At that time, I was all for International Harvester and we went there first. We registered and went outside where there were hundreds of people on a fence watching a little W-4 tractor perform with nothing but a two-foot aerial on the seat and a robot sitting in a chair on a little front porch drinking mint julep.

He said, "Well, there are the Martin Brothers from Floydada, Texas."
He told this radio controlled tractor to start up and go over and show us how it worked. This tractor came over to us and it had no power steering but you could see the front wheels move.

Then the robot said, "Back up and hitch to a tandum and plow the south 40 acres," which it did. I have often wondered if International Harvester had this 46 years ago what would they have today if all engineering was turned loose to the farmer.

We spent three happy days in Chicago going through the Field's Museum, the Ripley "Believe It Or Not," seeing things that just couldn't happen but all was in front of us. We saw the movie Flying Down to Rio starring Paul Redform trying to make the non-stop flight but was never heard of.

When we left Chicago,

it had rained and the pilot climbed above the clouds where we had good flying. When we arrived in Tulsa for supper, there was a Worth Star Telegram and they wanted to have a reporter at the airport to tell our story of our trip because we were the first three from one family who had made such a trip on American Airlines. I told Mr. Smith it would be after 12:00 a.m. when we arrived in Fort Worth and we were tired, hungry and

After leaving Tulsa, the only guiding lights the pilot had were the stars and a lighting beacon about every 20 miles to guide us to Dallas and on to Fort Worth as there was no radio to go by.

Since 1934, I have ridden American on many trips. The only place my wife and I go now is to South Africa where our son and his family live. American Airlines does not go that route. We went to South Africa in 1973, 1976 and 1978 and we hope someday that we will be able to make the trip again.







How can half a pound equal less than three ounces? Sounds like new math, but it really just points up the difference in interpretation of statistics. Here's how it works. Those persons who claim Americans eat too much red meat quote figures from the USDA that say we each consumed 181.3 pounds of meat last year. That figures roughly the equivalent of one-half pound per day per person. Now what's left out is that the statistic refers to carcass weight basis. Carcass weight includes a whole lot of fat and bone that are never eaten. According to researchers at the Meat Board, the amount of cooked meat, actually consumed was really only 2.77 ounces per person per day. That missing five ounces makes a lot of difference when talking about nutritional differences since one is
