

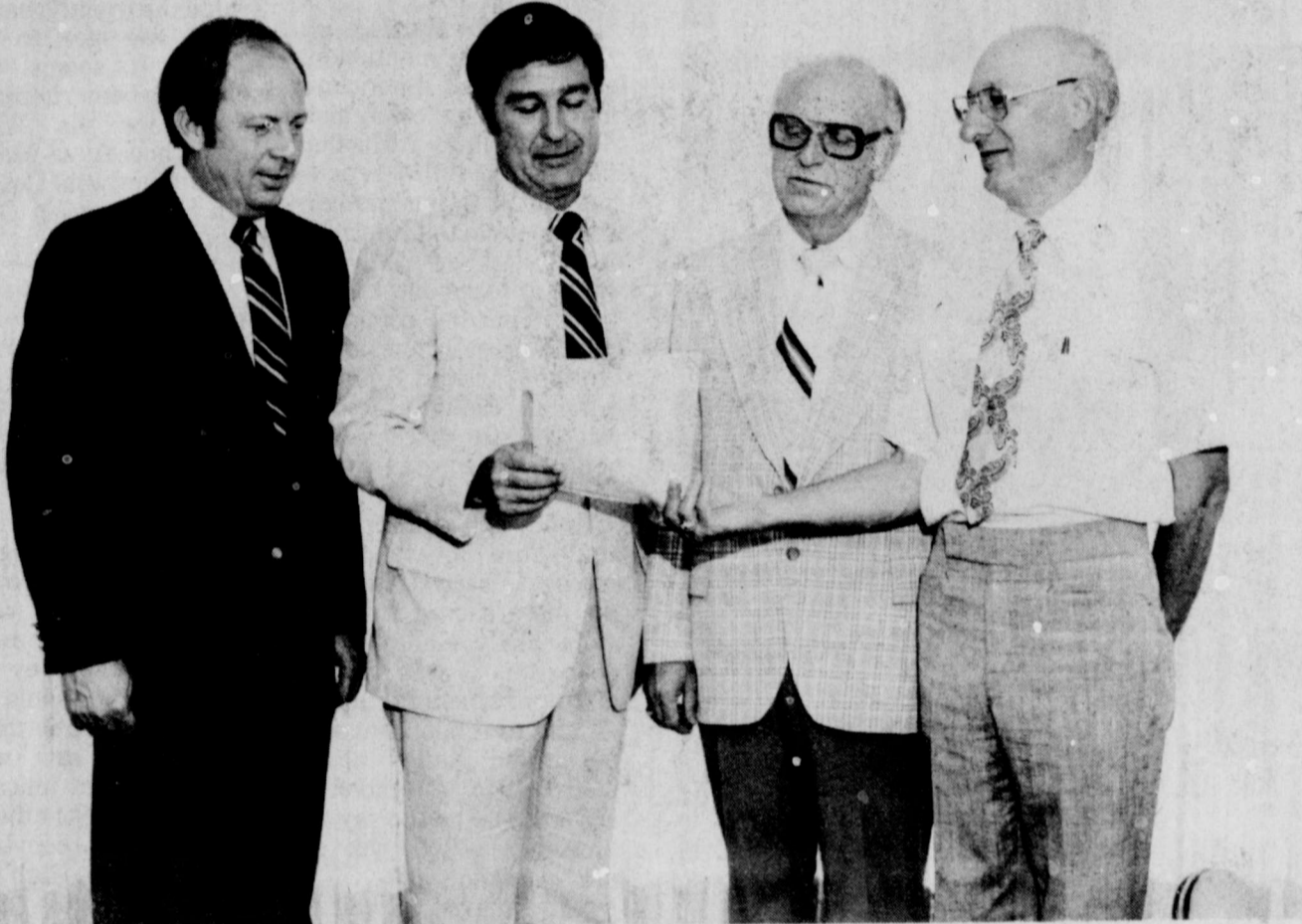

### Cooperatives Establish Scholarships

Eleven electric cooperatives in the Panhandle and South Plains have joined to establish the West Texas State University Electric Cooperative Scholarship Fund with a gift of \$13,750.

Interest from the endowment will be used to provide scholarships each year to majors in agriculture, accounting, computer information systems and management.

The cooperatives include Bailey County Electric Cooperative Association; Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative, Inc.; Dickens Electric Cooperative, Inc.; Greenbelt Electric Cooperative, Inc.; Lamb County Electric Cooperative, Inc.; Light-house Electric Cooperative, Inc.; Lyntegar Electric Cooperative, Inc.; North Plains Electric Cooperative, Inc.; Rita Blanca Electric Coopera-

tive, Inc.; South Plains Electric Cooperative, Inc.; and Swisher Electric Cooperative, Inc.

According to the fund agreement, the donors will make annual contributions to the West Texas State University Foundation on or before September 1 of each year.

Each donor will contribute a minimum of \$250 until that cooperative has awarded \$1,250.

Scholarship recipients will be selected on a merit basis by a committee which includes the dean of the WTSU School of Business, dean of the School of Agriculture, and two faculty members each from the business and agriculture faculties.

Lyle Robinson, general manager of the Swisher Electric Cooperative, Inc., of Tulia, which serves portions

of six counties, said he believes the cooperatives and WTSU are members of the same community.

"We appreciate WT," said Robinson, who has been with the coop for 21 years.

He said students who leave the rural areas to attend colleges and universities in larger towns and cities often do not return to their home areas.

"We need the young people who love small communities and we feel that many of these will be coming from WT," he said. "We need to bring people back to the rural towns."

Representatives of cooperatives in Texas, eastern New Mexico and the Oklahoma Panhandle met on the WTSU campus for the annual meeting in January.

### Board Requests Floyd County To Designated As Disaster Area

The Floyd County Agricultural Emergency Board met on Monday, July 21, 1980 to discuss the extent

of crop, rangeland and livestock losses suffered by producers in Floyd County. The board's objective

was to determine whether or not the adverse affects of the current drought on agricultural production in the county was severe enough to justify an official request for assist-

ance from the Small Business Administration.

After extensive discussion of the current situation faced by area producers, the board voted unanimously to request that Floyd County be designated a disaster area based on the extent of economic losses suffered by all segments of the county's agricultural industry. The members of the board have sent a letter to Frank T. Cox, State

Coordinator Disaster Services stating, "We believe the office will concur with our request and help our own area producers will be able to obtain financial assistance through interest loans made available by the Small Business Administration."

Statistical and observational data used by the board in its decisions upon were reviewed by Cox.

### Texas Farm And Ranch Safety Week Set For July 25-31 By Clements

National Farm Safety Week is July 25-31, and Gov. William P. Clements, Jr., has also proclaimed that week as Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Week.

Urging all who live and work on Texas farms and ranches to make accident prevention a part of every activity, Gov. Clements authorized a weeklong campaign to make a safety the "conscious concern of all who work to produce Texas' and America's great agricultural abundance."

"Modern farming is a complex and highly skilled profession. It is also a hazardous one," Clements said. He noted figures which reveal that more than 200 fatal accidents occur on Texas farms and ranches each year. In addition, about 10,000 people suffer some type of disabling injury.

"Accidents can be prevented by using safe procedures in combina-

tion with safe equipment designs," said Clements. "Conscious attention must be given to the way we do things and how things are made or constructed so as to best reduce the risk of accidents."

The cost of farm and ranch accidents, both monetarily and in time lost from production, is enormous, said Dr. Gary Nelson, safety engineer with the Texas Agricul-

tural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, which sponsors the weeklong observance with the Texas Safety Association and several other organizations. Texas losses due to agricultural accidents could be as high as \$10 million a year.

Nelson pointed out that the emphasis of the weeklong observance this year is on personal safety through the use of protective equipment such as hardhats, protective eyewear and gloves. Protective

engineer. Wearing the equipment can often make a difference between a routine, time-consuming cleanup and a serious injury or death.

Many areas of the state are turning to full time safety equipment as a means of reducing injuries and production losses. Leaders believe they will benefit from these practices.

"All farmers and ranchers are encouraged to evaluate safety procedures and adopt safer work practices."



**FIX-IT FACTS**

 What saves energy, privacy and space, but is easy to install and costs little? Louvered shutters. If you have west or south side windows which let in a lot of heat in the summer or lack privacy or have a window which looks unfinished, louvered shutters may be your solution. Easy to install, most popular are the pre-hinged ones coming in natural or pre-finished stains. Measure the height and width of each window. If the shutters come slightly larger than your window they can be trimmed to fit. Place the shutter in its desired position with the hanging strip flush against the wall. Allow one-eighth inch clearance at top, bottom and between the shutters to allow easy operation. Drill through the hanging strip and into the wall behind it. Attach the hardware by screwing into the soft wood. Shutters can be installed in an easy afternoon and offer excellent insulation both in summer and winter while adding a finished look to any room.

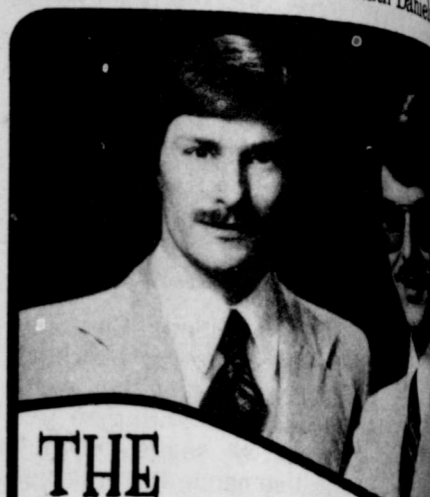

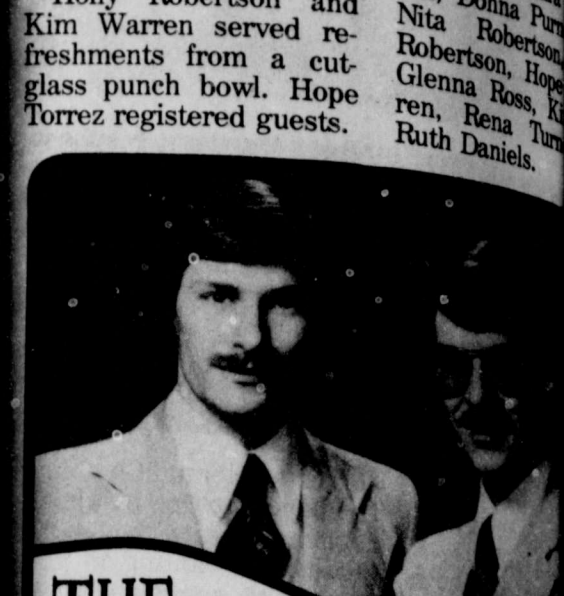

## Former AFS Student Writes Of Happenings In Italy

**[Editor's Note: The following letter was written by a former AFS student, Maria Antolini. She lived with the Leonard Matsler family during the 1963-64 school year. Maria and her husband, Tony, have three children: Stefano, 11; Alessandra, 9; and Paola, 7.]**

It has passed a long time since I wanted to write you but I had to wait until now to be able to give you our news as exact as possible.

Now, Paola and Alessandra have been chosen by a well-known Italian film-producer to be the interpreters of a film which will be produced this summer in a small village near Bologna (in the north of Italy).

It's going to be the first Italian musical film and in it will work a lot of well-known actors like Ben Gazar (American) and Maria Angela relato (Italian she has made a lot of films also in U.S.A.). The choreographer is Ernie Pan the ballet composer of the films of Fred Astaire. The film will be

given in Italy and also abroad, especially in the United States.

The name of it is "Help me to Dream." It will be shown on Italian TV only after being shown two years in the various cinemas.

It tells a story of 1940 and a rich family (mother and three girls Paola, Alessandra and a 14 year old girl) decides to move from the city and go to live out in the country with some farm families, because the war is felt less than in the city. The father has died in the war but the mother tells the three children that their father is far away in the United States.

There is also a lot of tip-tap dances (soft shoes) and dances of that period (something like rock). Paola and Alessandra will have to sing, dance and recite. They are taking dancing lessons now.

By now, nothing is sure. I'll inform you as soon as I know exactly.

Editor's note: The following article, submitted by Mrs. Joyce Lipham, relates information on her family, and also the incident at Daingerfield where several members of the First Baptist Church were killed by a gunman during services there.

Mrs. Joyce Lipham has returned home after staying with her daughter and grandson, who has been seriously ill.

The infant son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Spurlock, Trevor Braye, was transferred by ambulance from Pittsburg General Hospital to Schumpert's Hospital in Shreveport, Louisiana. He was in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit for ten days in serious condition.

The baby has been released and is at home in Daingerfield now, and reported to be progressing very well.

While the Spurlocks were at Shreveport, the tragic shootings at the First Baptist Church in Daingerfield happened. They lost friends and neighbors. Neighbors of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Clampitt were also critically wounded.

Spurlock served on the Morris County grand jury that had indicted King (the alleged gunman) of rape and incest last October.

King, an avowed atheist, was described as "brilliant but very weird," and reportedly

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sought revenge on the men and women who had served on the grand jury, requiring that this man be held accountable for his foul deeds and agreed he should be bound over for criminal trial.

The heroism and sacrifice of the four men who were killed immediately were acknowledged by all the townspeople. Truly these men took the bullets themselves in order to save others' lives, bullets meant for others.

A week of mourning was declared by the Daingerfield City Council. Businesses were closed, flags waved at half mast, and baseball games and other activities were postponed.

The sound of gunshots ripping across the serenity of that Sunday morning's packed service and the sight of men risking and sacrificing their lives to save others will never be forgotten in Daingerfield.

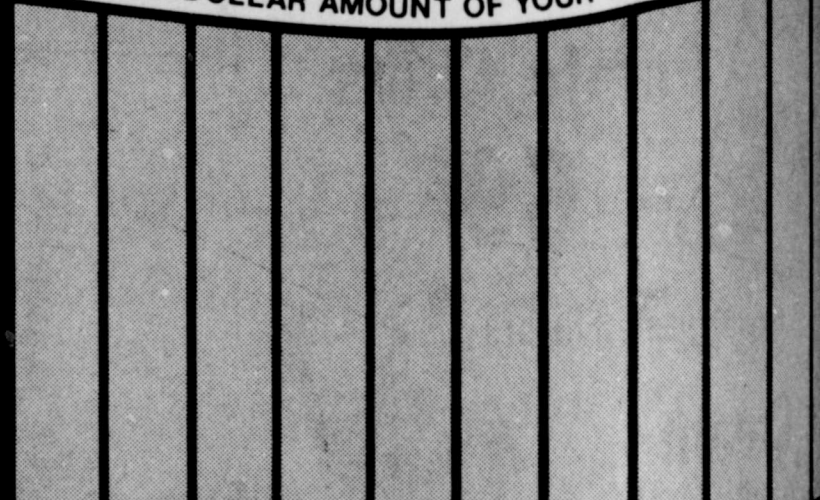

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
