County Budget Hearing Set For Monday

The Commissioners Court of Floyd County will hold a special meeting on Monday, November 7 at 8:30 a.m.

Court will canvass the ballots of the November 4 General Election.

Commissioners will discuss the 1981 budget in preparation for the budget hearing and adoption set for Monday, November 10 at 2 p.m.

Anyone who is interested in or who has questions about the county expenditures in the next year should attend the hearing on the 10th. Both meetings are open to the public.

This budget for a county with an estimated population of 10,000 anticipates total receipts of \$1,191,276 and total expenditures of \$1,184,683.

The receipts will be realized through an estimated ad valorem tax of 31 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation. The remainder of the receipts will come from local sources and various federal and state payments.

The tax rate will be based upon the final county valuation.

None of the tax will be applied to servicing outstanding debt as Floyd County does not have any outstanding bond issues or warrants.

In previous years the county has had a sizeable cash balance at the beginning of the year. In 1980 that balance was \$281,798.

The cost of the state required remodeling of the county jail whittled

that beginning of the year cash balance down.

The beginning of the year balance depends on the taxes collected in October, November and December. However, with the reevaluation this year tax notices have not been sent out, therefore, taxes have not been collected during those months.

The important thing is for the public to attend the budget hearings.

Floyd County goes for Ronald Reagan

An astounding 73% of the eligible voters in Floyd County turned out for the election Tuesday.

Reagan carried 57% of the county with 2043 votes, Carter had 1477 votes, Anderson had 24 and Clark had 12.

The only precincts to favor Carter were Northwest Floydada, McCoy and Northeast Floydada.

Election results of the local candidates, all uncontested are as follows: Randy Hollums, District Attorney, 2321; Kenneth Bain, County Attorney, 2314; Fred Cardinal, Sheriff, 2374; Jonelle Fawver, Tax Assessor-Collector, 2356; and Walter Hollums, Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1, 1630. All are incumbents.

Two new County Commissioners were elected: Sam Spence, Precinct 1, 1214 votes and Tomas Warren, Precinct 3, 481 votes.

Voting boxes came in to the County Courthouse before 9:00 p.m. which was a good time with the large voter turnout.

Republican Chairman Bill Gray said in an interview that he would like to thank the volunteers who helped in the telephoning and mail out aspects of the campaign.

"Especially the numerous high school youth who spent endless hours addressing numerous post cards that were mailed throughout the county," Gray said. "The nice weather helped in getting the voters out, but I think a great deal of credit goes to the increased effort of the volunteers."

Floyd County voter response on the amendments are as follows: Amendment 1, unamended tellers for banks carried 1366 to 1335; Amendment 2, appeal of pretrial rulings failed 1639 to 763.

The amendment 3 about the appraisal and equalization being mandatory failed 1431 to 1032.

Amendment 4 authorizing bingo failed 1728 to 989. Amendment 5 about governor control of appropriated funds failed 1969 to 586.

Amendment 6 authorizing governor to remove appointed officers failed 1349 to 1219.

Amendment 7 authorizing county under 5000 to do private road work carried 1425 to 1108.

Amendment 8 to change the Court of Civil Appeals failed 1569 to 868. Amendment 9 allowing spouses separate property failed 1359 to 1222.

Mackenzie Bond election topic of program

On Thursday at 12 noon Neil Taylor, manager of the Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority Project, will be the guest speaker at the Lions Club meeting in Floydada.

Taylor will discuss the coming November 22 bond election. He will answer questions of cost of the project.

He will also have the facts and figures of the projected tax increases and costs of water.

He will also present comparisons of water costs and taxes.

A major concern of our community is the depleting ground water supply in this area.

The Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority Project will provide such an alternative water supply.

The Mackenzie Authority Manager as well as the Board members are anxious and willing to talk to any group of interested citizens about the treatment plant project that these bonds would

finance.

Four municipalities are included in the coming bond election: Tulia, Silverton, Lockney and Floydada. All four towns must vote in favor of the Bonds for the project to pass.

In the coming weeks City Councils, Chamber of Commercements of the towns involved will be studying the issue closely.

Mayor Claude Brown, Lockney, indicated at the Mackenzie Authority meeting in October that their city council would endorse the authorization of the bonds. Mayor Brown is in the hospital and unavailable for comment in this issue.

Silverton City Council has endorsed the project.

The Floyd County Hesperian and the Lockney Beacon are strongly in favor of the passing of the bonds, as are the Tulia Herald and the Silverton, Briscoe County News.

Bill To Extend and Increase GPCP Funding Passed

In June, a bill extending the Great Plains Conservation Program (GPCP) from December 31, 1981, to September 30, 1991, became law.

The new legislation, Public Law 96-263, will increase GPCP funding from 300 million to 600 million and will raise the yearly cost-share limitation from \$25 million to \$50 million.

"This is a positive step to insure that farmers and ranchers throughout the Great Plains will have added incentive to apply conservation measures on their land," Jon LaBaume, district conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service at Floydada said.

Under the GPCP, landowners can speed up soil and water conservation work by signing agreements for 3 to 10 years. The contracts guarantee cost-sharing by the government to apply and maintain conservation measures. Contracts have been written for about half of the land eligible in the 10 states.

The Soil Conservation Service has administered GPCP since the program began in 1956. Through the program, working together with local Soil and Water Conservation Districts, SCS has given technical and financial assistance to 55,000 Great Plains farmers and ranchers in treating critically eroded farmland and making appropriate land use changes.

A landowner's soil type, slope, and past erosion patterns are considered in determining what kind of soil conserva-

tion practices are needed in his or her area. The operator may agree to one of several alternatives, according to which suits his budget and labor limits. A reasonable amount of flexibility allows for later changes in the conservation program if the need should arise. Modifications in the plan of work can be made during the annual fall contract status review with the SCS representative.

Over the next 10 years, SCS and districts hope to help even more Great Plains farmers and ranchers plan for and install the most effective conservation practices on their land.

"The hazardous climate and easily eroded soil in the 10 Great Plains States require lasting protection of soil and water resources," LaBaume said. "The drought of the 1970's, and the summer of 1980, is a reminder that we must adequately protect the Plains from wind and water erosion to reduce the likelihood of another disastrous Dust Bowl."

"Despite a good record of success for work done under the GPCP, much work remains in order to combat serious droughts and persistent erosion problems," LaBaume concluded.

Any landowner is eligible for cost-share under the Great Plains Program and should contact the Floyd County Soil and Water Conservation District or Soil Conservation Service at 208 S. Wall.

Agriculture Will Have To "Wait Till Next Year"

Texas farmers and ranchers will have to "wait till next year" for any improvement in their income.

"Higher farm prices resulting from a sizable drop in crop production this year, smaller meat supplies, and strong export demand all point to an improved agricultural income picture in 1981," believes Dr. Carl Anderson, economist in marketing with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Crop producers will likely fair much better in 1981 because of this year's short crop and a rise in prices. And, with meat supplies expected to slip under year-earlier levels, prospects look somewhat better for livestock producers as well.

Although production expenses will rise again, price increases are not expected to be as sharp as in 1980, says Anderson. During the past 12 months, fertilizer prices jumped 28 percent, fuel and energy prices and interest rates climbed 25 percent, and agricultural chemicals rose 21 percent.

"Texas agriculture suffered considerably from the extended dry, hot weather during late spring and summer. Dry-land farmers, cow-calf operators and

poultry producers experienced big setbacks. Irrigated crops were even stunted by the intense and prolonged heat wave," notes Anderson.

Despite the steep drop in crop production, cash receipts for 1980 are estimated by Extension specialists to total only a little less than in 1979. Crop inventories carried over from the bumper 1979 harvest and price increases for many commodities have helped maintain sales close to last year's level.

Livestock sales sagged a little as lower cattle and hog receipts more than offset increased sales of poultry and milk.

While overall agricultural receipts won't be down too much from last year, net income will be off sharply due to surging costs of running a farm or ranch, says Anderson.

And, to make matters worse, the purchasing power of income has been further reduced by this year's double-digit inflation.

"Declining farm income is also hurting businesses serving agricultural producers. As farmers and ranchers tighten their belts, they will be buying fewer production and consumption goods and services," notes the economist.

HERBICIDES FOR FALL

Treating the base of brush plants with liquid herbicides and using pelleted herbicides can be effective during fall and winter months, making brush control a year-round practice.

Kerosene, diesel or a diesel and 2,4,5T mixture may be poured or sprayed around the base of many brush species on rangeland in Floyd County. Apply the solution to the trunk from a height of twelve inches to the soil surface. Be sure to apply enough of the herbicide mixture so it runs down the trunk and soaks down around the root crown. This method works best when the soil is dry and pulled away from the trunk.

Although basal treatment is a time-consuming method of brush control, it gives excellent results. The method is good for use on thin stands of brush, on small acreages adjacent to cropland, on fencerows and on areas where other methods are not feasible.

In recent years, two pelleted herbicides have been registered for use on rangeland and may be used during the fall months. They are the 10 percent picloram pellet (Tordon 10K) and the 10 percent and 20 percent tebuthiuron pellet (Graslan 10P and 20P). These

herbicides are applied to the soil surface. Moisture is needed to move the herbicide into the soil, and plants pick it up through their root system.

Apply Tordon 10K and Graslan just prior to expected rainfall. Most of the state normally receives sufficient rainfall during the fall months to move these herbicides into the soil.

Tordon 10K pellets are useful for controlling pricklypear, huisache, red-berry juniper, macartney rose, hawthorne, sumac, willow baccharis and whitebrush. The material may be applied to individual plants or broadcast by ground or aerial equipment.

Graslan pellets are currently registered for use on post oak, blackjack oak, winged elm, whitebrush, blackbrush, running live oak, and sand shinnery oak and have effectively controlled these species. However, the herbicide is available only for aerial broadcast application through Elanco Products Company approved aerial applicators.

Pelleted herbicides are safe because of minimum drift. They are ready to apply and require no mixing. Now would be a good time to apply Tordon 10K and Graslan for control of certain brush species.

Wheat In Farmer-Owned Reserves Released

Wheat may be redeemed by producers from farmer-owned grain reserves I and III without penalty, a U.S. Department of Agriculture official announced recently. The national average market price for wheat is \$4.21 per bushel, one cent above the release level for wheat in these reserves.

John Goodwin, acting executive vice president of USDA's Commodity Credit Corporation, said farmers may sell their wheat stored in the two reserves after repaying their CCC price support loans. Release of the reserves does not require farmers to redeem or sell their grain at this time, Goodwin said.

Farmers with farm-stored reserve grain must request a release from the county office of USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service before removing the grain for sale.

The release level is 140 percent of the \$3.00 per-bushel national loan rate for wheat.

About 80 million bushels of wheat are in reserves I and III.

Data used by CCC in determining the release level include five-day average prices as reported by USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service which show prices bid by buyers at selected markets.

SBA Includes "Hot Weather" In Disaster Eligibility

The U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) has amended Disaster Declaration #1900 for the State of Texas to include "extreme hot weather" as being cause for disaster loan eligibility.

The SBA makes available disaster recovery loans to farmers, ranchers and agriculture-related businesses who suffered hardship due to adverse weather in counties declared a disaster area, as well as in all bordering counties within the state. The loans are low-interest and terms of the loans are based on the borrower's repayment ability. Texas producers who lost crops because of the drought or extreme hot weather may receive program and eligibility information by calling (806) 762-7481.

Physical disaster loan applications filed under declaration #1900 must be received by February 12, 1981. The deadline for economic injury disaster loan applications is May 12, 1981.

FIX-IT FACTS

To nail or to glue and nail... when applying paneling? Both methods are good. Paneling adhesive is gaining popularity but some prefer to use only nails. But the panel into the corner and back. Check to be sure there is a 1/2 inch clearance on both top and bottom and the outside edge is vertical. Nail the panel to the furring strips or studs every 16 inches. If using paneling with grooves, 16 inch intervals should coincide with grooves. A great time saver is to use pre-colored nails to match the paneling. Planning can make the rest of the wall easier. Figure where the paneling will end up in the second corner. If there is only a small space taking a few inches off the preceding panels will leave more room for the final panel. Cut each panel just prior to putting up. Next week, the second application method... glue and nails.

Reserves
Released

Wheat may be redeemed by producer-owned grain reserves without penalty, a U.S. Department of Agriculture official announced. The national average market price for wheat is \$4.21 per bushel, one cent below the release level for wheat in Texas.

Goodwin, acting executive vice president of USDA's Commodity Credit Corporation, said farmers may sell their wheat in the two reserves after receiving CCC price support loans. The release does not require redemption or sell their grain at a loss.

With farm-stored reserve wheat, a release from the USDA's Agricultural Conservation Service allows the grain for sale. The release level in 140 percent of the national loan rate is \$4.21 per bushel of wheat and \$4.11.

Agri-Facts

After a year when so many corn growers suffered from hot and dry weather, a lot of attention is being paid to the potential for drought-tolerant hybrids to be developed. An easy way to check for drought tolerance this year was to grab a handful of soil and pull it up. If the soil resisted and was hard to pull up, it indicated a developed root system which could go wherever moisture was available. In the next few years, look for a special drought-tolerant corn with a genetic trait called latent. This trait allows the corn plant to turn off the reproductive system during heat or drought stress. After the stress is over, the plant resumes normal cycle.

Success for a library is measured in terms of the number of items circulated per capita, said Jim Scheppke, new coordinator for the West Texas Library System. "Just as in a retail business, three things are the key to the amount of business you do — the three things are location, location and location," Scheppke told the Friends of the Library at their regular Tuesday meeting in the Floyd County Library.

While other factors contribute to the success or failure of a library service, statistics prove that a court house is not the best place to house a library, Scheppke continued. Average circulation in the West Texas Library System area for 1979 was 7.19 books per person. In Floyd County the average was 2.24 books circulated per person. This statistic includes the Lockney branch library.

Out of the 24 member libraries in the system, five remain located in a courthouse. The Floyd County Library ranks 20th out of the 24 area libraries in the amount of money spent per capita for library services. Texas allows 16 cents per person from state funds for public libraries. These funds are distributed to Floyd County through the West Texas Library System, Scheppke explained.

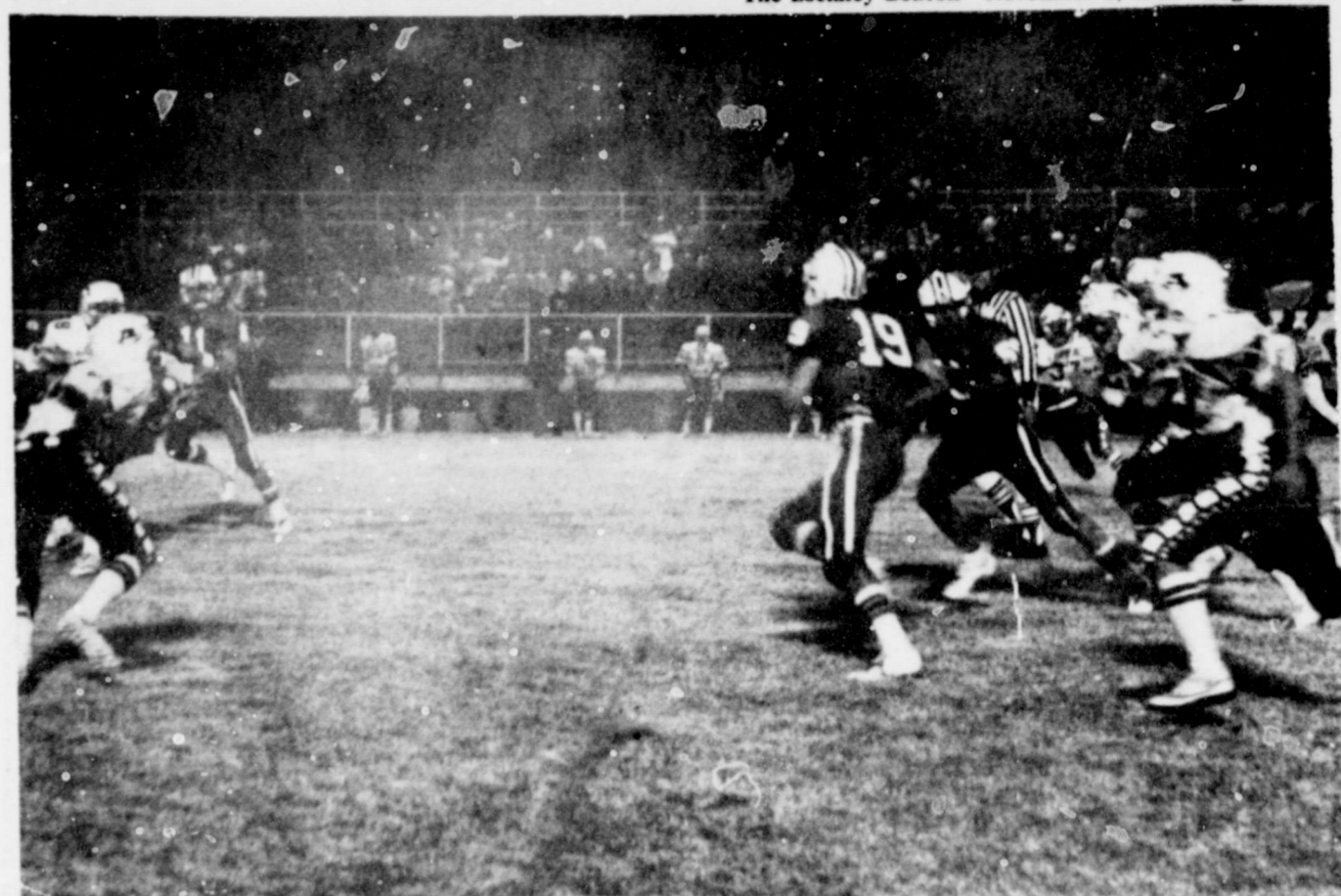
Lockney once again came back strong after Abernathy's score and drove the ball down the field well ending on the Abernathy 18 yard line.

Despite being further from the "geographical truth", the name has stuck. It is only a mile north of Quitaque Peaks.

"Mayshaw" might seem to be an unusual combination. A.J. Shaw was one of the promoters of the new town to take the place of Della Plain in 1892. His wife was named May. The two names were put together, and thus we have the designation "Mayshaw" for what is now the Muncy area.

Perhaps the most consistently mispronounced name in this general area is that of Quitaque. Many persons take the "q" sound quite literally at the beginning. Phonetically it would be spelled kit-ah-kway. It was taken from the Indian tongue, and has two meanings: "watering place" and "end of the trail." Quitaque Creek is well-known. There are also two hills that serve as landmarks. They are known as Quitaque Peaks, one being in Motley County, the other in Floyd. Quitaque, as a town, is in Briscoe County.

Barwise was not the original name of that community that is 10 miles west of Floydada on the Ft. Worth and Denver which still has a general store and agricultural enterprises. It was platted in 1928 and was first called Stringer, as there were well-improved farms, some under irrigation, belonging to the J.W. Stringer estate. But some freight meant for that location was sent by mistake to a town in Texas called bearing that title, and so, according to L.R. Stringer, son of the late J.W. Stringer, it became necessary to change the name. Some people were already calling it "Granary." The Ft. Worth and Denver wrote to him asking for name, and when

he requested them to make the designation they did so, calling it Barwise. This was in honor of Judge J.H. Barwise of Ft. Worth.

Aiken is located in the west part of Floyd County, only two miles east of the Hale County line, and was established in 1909. It was named for F.O. Aiker, one of the pioneer settlers of Floyd County, and the townsite was secured from the state of Texas on October 23, 1898. It is in the heart of the irrigation district, and is located on the branch line of the Santa Fe that runs from Floydada to Plainview.

The story about how HE, that is Blocker-Douglas, got his name, can be found in the article on "Range Life on the Plains."

GREY MULE

There's a section of Floyd County off the Cap, between Cedar Hill and Quitaque, commonly called "Grey Mule". This is simply because, in the days long before school buses carried children to school, many of them rode grey mules to school. No great mystery!

COLLEGE STATION — This summer was the hottest on record for most of the state's major metropolitan centers, but not enough to topple Texas' 44-year-old record for the hottest day.

That mark of 120 degrees — set in Seymour on Aug. 12, 1936 — was shaken but not unseated by neighboring Wichita Falls which recorded 117 degrees on June 29 for the highest temperature to yet come out of the Texas heat wave.

Unofficial figures from the State Climatologist's Office at Texas A&M University reveal that Wichita Falls had the worst of it this summer, with 70 days of 100-degree temperatures by the first week of September and rainfall so sparse a local newspaper called it drier than the Dust Bowl days.

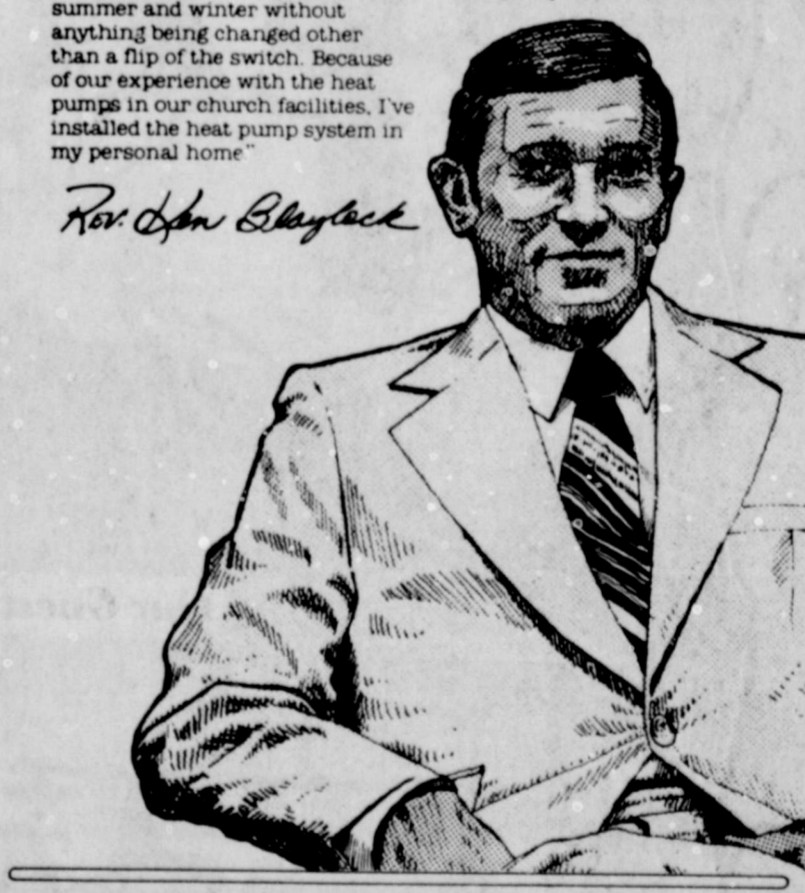

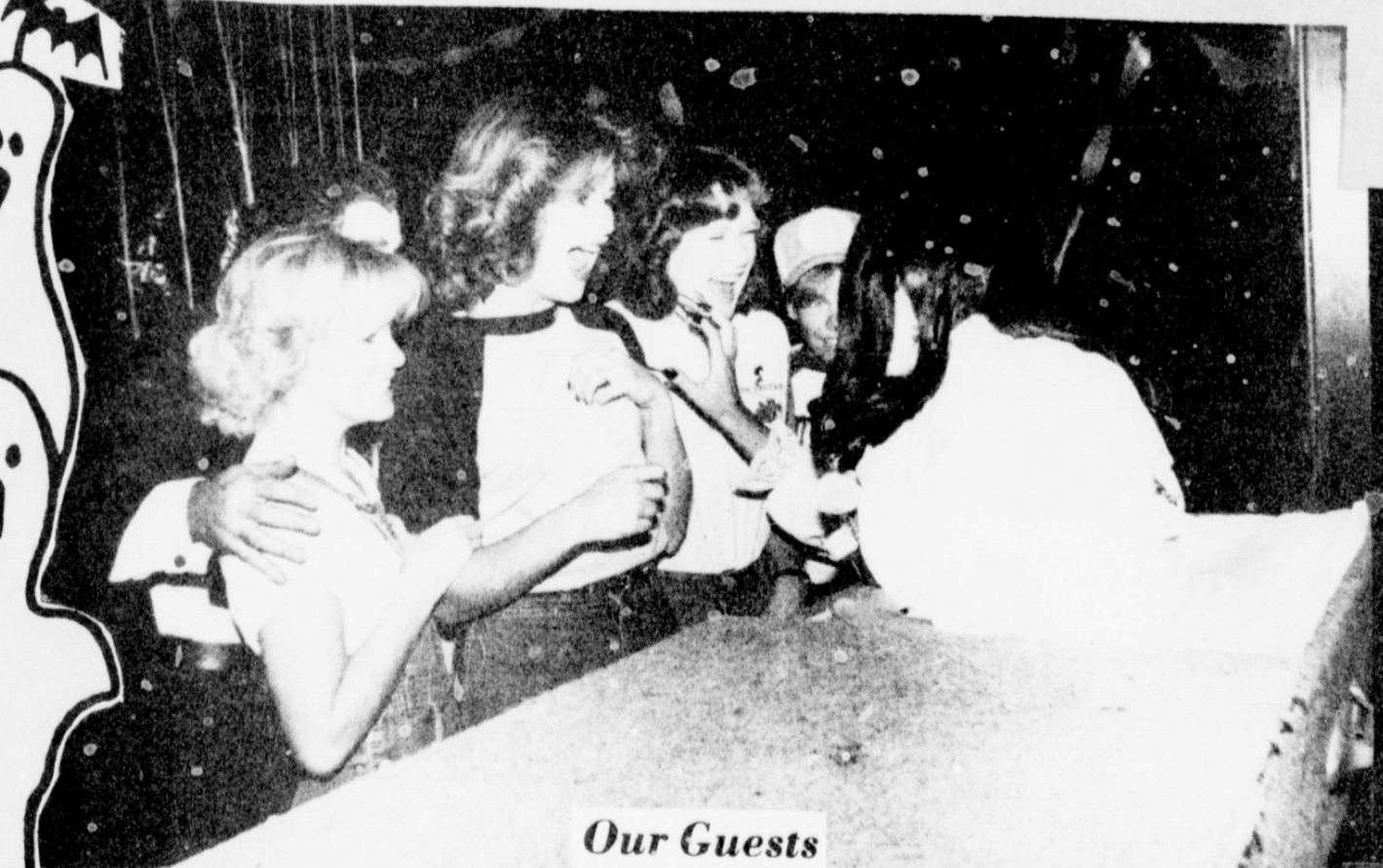
