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I let an anniversary of sorts go by last week without mention. Maybe I should try to forget the month and year that I first worked in a print shop, but I doubt it as I have no regrets for the forty years I have spent in the newspaper business in various capacities. I applied for and got the job as Printers Devil on the Rogers News in Bell County on August 10, 1925, and I found out later, much later, it was like getting a tiger by the tail. There hasn't been any place to let go. Forty years in one profession might seem like a long time to a beginner, but when you are looking back it doesn't seem so long.

We have had many happy experiences in the weekly newspaper business. It is the ideal spot to be in touch with all segments of community life. The lack of financial remuneration is more than made up for in the satisfaction that goes with the privilege of being an active participant in the projects designed for the betterment of the community. Despite the drudgery involved, we have enjoyed every year spent in the weekly newspaper profession.

The Retail Merchants Committee of the Chamber of Commerce, in a called meeting in the chamber office Tuesday night, laid the groundwork for the annual community Christmas party and holiday trade promotion campaign. Plans are to have everything in readiness for the opening of the holiday season immediately after Thanksgiving. Tentative plans call for a Bobcat Band concert on the evening that downtown Christmas lighting decorations are turned on. Date and details for this program will be announced later. Santa Claus will also be invited to visit Dimmitt and to bring along treats for the kiddies.

Christmas decoration contests will also be sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce, with prizes being given in residential, business and industrial categories. This program, if given full cooperation in the residential and business districts, will add much to the holiday spirit and should afford much pleasure to Dimmitt visitors and townspeople. Details for this phase of the Christmas program are yet to be announced.

The merchants committee, in pointing up the fact that Christmas goods, toys and the like, will be found in large supply throughout the shopping districts, discussed plans for making the chores and problems of the Christmas shopper as simple as possible with efficient display of Christmas merchandise and sufficient sales personnel to expedite shopping in the community.

Numerous trade promotional programs were discussed at the meeting and if plans materialize, the Christmas shopper will find that it is not only a pleasure, but in many instances profitable to patronize local merchants. If I were you, you would make plans now to do all of your Christmas buying in Dimmitt, or for that matter it is wise to do your buying in Dimmitt throughout the year.

A meeting of local and district Red Cross officials was held Tuesday afternoon in the Community Room at the First State Bank to make plans for the annual Red Cross fund drive. Castro County has been lax in its responsibilities to the international Red Cross for the past several years with the result that we haven't carried our share of the financial burden of that humanitarian. The Red Cross fund campaign that should have been conducted in March will get underway Friday, August 20 and continue through Friday, August 27. Jack Flynn is fund campaign chairman, Judge Raymond Wilson is County Red Cross Chairman and Mrs. Bruce Woodell is the county service chairman and secretary. In event you are missed by a campaign worker you can hand, or mail your contribution to any one of the people mentioned above.

Castro County's quota for the Red Cross has been set at \$1,053.00, for the good the money does this is a bargain for our county. We should get it in post haste.

In peace times when the Red Cross is concerned primarily with domestic disasters, we are apt to become careless in its support unless there is a major catastrophe nearby to call our attention to its functions. But in times such as these, with a hot war in progress in Viet Nam and with service men stationed in many other countries all over the world, it is necessary that the Red Cross have the necessary finances to render its many services to our soldiers as well as their families. The Red Cross performs a function that cannot or is not replaced by any other agency. It is our responsibility to see that the money is forthcoming. Give.

Castro County Roundup Week parade unfolded last Thursday afternoon with 118 entries gathered for the procession according to Don Newman, parade chairman.

According to Newman, the parade took 25 minutes to pass in review. The Castro County Home Demonstration Council met Tuesday, August 10, at 2:30 p.m. in the Courthouse Assembly Room.

Three club presidents, three Council delegates, one Council officer, the County THDA Chairman, and the HD agent were present.

Topics of discussion and action included preparation of the 1966 year-book, appointing a nominating committee for officers for 1966, and attendance at the State THDA meeting in Austin in September.

Elected delegates to this State meeting are Mrs. D. L. Cleaver, Mulkey HD Club; Mrs. Billye Gwen Davis, Flagg HD Club; and Mrs. Murray Snyder, Bethel HD Club. Mrs. Irvin Ott, Big Square HD Club is alternate.

The leather apparel industry has tripled its annual sales volume since 1958. It has also expanded its research and developments. Sealed-in color, smooth surfaces that resist stain and soil and added resistance to wet and dry rubbing have resulted from new finishing processes. New chemicals make possible leather with greater flexibility.

Leather is being used in very formal wear. Leather lace, a fine suede skin punched in a geometric design, is being used in simple sheath dresses.

Silk-screen printing of leather is another recent development. These are available in ready to wear garments and in yard goods. This is an expensive process, as many of the steps must be individually hand done. Cleaning reports very good colorfastness and retention of softness of these after dry cleaning only. This is not a good indication of what might occur with wearing and cleaning. In dry cleaning only there was a slight color change, but they felt that it was not significant.

For the family with a barbecue pit or grill, barbecued food takes priority during the summer.

That's one good reason why the plentiful supply of broilers reported this month by the Consumer and Marketing Service of USDA should be most welcome.

You'll find these meaty, succulent chickens ideal for the tempting enjoyment of an outdoor barbecue. You may prefer broiler halves or disjointed chicken parts, whichever

suits your family's fancy. Thighs, drumsticks, whole legs, wings and breasts are the most popular portion of the disjointed chicken for barbecuing.

Reserve the remaining parts for use in casseroles, soups, and salads. Try this Barbecue Sauce prepared ahead of time. Pour contents of a large bottle of seasoned barbecue sauce into a sauce pan; add a stick of butter and a quartered clove of garlic. Simmer ingredients about 30 minutes. Brown chicken on all sides before brushing on the barbecue sauce.

Do you know that many facial squint lines are caused by straining to see through smudged lenses?

Rubbing with a dry cloth smears soil and grease, so glasses should be washed at least once a day to remove finger marks, cosmetics, and dust.

After rinsing, wipe the lenses and frames dry with a clean lintless cloth.

Lenses made of unbreakable resin should be washed the same way. Authorities warn against rubbing them with silicone-treated paper which tends to scratch and damage resins.

August is Sandwich Month - a time for good eating the sandwich way. Just about any kind of food imaginable fits into a sandwich - an ideal solution for leftovers.

Sandwich meals, using in-season fruits and vegetables, and plentiful and less expensive meats, offer economy in time and energy without loss of good nutrition.

And, trying new and interesting sandwich recipes prevents sandwich routine.

For example try these Barbecued Turkey Po' Boy Sandwiches: To prepare six, heat together in a large fry pan 6 thick slices of cooked turkey and 1 1/2 cups of your favorite barbecue sauce. Using six 8 inch Po' boy rolls, cut each into 3 lengthwise slices, restack slices and place rolls on baking sheet. Heat rolls in preheated 350 degree F oven for about 5 minutes, or until crisp. Remove rolls from oven.

Spread cut surfaces of rolls with butter and arrange in single layer on baking sheet, buttered side up. Cover bottom roll slices with hot turkey mixture. Top each of the center roll slices with 3 tomato slices 3 sweet onion slices and 3 green pepper rings.

Cut 6 one-ounce slices of cheese into halves and place 2 slices on each of the top roll slices.

Broil sandwiches in preheated broiler until cheese melts and is slightly brown. Restack slices to form sandwiches. Serve hot.

GRILLED CHEESE MEXICANA
(6 servings)
10 ounces ground beef
Two-thirds cup finely chopped celery

1/2 cup finely chopped onion
6 tablespoons tomato paste
1 1/2 teaspoons chili powder
3/4 teaspoon sugar
1/4 teaspoon pepper
3/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon garlic powder
About 1/2 cup water

18 slices enriched sandwich bread
1/4 cup butter, softened
12 slices process American cheese
1 1/2 cups grapefruit and orange sections

6 lettuce cups
Preheat grill. In heavy saucepan place beef, celery and onion. Break beef into small pieces, cover and cook 15 minutes. Stir in tomato paste, chili powder, sugar, salt, pepper and garlic powder. Add enough water to moisten. Cover and continue cooking 15 to 20 minutes, stirring occasionally. Meanwhile, spread 12 slices with butter. Using a 3 inch round cutter, cut centers from remaining 6 slices, buttered side down, on board. Cover each with 1 cheese slice. Place bread slices with centers removed over cheese. Place 2 tablespoons beef mixture in center, spreading to fill cheese slices. Close sandwiches with remaining buttered bread slices, buttered side up. Grill sandwiches on both sides until golden brown. Cut in half diagonally. Serve 2 halves with 1/4 cup grapefruit and orange sections in lettuce cup.

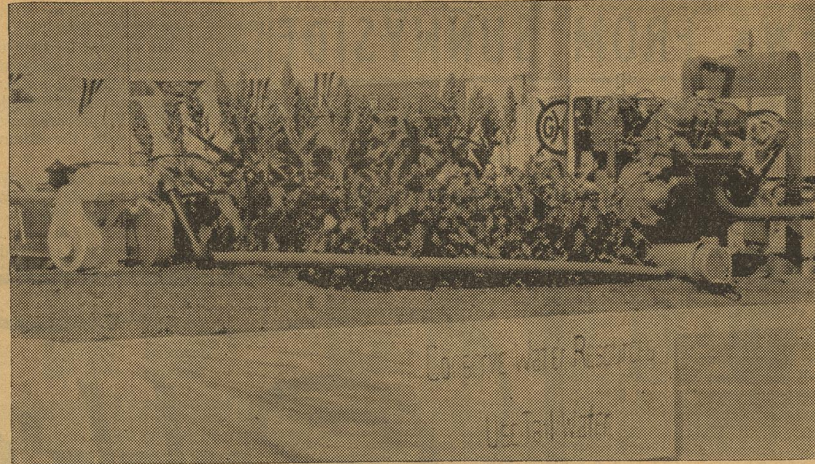

Granddad Bagwell . . . Roundup . . . (Continued from page 1) well said he never had trouble from Ivor, both of here contend that an old family Bible has the date recorded as 1865. Even though the date isn't established by a record, Bagwell was born in Olathe, Okla. which was Indian Territory at the time. Indian territory was a familiar setting for the oldtimer who moved several times into Indian areas. Bagwell, he began to work for money to come to Texas. He worked as a woodcutter for 75 cents a day. When he was 18 years old, he came to Montague County and the small town of Saint Jo. His grandparents made the move with him, but he left them there to return to Oklahoma Indian Territory where he started running a ferry boat across the Red River. James Andrew Bagwell married Nancy Adaline Ashly in January 17, 1892 in one of the most unusual weddings in Texas. The couple rode horseback to a crossroads about 20 miles south of Saint Jo, where they met the Rev. M. C. McCloud, another preacher and a third witness. It was under a big live oak tree with freezing rain falling that Rev. McCloud united the couple while the second minister held his hat over the Bible. Following the wedding the couple rode on to Granddad's farm to herd cattle into pens, before a blizzard hit the area. While at the house the blizzard struck and the newlyweds had to stay there three days before being able to return to her sister's house two miles down the road. The Bagwells raised ten children and now have 23 grandchildren and 33 great-grandchildren. Seven of these were born in Indian Territory, while the other three were born after the couple returned to Texas. The children are Ernest Dimmitt Jim of Clayton, N. M., Grace who died in 1923, Douglas who died at 1 year old, George and Ivor of Dimmitt, Mildred (Gullion) of Tulsa, Oklahoma, Mrs. Hattie Howell, John who died in 1951, and Marie Teague who died in 1958. Impressed with the land in Texas Bagwell returned to Miami in 1906 and in August of the same year he moved to Floydada. While there he ran a freight wagon between there and Canyon. Once he was caught in a blizzard on his ride home from Canyon and had to walk to a school house where he found shelter by an old wood burning stove. In 1916, Bagwell bought three sections of land in Castro County near Bethel. In 1917, his son, J. A., Jr. moved to the place in Castro County which they farmed until 1934 when "Granddad" and "Grandmother" Bagwell moved to the place. This is still his home. The Bagwells celebrated their 73rd anniversary in January of this year. What does he attribute his old age to? "Hard work, and good healthy food and living a good clean moral life." And what does it feel like to be 100 years old? "It feels pretty good, even though I can't see or hear very good. But I'm not sick." Bagwell remembers when both Pres. idential Garfield and MacKinley were assassinated. He says, "I can remember the Garfield killing better because of the song the killer sang on the gallows just before he was hanged." Recalling the hanging, Bagwell repeated the words of the song: "My name is Charles Giteau, That name I'll never deny. For the murder of James Garfield, I am condemned to die an important role in the oldtimer's life. He said, "In Indian territory no one voted except the Indians, but after I came to Texas, I have only missed a few elections because I was too busy on the farm." Even today, both "Granddad" and "Grandmother" still mark their ballots and exercise their right to vote. The ballots are brought to their house and checked off and "Granddad" says, "I know what I'm voting on." About the most irritating thing lately has been the idea that he hasn't been able to work in his garden. He said it bothers him not to be able to work in the garden because "I just can't stand weeds and goat-heads." Being born soon after the end of the Civil War, Bagwell can remember the freeing of slaves, although he never owned any. Talking about their freedom, he said, "They all wished they were back with their old masters, because they were out on the world and didn't know what to do." Granddad said he just can't point out any best years of his life. He added, "I've enjoyed all 100 of them."

Postal Employees To Take Part In Efficiency Plan

Postmaster Ernest L. Davis announced today that all Dimmitt Post Office employees will be asked to take part in the new Postal Efficiency Plan announced Wednesday, July 22, by Postmaster General A. Gronowski. "The Postal Efficiency Plan includes comprehensive programs for improving postal service and reducing costs," Ernest Davis said.

"It is our way of helping President Johnson fulfill his pledge to provide more effective and economical government services." In Washington, Postmaster General John A. Gronowski termed the plan's twin objectives of economy and service betterment "a matter of highest priority" and called for total involvement of all employees through the Post Office suggestion program.

Semiannual reports will be made to the President, Mr. Gronowski said, and realized savings will be reverted to the Treasury or applied to improving postal service.

A local committee will be organized to fulfill the two purposes of the plan:

1. Reduce Costs
2. Improve services

Ideas generated by individual employees will be taken up by the committee. Accepted ideas will be passed on to Washington for possible application on a national level. Employees whose ideas are adopted nationwide will be given national awards. The Postmaster General will personally oversee the programs. Postmaster Davis will be chairman of the local committee to implement PEP.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an Amendment to Section 24, Article III and Section 17 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, to allow an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature for the Lieutenant Governor and for the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and increasing the per diem allowance of Members of the Legislature.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 24. Representatives shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year. Senators shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year. The Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature. All Members of the Legislature, including the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives, also shall receive from the Public Treasury a per diem of not exceeding Twenty Dollars (\$20) per day for the one hundred and forty (140) days of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days. This Amend-

ment shall be self-enacting and appropriations hereof made in the General Appropriations Bill for the biennium ending August 31, 1967, for the salaries of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives shall not be invalid because of the anticipatory nature of the legislation.

"In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of Government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra Session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of the Regular or Called Session."

Sec. 2. That Section 17 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 17. If, during the vacancy in the office of Governor, the Lieutenant Governor should die, resign, refuse to serve, or be removed from office, or be unable to serve or if he shall be impeached or absent from the State, the President of the Senate, for the time being, shall, in like manner, administer the Government until he shall be succeeded by the Governor or Lieutenant Governor. The Lieutenant Governor shall, while he acts as President of the Senate, receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, and the same mileage which shall be allowed to the Members of the Senate, and no more; and dur-

ing the time he administers the Government, as Governor, he shall receive in like manner the same compensation which the Governor would have received had he been employed in the duties of his office. Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Monday following the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment allowing an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature for the Lieutenant Governor and for the Speaker of the House of Representatives and allowing a per diem for Members of the Legislature not to exceed Twenty Dollars (\$20) per day for the 140 days of each Regular Session and 30 days of each Special Session."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment allowing an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature for the Lieutenant Governor and for the Speaker of the House of Representatives and allowing a per diem for Members of the Legislature not to exceed Twenty Dollars (\$20) per day for the 140 days of each Regular Session and 30 days of each Special Session."

Sec. 4. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in like manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 14 proposing Amendments to Section 4, 22 and 23 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to provide a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office and Secretary of State; and certain statutory state officers; providing for the necessary election and the form of the ballot; and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 4, Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: "Section 4. The Governor shall be installed on the first Tuesday after the organization of the Legislature, or as soon thereafter as practicable, and shall hold his office for the term of four years, or until his successor shall be duly installed. He shall be at least thirty years of age, a citizen of the United States, and shall have resided in this state at least five years immediately preceding his election."

Sec. 2. That Section 22, Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: "Section 22. The Attorney General shall hold office for four years and until his successor is duly qualified. He shall represent the state in all

suits and pleas in the Supreme Court of the state in which the case is pending, and shall especially interfere into the charter rights of all private corporations, and from time to time, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any power or demanding or collecting any species of taxes, tolls, freight or wharfage not authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek judicial forfeiture of such charters, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give legal advice in writing to the Governor and other executive officers, when requested by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall reside at the seat of government during his continuance in office. He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature."

Sec. 3. That Section 23, Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: "Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution."

Sec. 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendments providing a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office, Secretary of State, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution."

Sec. 5. Nothing contained in this Resolution shall be construed so as to extend the term of office of any officeholder previously elected to a two-year term.

Sec. 6. The Governor shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

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Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5 proposing an Amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas so as to authorize an increase in the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board, Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds or obligations and the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Board; and providing for an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the organization of the Legislature of the State of Texas:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows: "Section 49-b. By virtue of prior Amendments to this Constitution, there has been created a governmental agency of the State of Texas performing governmental duties which has been designated the Veterans' Land Board. Said Board shall continue to function for the purposes specified in all of the prior Constitutional Amendments except that the Board shall be composed of not more than five citizens of the State of Texas, one (1) of whom shall be well versed in veterans' affairs and one (1) of whom shall be well versed in finance. One (1) such citizen member shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, be appointed biennially by the Governor to serve for a term of four (4) years; but the members of the Board on the date of adoption hereof shall complete the terms to which they were appointed. In the event of the resignation or death of any such citizen member, the Governor shall appoint a replacement to serve for the unexpired portion of the term to which the deceased or resigning member had been appointed. The compensation for said citizen members shall be as is now or may hereafter be fixed by the Legislature; and no more than Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund, Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) of which have heretofore been issued and sold. Such bonds or obligations shall be sold for

not less than par value and accrued interest; shall be issued in such forms, denominations, and upon such terms as are now or may hereafter be provided by law; shall be issued and sold at such times, and in such quantities and installments as may be determined by said Board and shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by said Board but the weighted average annual interest rate, in such phrase as commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds may not exceed four and one-half per cent (4 1/2%). All bonds or obligations issued and sold hereunder shall, after execution by the Board, approval by the Attorney General of Texas, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchaser, together with the purchase price, constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas; and all bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board in respect of the purchase and sale of lands hereunder and declared to be general obligations of the State of Texas, in order to prevent default in the payment of principal or interest on any such bonds, the Legislature shall appropriate a sufficient amount to pay the same.

"In the sale of any such bonds or obligations, a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various Teacher Retirement Funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent School Funds.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund shall consist of any lands heretofore or hereafter purchased by said Board, until the sale price therefor, together with any interest and penalties due, have been received by said Board (although nothing herein shall be construed to prevent said Board from accepting full payment for a portion of any tract), and of the moneys attributable to any bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board which moneys so attributable shall include but shall not be limited to the proceeds from the issuance and sale of such bonds; the moneys received from the sale or resale of any lands, or rights therein, purchased with such proceeds; the moneys received from the sale or resale of such lands, or rights therein; the bonuses, income, rents, royalties, and any other pecuniary benefit received by said Board from any such lands, or rights therein, received by way of indemnity or forfeiture for the failure of any bidder for the purchase of any such bonds to comply with his bid and accept and pay for such bonds; or for the failure of any such bidder for the purchase of any lands comprising a part of said Fund to comply with his bid and accept and pay for any such lands; and interest received from investments of any such moneys, on such terms and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law to

moneys of said Fund in conformance with the Constitutional provisions authorizing such bonds; but the moneys of said Fund which are not immediately committed to the payment of such bonds, the purchase of lands as herein provided, or the payment of expenses as herein provided may be invested in bonds or obligations of the United States until such funds are needed for such purposes.

"All moneys comprising a part of said Fund and not expended for the purposes herein provided shall be a part of said Fund until there are sufficient moneys therein to retire fully all of the bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board, at which time all such moneys remaining in said Fund, except such portion thereof as is due to veterans and who have not been sold may be sold or resold to such purchasers, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations, including commissioning, or drafting with a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, the foregoing notwithstanding, any lands in the Veterans' Land Fund which have been first offered for sale to veterans and who have not been sold may be sold or resold to such purchasers, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations, including commissioning, or drafting with a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, as may hereafter be provided by law.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund, to the extent of the moneys attributable to any bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board, as is now or may hereafter be provided by law, for the purpose of paying the expenses of surveying, monumenting, road construction, legal fees, recordation fees, advertising and other like costs necessary or incidental to the purchase, sale, or resale of any lands purchased with any of the moneys attributable to such additional bonds, such expenses to be added to the price of such lands when sold, or resold, by said Board; for the purpose of paying the expenses of issuing, selling, and delivering any such additional bonds; and for the purpose of meeting the expenses of paying the interest or principal due or to become due on any such additional bonds.

"All moneys attributable to the bonds issued and sold pursuant to the Constitutional Amendment adopted on November 6, 1956, shall be credited to said Veterans' Land Fund and may be used for the purpose of purchasing additional lands, to be sold as provided herein, until December 1, 1965; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on such bonds, and when there are sufficient moneys to retire all of such bonds, all of such moneys then remaining or hereafter becoming a part of said Veterans' Land Fund shall be governed as elsewhere provided herein.

"All of the moneys attributable to any series of bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board (a series of bonds being all of the bonds issued and sold in a single transaction as a single installment of bonds) may be used for the purchase of lands as herein provided, to be sold as herein provided, for a period ending eight (8) years after the date of sale of such series of bonds; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on such bonds heretofore issued and sold

shall be set aside for that purpose in accordance with the resolution adopted by said Board authorizing the issuance and sale of such series of bonds. After such eight (8) year period, all of such moneys shall be set aside for the retirement of such bonds hereafter issued and sold and to pay interest thereon, together with any expenses as provided herein, in accordance with the resolution or resolutions authorizing the issuance and sale of such additional bonds, until there are sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds hereafter issued and sold, at which time all such moneys then remaining a part of said Veterans' Land Fund and thereafter becoming a part of said Fund shall be governed as elsewhere provided herein.

"This Amendment being intended only to establish a basic framework and not to be a complete revision of the Veterans' Land Program, there is hereby reposed in the Legislature full power to implement and effectuate the design and objects of this Amendment, including the power to alter, amend, supplement, modify, and amend the Veterans' Land Board as it believes necessary.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this Amendment, such laws shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature.

"This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas so as to increase the Veterans' Land Fund by \$200,000,000; said Fund to be used for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and March 31, 1955; such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law; and

"AGAINST the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas so as to increase the Veterans' Land Fund by \$200,000,000; said Fund to be used for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and March 31, 1955; such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of same Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date set forth in said Amendment; and the Governor shall issue a proclamation in keeping therewith.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this state.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 24 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Article VII, Section 17, providing a method of payment for the acquiring, constructing and equipping of buildings and other permanent improvements at certain state institutions of higher learning; providing for allocation of funds therefor; authorizing the issuance of bonds or notes and the pledging of allotted funds for the payment of same; providing for an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the organization of the Legislature of the State of Texas:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 17 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: "Section 17. In lieu of the state ad valorem tax on property of Seven Cents (7¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation heretofore levied by Section 51 of Article III, as amended, there is hereby levied, in addition to all other taxes permitted by the Constitution of Texas, a state ad valorem tax on property of Two Cents (2¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the continuing payment of Confederate pensions as provided in the Constitution of the State Building Fund as provided in Section 51b, Article III, of the Constitution.

"Also, there is hereby levied, in addition to all other taxes permitted by the Constitution of Texas, a state ad valorem tax on property of Ten Cents (10¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the acquiring, constructing and initially equipping buildings and other permanent improvements at the designated institutions of higher learning provided that none of the proceeds of this tax shall be used for auxiliary enterprises; and the governing board of each such institution of higher learning is fully authorized to pledge all or any part of said funds allotted to such institution as

hereinafter provided, to secure bonds or notes issued for the purpose of acquiring, constructing and initially equipping such buildings or other permanent improvements at said respective institutions. Such bonds or notes shall be issued in such amounts as may be determined by the governing boards of said respective institutions, shall bear interest not to exceed four per cent (4%) per annum, and shall mature serially or otherwise in not more than ten (10) years; provided further, that the state tax on property as heretofore permitted to be levied by Section 9 of Article VIII, as amended, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed Thirty Cents (30¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation. All bonds or notes shall be examined and approved by the Attorney General of the State of Texas, and when so approved shall be incontestable; and all approved bonds shall be registered in the office of the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas. Said bonds shall be sold only through competitive bids and shall never be sold for less than their par value and accrued interest.

"The following state institutions then in existence shall be eligible to receive funds raised from said Ten Cent (10¢) tax levied for the twelve-year period beginning January 1, 1966, and for the succeeding ten-year period: Arlington State College at Arlington; Texas Technological College at Lubbock; North Texas State University at Denton; Lamar State College of Technology at Beaumont; Texas College of Arts and Industries at Kingsville; Texas Woman's University at Denton; Texas Southern University at Houston; Midwestern University at Wichita Falls; University of Houston at Houston; Pan American College at Edinburg; East Texas State College at Commerce; Sam Houston State Teachers College at Huntsville; Southwest Texas State College at San Marcos; West Texas State University at Canyon;

Stephen F. Austin State College at Nacogdoches; Sul Ross State College at Alpine; Angelo State College at San Angelo.

Eighty-five per cent (85%) of such funds shall be allocated by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas on June 1, 1966, and fifteen per cent (15%) of such funds shall be allocated by the Comptroller on June 1, 1972, based on the following determinations: (1) Ninety per cent (90%) of the funds allocated on June 1, 1966, shall be allocated to state institutions based on projected enrollment increases published by the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System for fall 1966 to fall 1978.

(2) Ten per cent (10%) of the funds allocated on June 1, 1966, shall be allocated to certain of the eligible state institutions based on the number of additional square feet needed in educational and general facilities by such eligible state institution to meet the average square feet per full time equivalent student of all state senior institutions (currently numbering twenty-two).

(3) All of the funds allocated on June 1, 1972, shall be allocated to certain of the eligible state institutions based on determinations used in the June 1, 1966, allocations except that the allocations of fifty per cent (50%) of the funds allocated on June 1, 1972, shall be based on projected enrollment increases for fall 1972 to fall 1978, and fifty per cent (50%) of such funds allocated on June 1, 1972, shall be based on the need for additional square feet of educational and general facilities.

"Not later than June first of the beginning year of each succeeding ten-year period the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas shall reallocate eighty-five per cent (85%) of the funds to be allocated from said Ten Cent (10¢) ad valorem tax for said ten-year period and not later than June first of the sixth year of each succeeding ten-year period said Comptroller shall reallocate fifteen per cent (15%) of such funds to the eligible state institutions then in existence based on determinations for the said ten-year period that are similar to the determinations used in allocating funds during the twelve-year period beginning January 1, 1966, except that enrollment projections for succeeding ten-year periods will be from the fall semester of the first year to the fall

semester of the tenth year. All such designated institutions of higher learning shall not thereafter receive any general revenue funds for the acquiring, constructing and equipping of buildings or other permanent improvements for which said Ten Cent (10¢) ad valorem tax is herein provided, except in case of fire, flood, storm, or earthquake occurring at any such institution, in which case an appropriation in an amount sufficient to replace the uninsured loss so incurred may be made by the Legislature out of any General Revenue Funds. The State Comptroller of Public Accounts shall draw all necessary and proper warrants upon the State Treasury in order to carry out the purpose of this Amendment, and the State Treasurer shall pay warrants so drawn on the Public Accounts fund hereby created for said purpose. This Amendment shall be self-enacting. It shall become operative or effective upon its adoption so as to supersede and repeal the former provisions of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas which shall be construed as impairing the obligation incurred by any outstanding notes or bonds heretofore issued by any state institution of higher learning under this Section prior to the adoption of this Amendment but such notes or bonds shall be paid, both as to principal and interest, from the fund as allocated to any such institution.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A.D. 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon: "FOR the Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by providing a method of payment for the acquiring, constructing and equipping buildings and other permanent improvements at certain state institutions of higher learning."

"AGAINST the Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by providing a method of payment for the acquiring, constructing and equipping buildings and other permanent improvements at certain state institutions of higher learning."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

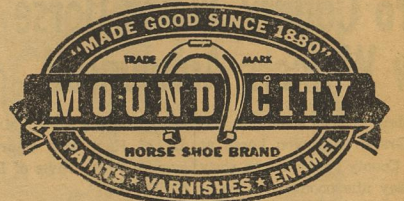

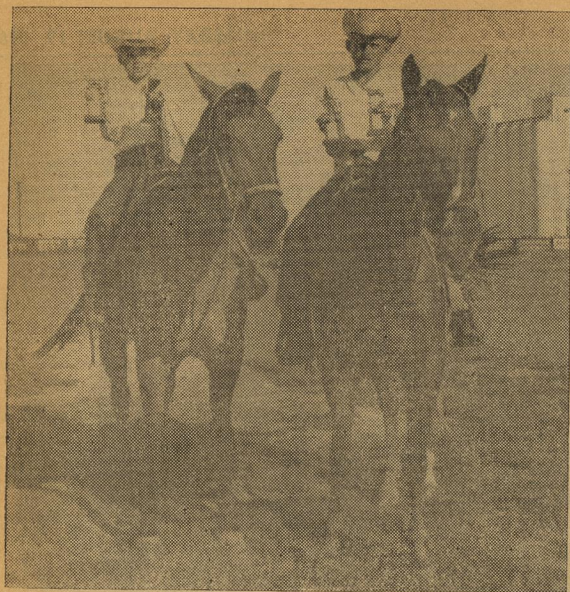

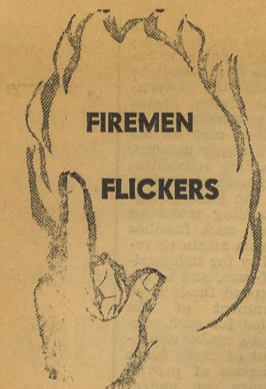
