Appraisal Office Open In Floyd County Court House

It's given name is 'Property Tax Code.' It's legal name is S.B. 621 and it says among other things that every county in the state has to reappraise the property in their counties

Also prior to 1982 the county is to name an appraisal board and that board is to "prepare for the district's operation by establishing, equipping, and staffing the appraisal

The appraisal office has been established in room 107 of the Floyd County courthouse. Shelia Faulkenberry has been appointed as Deputy Appraiser for the Floyd County Central Appraisal Dist-

Since all counties in the state are under the Tax Code, the appraisal companies are being booked solid. Therefore the appraisal district contracted

with the taxing units within the district under the Inter-local Cooperation Act. Eleven different entities were included in the reappraisal of Floyd County. The reappraisal

has just been completed.

Each of the taxing enti-

ties have set a tentative tax rate. The reason it is tentative is that the reappraisal figures are only tentative. Letters are being sent to taxpayers advising them of the appraised value of their property, tax rate, and taxes due. This is not a tax bill. It is to give the property owner a chance to appeal the appraised value of his property if he feels it is not correct. The letters will give meeting times with representa-



Desiccating Dryland Cotton May Pay This Year

Premature opening of dryland cotton on the South Plains, brought about by the prolonged summer drouth, could cause significant losses of seed cotton, an Extension cotton agronomist warns. As a result, it may pay growers this year to make prompt and proper use of harvest-aid chemicals on the crop, he said.

"Most of the area's dryland cotton is opening rapidly because of the hot, dry weather," said Dr. James R. Supak, area agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "Most of this is premature.

"When this happens, cottons tend to lose a lot of their inherent stormproof characteristics. There is a danger that a lot of this cotton will

fall out on the ground.

Because it still is far from the normal frost date for this area, which usually occurs between late October and early November, this year it appears it would pay producers to use harvest-aid chemicals, the cotton specialist said.

There are two types of harvest-aid chemicals: defoliants and desiccants. True defoliants are relatively mild materials that act slowly and cause leaves to drop off. In contrast, desiccants kill the entire plant

'I'm sure that for much of the dryland crop, with low yield potential, many growers will seriously consider harvesting without desicating," Supak said. This has been successfully done in the past when the bolls have matured under more normal climatic conditions, he said.

But with the drouth conditions this year causing premature opening of bolls, excessive green plant content in the harvested cotton can reduce the ginning efficiency; stain the lint, thereby reducing the grade, and result in heating which could further reduce seed quality, he cautioned.

'The best advice we can give growers is to check with their ginners to see if they'd be willing to rin cotton that hasn't been desiccated," Supak said.

Defoliants probably won't be of nuch value under current dryland

conditions, he added.

Desiccants cleared for use in this area are arsenic acid, Paraquat and sodium chlorate.
They should be applied when 80

to 85 percent of the bolls are open. "In many cases, the decision won't be cut and dried as to when to dures for computerized cattle mardesiccate," Supak said. "Low spots in a field will appear greener and daily for nine months. Computer have a lower percentage of boll

Farm Bureau **Urges Members To Vote In November**

"In some cases it may pay to desiccate the portion of a field that's ready, and leave the remainder for

later," he said. The agronomist suggested that initially, producers stay with the recommended rates for the desiccant they are using. But he also recommended that the growers do a little testing to find the chemicals and rates most effective for their particular fields.

Rains such as occurred last week will stimulate regrowth, especially in heavily drouth-stressed cotton, he cautioned.

Lower rates of desiccants that were doing a good job before the rains will probably be inadequate as the cotton begins regrowth, Supak

Arsenic acid, at one to one-and-ahalf quarts per acre, would be the best chemical to use in this case, he said. If using Paraquat, start at the suggested rate (one to two pints per acre) and be sure to add a surfactant, he said. "If this rate does the job, you may want to try a lower rate to reduce expense."

Combinations of chemicals may also be used. He suggested a tank mix of arsenic acid (one to one-anda-half quarts per acre) plus Accelerate (one and a-half pints), an additive to enhance the desiccant activity. Also, the tank mix of Paraquat (one-and-a-half pints per acre) plus Accelerate (one-and-a-half pints per acre) has been effective in some

In rank cotton with heavy foliage,

coverage is essential for good desircation, he said.

With ground applicators, use rigid drops on booms and increase spray volume, Supak advised. Use three nozzles per row if cotton is lower than 24 inches tall and five nozzles on taller cotton.

An alternative would be split applications of Paraguat (a half to one pint per acre) made seven days apart, or first apply a defoliant (such as Def-6 or Folex) plus Accelerate and follow that five to seven days later with Paraquat. That removes top leaves and allows better spray coverage of remaining

If applying arsenic acid with a ground rig, he recommended a higher gallonage of total spray be used (20 to 25 gallons per acre) and that only 20 to 30 pounds per square inch of pressure be maintained to produce larger droplets.

With Paraquat, he noted that spray volume could be reduced (10 to 15 gallons per acre) and pressure be increased (40 pounds per square inch) to decrease droplet size.

Also, arsenic acid requires warm, sunny conditions for maximum effectiveness, whereas Paraquat is less sensitive to temperature and

"With all chemicals, avoid application during windy conditions to reduce drift," Supak urged.

Further information can be obtained by visiting your county Extension agent and requesting Extension publication L-145, "Cotton Defoliation Guide," the agronomist said.

"Cattlex" Computerized **Marketing For Cattlemen**

A new computerized cattle mar-keting project called "Cattlex" (for Cattle Exchange) has been launched by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Texas Agricultural Experiment Station of the Texas A&M University System and the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Cattlex is currently in the demonstration and experimental stage for the purpose of developing trading techniques and operating proceketing. The test project will run terminals have been set up at 18 different locations over the state to link together feedlots, order buyers and auction markets. Locations were selected based on cattle volumes and density as well as economy of operation.

To use the system a producer requests a grader from a computer terminal location to list and describe the cattle he wants to sell. The description and listing fee is about \$1 per head payable before the lot is offered over the computer system. Included in the description are such things as sex of the cattle, age, grade, breed, weight and flesh condition. A seller may also put a "no-sale price" on the lot which means that he does not want to sell for less than a certain price.

This information is then consolidated and transmitted by way of a cathode ray tube (CRT), a television-like screen which is a part of the computer terminal. The terminal can also produce a printout of the information.

Each day before the sale begins, buyers gather at the terminal site to review the day's listings on lots of cattle offered for auction. When a sale is made, a printout at both the buying and selling terminals will present a confirmation of sale. Both buyer and seller will also receive a copy of the individual description of the lot. Title transfer is at the time of official weight for ranch cattle and after the sale for delivered

With Cattlex, buyers still bid competitively and sellers still seek the highest possible price. However, the system expands the scope of trading and reduces transportation and stress through more direct movement. Sellers have the advantage of more purchasers while buyers have more lots of cattle from which to choose without scurrying over the countryside.

Recent trends toward more local auction sales as well as direct selling on farms and ranches has resulted in more dispersed, lowvolume markets too small to attract large numbers of buyers. However, Cattlex centralizes the price negotiation process in marketing livestock without the costs involved in physically centralizing buyers, sellers and livestocks.

An added benefit of Cattlex is that it provides fast, up-to-date market information. Interested parties can watch the market as it occurs over the state or nation by simply viewing the CRT at the terminal site.







The Civil Aeronautics Board says that passen-gers involuntarily "bumped" from overbooked flights are due denied boarding compensation of up to \$200. And that compensation doubles if you cannot be rebooked to arrive at your destination (if in the United States) within two hours of your original schedule.

A new procedure allows airlines to ask for volunteers to give up their reservations for a payment from the airline. The amount of this payment is negotiated, so you may want to accept less than another passenger to give up your seat, or you may want to hold out for more money. Those left behind after volunteers relinquish seats are due "denied boarding compensa-

Innsbruck, is the capitol of Tyrol and has a popula-tion of 140,000. Eight hundred years ago in 1180 a bridge was built over the Inn River from the small Roman settlement of Wilten. Bruck, means bridge-Innsbruck means bridge over the Inn River.

Maxmillan I, built a hugh castle downtown and the streets, gates, old buildings, squares and ca-thedrals surround the castle and made this one of our very favorite cities. We saw the central part of the city by foot and en-joyed our free time shopping and eating. We went to the Olympic ski jump stadium which seats 80,000 and saw Dorothy Hamill's name under the Olympic circles. Then we went on to the ice stadium, where Olympic skating contests were held. One of the castles here houses the only picture of Dracula of Transvania. We agreed that Innsbruck was a beautiful sight and site for the Winter Olym-

Our trip to the Wild Kaiser forest and mountains was the first day we had seen any rain. On the way we stopped at Kufs-tein, which is a lovely old fortress town built in the 12th century, on the Inn River and became a town in 1393. It was here that Art tried again to get a hot dog, but it wasn't until we reached the Wild Kaiser Lake that we could find anything American to eat. There we saw a hamburger booth and were served their version of a hamburger, which was really a very savory meat ball between small roll like buns- then tortes, of

Back in Soll, on the e rening of August 9th, we all attended a lecture on the Passion Play, preparing us for the experience of Christian faith, we were to experience the next day at the little village of Oberannergau. After the lecture we went into a very Austrian cafe for ice cream treats. There the manager served us pitchers of iced water (the first we had seen) upon request, and we were so overjoyed that people came by our secluded booth and thought we must be "high" on plain

ice water! Our day started early -4:00 a.m. for the trip to beautiful Oberannergau, and the long awaited Passion Play. Oberannergau, is a village of under 5,000 population nestled in a plush valley between soaring mountains. In 1632, during the plague that killed 1/3 of the population of Europe, the pe-ople in this little village prayed to God to spare their people and vowed to re-enact the life of Christ, every 10 years, with all the parts played by the citizens of Oberannergau. The only times they have failed, was during the war

The Passion Play is something you have to see to get the full meaning or impact. In front of the theater is a sculptured fountain of Jesus and his re-entry into Jerusalem. The theater seats 5,000 all under roof, although the impressive stage is in the open. More than 300 characters take part in some of the mass scenes. The music is superb, with a 50 voice choir and a fuli orchestra. The play is acted out in the open. Rain does not stop the play. It was a beautiful sun shining day when we were there, with clouds playing in the background and the mountains as a natural backdrop. The play goes from 9:00 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. then a two hour break and finished at 4:00 p.m. in the afternoon. The actors try out for their parts two years in advance and all live in and around Oberannergau. There are 1,000 adults and 250 children. In 1960 two American children were in the play. An American soldier had married a German girl and their children attended school there and were in the play. The play is done in the German language, but we had books translating it into English. The Old and the New Testaments were tied together by "still life" scenes of the Old Testament to relate to the happening in the New Testament, for us personally. It was truly an overpowering experience, and we felt nearer to the life, death and resurrection of our Lord Jesus, than at any other time in our lives, God, truly blessed

us in this rare experience. We saw one of the High Priest, mowing his lawn, as we walked through the village after lunch. There are two people who play each role, so if anyone gets sick the play goes on. We were told that 1/2 million people will see the play this season. We saw the play on Saturday.

On our last Sunday in Soll, we had our morning worship on the balcony just outside our room at the hotel, almost in the shadow of the village Catholic Church. In the middle of our service the church bells played for about five minutes, and we were blessed as we were dismissed by singing "There's A Sweet, Sweet



AVOID GETTING BITTEN BY A BARGAIN IN A BOX

A lot of mail order promotions these days don't tell you the name of the outfit making the offer. All you know is what's for sale, the price, and the box number you're supposed to send your money to. If you're queasy about buying something without knowing who's selling-particularly if it's an item costing \$10 or \$20 or more (and many offers are for this much)-here's what to do: Write the postmaster at the post office where the box is located and ask for the name of the box renter. > The increase applies to veterans who are receiving VA compensation un-der Section 314(k) of Title 38, U.S. Code, Veterans Benefits and commonly referred to as "Satutory award." Such veterans have been receiving \$56 per month for each service-connected anatomical loss or loss of use of a limb, eye or creative organ. Effective September 1, 1980, the monthly payment for each such service-connected loss will be increased to \$62, and will appear in the disability checks dated October 1,

The increase in these VA payments should come automatically on October 1, with no application required from individual veterans. Anyone entitled to the Statutory award payment who does not receive the increase in their October 1, checks should contact the local Veterans Service Officer, who will assist in determining why it was not




