Around The County

Most of the grain elevators in Floyd and surrounding counties were open during the Labor Day weekend to accommodate many farmers who have begun this year's corn harvest. With moisture tests hitting well below the 20 percent mark on most of the corn samples brought in, corn producers will no doubt get serious this week about harvesting some of that earlier corn. Some problems have been developing with armyworms, earworms and even corn borers eating through the shank between the ear and the stalk causing many ears to drop before they can be harvested. Producers may want to check their corn fields to determine whether it would be more profitable to harvest corn at a wetter stage and be docked at the elevator or let it set a little longer and, if there is a worm problem present, take a chance on a yield reduction due to shank damage. Preliminary yield reports indicate below average yields all across the area, but not near as low as predicted earlier in the growing season.

Cotton bolls have opened up on many of the dryland fields that have given up and also cotton bolls on the bottom of many irrigated plants are opening up across the county. Some

Grain Prospects Down For 1980

The 1980 grain sorghum crop has been reduced as much as one-third by this summer's drought, reported Elbert Harp, executive director of Grain Sorghum Producers Association. "The crop could be off as much as fifty percent if general rains don't fall in the next two weeks throughout much of the sorghum belt," he said.

Harp reported a telephone survey he conducted during the last week of July. "The crops are now in critical condition even where they had not suffered earlier in the year," he said. "The crops have gone as far as they can go without rain and they will deteriorate rapidly from this point. Even irrigated crops have suffered from the extreme heat."

Harp found that much of the crop is beyond the point of return. Large areas are being baled as hay, chopped as silage, or grazed out. These areas include a region west and south of San Antonio, Texas and another strip through North Texas, Oklahoma, Southeastern Kansas and Missouri.

The irrigated crops of the Texas High Plains and Western Kansas are fair, but need supplemental rain and cooler weather. Western Kansas is spotted with much of the crop still in fair condition, provided rains fall very soon. The same is true of Nebraska.

Most of South Texas and South Central Texas sorghum matured before the onset of the heat wave. Harvest there produced fair-to-good yields.

The drought is already affecting market prices. Short crop prospects have strengthened prices to the "call level" for sorghum in the reserve program. On July 25, the last of the reserve sorghum was called. This means that more than 80 million bushels of sorghum will be forced into the market within 90 days following the call.

If the market continues to strengthen, reserve corn will be called. Then, over a billion bushels of reserve corn will be dropped into the market. (USDA is presently considering a plan to raise the call levels.) The "called" grain will tend to hold a ceiling on prices—at least temporarily.

The extent of damage to the corn crop will ultimately determine the price of both corn and sorghum. Some analysts are now predicting the 1980 corn crop to be 6.4 billion bushels or less. If the corn crop drops below this level, all reserve stocks will be absorbed and both corn and sorghum prices will remain strong throughout the coming year.

dryland fields are being plowed up in preparation for wheat planting. Irrigated cotton looks good in most parts of the county with most plants carrying a fairly heavy fruit load despite the uncooperative weather experienced this summer. Bollworm activity has slowed down with the onset of cooler nighttime temperatures and pressure from a growing population of beneficial insects seen in most fields; however, heavy worm and egg counts continue to be reported in the more lush fields in the county.

Some fields of sunflowers have been harvested while other late planted fields are still blooming.

Soybeans look better than expected with many plants carrying heavy pod loads despite weather and continued insect problems.

Many producers are still holding out for a rain to sow wheat on this year, but some have given up and started sowing anyway. It appears that wheat acreage will be up again this year.

Bell pepper harvest has begun in a few fields in the county and should be well underway within the next two to three weeks. Pepper growers continue to be hampered by thin, underproductive stands due to weather and insect pressure from nearby corn and cotton fields.

FCIC Seeking Floyd County Comments

The Federal Crop Insurance (FCIC) of the Department of Agriculture is seeking public comment on a proposed amendment to regulations for insuring soybeans in Floyd County, effective with the 1981 crop year.

The proposed rule would benefit soybean crop insurance policy holders by amending two sections of the Soybean Crop Insurance Policy to prescribe procedures for allowing them to replant acreage to soybeans under certain conditions and to become eligible for a replanting payment under certain conditions.

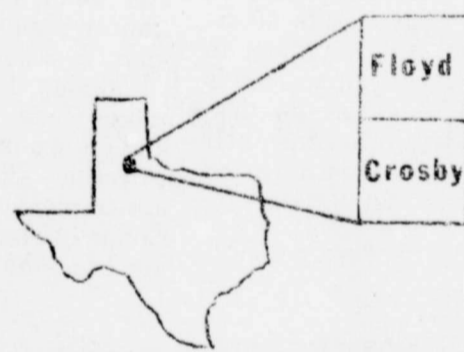

that can be considered safe from bollworm attack.

Reports from pest management program field scouts from last week indicated the following bollworm populations. For Floyd County egg counts of 5 to 87 and worm numbers of 0 to 21 for every 100 plants were recorded. One field was observed with 40 per cent of the plants infested with bollworms. In Crosby County 0 to 13 eggs and 0-12 worms per 100 plants were reported.

A continuous egg-lay in some fields has resulted in a few more

small worms each week. We can expect continuing problems until the temperatures drop to a point where egg laying activity ceases and cotton plants terminate growth.

SORGHUM

Headworms (bollworms and fall armyworms) are present in developing sorghum heads. Checks fields in several locations to determine the percent infested heads. In seed production fields numbers approaching one per head will cause economic damage.

The cotton is opening fast this week. If this continues, there should be some defoliation beginning in about two weeks to some fields.

Cotton prices are still going up. Wednesday contracts were at 3400 points over the 1980 loan. The outlook on yields varies greatly throughout the county. The dryland that has not been plowed up will not yield much while some of the irrigated crop should make over a bale per acre. Some estimates are as high as 1 1/2 bales per acre.

Corn harvest is increasing each day. Some of the fields are still too wet. Most of the corn is running around 25% moisture at this time. Yields are ranging from around 6,000-6,500 lbs. to over 9,000 lbs.

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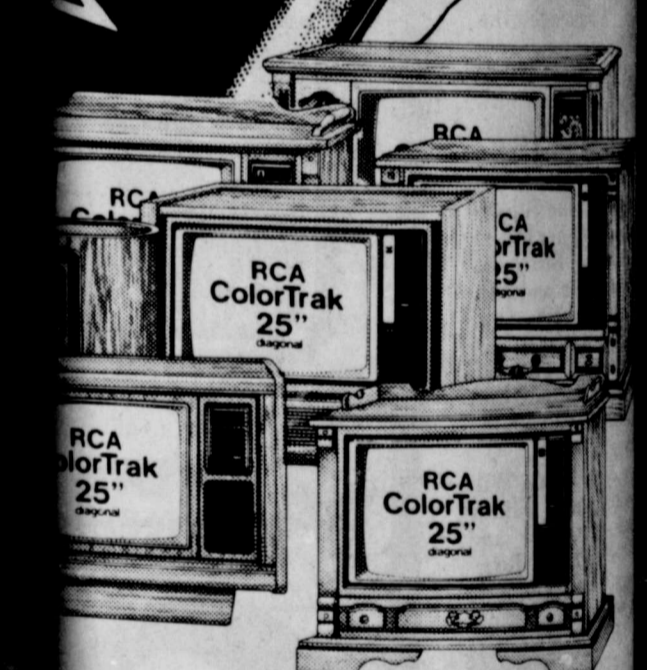
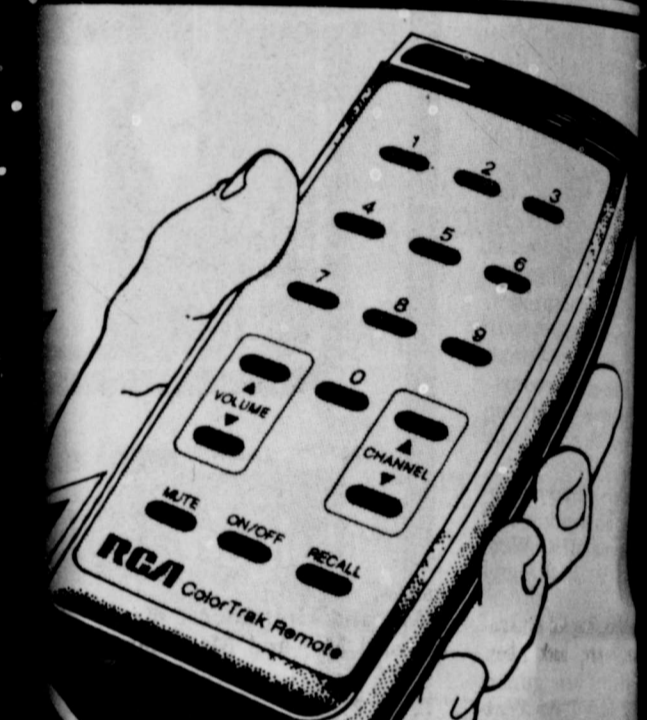
Marathon Runners

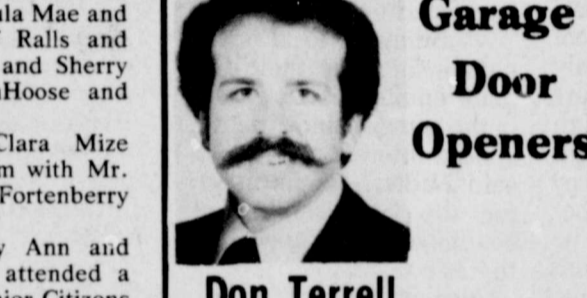

Coleman Recalls Potential Leaking Stove And Lantern Fuel

The Coleman Company, Inc. reported June 27 that approximately 7,000 one-gallon containers of liquid camping fuel marketed by it in Texas and areas of Oklahoma, Louisiana, Arkansas and New Mexico bordering on Texas may leak. Containers should not be returned to places of purchase or transported in motor vehicles without proper tie-down technique. Empty containers should be disposed of in a safe manner. Above will be made available for a free of charge if the fuel is not used.
