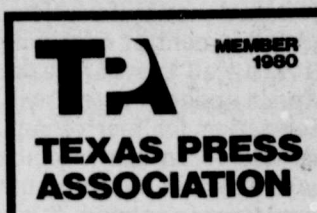

The demand for a newspaper in the county is so great that the publishers have agreed to merge the two papers into one. We will begin with the July 3 edition. That paper will come out on Thursday, and after that we will no longer publish a Sunday edition. There will be one edition of the Hesperian and one edition of the Beacon per week that will come out on Thursday. I can hear it now, "But what about football season?" I may be new around here, but it doesn't take long to find out how Floyd County feels about football. So, during the fall we will put out a special Saturday edition. It will be small, about four pages, and will cover sports only. One newspaper term for an edition like that is flyer. So we will publish a football flyer during the season. We expect to be making many adjustments during the next two weeks and ask that you bear with us the first few editions. The change will make a difference in deadlines. We will have to have all the news in by 4:00 Monday for that week's Thursday paper. Anything after that will have to go in the next week's paper. The advertising and classified deadline will also be Monday 4:00 p.m. for that Thursday's paper. Deadlines are necessary in order to publish accurate facts with as few typographical errors as possible. The earlier you get your news and advertisements in to us, the more time we have to work on the, and the better job we can do. We are trying very hard to put out a quality newspaper. We're using different approaches in page make-up, and editorial content. Two weeks ago we went to a larger type size which should make the paper easier to read. We've had many favorable comments on the type change, especially from the senior citizens. We are about to get our subscriptions straightened out. This has been a major project the last few weeks and one that has had top priority. All the work we do all week long is for nothing if our readers don't receive their newspaper. Freedom Delivers First Load

Elams 16,300 pound load hit the scales of Lockney Co-op elevator at 7:30 p.m. and tested 13.5% moisture and had a 61 test weight.

The yields on all county wheat have been good. Bert Elam estimated the irrigated wheat he was cutting in the trick community to be yielding between 45 and 50 bushels per acre.

The earliest load we know of in the county was delivered to Muncy elevator on June 7 by Mrs. Alvin Nichols but it had a 14.5% moisture test.

We will have a complete county run down on the wheat harvest in Sunday's edition on the farm page.

The test field of Vona seed was planted the first of October. It was watered three times and had a light application of dry fertilizer.

Bill Cagle, manager of Producers Co-op Elevator, says Vona seed has been used by several farmers in the area and it is proving a good yielder on dry land as well as irrigated.

Crime Call Editorial

Have you ever had anything stolen, your business or home broken into, property damaged? Have you wanted to do something about it, but as a private citizen felt there was nothing you could do? Have you ever felt that combating crime was a community affair, that law enforcement officers needed your support, but there was really nothing you could do to help?

Now there is something that each one in the community can do. With the organization of Crime Call of Floyd County, Inc. each citizen can have a hand in solving crime, recovering stolen property, and cutting down on the number of crimes committed.

You can do this by supporting Crime Call with donations. These donations go into a fund that is used as reward money for information leading to the arrest and indictment of criminal offenders.

It is a well known fact that many persons who might help in police cases will not come forward with information for fear of reprisal, and because they do not want to appear in court. The Crime Call program guarantees that informants will not have to identify themselves to anyone. It is this assured anonymity that makes the program work so well.

Also there is the dollar incentive. The advertised reward money is often the deciding factor for someone who has knowledge of a crime that has been committed. The informant knows that he can give the information over the phone, that on one will ever find out who he is, and that he may be rewarded with as much as \$200 for the call.

The Crime Call type of program has been proven in other towns and cities. Stolen property has been recovered. Crimes have been solved. Vandalism of private property has been curbed. And in many cases the crime rate has been reduced.

Crime reduction is the Crime Call program. It is a non-profit organization, designed to bring the citizens of Floyd County into a more active role in fighting and preventing crime.

Private donations of any amount can be made directly into the Crime Call account. Collection points for the monies are the First National Bank of Floydada and the First National Bank in Lockney. Any member of the Crime Call Board can also receive donations. The finance committee of the board will pick up donations.

Many businesses have already pledged their support. Members of the finance committee will be contacting supporters in both towns and in the communities in Floyd County. Probably no more than thirty will be contacted either in person or by letter. Crime Call will rely on the citizens of the county to come forward on their own with donations. This will be a community effort.

Each one of us can now do something, by taking an active role in fighting and preventing crime in our area. It is time that we banded together and let the criminal know that we will no longer tolerate his activities in our communities.

Lockney Branch Library Adds New Books To Shelves For Summer Reading Enjoyment

NOVELS

The Weeping Ash by Joan Aiken intertwines two extraordinary tales, and many fates, in a novel of India and England in the last two years of the 18th century. One story concerns 16-year-old Fanny who marries an older man and comes to a loveless marriage at The Hermitage. Meanwhile in northern India, twin cousins of Fanny's husband flee from the soldiers of a vengeful maharajah and arrive at The Hermitage.

The Love Talker by Elizabeth Peters takes the reader on a journey of fear through the dark, hidden country of fairyland, populated by the nightmare creations of children's memories. But these come to life to haunt adults trapped in a world where make-believe becomes deadly danger.

The Women Of Eden by Marilyn Harris is said to be the best yet in the Eden family saga chronicled in other Harris books. The family's story is told from England's Devon coast to London, Cambridge and finally America.

Man, Woman and Child by Erich Segal (author of *Love Story*) has as its theme a perfect marriage—envied by all—is suddenly threatened by a voice from the past. A man must decide what to do about the son he never knew he had...until the death of his long-ago lover.

The Chains by Gerald Green is set in Brooklyn as were his novels *The Last Angry Man* and *To Brooklyn, With Love*. This book tells the story of the Chain family, spanning the years 1910 to 1960. Founding father of the dynasty is "Crazy Jake"

Chain, a rough-fisted wagon driver who knew no fear.

A Class Of Blessings by Barbara Pym is said to be a beautiful, high comedy, full of hidden flirtations and suppressed emotions. The publishers of this English author offer reviews saying this book was "written with the wit and style of a 20th century Jane Austen."

The Devil In Tartan by Elisabeth Ogilvie, a year-round resident of Maine, which is customarily the setting of her novels. This time the setting is Scotland, where the author made a recent extended trip. An American family seeks to trace roots back to Scotland, and while researching the family, find themselves in a plot to wipe out the male members of the clan.

Kane & Abel by Jeffrey Archer spans more than 60 tumultuous years and revolves around a millionaire financier and a Polish immigrant who rises to become the head of a vast hotel empire. This is a tale of power, jealousy and horrible revenge as the two women from widely different backgrounds are obsessed with destroying each other.

Neighbors by Thomas Berger deals with a pudgy homeowner living on a dead-end road in the country, and he has new neighbors.

No Love Lost by Helen Van Slyke was completed only a few days before her untimely death. This book is said to be Helen Van Slyke at her best: a splendid family story spanning three generations of extraordinary and very different wives, written with

her keen understanding of the conflicts that beset the modern woman.

Who's On First by William F. Buckley Jr. is the third Blackford Oakes book. Oakes is a young CIA operative whose adventures were told in *Saving The Queen* and *Stained Glass*.

The Capricorn Stone by Madeleine Brent is set in Victorian England and brings us Bridie who holds a secret she does not know she possesses.

The Earth And All It Holds by V.J. Banis, author of *This Splendid Earth*. This sequel is set in California at the turn of the century.

The Scarlet Ruse by John D. MacDonald is a Travis McGee novel.

Innocent Blood by P.D. James (author of seven detective novels featuring Adam Dalgliesh of Scotland Yard) has as its heroine a girl who discovers at age 18 that her true mother is a prison inmate about to be released.

Creek Mary's Blood by Dee Brown is his first novel in more than ten years. (He is author of *Bury My Heart At Wounded Knee*) This is a tragic saga about four generations of American Indian life.

The Spike by Arnold de Borchgrave and Robert Moss is said by Richard Helms, former director of CIA, to be "a well-written, fast-paced novel dealing with what the Russians call disinformation. It deals with a challenge posed to America and the Free World: Can the Soviets destroy the West without firing a shot? The spike is a newspaper term that means a story is

killed because an editor doesn't like its politics...it means slanting the news, by omission...it means politics govern news.

A Presence In An Empty Room by Velda Johnston is a mystery story and chilling tale of supernatural terror as a shy girl becomes the second wife of a rich, attractive man. The first wife had been killed in the crash of her small plane.

Freddy's Book by John Gardner starts as an aging professor of Scandinavian history announces to a younger historian and folklorist "I have a son who's a monster." The "monster" is Freddy, a shy, obese 8-foot-tall adolescent, who deposits in the visiting historian's room his book, a fabulous tale of 16th century Scandinavia.

One Corpse Too Many by Ellis Peter's brings us once again the detective Brother Cadfael who has joined the brotherhood after many years in the world. Though determined to live quietly, he is inevitably distracted by the evil doings of others.

Heart-Sounds by Martha Weima Lear is a story of a love and loss. This is the story of a prominent surgeon's heart-attack and surgery and post-surgical complications as the doctor becomes the powerless patient.

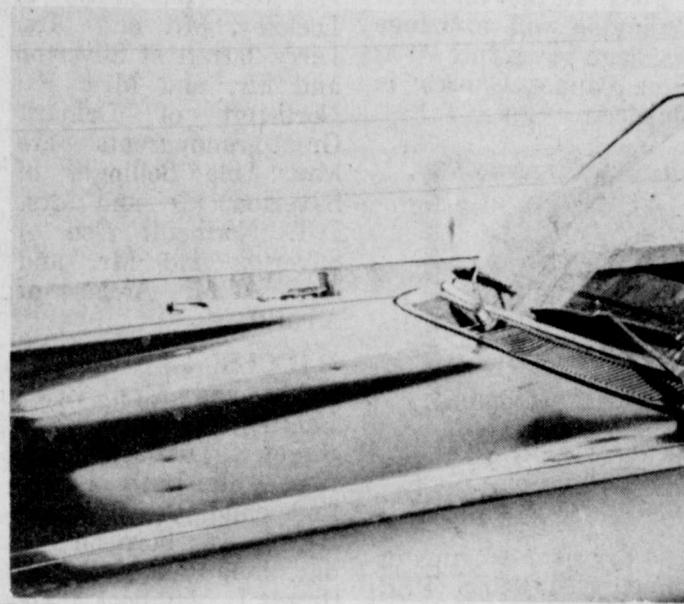
