

Who said homemaking

is just for girls?

Boys enrolled in homemaking classes isn't something new at Lockney High School, but local residents may be surprised to know that over one-half of the students in those classes taught by Cindy Ford are boys.

And the homemaking II class is composed of 14 boys and five girls. The senior home and family classes taught by Treena Aston also have an enrollment that is about one-half male.

While their friends may laught at the young men for taking "cake class", the male homemaking students and the male home and family life students arc telling their teachers that they believe the classes should be required and that the subject matter applies more to everyday life than many of their other subjects.

In Homemaking I the students spent about four weeks talking about dating and other relationships. Now into the cooking portion of the course, the students have already learned basic nutrition and have made quick breads such as muffins, biscuits, waffles and banana bread.

The boys and girls have just finished a study of milk products and learned to cook gravy, pudding and cream pies. One class period was spent making the pie crusts that were baked and saved until the next day. Mrs. Ford demonstrated a coconut cream pie so many of the groups chose to make that kind, but lemon and chocolate also were cooked. Currently the classes are learning to cook vegetables and teacher Cindy Ford encourages them to choose something besides green beans. Everyone is asked

to taste all the vegetables. Mrs. Foro and Mrs. Aston both say that in their experience the students prefer to eat their own cooking-even if

it's bad-than to eat food made by other cooking teams. The boys themselves will say that it is fun to make a better pie than anyone else as they make the homemaking classes another place to be competitive. Most of the boys believe that they are better cooks than the girls, with the

young ladies taking an opposite view. Both boys and girls share in the clean-up duties in the cooking units.

Mrs. Ford has redesigned the sewing classes that will begin second semester because of the boys' presence. Wardrobe planning and maintenance will be emphasized as the class will learn to mend and sew on buttons, iron, sort and wash clothing.

Students who wish to learn to sew will tackle garments on an individual basis on a contract with the teacher.

Also to be studied is consumer education, home management and some crafts such as macrame plant hangers.

Do the boys take what they learn home to be used in the kitchens there? Mrs. .Ford says "We give them home cooking assignments and they tell us the do them.

That must be true for a mother of a brawny senior football player described her son's chocolate cream pie made at home as "great". "It was the best pie crust I had eaten."

Another mother, whose son graduated last spring, says that he got interested in cooking in his home ec class and chased her from the kitchen many times this past summer to try his hand at such things as yeast-raised doughnuts and other complicated reci-

Mrs. Aston is glad to see boys enrolling in the homemaking classes. 'Even now most families cannot afford for the wife to stay at home, so the men will need to participate in the making of a home just as most of their wives will share in the earning of wages."



Farmers maybe losing valuable topsoil

Farmers in the Floyd County area who plow up and down the hill over surface, reduces erosion." terraces may be losing a lot more topsoil to erosion than they realize. So says Jon J. LaBaume, district conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service, at Floydada.

"Research indicated that plowing over terraces can double the amount of erosion as compared to farming with the terraces on the contour," LaBaume said.

The actual amount of gross erosion depends on several factors, including percent slope, length of slope, type of crop grown, amount of crop residue left on the surface, type of soil, and rainfall.

"All things being equal, there will be more erosion on land where cotton follows cotton than on land where sorghum follows sorghum," LaBaume said. "That's because sorghum produces more residue which, if left on the

LaBaume said one reason some farmers plow over terraces is because their land was terraced several years ago when two-row equipment was standard. These terraces were built as economically as possible and left a lot of point rows .. rows that are difficult to farm with 8, 10, or 12-row equipment. "One solution to the problem is to replace these old terraces with modern terraces that are built an even number of rows apart," LaBaume said. "We call these parallel terraces and they're alot easier to farm.'

He said parallel terraces cost more than standard terraces, partly because more cuts and fills are usually needed to make them work properly.

"But they are a lifetime investment," LaBaume stressed. "And since they are so much easier to farm, few farmers ever plow over them."

"Program" safety into

farming and ranching

Although poor work practices cause many farm and ranch accidents, poorly designed equipment and facilities can also create hazardous conditions that lead to accidents.

"Therefore, it's important to 'program' safety into your farming and ranching operation," contends Dr. Gary Nelson, an agricultural engineer in safety for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Hazardous conditions represent conditions of risk which could cause human and financial loss due to injury or damage to equipment. In addition, such conditions can also stifle agricultural productivity and lead to inefficient operations," points out Nelson.

"Farm and ranch workers should be on the constant lookout for hazardous physical or environmental conditions,' emphasizes the Texas A&M University System engineer. "Such conditions

should be corrected on the spot or as soon as possible to reduce the potential for accidents. Special attention should also be given to the safe design of equipment and facilities when purchased or installed."

Among hazardous conditions that lead to accidents include unsafe basic designs; worn equipment; protruding objects; lack of storage space; poor arrangement, placement or storage of equipment; objects which may move unexpectedly; exposed sources of electricity; congestion and insufficient clearance; improper or loose clothing; presence of flammable, corrosive or toxic substances; excessive noise; inadequate illumination or ventilation; or the presence of such atmospheric substances as dusts, gases or vapors.

'Be conscious of accident risks at all times, whether planning, purchasing or working with facilities or equipment,' cautions Nelson.

"Farm tractor and machinery mishaps take the lives of 800 to 1,000 people each year on our U.S. farms and ranches," David Bohac, Assistant Safety Director for the Texas Farm Bureau in Waco, said today as he spoke to Lockney FFA classes, at Lockney High School.

FFA

The Farm Bureau hopes to aid in reducing the needless loss of life, time, and farming equipment by encouraging greater caution and protective equipment.

Bohac discussed ways in which many Texas farm and ranch people have been fatally injured (30 to 50 annually)

in past years. They include overturns, horseplay, speed, extra passengers and refueling accidents. He estimates that both the (1) injury rate and the (2) fatality rate could be reduced by 40 to 50% through the use of protective equipment.

Using model equipment, Bohac illustrated the importance of protective cabs or roll-gards, properly mount-ed, with seat belts. Personal protective equipment such as bump hats,

gloves and snug fitting clothing were listed as being very important, too.

When on a road, or highway, proper lighting and markings were discussed, including SMV emblems. The SMV emblem is to be placed on the tractor, or self-propelled equipment that - by engineering design was designed to travel 25 MPH or less.



TEXAS BOBCAT TAGGING REQUIRED The bobcat pelt tagging season for Texas with the exception of 22 High Plains counties, is set for November 15, 1980 through February 15, 1981 by the Texas Parks and

Wildlife Department. These tagging dates were set due to the prime condition of

bobcats during the winter months in Texas. This is the third year Texas residents are required to get

theit bobcat pelts tagged prior to sale or shipment. For Texas bobcat pelts to be eligible for International trade, all pelts must be tagged by a registered pelt dealer. These dealers are certified and licensed by the P&WD.

Since the P&WD is the state agency required to manage and account for the bobcats, they are the agency that must set the rules according to the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service and the Office of the Scientific Authority.

During the 1979-80 bobcat tragging season, 11,455 bobcat pelts were tagged with prices for pelts ranging from \$45 to \$85. The bobcat pelt orices have dropped from two years ago when pelts were bringing up to \$125. The P&WD does not maintain a list of selling prices for

bobcat pelts due to the competative nature of fur sales and quality of pelts. It is best for persons wishing to sell their tagged pelts to contact a reputable fur dealer for current prices

Texas bobcats are separated scientifically by subspecies just like deer. In the 22 counties comprising the High Plains, a distinct subspecies of bobcat resides and cannot be harvested.

Deer hunting forecasts by P&WD personnel, hunters, and landowners point toward a good whitetail season which opens in the Panhandle November 22 and across the central Texas area on November 15.

The Panhandle white-tailed deer season continues through December 7 and the Rolling plains region of northwest Texas deer season continues through January 4, 1981.

Deer management in Texas requires different seasons and bag limits according to deer populations and habitat. For example, a deer hunter near Abilene could possibly bag three deer with a limit of two bucks or three antlerless deer by

A deer hunter in the Panhandle is limited to one deer whi must be a buck or antlerless by permit.

The late rains in the region of porthcentral Texas has produced a lush growth of food which has helped put the deer in good body shape. Antler growth has not been hurt by the extreme summer drought as there was adequate food last spring when the

antler growth began on the bucks.

All hunters and especially deer hunters are reminded to wear hunter blaze orange colored clothing including head cover while in the field. There is no excuse for a hunter to mistake another hunter for a deer or turkey.







News Q--Is an unmarried minor stepchild serving in the armed forces still considered by VA to be a member of a veteran's household? A -- Yes, provided the rela-

tionship of the stepchild as a member of the veteran's household was established prior to entrance into the armed iorces.

Q--I have completed both college and specialized training with VA educational benefits. Now I wish to go into business for myself. Does the VA make business loans?

A--The Veterans Administration does not make business loans. However, loans and business management advice for veterans are available through the Small Business Administration.


Q--I am a 100 percent service connected veteran receiving compensation. I am also attending school fulltime and receive education benefits. I receive allowances for my dependents (a wife and two children) under both programs. One of my sons, aged 17, will begin college this tall. He will not be 18 until early next year. How long will I receive pay for him as my dependent?

A--He will be included in your compensation and education allowances until he reaches age 18. He will then become eligible for benefits under the VA dependents' education program.

Q--I receive retired pay as a result of military service and I also qualify for a VA clothing allowance for prosthetic devices I wear. Am I required to waive a portion of my retirement equal to the clothing allowance?

A--No. But you must waive an amount equal to any VA compensation you receive.

Q -- My husband was killed in service. I am now financially able to purchase a home. Will the Veterans

Drought Brings Crop Harvest Estimates Down


AUSTIN--The vegetable harvest for the last quarter of 1980 is expected to drop, one more lingering effect of the drought that in some areas of the state made it "too dry to plant," reports Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown.

Harvest of carrots, bell peppers, spinach, lettuce and cabbage will all be down, according to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Only cucumbers and tomatoes are expected to increase over the 1979 fall harvest.

"It wasn't disease or insects that got these crops," said Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown. "It was the hot, dry weather. In some areas it was too dry to plant." Prospective harvest figures for the October-December quarter are 3,400 acres of carrots, down 11 percent from 1979; 4,800 acres of bell peppers, down 17 percent; 4,000 acres of cabbage, down 33 percent; 1,700 acres of spinach, down 37 percent, and 900 acres of lettuce, down 47 percent

Around 4,600 acres of cucumbers, a 35 percent increase over last year, are expected for harvest. Tomatoes will increase from 500 acres in 1979 to 800 this fall


Nationwide, harvest for 14 fresh market vegetables is estimated at 249,000 acres, down one percent from a year ago. Yields are projected at 2.06 metric tons, down four percent.



Following a 35-minute program of Christmas carols, 12,000 red, yellow and white lights, outlining seven buildings around Memorial Circle, will be switched on. A torchlight procession from Texas Tech's Broadway and University entrance to the Science Quadrangle at 6:55 p.m. will follow the summons of carillon music by Professor Judson D. May-Led by the Saddle Tramps, men's service organization, nce. (90 mins.) the procession will pass 1,500 luminarios lining Memorial Circle along the path to the Science Quadrangle where the musical program will begin at 7 p.m. Luminarios will be provided by service fraternity Alpha Phi Omega, Womens Service Organization and Catholic service fraternity Chi Rho. The musical program will feature the Texas Tech and residence hall choirs. After the 30-40 minute program, decorative lights on the Administration Building, Holden Hall, Home Economics Building, Mass Communications Building and the buildings around the Science Quadrangle will be turned on. 


