation for sorghum developed at the USDA Center at Bushland doubled irrigation water use efficiency in 1979. Dr. B.A. Stewart, Research Director at the Center put together a combination of furrow dams, differential seeding and fertilizer rates along with limited irrigation to accomplish this feat. He said the system eliminates irrigation tailwater and run-off from rainfall to achieve high water-use efficiency.

To test his new system, Stewart and his co-workers, Don Dusek and Jack Musick divided a 1900-foot long field into three water management sections. fallowed since wheat harvest the previous year. The upper half was adequately irrigated. The next one-fourth was used as a tailwater runoff section, and the lower one-fourth of the field was managed as dryland.

Grain sorghum was planted on 30inch beds. Six pounds per acre were seeded in the adequately irrigated area, 3 pounds per acre in the runoff area, and 1.5 pounds per acre on the lower or dryland section. Anhydrous ammonia was chiseled perpendicular to, and prior to building beds at 180 and 90 pounds per acre on the upper half and lower halves of the field.

furrows were irrigated and dams washed out as water progressed down the furrows. Dams were "notched" in the middle to prevent water from washing over the beds.

Five irrigations each equivalent to 1.5 inches on the entire area were applied on a 14-day schedule. Irrigated furrows received 12 gallons of water per minute for 12 hours to achieve the proper amount of water. During the five irrigations, water advanced from 1000 to 1500 feet down the field, breaking dams as it went. Irrigation water advanced the most when irrigation came after a rain.

The total irrigation water applied was 7.5 inches during the five waterings. None of the irrigation water or 9 inches of rainfall ran off the field. Dams on the lower or dryland part of the field and rows that were not irrigated held all of the rain. "The upper part of the field was adequately watered and the field became increasingly dry with length," Stewart said.

The new system was compared to fully irrigated sorghum using 24 hour sets on every row where 24 inches of irrigation water were applied. Seeding rate was 6 pounds per acre on the entire area. About 8 inches of the 24 ended up as tailwater. On this part of the study, 1 of the 9 inches of rainfall also ran from the field. The two methods of irrigation were

compared to dryland, with a seeding rate of 1.5 pounds per acre. No water ran from the dryland area.

Yield on the new system averaged 6510 pounds of grain per acre. Fully irrigated and dryland made 8300 and 3040 pounds per acre of grain. With either full irrigation or dryland, yields were the same the entire length of the field. "With the new system," Stewart said, "yield varied with the distance irrigation water moved down the field." On the upper end, yield exceeded 8000 pounds per acre and was equal to fully irrigated. Yield started to decrease at 1000 feet down the field and was the same as dryland on the lower

"The new system doubled irrigation water-use efficiency by eliminating tailwater and runoff from rain." Stewart said. With adequate irrigation 222 pounds of grain were produced per acre inch of irrigation water. With the new system, sorghum yielded 463 pounds of grain per acre inch of irrigation water.

Growers who want to try the system have one problem to remedy. They must figure out a practical way of changing seeding rate while going across the field. In this study the researchers used a six-row planter that had a single-chain drive for all boxes. Seeding rate was varied by changing sprockets. Stewart says seeding rate could be changed by planting either one or two rows per bed.

Stewart said advantages of the system are (1) runoff is prevented; (2) irrigation sets are moved on a 12-hour schedule regardless of water advance; (3) more land is irrigated during wet times and less in dry weather; and (4) water is utilized most efficiently.

The researcher figures the new system should work on sorghum, cotton, and sunflower crops that are grown under both irrigation and dryland Stewart encourages farmers interested in increasing returns from limited water to give the new system a try.


