



Cost-Price Squeeze To Cut Into Revenue

Farmers and ranchers are suffering from an old and persistent ailment-the cost-price squeeze.

Net agricultural income in Texas is expected to decline to about \$1 billion this year despite higher cash receipts, points out Dr. Carl Anderson, economist in marketing with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. That would put it at the 1978 level.

Cotton growers, cow-calf operators, sheepmen and dairy farmers will likely fair somewhat better than wheat, milo, corn and soybean farmers, swine producers and poultrymen, speculates the economist. Anderson foresees production costs this year jumping up around 12 percent, with fuel, fertilizer and

interest expenses leaping much higher. Although this rise trails last year's big jump, cash receipts may increase only 4 to 6 percent. With the cost of pumping water skyrocketing, Texas farmers will be especially hard hit since production from irrigated farms represents about 60 percent of the state's total crop sales.

While money is generally available for farmers to borrow, the greatest concern is the cost of that money and the income that it might generate, says Anderson. With the current cost-price squeeze, farmers and ranchers will be hard-pressed

to repay high-cost loans. All this is putting a growing number of agricultural operators in financial stress, particularly young farmers and those depending heavily on credit capital to run their farming business.

It's also changing the financial potential of operators using a lot of credit compared with more conservative farmers that depend less on credit and more on debt-free capital. When the rate of inflation exceeds the cost of money, it generally pays to borrow money to expand your operation.

Inflation boosts the net worth of assets which helps support weak cash flow statements. But interest rates higher than inflation shifts the financial situation in favor of operator with a large proportion of equity in his business and little

Mrs. Helen Bryan says her 10year-old son Tuesday night "became my protector at a time I felt I should be protecting him-but had no strength."

Mrs. Bryan was speaking of her son, Ralph, from her hospital bed where she is recovering from a life-or-death struggle in the flood waters of Swisher County.

She and Ralph survived the raging waters in a night of fear, but "Rowdy" as folks call her son, is credited with saving his mother from death in the flood.

Mrs. Bryan and Rowdy Tuesday were returning from a Little League ball park in Happy where Rowdy was to participate in a soft-ball game. But heavy rains caused the game to be cancelled. The boy and his mother stopped at a restaurant before going home.

"We live about 10 miles northeast of Happy," said Mrs. Bryan, "and my husband was out of town, so I had not cooked that night."

The Bryans operate a small trucking firm as well as their farm, and her husband was on his way to Wichita Kan

"While we were eating we heard the tornado siren," Mrs. Bryan said. "It kept going for the longest time without a letup, and everyone thought it was shorted out or something. After a while we didn't pay much attention to it."

Mrs. Bryan and her son finished their meal and started home. Along the way they saw hail on the roads, but it had fallen before they came along.

cold. muddy, exhausted and confused," Mrs. Bryan said. The two rested for perhaps an hour and a half. The sun was coming up, and the rain had stopped. Just then, Rowdy, who said he

never went to sleep, heard the sound of a car on the road. He left the house and went toward the road as fast as he could.

"The car passed within a few yards of me, and I was waving to the driver. But he was looking out at the field on the other side of the road and drove on by."

It was another hour before anyone came that way again.

"It was Mr. and Mrs. Dick Rat-jen and Larry Harvey," said Mrs. Bryan. "They were out searching for us. The boy and his mother later

learned that other neighbors and duputies from the Randall County Sheriff's Department also were searching for the missing pair.

"Lee Doughtery had been down the road about 12:30 the night before, after the worst of the water came through, and had seen our car," Mrs. Bryan said. "He had looked until 2:30 and then went home to wait until he could see. At daylight he took his broth-

Mrs. Bryan's hand was so badly torn that she was transferred to High Plains Baptist Hospital here, where plastic surgery was performed.

And Rowdy? Well, he's subdued somewhat, but doing well. Both hands and one arm have barb punctures which are sore and will be slow healing. But physically and mentally he's no worse for the

experience. . He appears to have taken the ordeal philosophically. His mother forgets the pain in her left hand as she tells about her son.
