Farmers Faced

With Problems

Among major problems faced by the agricultural industry during the 1980s will be the cost-price squeeze, the decline of small, independent farms, and the threat of having no succeeding generations of young farmers and ranchers.

Those threats to continued food and fiber production were outlined by Dr. Daniel C. Pfannstiel, director of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, while addressing an awards banquet during the annual meeting of the Texas County Agricultural Agents Association in San Antonio August 5.

More than 625 people registered for the annual professional meeting. The banquet honored seven outstanding agricultural leaders who were each named a "Man of the

Year in Texas Agriculture" by the

state county agents association. Award recipients were Carrol G. Chaloupka, Dalhart farmer and rancher and president of the Texas Farm Bureau for the past five years; J.T. Smith, former farm editor with the Abilene Reporter News; Harvey W. Loupee with the Lloyd Justiss Farms, Inc., of Daingerfield; Joe Mertz, San Angelo rancher and newly elected president of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association; Jerry D. Nichols, Nacogdoches County farmer and banker; Don Jobes, Jr., assistant general Show and Rodeo; and Susan Gurley McBee, state representative from

Del Rio. Pfannstiel tabbed the award recipients as the "cream of the crop" among Texas agricultural leaders and noted that they have provided strong and effective leadership in dealing with the problems agriculture is facing in the '80s.

"The many contributions of these leaders to improving agricultural production efficiency, improving practices adaptable for small operators, and inspiring young farmers and ranchers have led to this honor," he said.

"To cope with day-to-day pro-blems and issues, people still look to their leaders for assistance," noted the Extension official. "Leaders are people who care about other people and who try to consider as many positive and negative consequences as they can before acting to the greatest benefit to the greatest number."

To deal with the cost-price squeeze, production agriculture needs solutions which can help reduce or at least stabilize its dependency on the highest cost forms of energy, said Pfannstiel. He pointed out that practical applications of energy research for agricul-ture are needed not more than ever before.

Pfannstiel also emphasizsed that agricultural producers are vulnerable to highly inflationary, speculative land values and that political leaders need input from agricultural leaders on this situation.

The Extension official noted that medium and small-sized farm and ranch operations continue to be the hardest hit by unparalleled agricultural production cost increases." Quietly but surely, these operations have been absorbed by either large agricultural conglomerates or into nonagricultural ventures," Pfanns-

For those unconcerned about this situation, he rephrased the adage "Don't cry over spilled milk" to "who will cry when there is no

This dilemma is depicted in the threat of having no succeeding generations of young farmers and ranchers.

Many of today's children are receiving a negative image about agriculture, Pfannstiel said. The large salaries and seemingly glamourous lifestyles of non-agricultural occupations are held up to youth from agricultural families as being


Pfannstiel challenged farm and ranch parents and leaders to actively emphasize the positive values of following agricultural occupations. "Our country's well-being, indeed the world's present and future well-being, depends largely on the success of American agriculture," he emphasized.

bollworm egg lay continues for most areas. Fields in corn producing areas apparently are receiving pressure from corn earworms (bollworms) since egg counts of up to 99 per 100 plants are still being reported. Cabbage looper eggs can be found in high numbers in some

As long as warm weather and irrigation continues we can expect to see bollworm activity in cotton. When evening temperatures start

dipping to the mid - 50's expect egg laying activity to decrease. Also when cotton reaches a point when few new squares are being produced bollworm populations often collapse and cease to be a problem.

Mature bolls can now be found in all fields. When considering trying

to make cotton from blooms at this point in time consider the following chart that shows the probability of producing mature bolls from flowers at different dates. This information is from research conducted at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Lubbock over a 14 year period. Date of White Bloom

Corn harvest has started in some fields this week. Most of it has only been sampled and is still too wet to cut. More should be cut next week. The prospect on the yields is looking more favorable now than it was several weeks ago. Corn farmers are now hoping for the yields to be around 7,000-8,000 lbs.

Cotton is still being plagued with bollworms. Some of the lower bolls are opening now. One farmer said that he had open bolls on the bottom of the stalk, bollworms eating in the middle of the stalk, blooms on the top of the plant, and water running down the rows.

The cotton prices are really looking good. Contracts of 3000 points over the 1980 loan are being offered and the talk from buyers is that prices could hit \$1 this fall. We have heard that kind of talk several years ago and it didn't materialize but hopefully this year it will come

Loading cars and pickups with all their wordly belongings, college students are returning to campus. Freshman are looking forward to more independence and possibly worrying a bit about how they will get along with that new roommate. For most the fear of the unknown will quickly fade as the anticipation gives way to the routine of settling into a different life style. Being away from home gives a heady sense of freedom and most will cope well.

While across the land another group is gathering courage to assault the hallowed halls of learning. Growing in number and courage, these students have a different focus and perspective. They are beginning a college education after a 20-year lapse, during which they married and raised a family. Some are picking up an interrupted college career and others are "first-

How will they fare? Comparatively well, say most educators. These students are more serious and committed. Their goals are clearly defined. The mature students bring a wealth of experience that challenges the

The largest influx of more mature students occurred after World War II when Veterans flooded the campus, impatient to finish their education and get on with the business of making a living. stalls? Check your policy to see if it contains "towing and labor" coverage. If so, a good part of your expense will be covered. Expenses covered would include the towing of the vehicle to be repaired and labor costs, if performed at the place of disablement. An example of labor performed might include service charges for jumping a battery or changing a flat tire. However, the repair of the tire would not be covered . . . only the charge of the labor in changing it. With "towing and labor" coverage, there is usually a maximum liability paid for each occurence.

Fireplaces add a great deal

to a room's atmosphere and comfort but can also detract

by letting air escape. One solution is a wood and metal fireplace screen. A less expensive solution is to build an attractive fireplace

build an attractive fireplace mask. Begin by measuring the opening. Build a frame of 1x2s which will fit tightly into the opening. Use a staple gun to staple a strip of 34" foam rubber or other insulating material around all sides of the frame. Cut a piece of ½" plywood two

all sides of the frame. Cut a piece of ½" plywood two inches larger than the top and sides of the fireplace opening. Nail the plywood to the frame. From a length of 2x4 cut a base which will extend four inches beyond each side of the plywood panel. Notch out a ½ inch strip from one edge of the

strip from one edge of the 2x4 base for the bottom

edge of the plywood panel to fit into. Round and sand smooth all edges of the 2x4 base. For a finished look, nail molding to the face of the plywood panel.



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


