Scouts Canoe Colorado River

When eleven West Texas Boy Scouts from Lockney, Troop #257, took to the water on the Colorado River, things began to happen. Census Figure Low For Lockney

The Census Bureau has released the preliminary figures for the population of Lockney and, like almost every other town in the area, Lockney has shown a decline, according to the government. The 1970 census shows that Lockney had a population of 2094. The 1980 counts shows a drop to 2062 or a 1.5% decrease.

Mayor Claude Brown and other city officials were also surprised to learn that there are 63 empty housing units in the city. Brown said, "This is hard to believe when I spent half a day last week trying to find a house for a man to live in. I don't feel that this is right. We have too many more water meters now than in 1970."

City Secretary Erma Lee Duckworth said that there were over 100 more

hookups now than in 1970. In 1970, Lockney shows 799 housing units. The preliminary count for 1980 shows 789 units, a decrease of 1.3%.

The population per house showed a decrease from 3.12 persons per household in 1970 to 2.89 persons in 1980.

The city has 10 days to file an appeal on this report. At press time, no decision on the course of action had been taken.

The reason for not accepting this report is that revenue sharing and federal housing funds are based on these census figures. This is why it is so important for an accurate count to be made.

These are preliminary figures and Lockney's decreases are not as large as many area towns, but they are still decreases.

Wright To Preach At Church Of Christ Revival August 10

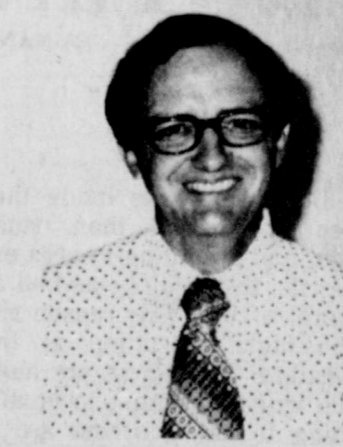

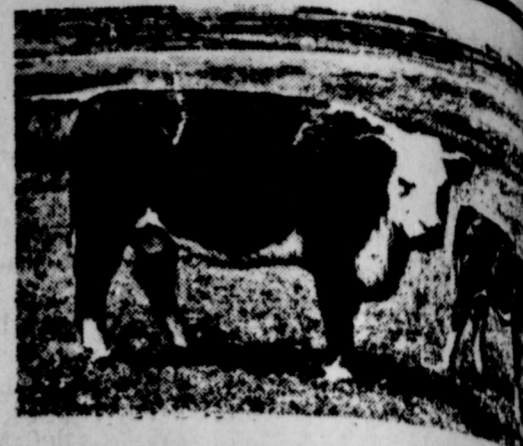

Moderate Drought Conditions Continue To Expand In Tears

Although several sections of Texas received light to moderate rain showers earlier this week, the area of the State encompassed by moderate drought conditions as defined by criteria used by the National Weather Service continues to expand.

Texas Department of Water Resources meteorologists reported at mid-week that more than half of the State is experiencing moderate drought, with a part of the Trans-Pecos region now categorized as having severe drought conditions.

The scattered rainfall in the Dallas-Fort Worth area, the Red River Valley, central East Texas, the eastern part of the Edwards Plateau, and along the Texas coast did not amount to enough to provide any significant runoff into any of the major reservoirs in the State.

While in general the water supply ground in reservoirs and underground aquifers is substantial, many towns and cities continue

either voluntary or mandatory water rationing, principally through "odd-even" day lawn watering to relieve pressure on overtaxed pumping, treatment, and distribution systems. Several small reservoirs supplying towns are now at levels below the pump intakes, and some towns are having to turn to other sources of supply.

The 63 major index reservoirs monitored by the Department held 80 percent of their conservation storage capacity as of July 18, two percent less than reported the previous week, five percent less than at the end of June of this year, and 12 percent less than at the end of June, 1979.

Total storage in these reservoirs amounted to 24,242,278 acre feet. These index reservoirs account for 95 percent of the total conservation storage capacity available in Texas reservoirs, although it should be emphasized that there are more than 180 major reservoirs in the State (those having

500 acre-feet or more total capacity) and many smaller reservoirs.

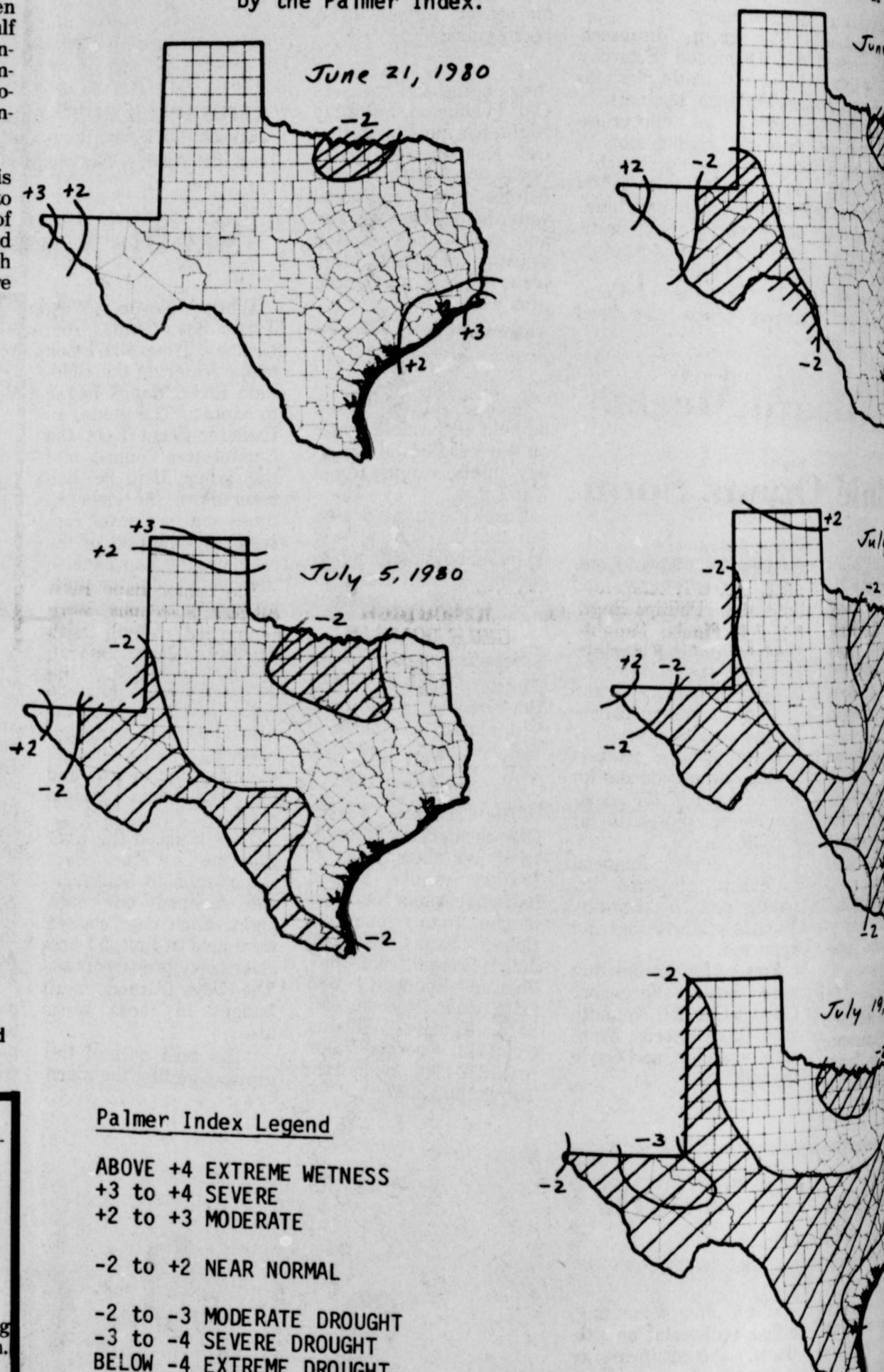
Only two lakes on the IDWR monitoring list remained full at the end of last week, Wright Patman Lake and the Lake O' the Pines. For the first time this year, Lake Cypress Springs dropped below 100 percent of capacity. All of those reservoirs are located in Northeast Texas.

Department meteorologists said the center of the subtropical high pressure ridge shifted to the west last week and allowed a sudden influx of moisture from the Gulf of Mexico, which resulted in increased cloud coverage, lower temperatures, and those scattered showers of light to moderate rainfall.

The extended weather outlook is for the center of the ridge to remain west of Texas for most of the coming week, which would allow any tropical disturbance which might develop in the Gulf to move toward Texas.

91-Year-Old Panhandle Pilgram Recalls Area's Early History

To 91-year-old Clifton Oliver, life is a constant stream of stories. Reminiscing, he tells one story, which reminds him of another, which leads to another and another. After 91 years, Oliver has so many stories to tell because he has done so much during his life.

A conversation with Oliver, of 2215 Bonham, is like a conversation with a history book. He was involved in the early colonization of the Texas Panhandle, participated as a musician in vaudeville acts traveling through Texas, worked for a railroad company "when railroads were king", and worked on a newspaper when the ink for the printing press was rolled over stone.

Oliver grew up in the newspaper business. His father was a professional newspaper man and originally had worked on the Denton Review, serving Denton County, in 1872.

Later, the family was lured to Lockney and Floyd County by the farm and ranch land available to settlers. They made the trip in a covered wagon.

After farming for several years, Oliver's father re-entered the newspaper business in 1902. This time, the elder Oliver leased printing equipment, formerly used for the Lockney Leader, from M.A. Shaw for \$5 a month and founded the Lockney Beacon.

"It was a two-man operation," Oliver said. "We used an old George Washington hand press that is in antique now. Western Newspaper Union in Dallas sent us their national news which came to us by stagecoach. They would print on one side of the paper and leave the other side blank for us to print the local news on. So we only had four pages to print, but that was enough in those days."

"I went to school for half a day, then I would go to help my father. First, he would give me a copy of a local story and I would set the type. That was a painstaking business. I would have to set a little piece of lead for every letter into what we called a styk. I'd finish a line and then start a new styk for the next line."

"When that was done I would have to prepare the roll-hall complexes. The main office for the registration conference will be in Wall Hall.

er. For that, I had a flat, smooth piece of stone set up on a table with ink on it. I'd roll it in the ink, then carry it to the press. Then we'd get the blank side of the paper sent from Dallas and set it down in the printer.

"One of us would press the levers on the machine and roll the press, and the other would pull the copy out. After every copy I had to take that roller back to re-ink it and start all over again," Oliver recalled.

"Darn near everybody in Floyd County subscribed to the paper, but at that time, that was only about 500 families scattered throughout the area. After the printing was done, we would have to address most of the papers and ship them off."

"At my best," he said, "I could run off five or six copies a minute on that old press. Every once in a while, we would have contests to see how many we could do, but we usually ruined a lot of those."

Even with the work involved in printing the Lockney Beacon, Oliver managed to make extra money in various ways.

"As young as I was, I knew the advantage of being diversified. I shined shoes and transported messages, mostly love notes, back and forth across the town. I also scrubbed the only bathtub in Lockney and kept it clean."

"On a good day, I would relay a message from so-and-so to his girlfriend saying he would like to take her to the weekly picnic. Then I would rush over and scrub the bathtub. I'd make about 25 cents on a good day like that," he laughed.

After his father retired from the printing business, young Oliver moved to Plainview to work on the Plainview Herald, which he says was a "cracker-jack paper at the time." Later, he moved to Clovis, working on the Clovis News.

"Clovis was just being put on the map. Land was going for \$21 for 160 acres and they were bringing folks in by the trainload. I was foolish not to buy some of that land."

Oliver's brother, who also had helped at his father's newspaper, pursued a career in journalism and worked for 16 years at the New York Daily News.

It was in Clovis, though, that Oliver became involved in the two things he loves most — music and the railroad business.

In 1912, he went to work for the Santa Fe Railroad in the store department. At that time, he learned to play the tap drums well enough to be in his first orchestra.

When he was transferred by the railroad to Amarillo in 1914, he was determined not to give up on his drum-playing. To keep up with his music, Oliver played in the orchestras for touring vaudeville shows.

"Amarillo got to see some really good shows from the big city. They weren't always supposed to come here, but were booked in other parts of the nation. Traveling across country, these shows would often run out of money when they got to Amarillo and would have to play for the money," he said.

Oliver has antique pictures on every wall of his house, recalling the old vaudeville acts with which he was associated through the years. One picture is of the Dundee Theatre, which was located on Taylor Avenue, between Fourth and Fifth streets where the Amarillo National Bank now stands.

Oliver uses a magnifying glass to read and see pictures, but his memory for names, places, and dates has not been affected in the least.

"Don't forget that I started out in the newspaper business. Even in a small town like Lockney, it was our business to know everything that was going on and to know everybody's names."

Of all Oliver's memories, he said the one that thrills him most happened about 30 years ago.

According to Oliver, a "special" guest conductor for the Amarillo Symphony was in town and was outraged when the drummer for the Symphony called in sick. A member of the orchestra called Oliver, asking if he could come to play in the performance.

Oliver told the man that he had not played in four years, but the man insisted. Oliver went and played, although he had not looked at the music before the performance began.

"That was my happiest moment," he said. "Considering a life as full and complete as Clifton Oliver's, that must have been quite a moment."

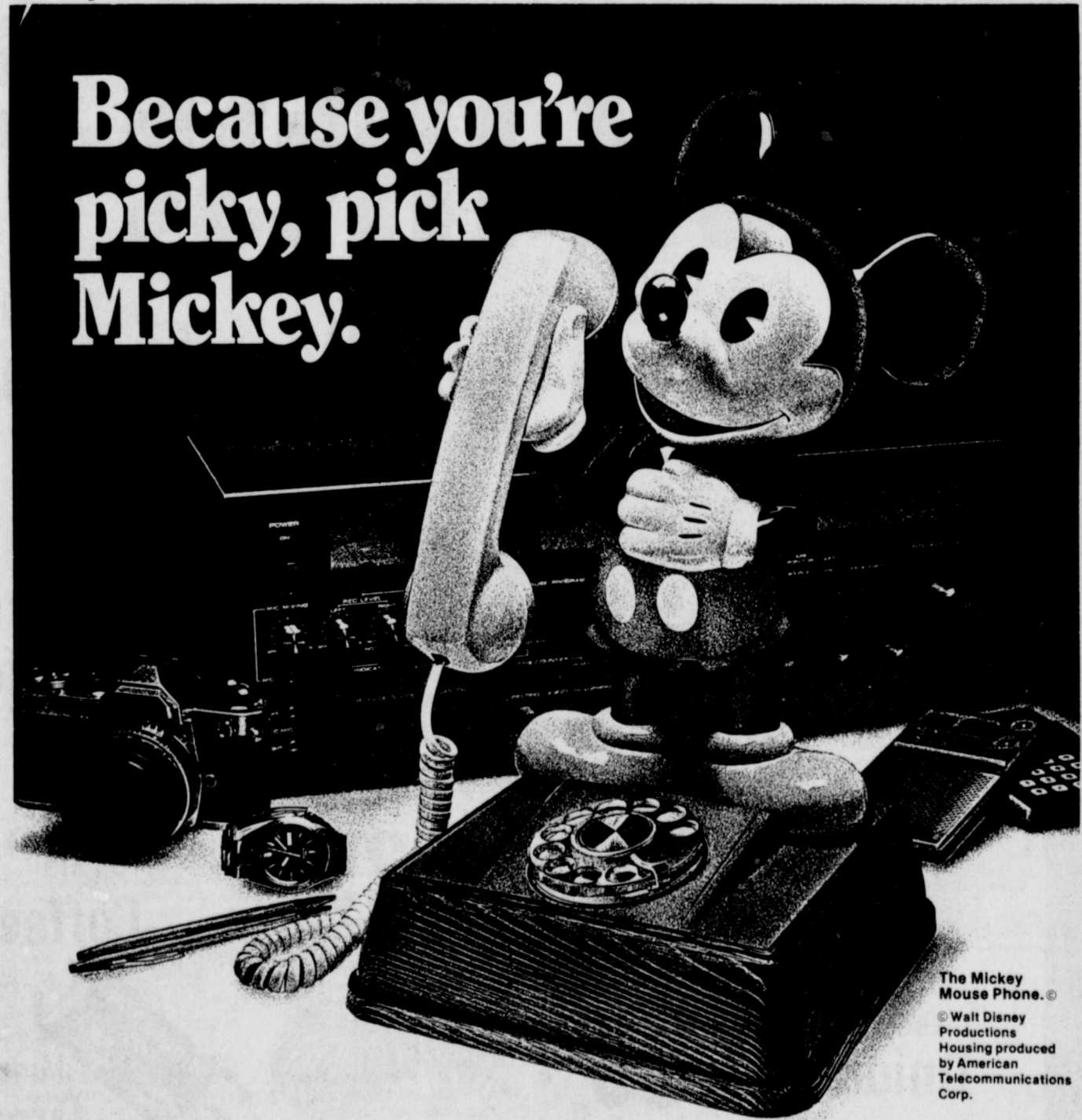

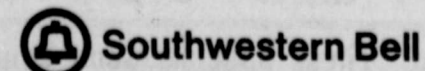

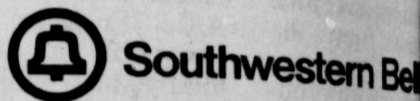
