Mustangs To Attend LHS Homecoming

The Olton Mustangs come to Lockney this Friday night and will try to spoil the Longhorns record of 2-0 and Lockney's homecoming. Olton brings an identical record into the game but they also bring a 23rd state Harris Poll rating while Lockney holds the 98th position.

The Mustangs are big, averaging 207 pounds on both the offensive and defensive lines. Lockney averages 185 pounds. Olton has a big play offensive led by one of the best backs in the area, Danny Garcia, 165 pound senior halfback. Garcia is a state Golden Glove boxer and a state track contender. He has made all-district in football for two years. Their offense also features Greg Smith, a 160 pound senior quarterback, Doug Smith, a 275 pound tackle who plays both offense and defense and Roy Luera, their 160

pound flanker who is Smith's primary receiver. The Olton defense is quick, aggressive and strong.

Olton beat Hale Center 23-0 in their season opener and then beat Abernathy 12-6 last week. The Longhorns will be without the services of Phillip Kidd who sustained a knee injury in the Petersburg game. The extent of the injuries is not known at this time. Tony Rodriguez will be playing in the Olton game but will be doing so with a pulled groin muscle. Javier Rodriguez is still out and will be for at least two more weeks.

Lockney goes into the game a two touchdown underdog.

Pre-game activities and the coronation of Homecoming Queen will begin at 7:15 and the game is scheduled to begin at 8 p.m.

LATE FERTILIZER APPLICATION FOR WHEAT?

Recent rains in Floyd County have changed our wheat prospects. With a little more rain, our winter grazing situation should improve. Our Floyd County producers would certainly welcome this.

If you are or have planted wheat for 1981, you should have some idea about the nitrogen level in your soil. This plant nutrient is extremely important for both our dryland and irrigated producers. If (there is that word again) sufficient moisture is received for heavy grazing this winter, then additional nitrogen will be needed. For both the irrigated and dryland producers, a soil test is the best investment to understand your soil nitrogen level for 1981.

Drought and Summer Tilled

Last year many of our producers have grazed out their wheat land and we also had cotton land plowed up due to the drought. Much of this soil will have carry-over fertilizer but a soil test will help reduce the

odds of running short on nitrogen this next year.

Nitrogen Removal

With moderate grazing, wheat will remove about two pounds per acre of nitrogen per bushel harvested. Your yield goal dictates the total required nitrogen. Part of the required nitrogen can be obtained from our Floyd County soil. The remainder of our required nitrogen must be from applied fertilizer. If the soil has adequate nitrogen for stand establishment, our dryland producers may want to wait and top dress just prior to wheat joint. This usually occurs in late February or early March.

If you need information on soil test forms for sampling your wheat and contact me at the Floyd County Extension Office.

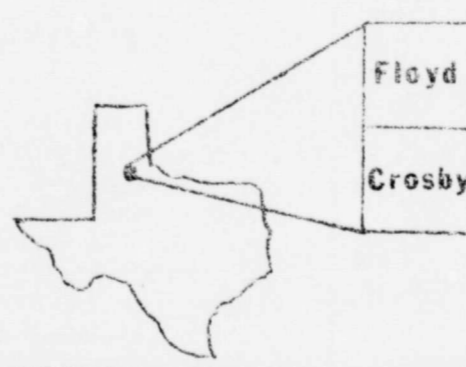

COTTON

Our recent rains and unseasonably warm temperatures have prolonged the concern about insect problems this year. Some cotton is starting to green back up and produce squares again. In most fields the majority of bolls are past the point in their development that continued bollworm infestations should be a worry. Only in those fields that have a substantial number of half-grown bolls does the possibility of economic infestations exist.

While newly laid eggs and small worms can be found in a few scattered areas at this time survival of both eggs and worms has been low. Flights of bollworm moths have been noted during the daytime in some cotton fields. Increased natural beneficial insect activity has eliminated the problem in many cases. Infertility of bollworm eggs is increasing. With cooler daytime temperatures forecast for the next few days it looks like fall and the end of the insect season (at least in cotton.)

WHEAT

Emerging wheat has some problems. Some producers have reported problems with greenbugs and have been reported to emerge before the wheat should be checked for insects. SMALL GRASSHOPPER APPRAISAL at the County Extension Office will help you with your management decisions.

Farm Bureau Urges Members To Vote In November

Floyd County Farm Bureau is joining other county Farm Bureaus across the state in an effort to get out a large rural vote in the coming November 4 general election.

Members who do not have valid voter registration cards are reminded to get them soon. The deadline for having the application for the card in the voter registrar's office at the Floyd County Court House is October 3.

Although Farm Bureau is strictly non-partisan, the organization encourages its members to become active in contributing money, time and work to the candidate of their choice.

The membership in the local county Farm Bureau represents a possible 1700 votes. The Texas Farm Bureau has more than half a million potential voters and the American Farm Bureau Federation represents a potential of almost seven million votes nationally.

County Farm Report

Harvest is going on in the county for several crops. The first bale of cotton has been received in Lockney and in Floydada and the first load of milo is in. Corn harvest is still going on and a large number of acres of cotton have been defoliated and should be ready for harvest by the end of the month.

Wheat planting is underway with enough moisture present to get the wheat up in most cases.

The markets for grain on Wednesday after were:
Milo/cwt. — 5.50
Corn/cwt. — 5.90-5.95
Wheat/bu. — 3.95-4.02
Soybeans/bu. — 7.25-7.37

The cotton market has really fluctuated this past week. The government crop estimate came out on Thursday and the predictions were that the crop would be down about 20% from last year. The market went up in anticipation of this report and followed the trend on Friday. October futures hit 97.77 on Friday afternoon and contracts hit 3700 points over the 1980 loan. Monday, the buyers cooled off considerably and the market dropped the limit. On Tuesday, the market dropped 300 points and Wednesday it dropped 216 points. Contracts, if you could find one, were going for 3300 points over the loan.

Most feeling is that the reason for the drop in prices is because cotton was pricing itself out of the market for competition with the synthetics. Floydada Livestock Sales was running a special Stocker and Feeder sale on Wednesday and

were selling 200 head of cattle. They were unable to give a complete report but did say that the general trend was \$2-\$3 higher on all classes.

To move the ball, McCormick was once again punted and gained good yardage on the run. A Buff first quarter completed pass to McCormick after the second

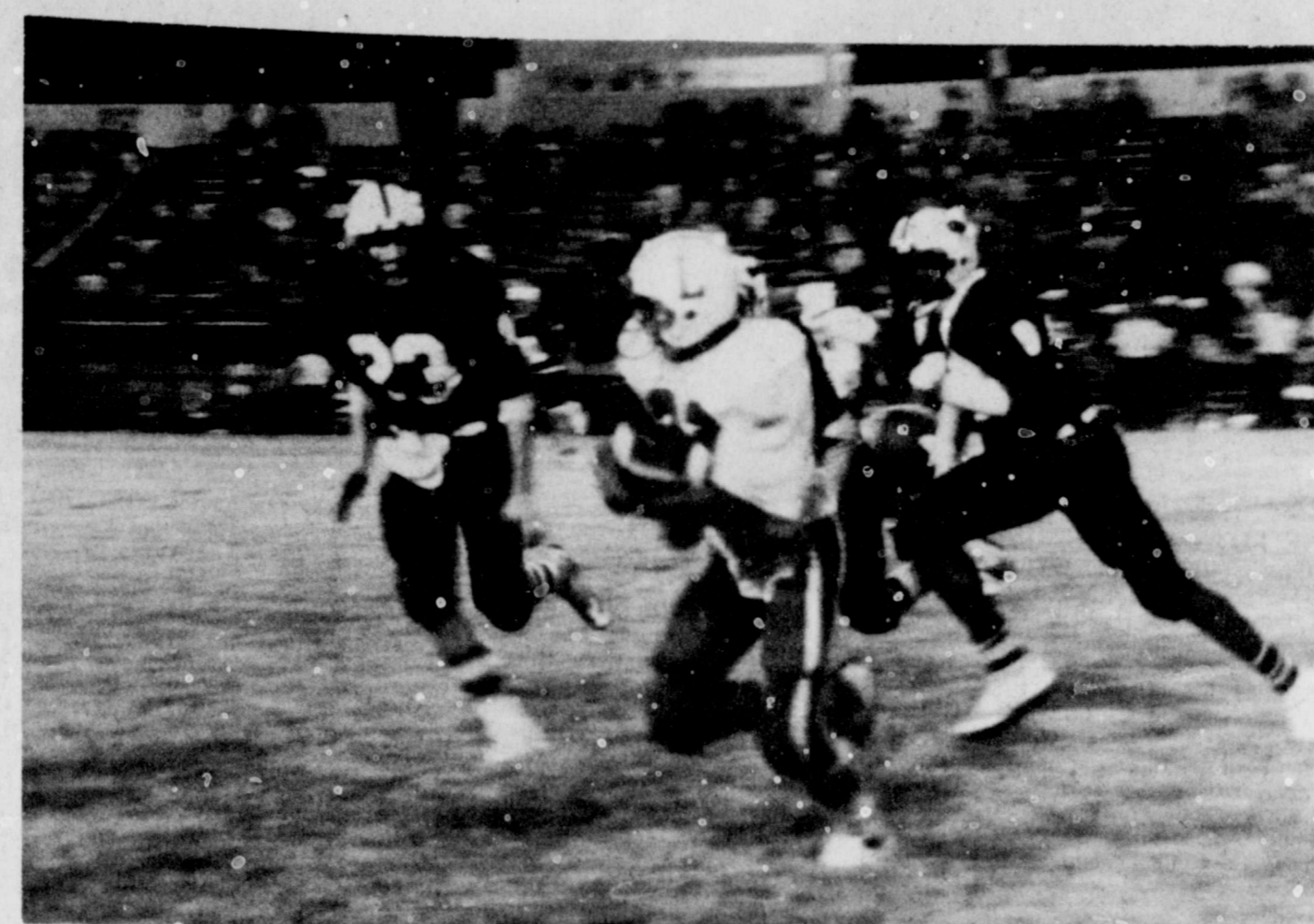
quarter. The PAT was good bringing the score to 17-0.

The second half began with Lockney receiving the kickoff. The Horns then moved down the field with good running by Junior McDonald and McCormick. They moved the length of the field and scored on six plays. McDonald crossed the goal line with 9:08 on the third quarter clock. The PAT was no good and the score was 17-13.

Petersburg returned the Lockney punt to their 37 and a 3rd down pass attempt, was blocked by John Cummings and the Buffs had to give up the ball but not for long because Lockney fumbled the punt and the Buffs recovered. But they could not move against the Horn defense and punted to the Lockney 10. The Horns moved up the field again in five plays to the Petersburg 9 yard line and John Cummings then passed to Mike Arellano for the third Longhorn TD. McCormick then ran to the Petersburg 25 yard line and after three attempts to pick up a first down, Fidel Blanco booted a 39 yard field goal with 10:20 remaining in the game to end the scoring in the game.

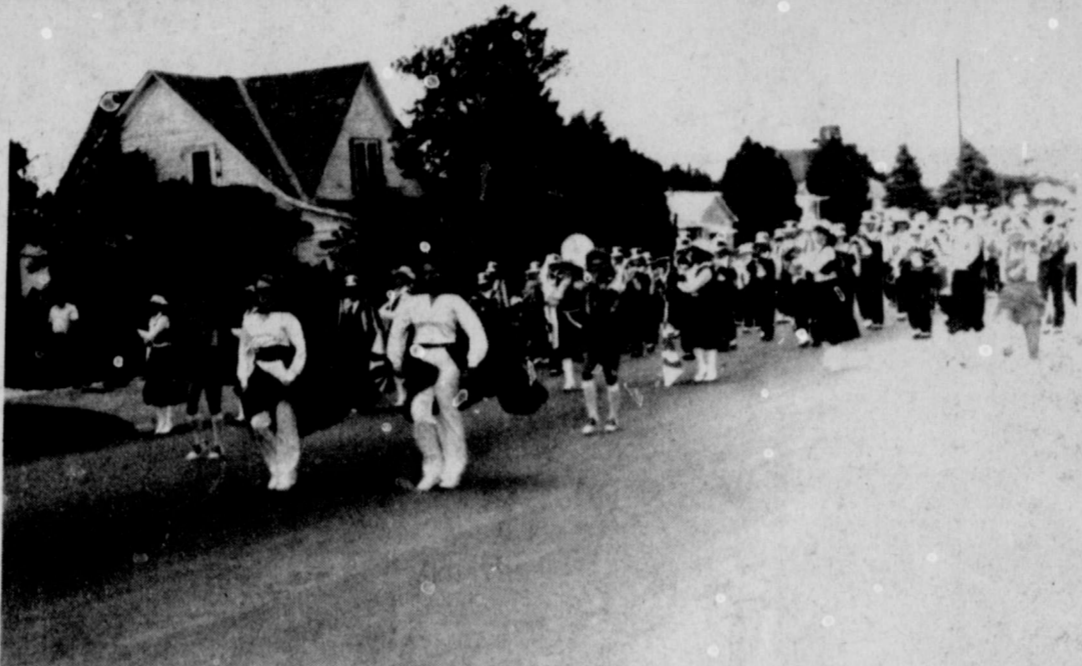

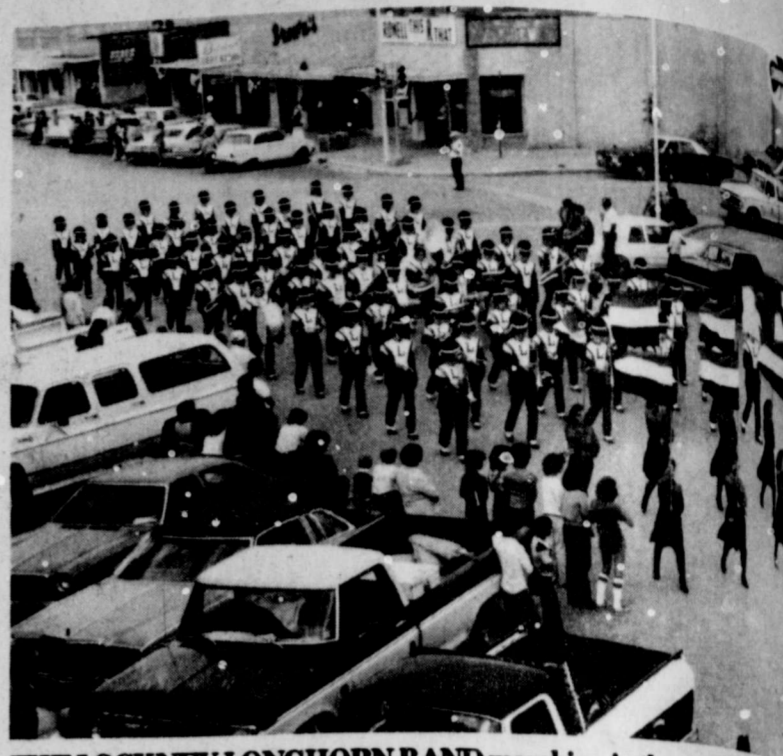

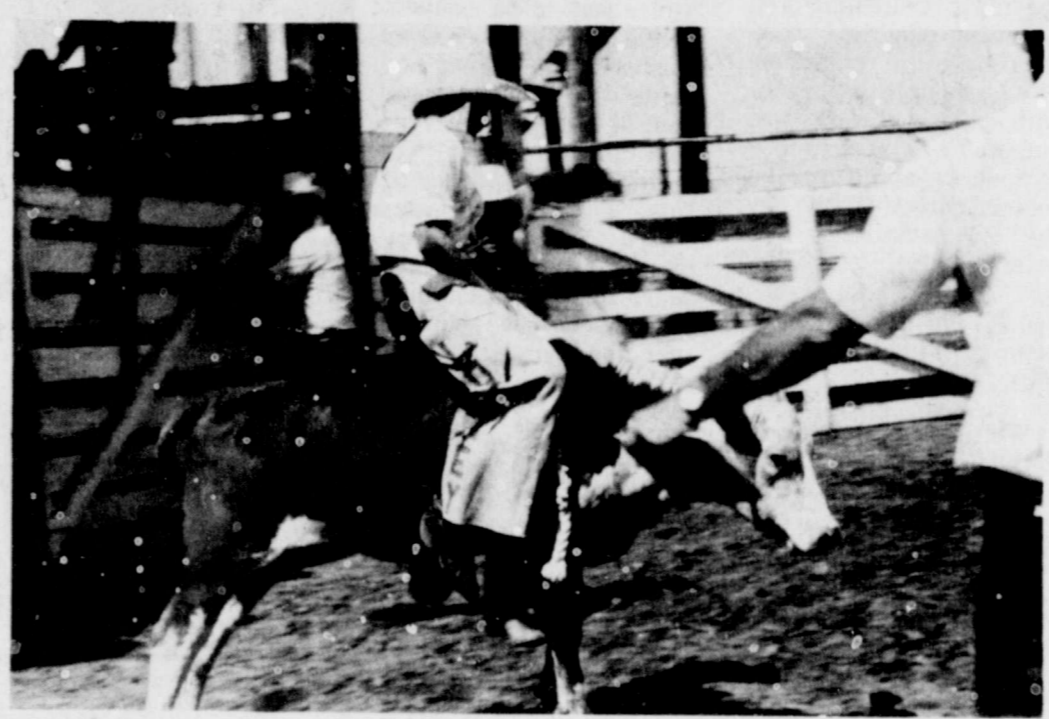

Part Two Barkers and Seagos Tour Europe

The next day we left Austria and went into Hungary. The Austrian border was very casual, but we were inspected on the Hungarian side. Art and De had bought fruit in Vienna and they shared this with the 42 that were in our tour group and that helped our 2 1/2 hour wait at the border. Lookout towers and high barbed wire fences at the Hungarian border made us realize that we were going into a Communist Country. Hungary seemed so dull in color, except for the beautiful flowers. The farm machinery was old and there were lots of horse drawn wagons. Women were raking hay in the fields, dressed in ankle boots and dresses. The only women we saw in pants were tourist. Bicycles were a real means of transportation and travel. Between the villages we saw sections upon sections of sunflowers, lots of sugar beets, wheat, cabbage, corn, (no cotton) and trees lined the rolling plains on into Budapest. The land is owned by the government and farmed by individuals.

Buda and Pest have 2.2 million people and came together in 1880 to form Budapest. Buda is on the mountain side and carried 1/3 of the population. Pest is on the plains or flat side and has 2/3 of the population. They are joined by the Elizabeth Bridge, which spans the Danube River. We ate Hungarian food until we really started dreaming of an American hot dog - which we never found. We went to an authentic Hungarian Folk dance, and ate one of the best meals of the trip in a wine cellar in the side of a hill, with Hungarian Dinner performers of dance music and song. Even the strudel was delicious, and we were happy that we could get bottled water. We had Gypsy music and dances and it was in this place that we met another tour group from America. In the museum there, we saw Beethoven's piano. We also saw the crown of St. Stephens, kept in the U.S.A. since WWII, and recently returned to Hungary.

We stayed on the Pest side in what had once been a beautiful old hotel, but that was years ago; and I'm sure we wouldn't have remembered it as much if it had been the Hilton, which stood tower-

ing on the Buda side. We toured the city with a Hungarian guide named Gazi. In Communist countries you have to use their guides and we saw him getting a "feedback" of money from the stores where he took us to shop.

On leaving Budapest, next morning De could not get his suitcase to lock. He carried it to the elevator and borrowed a belt for the rest of the trip. We were glad to get our American, Mike, back the next day, as we drove from Hungary into Yugoslavia where we waited 4 1/2 hours at the border for clearance and it was hot and dry. It seemed that the people in Yugoslavia are happier, the homes brighter and a better atmosphere - probably because of Tito's rule. In Yugoslavia, as well as Hungary, the primary church is Catholic and Greek Orthodox with some Moslems. The economy is better in Yugoslavia, the houses are larger and the people seem happier and doing fine since Tito died.

Now we change money for the third time - this time into Dinars which takes 26 to make \$1.00.

We spent one night in Belgrade, which has 1.3 million people, and is an old fortress city built where the Sava River joins the Blue Danube. The old Roman fortress is on the hills where the rivers join. Belgrade is the capitol of this province and the main street is "Tito" and the streets have Latin lettering.

One interesting cafe had been in business 400 years and was named "Z". The reason for this name was because it was across the street from a church, and sometimes the people didn't know whether to go to church or

to the cafe-tavern and drink beer - thus the name "Z".
New Belgrade was built on the Zava River and had new hotels and convention centers, very modern.

Waiting to leave the hotel the next morning, De fell into conversation with three ladies flying to Spain. They were two teachers and a doctor, very happy and well dressed. They were from the Province of Macedonia, (Paul, mentioned it in the New Testament.)

Between Belgrade and Zagreb were rolling hills and plains and stops along the way for more tortes and apricot drinks. Tito was born near Zagreb, which was one of the most interesting and beautiful cities we saw, with beautiful churches. The Cathedral of Zagreb, with its twin towers, was outstanding. We toured it by foot, up and down the rolling, narrow streets, by the old cathedrals, into market squares and through the "Stone Gate" which held the names of people who had died and were still being prayed for.

We met a lady at lunch and when she saw a little open Bible on the corner of our name tags, she came over and asked us "You love Jesus?" Our guide was near our table and spoke German and was able to explain to her what we were doing in Europe. We weren't ready to leave Zagreb, but knowing that we were going to the Alps and beautiful Austria made it easier. With yodeling music being played and the mountains getting higher and more beautiful - we knew that we were finally seeing the beautiful country that is characteristic of the Italian and Austrian Tyrolian Alps. They are white at the top because of the Dolomite marble formation and are unfriendly mountains because of the danger of climbing with cascading waterfalls, avalanche tunnels. We passed through a three mile tunnel, then towering mountains, smoo-

other ski mountains, green meadows, clear rapid rivers, and snow on the peaks plus we drove along side a 10 mile lake, made this a breathtaking ride. We finally arrived in Soll, Austria, to stay at the Hotel Austria in downtown Soll, which really has one narrow main street and we were the only American tourist in this hotel. Our rooms were small but our beds had down comforters about 18" thick and we enjoyed them every night. We stayed here and made side trips from here for the rest of our European trip. A beautiful little chapel was behind our hotel and its bells rang loudly every morning. Its a nice way to be awakened. While we were here, we washed some clothes and made ready for the main part of our trip the Passion Play.

Our first day out was a side trip to Innsbruck where the winter Olympics were conducted last year. This was something to see since we had all seen the games on T.V. and since our guide had lived and studied there for the past year, we felt we were in good hands.

On our way to Innsbruck, we went through the village of Fottenberg, which was the first chartered town in Tyrol and was the glass capitol center before Vienna and was so named because salt was mined up in the Inn River and shipped down to Rottenberg to aid in the making and retting of glass and since rats like salt - the rats went to this town, thus the name Rottenberg, which means "Mountain of the Rats." The buildings downtown were painted according to the persons profession - the butlers building would be red, the doctors white, etc. There were the ever present beautiful churches and the castles all the way along the Inn River into Innsbruck. They were built half way up the mountain sides, for protection - both the castles and the churches. [More next week]

WTSU To Hold Homecoming Festivities

Students, faculty and staff members, friends and supporters and alumni through 70 years at West Texas State University will gather on campus during Homecoming week, September 29 through October 4.

"West Texas - Heart of America" has been selected as the theme for the celebration which will include a parade, carnival, bonfire, Pigskin Review, alumni activities and an afternoon football game.

Campus organizations will offer food and drink, games and other activities at the carnival from 8 p.m. to midnight, Tuesday, September 30, in the Activities Center All-Purpose Room. To reserve space for a carnival booth, campus organizations must submit an application form and \$5 by Friday, September 26.

Organizations which wish to sponsor the same booth as last year must apply before Monday, September 22. Application forms are available at the Activities Center desk.

First, second and third place awards will be presented to the most imaginative and popular carnival booths.

The Pigskin Review, which features campus organizations in musical and comedy performances, has been set for 7:30 p.m. on Thursday, October 2, and Friday, October 3, in Mary Moody Northen Recital Hall. Tickets are \$4 for the public and \$2 for all students and children. Reserved seats will be available.

Performing will be five winners of the All-University Sing which was sponsored in March by Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia and Mu Phi Epsilon music organizations and the New Day Singers.

The winning campus organizations which will perform include Chi Omega social fraternity for women, Phi Delta Theta social fraternity, WTSU Herdmen spirit organization, Latter Day Saints Student Association and Dance Club. Prizes will be awarded.

Following the Thursday evening performance of Pigskin Review, the Homecoming queen will be crowned and the mountain of lumber collected for the bonfire will be torched. The bonfire will be lit at 10 p.m. in the lot near the tennis courts and university police station.

Persons wishing to donate wood for the bonfire may contact John Hasse at Jarrett Hall.

The bonfire also will feature a pep rally. Floats, area bands, antique cars and other entries will parade through the streets of Canyon and campus at 10 a.m., Saturday, October 4. Capt. Ralph Moglia, assistant professor of military science and chairman of the parade committee, has invited 150 units to participate.

Deadline for entering the parade is Friday, September 26, and application forms are available from Moglia in the military science department at WTSU.

Bob Crudginton of Amarillo who attended WTSU in 1917 will head the parade as marshal.

First, second and third place award winners and a sweepstakes winner will be selected from parade entrants and the winning entries will be displayed at Kimbrough Memorial Stadium during the football game.

Barbecue and the trimmings will be served at 11 a.m. following the parade. Until 1 p.m., the meal will be served on the lawn area between the Cornette Library and Terrill Hall. Tickets are \$4 for adults and \$3 for students and children. WTSU students with meal tickets will be admitted free.

For the 1979 Homecoming celebration, 1,800

pounds of beef were cooked during the night in a pit near the stadium. More than two cords of wood were needed to cook the barbecue.

The football game, featuring the WTSU Buffaloes and the Aggies of New Mexico State University at Las Cruces, will be

an afternoon game beginning at 2 p.m. Half-time activities will include the WTSU Marching Band and the Alumni Band under the direction of Dr. Gary Garner.

The Class of 1930 will celebrate their 50th year on Saturday. Alumni may register at 8 a.m. in the

Activities Center. Coffee and doughnuts will be provided. The general membership of the WTSU Ex-Students Association will meet at 9:30 a.m. on Saturday.

Also during Homecoming, 24 area artists will display and sell their works to raise money for

football scholarships. The show and sale, sponsored by the Quarterback Club, will be from 7 p.m. to 10 p.m., Friday, October 3, and 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., Saturday, October 4, in the Activities Center Ballroom.

Dr. Allen Early, WTSU assistant professor of eco-

nomics, is chairman of the Homecoming committee, which includes representatives from several campus organizations.
