*Mackenzie Lake meeting kicks-off bond election

SILVERTON - A supper meeting was hosted at Lake Mackenzie Tuesday by the directors of Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority for city councils and news media in Lockney. Floydada, Silverton and Tulia, during which Joe Smith, bonding attorney, First Southwest Company, Abilene, presented a financial report and the latest information on the Mackenzie bond election to

Lon Davis of Floydada presided over the meeting. "The purpose of the Mackenzie Municipal Water

Authority," Smith said, "is, and always has been, to construct a reservoir on Tule Creek in order to provide a surface water supply for the cities of Floydada, Lockney, Silverton and Tulia. The authority must also construct treatment and transmission facilities to order to deliver water to

THE AUTHORITY has constructed the reservoir on Tule Creek. Cost of the reservoir construction and land was approximately \$3.3 million, financed by the issuance of general obligation bonds which were sold to the Texas Water Development Board in 1970 and 1972.

Elements required to complete the project so that water can be delivered to the member cities include a raw water pump station at Mackenzie Reservoir; a raw water supply line to the treatment plant near the reservoir; a 4.6 million gallons per day treatment plant with overload capacity up to six MGD during peak demand periods and a treated water pump station; a 24 inch by approximately

THE AUTHORITY has made application to the Farmers Home Ad-, ministration, for long-term loans to finance a major portion of the cost. In addition. the authority has applied for a \$1 million

fund the supply facilities. At this point, the authority has received no commitment from FHA that the loans or grant will be approved other than an acknowledgement that the project is eligible for consideration.

the Mackenzie bond issue, it will be necessary for Silverton to purchase land outside the city for water pipe. This would be costly since it would have to be done by Silverton alone.

Silverton faced a serious water shortage situation this summer even with water rationing.

Each city, if the bonds are approved, would be entitled to receive an adequate supply of water from the Mackenzie Reservoir, and might be able to make arrangements to sell some of its alloted water to help finance its part of the cost.

CONTINUATION OF reliance on ground water supplies, primarily the Ogallala formation and possibly the Santa Rosa formation is not practical. Studies indicate that the Ogallala formation is being depleted with little or no recharge. Water from the Santa Rosa formation has been used by Tulia, but water from this formation is often of unsuitable quality

and quantity. Already Silverton has had experience with locating a supply of water in the Santa Rosa formation. The State Department of Health would not allow this water to be used because of a high iron

content. Monthly water rate structures have been projected as follows. These rates are not recommendations, but are intended for guidance.

THESE ESTIMATED water rates vary since the cost of water delivery differs depending on the distance from the transmission station; amount ofwater delivered and cost of the separate transmission

There will be only one proposition on the ballot: to authorize the authority to issue \$2,150,000 general obligation bonds. The election must carry in each city for the bonds to be authorized. If the election is successful, the board will continue to pursue construction of the entire project as outlined.

Any resident of Tulia, Silverton, Lockney or Floydada who has been a registered voter for at least 30 days prior to the election is qualified to vote.

Hordes of field crickets have invaded parts of Floyd. County, creating a nuisance in some areas and causing minor plant damage.

Large numbers of crickets usually occur in the fall following prolonged dry weather in the spring and summer. Cooler fall temperatures and rains often trigger cricket migrations to lighted areas around buildings.

Field crickets can damage ornamental and garden plants. Inside homes and other buildings they become a nuisance and may occasionally feed on fabrics, especially clothing stained with perspiration or food.

Cleaning the yard and garden areas will reduce cricket feeding and breeding sites. This includes destroying weeds and dense vegetation around homes and other buildings and removing piles of bricks, stones, wood and other debris

Farmers are getting good prices for their 1980 cotton crop, and if they play their cards right, they may be able to contract next year's crop at a good price

"This year's drouth-plagued cotton crop has left U.S. supplies short, causing a stronger market," points out Dr. Carl Anderson, cotton marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. "However, demand generally has been short, with U.S. textile mills considering more polyester in cotton-polyester blends." As of September 1, the U.S. cotton

crop was estimated at 11.7 million bales, down from 14.6 million last year. And the Texas crop was pegged at 3.6 million bales compared to 5.5 million a

The world crop at 63.4 million bales means a drop of about 2.1 million from 1979 levels. Both Russia and China have somewhat better cotton crops this year. "While most producers are currently

enjoying stronger cotton prices, the market's strength may soften once cotton users adjust their demand to higher price levels," says Anderson. "Some mills are already building up excessive inventories of unsold goods and have cut work weeks to three or four

Average daily spot prices for Strict Low Middling 1-1/16-inch cotton in mid-September were some 30 cents a pound above last year's prices, notes the economist. Editor's note: The Floyd Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm tackles the garbage problem this week and has a solution, if you don't live in Alaska.

Dear editor:

This hasn't got anything to do with the international situation or inflation or politics. It's about what to do with the nation's trash. Where're we gonna put it?

Early day American Indians solved the problem easily. When a camp site became too littered, they stepped carefully out and moved to another site. This is impractical today. Sure, if Washington say produced more crash than it could walk through, the city could up and move some place else.

But where? It's one thing to have a new shopping center spring up near your town, but what town would want Washington out there too? Bringing in Congress and all that. . .you know what it'd do to land values.

One solution has been the Sanitary Land Fill, more accurately called the Unsanitary Land Fill, but nobody wants one near his house. I've never seen a Land Fill that shouldn't have been some place else. And no fence has ever been built around one high enough to keep paper from being blown over the countryside.

But there is a solution, not only for where to dump our household trash and garbage but also the nation's nuclear waste, obsolete warheads, barrels of poisoned chemicals and other necessities of the modern world.

As I understand it, the government has set aside 100 million acres of wilderness in Alasksa to be maintained in its original condition. . . no mining, no drilling for oil, no lumbering, no roads, no tourist lodges, no hunting, no camping. Just no trespas-

In other words, the 100

million acres are to be enjoyed in your mind only. A city dweller can sit in his apartment and glow over the fact there are 100 million acres of land up there in Alaska untouched by human hands.

Here's the trash problem solution: swap 50 million of those 100 million acres for an equal number of acres on the moon and set aside those moon acres for the mental enjoyment of people who go in for that sort of enjoyment. Then use the borrowed 50 million Alaskan acres for the Supreme National Dumping Ground for the entire United States. Alaska is so far away the odor from the dump

Deadline nearing for quarter reports

October 31 is the date by which employers must report on Form 941 Social Security and withheld Federal income taxes for the 3rd quarter of 1980 and pay any taxes due, the Internal Revenue Service says. If the quarterly liability (reduced by any deposit during the quarter) is \$200 or more, the unpaid

balance must be deposited. This deadline does not apply to those employers who make timely deposits of the full amount of tax due in Federal Reserve or approved commercial banks. They are allowed until November 10 to file Form 941, "Employer's Quarterly Federal Tax Re-

If employers have not received Ford 941 by mail, they can obtain one from local IRS offices. IRS Publication 15, 'Circular E-Employer's Tax Guide," is also available

and flexible and easy to sew. ing on the right side. Just follow a few guidelines.

When laying out the pattern, make sure that fabric is flat with no part hanging off the cutting surface. Place the pattern pieces so that the stretch is going in the right direction. Avoid stretching the fabric during cutting to

prevent distorting the gar-When stitching, use a polyester thread, because it has the stretchability and strength needed. A sharp needle or ballpoint needle in size 14 is recommended with 12-13 stitches per inch. Use a slightly loose tension and light pressure on the presser foot. Use a straight stitch, stretch stitch, tiny zig-zag or an overcast stitch that stitches seam and overcasts as the same time. To finish the

seam with a straight stitch machine, stitch one-eight inch from the seam through both seam allowances and trim close to stitching. With a zig-zag machine, double stitch with zig-zag

stitch. Use an interfacing that has built-in stretch where the stretch of the fabric is to be mainained. Use conventional interfacing where stability is needed. Machine-made buttonboles will function better if they are placed in the opposite direction to the stretch of fabric. Navy Radioman 3rd Class participated in several naval Billy M. Nichols, son of James L. and Eva L. Nichols of 801 S. Main, Floydada and Navy Seaman Apprentice John T. Spurlock, son of Bee Spurlock of 608 W. Ross, Floydada have returned from a deployment in the Western Pacific and Indian Ocean.

They were crewmembers aboard the aircraft carrier USS Constellation, homeported in San Diego.

During the seven-month cruise, the Constellation set a new Pacific Fleet record of 110 continuous days at sea while operating in the Indian Ocean. The embarked air wing fiew more than 28,000 sorties and logged more than 10,500 arrested landings.


