Commissioners To File Answer To Suit

Mr. and Mrs. I.H. Parks and their attorney met with the County Commissioners at regular court session Monday morning. Petition filed in District Court by C.W. Bond and the Marble Brothers against Mr. and Mrs. Parks and the Commissioners was discussed.

Suit results from a Commissioners Court decision to close a portion of Brown Street in South Plains at the July 14 court.

The petition was filed in District Court on July 23. Defendants named in the suit were I.H. Parks and wife, Maurine Parks and Choise Smith, Aaron Carthel, Bob Jarrett, Grigsby Milton Jr., and James C. (Jack) Lackey in their capacity as members of the Commissioners' Court of Floyd County.

Kenneth Bain, county attorney, was asked to file an answer to the petition on behalf of the Commissioners Court. Commissioners answer will be filed separately.

Commissioner Milton said that their position is that the court did have the authority to close the street.

Court discussed the coming budget and set tentative hearing for September. It is doubtful, however, that the tax assessment figures will be ready in time for the court to set it's rate and have a budget figure they can work with by that date.

Mr. Paul Shawyer, Child Placement Director of the Texas Department of Human Resources met with the Court to give information required for a contract between the County and State Department of Human Resources for participation in a Service Program for Families and Children. A contract will be signed by the Commissioners Court when it is sent from the State at a later date.

Urgent Appeal To Those Who Have Not Been Census Counted

"I likened taking the census to trying to count kids in a swimming pool." Gail Jackson, Floyd County census director, said. "Then someone said it was like trying to count sheep in a pen, and I liked that description even better. People keep moving around and it's hard to keep up with them."

Anyone who knows the bouncy energetic Gail will agree with me that anything she heads up will be run in the most competent manner possible.

"We've counted everyone that wanted to be counted, and even some of those who didn't," she commented laughing. But there is always the human element involved.

There were people who received the long form and either didn't know how to, or didn't want to fill out the entire sheet. There were those with a large family that just got tired of listing all members.

Each of the mail out questionnaires were coded to an address. If the house was vacant the post office gave that form to someone else. "So we might end up with a Mr. Jones coded into a house he's never lived in," Gail said.

There were those who picked up the form at the post office and dropped it in the basket on their out of the building.

Phase I and Phase II of the census schedule has been completed. Phase III, the spot check is being conducted.

It is now up to the individuals who were not counted, who did not fill out a form, to come forward.

Reward Offered In Vandalism

A \$200 reward is being offered by Lloyd Widener, Jr. for information leading to the apprehension and conviction of the person or persons who shot holes in 90' of line on his tailwater return system. The incident happened either on the night of August 9 or 10 on his farm 3 1/2 miles southwest of Lockney.

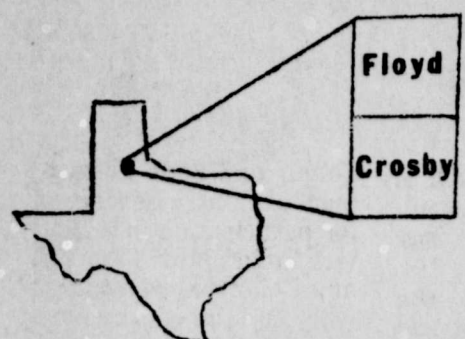

COTTON

Bollworm egg laying activity has increased sharply in Crosby and Floyd Counties over the past several days. The highest activity has been noted in portions of western Floyd County. Up to 90 white eggs per 100 plants were being detected Monday in that area. Of those fields monitored, average egg counts per 100 plants was 35. A slower, but definite, increase is being noted in scouted fields in Crosby County. Private consultant and pest management program scouts have detected up to 24 eggs per 100 plants with most fields averaging about 100 at this time.

The cooler temperatures and overcast days coupled with light to moderate beneficial populations in most fields will result in increased worm survival. While fields are being found each day that require treatment due to previous egg lays we can expect more widespread problems shortly.

Continue making whole plant observations at several field locations to monitor insect activity. Eggs are being found lower on the plant in many cases. Bollworm infestations have varied greatly from one field to the next. Determine the need for control measures by determining the per cent infested plants in each field.

White eggs that are found singly laid on the lower surface of the leaves are likely to be those of the Cabbage Looper. Looper eggs can be separated from those of the bollworm by their flatter appearance on the top and are much more finely ribbed.

After any initial treatment with harsh insecticides at the 10 per cent infested plant level the treatment level should be reduced to 5 per cent of the plants with treatable sized worms. This is due to the reduction of beneficials and the resultant higher survival rate of bollworm eggs and small larvae. About two weeks after initial treatment beneficial numbers may have increased and should be monitored. If key predators can be found on 20 per cent or more of the plants the 10 per cent treatment level should be used.

HOW MUCH IS A BOLL WORTH? Producers need to know the answer to this question if they

are to make sound insect control decisions. Several factors influence the value of a boll. These include, among others, market value of lint, number of bolls to make a pound of lint, percent turnout and yield potential. Early in the season, yield potential is high and we can afford to lose more fruit to weather and insects than we can later in the season when days are cooler and a killing frost is just around the corner. This same cool weather will also increase the number of bolls needed to make a pound of lint. Assuming a 22% turnout, this number could range anywhere from about 400 to 650.

If we assume cotton is going for 50 cents a pound and 450 bolls are equal to a pound of lint, then 900 bolls are worth 1 dollar. This works out so that if roughly 1 boll per 13 row feet (1/1000 of an acre) or 1 boll per 50 or so plants is lost to insect damage, 1 dollar per acre was also potentially lost. This means a producer can pay the spray pilot of 5-10 bolls per 13 row feet or 1-2 bolls per 10 plants are saved from insect damage. Actual numbers depend on chemical and rate used and application cost for bollworm control.

Individual bolls are worth a lot more than you probably guessed. This lesson in economics also demonstrates that scouting (even at \$3.00/acre) is one of the cheapest but smartest crop management investments a cotton producer can make. It doesn't take very many bolls (up to about 3000 per acre) to pay to have your field checked.

Just because a producer can make some money on the surface and still pay the aerial applicator does not necessarily mean that an application is economical. Bollworms have tremendous appetites. One bollworm will consume or destroy approximately 6-8 squares, 1 bloom and 1 boll during its developmental period. Early in the fruiting cycle, when mostly small bolls are found, bollworms can destroy more than 1 boll during its life time. More bolls and fewer squares would be damaged later in the season when squares are hard to find. But, bollworms generally damage only a few locks on full-sized bolls.

SORGHUM

Greenbugs and mites continue to be a problem in sorghum. Cooler temperatures may tend to slow down increases in these pests for a while. Headworms (bollworms and fall army worms) are present in most fields. A convenient way to check for number of heads infested is to shake 20 sorghum heads into a bucket at several field locations.

Case Reins

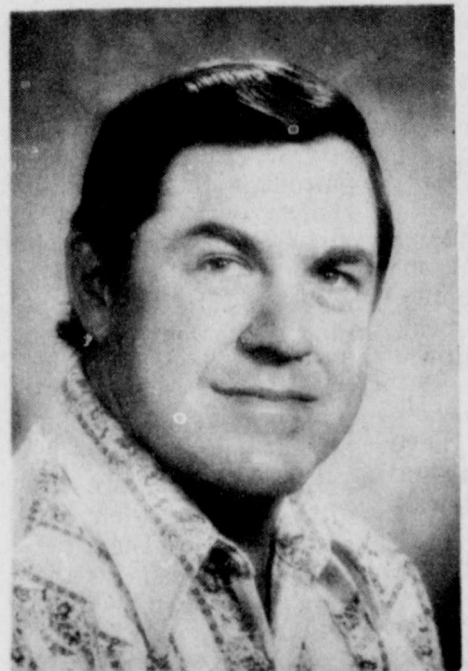

HOW TO AVOID HOT WEATHER PROBLEMS

If you become overexposed to the sun or overexert during extreme heat and humidity this summer, you may get heat cramps, heat exhaustion, or possibly even the rare but serious heatstroke.

Avoiding these hot-weather complications is more than simply a matter of staying in cool or air-conditioned areas and walking on the shady side of the street as important as those precautions are. You'll also need to pay attention to medically sound preventive steps.

1. Wear loose-fitting, light-colored clothing that reflects the sun's rays and allows for better sweat evaporation, and wear a wide-brimmed hat for added protection.

2. Avoid sudden changes of temperature, such as dashing from an air-conditioned building to a hot sidewalk or car. Before getting into a car that's been parked in the sun, open it up for a few minutes.

3. Stick to cool drinks and food and salt your food liberally. Salt tablets are seldom necessary if you have a well-balanced diet. If you feel the need for salt tablets, check first with your doctor. (see #12)

4. Don't over-eat. Don't over-indulge in alcoholic drinks. Your body system needs extra water in hot weather, whether or not your thirst sensation increases. Drink water often, even when you don't feel the urge.

5. Acclimate yourself by limiting exposure to the sun or strenuous outdoor activities to just 15 minutes on the first hot day, adding 15-30 minutes each day over a week or 10 days.

6. Avoid outdoor physical activity between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. whenever possible.

7. When you exercise in the heat, take a 5-10 minute break every half-hour. Don't exercise just before or after meals.

8. Drink plenty of water or salted lemonade when you're exercising. You may have heard that drinking water when

you're hot and active will bring on stomach cramps, but it is not true; you need to keep up your water intake to replace what you're losing in sweat—so drink when you're thirsty.

9. Also take extra precautions whenever the humidity is high during a heat wave. When the relative humidity gets above 60 percent, the air won't absorb as much as sweat as your body needs to get rid of, and by 75 percent relative humidity, it won't absorb any. This, coupled with high temperatures, is particularly dangerous.

10. If the weather is hot and dry, you may not feel sweaty, but in high temperatures you indeed are sweating; the dry air is evaporating the sweat so effectively that you don't get damp skin or soaked clothes. Drink plenty of water; don't be lulled by the false idea that you're not losing any.

11. Take extra care when the official temperature is higher than 85 degrees F. If the official temperature is, say 95 degrees F, it may be well over 105 degrees F on a tennis court or in your backyard garden, even in the shade. Official readings are often taken from towers or high buildings.

12. If you are on a low-salt or salt-free diet, or if you have a chronic disease (heart disease, hypertension, diabetes, or lung disease, for example) high heat and humidity will put an especially heavy burden on you. Consult your doctor before engaging in any unusual activity or changing your salt intake.

13. If you do feel the effects of the heat and humidity—unexplained stomach or arm and leg cramps, extreme fatigue, nausea, headache, or dizziness—get medical attention as soon as possible.

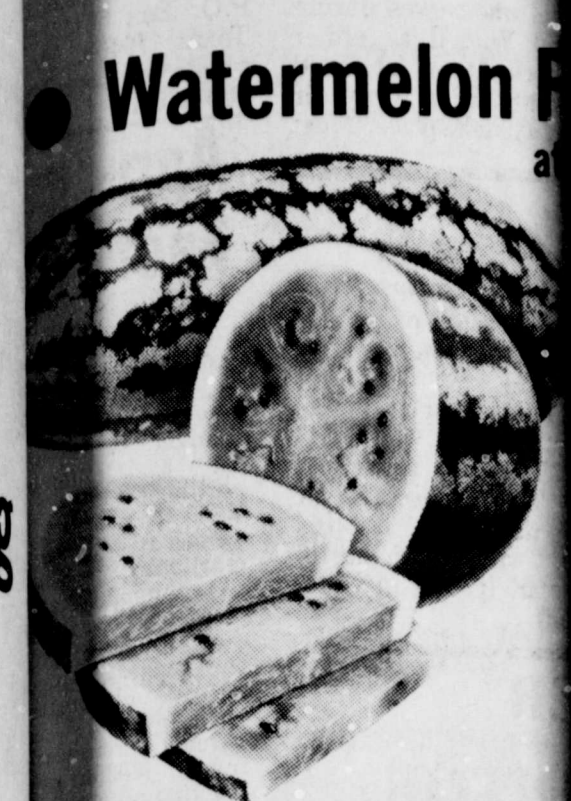

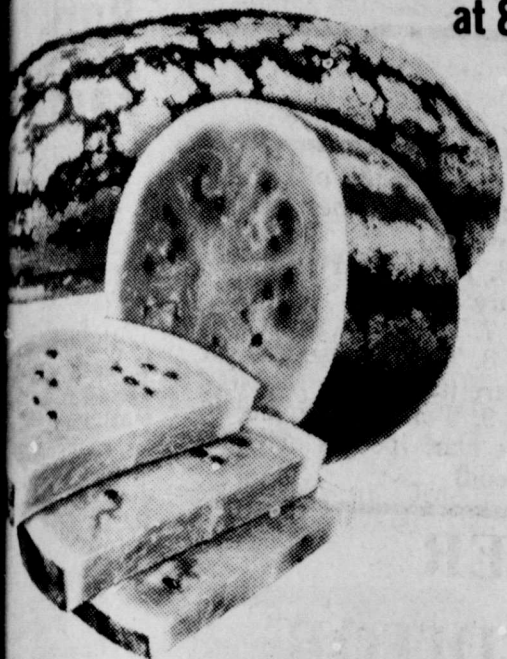

Thorntons Return For From Nova Scotia And East Coast Tour

Kathleen and Owen Thornton and Roy and Oleta Thornton, of Clovis, New Mexico, returned July 21, from a twenty three day bus tour of 22 states and two Provinces in Canada. This is their second tour to make with Roy and Oleta. Last year they toured the Pacific Northwest and the Canadian Rockies.

"We left Amarillo June 29 by Continental Trailways bus and went to Springfield, Missouri and spent our first night there and continued on to Indianapolis, Indiana, for the second night. We spent our third night in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania and stayed across the river from Three Rivers Stadium. The next day we went to Lancaster, Pennsylvania and toured thru the Amish and Pennsylvania Dutch farms. We had dinner that night on an Amish farm.

July 4, we stopped at Hyde Park at Poughkeepsie, New York and visited the home and burial gardens of Franklin D. and Eleanor Roosevelt. Also nearby we visited the Vanderbuilt home, built in 1896, at a cost of 2 1/2 million dollars. After leaving there, we crossed Vermont and New Jersey and spent the night at Concord, New Hampshire.

The next day, July 5, we went to Bangor, Maine and continued thru the rugged North woods of Maine then crossed into New Brunswick, Canada and drove along the St. Andrews by the sea and along the Bay of Fundy. We spent that night at St. Johns, New Brunswick. While we were there we visited the reversing falls rapids. We continued from New Brunswick to Halifax, Nova Scotia. The two days we spent there, we wore our coats buttoned up as the highest temperature was 46 degrees. We had a guided tour of the city and visited "Old Fort" that was built on the highest hill in Nova Scotia. While we were in Halifax, we went to a fishing village, complete with a lighthouse, that is the favorite meeting place for the artist. It was called Peggy's Cove.

From Halifax, we went thru Evangeline country and spent the night in Yarmouth. From there we took a ship, the "Caribe," from the Bay of Fundy and had a 10 hour boat ride and docked at Portland, Maine.

We boarded the bus and went to Boston, Massachusetts where we spent the next two nights. While we were in Boston, we visited the Boston Common, the old South Church, the old North Church, Bunker Hill, Harvard Square, Harvard University, Cambridge Common and then drove on to Plymouth. In Plymouth, we saw the Miles Standish Monument, the John and Pracilla Alden Monument, and a house built by Alden in 1653 that is still preserved and owned by one of his descendants. We saw Plymouth Harbour, the Mayflower II, and Plymouth Rock. The next day we drove across Connecticut into New York City.

In New York City, we saw the Statue of Liberty,

Chinatown, the Bowery, Wall St., 5th Avenue, Central Park, and the Cathedral of St. John Devine. We went to Radio City Music Hall, and attended a play, "Manhattan Show Boat," featuring the Rockettes. We tried to get tickets to see "Annie" or "Oklahoma," but they were not available.

When we left New York City, we drove down to Philadelphia and visited the Liberty Bell, Independence Hall, and the home of Betsy Ross, then drove on into Washington, D.C. that night. We spent two nights there and toured the city and visited the Capitol Building, the White House, Arlington National Cemetery, and went to Mt. Vernon to see the home of George Washington. While we were in Washington, D.C. we rode the Metro system, which is underground and circles the whole city. It has the longest escalator in the world and when you reach the bottom, it's the equivalent of three miles underground. The people and employees use the Metro 90% of the time, as parking spaces are not available. They have shopping centers and all sorts of shops for the convenience of the people. The trains run every 15 minutes.

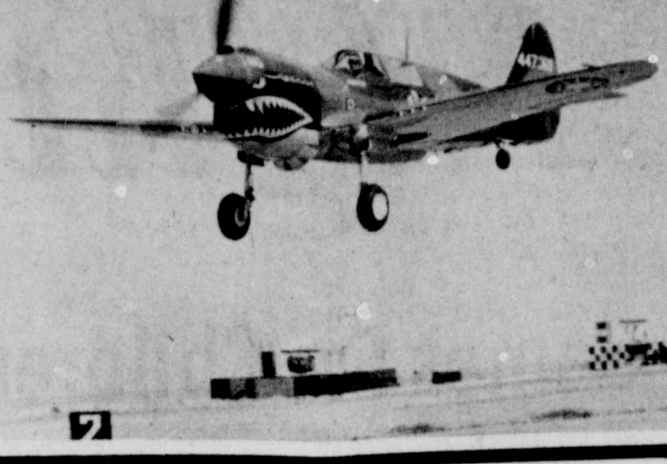
After we left Mt. Vernon, we went to Richmond, Virginia and visited the capitol building, which was designed by Thomas Jefferson, then on to Jamestown, which was the first permanent English settlement in the New World, settled in 1607. We spent two nights in Williamsburg, Virginia and went thru Colonial Williamsburg, which has been completely restored.

The next day we crossed Southern Virginia into Winston-Salem, North Carolina where we stopped and had lunch and continued to Asheville, North Carolina. When we left Asheville, we crossed the great Smokey Mountains and went into Maggie's Valley. Kathleen thought that was the most beautiful place that she had seen on the whole trip. From Maggie's Valley, we went to Cherokee. That is the place where the Indians were driven out of the country by the settlers after their raids and attacks on the early pioneers.

We went on to Gatlinburg and continued to Knoxville into Nashville. We attended the new Grand Ole Opry and saw Earnest Tubb, Grand Pa Jones, Roy Acuff and many other country and western performers. We spent the next night at Ft. Smith, Arkansas, where we had our farewell

banquet. Kathleen and I were asked to put the program on for the banquet, so Kathleen planned the program and wrote a poem about every person on the bus and I acted as M.C.

The next day, July 21, we drove to Oklahoma City and had lunch then drove on to Amarillo, which was the end of our 23 day tour of the historic East Coast.




