Sorghum Crop Prospects The 1980 grain sorghum crop has by this summer's much as one-thir Elibert Harp, executive director of
Grain Sorghum Pre Grain Sorghum Producers Associa
tion. "The crop could be off as
much as fifty much as fifty percent if general
rains don't fall in the next two
weeks throughout much of weeks throughout much of the
sorghum belt,", he said.
Harp reported a telephone survey herp reported a telephone surve
he conducted during the last wee
of July. "The crops of July. "The crops are now in
critical condition even where they
had not suffered earlier in the had not suffered earlier in the
year," he said. "The crops have
gone as ar as they gone as far as they can go without
rain and they will deteriorate rapidly from this point. Even irrigited
crops have suffered from the excrops have. suffered from the ex
treme heat."
Harp found that much of the crop
is beyond the point of is beyond the point of return. Large
areas are beeng baled as hay,
copped as ensilage, or grazed out These areas include, a region west
and south of San Antonio. Texas
and another strip through North and another strip through North
Texas, oklahoma, Southeaster
Kansas and Missouri. Kansas and Missouri.
The irrigated crops of the Texas
High Plains and Western Kansas are fair, but need supplemental rai
