Jaws of Life campaign victorious

The Lockney Jaws of Life campaign has succeeded. The fund raising drive for the emergency equipment for the fire department passed the magic \$6,000 mark with a \$1,500 contribution from the Floyd County Farm Bureau and within hours, the jaws was on its way to Lockney.

The jaws actually cost about \$8,000 and the Lockney Fire Department received over \$8,500 in contributions. The extra money will be used for other fire department equipment.

The jaws is a gasoline-powered piece of hydraulic equipment that can cut, push and pull. It can be used to remove traffic accident victims from the wreckage of their vehicles or to knock down doors to allow firemen to gain entry into burning buildings during fires. The Jaws can apply 12,000 pounds of pressure.

The Lockney jaws campaign began about two months ago following an accident at Hale Center when a man became trapped with both feet in a combine. The closest jaws was at Plainview and it took an hour and 45 minutes for it to arrive at the accident scene. Once there, it took only five minutes to get the man free. But it was

too late. The man died on the way to a hospital in Lubbock.

Following the Hale Center tragedy, the Lockney Rotary Club asked Lockney Fire Chief Jerry Johnson if the department could use a jaws of its own. When Johnson told the club the jaws would be of great help in emergency situations, the Rotary launched the fundraising drive with a \$2,000 contribution.

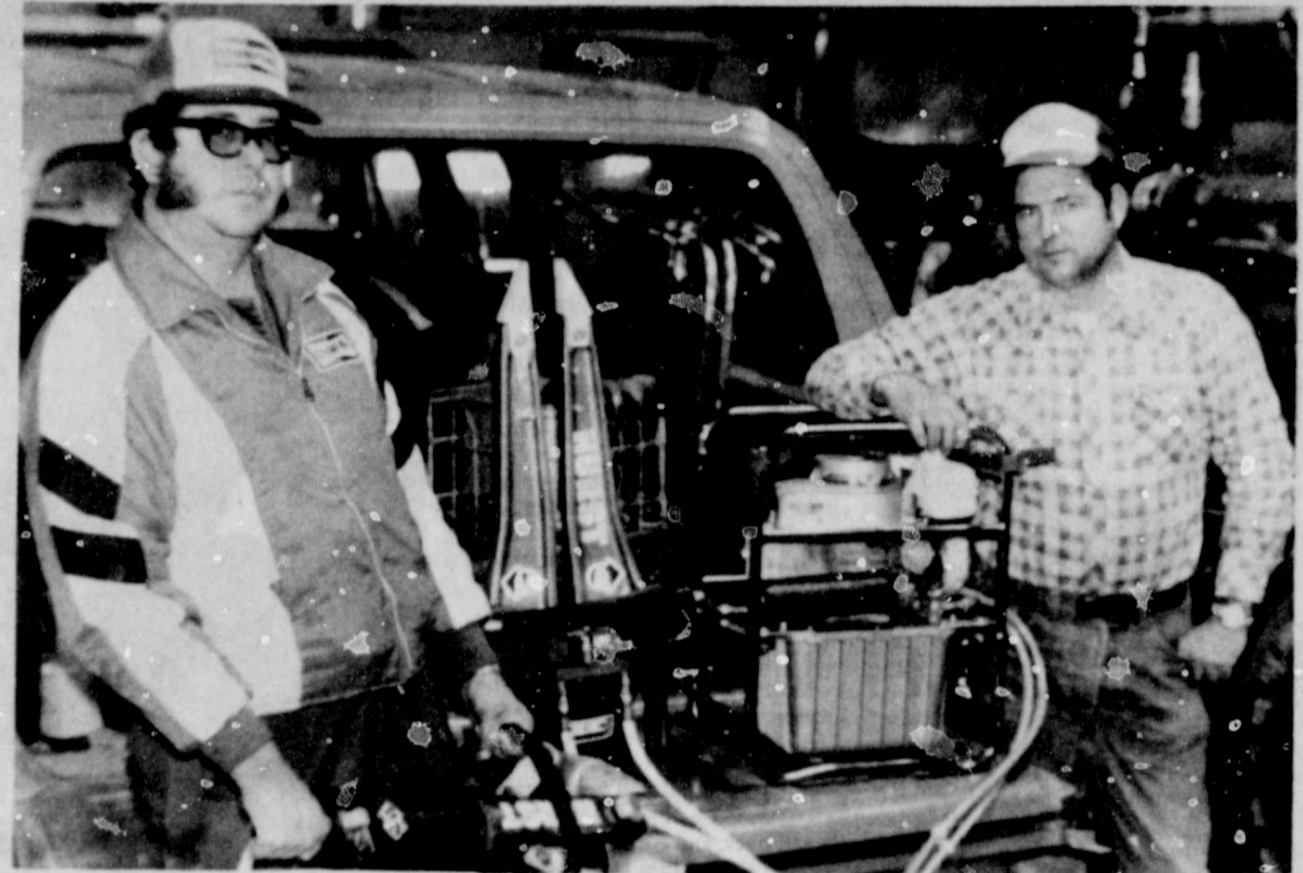
The Il Penseroso Study Club followed with a donation of \$1,000 and the student body at Lockney High School collected \$557 worth of pennies for the fund drive.

And there were dozens of individual contributions from private citizens. Finally, last week's contribution from the Floyd County Farm Bureau pushed the drive over the top.

"There's only been one time we really needed it," Chief Johnson says, "but there are many times we could use it. It'll help in the less serious cases as well as the life and death situations."

Johnson is pleased the department finally has the jaws in its possession but he has one other wish.

"It's the best piece of equipment," he says, "that I hope we never have to use."

Near-blizzard hits Floyd County again

Near-blizzard ripped Floyd County the second time in ten-days yesterday.

About ten inches of snow had fallen early afternoon and the National Weather Service was calling for another five to six inches before it stopped falling.

Winds were clocked at 20 miles per hour with gusts to 27 causing three to four foot drifts and at times reducing visibility to no more than 50 feet.

The National Weather Service officially classifies a blizzard as a snowfall of 35 mile per hour winds and falling snow. A Weather Service spokesman at Lubbock says yesterday's snowfall was close but not quite a blizzard.

Schools at Floydada called off classes yesterday while Lockney schools did not until 10 o'clock in the morning and

bus service was provided only on paved roads.

The Texas Highway Department crews at Floydada were called out about 3 a.m. yesterday. A department spokeswoman says two graders, six trucks with snow blades and two trucks with front end loaders were put into action.

No roads were ever officially classified as closed in Floyd County, but travel nevertheless was extremely hazardous.

There were no reports of any serious traffic accidents but there were a number of minor collisions. The highway department crews also rescued several people whose automobiles had become stuck or stalled in the snow. There were no reports of any injuries.

The latest snowfall came just nine days after ten inches of snow buried the county and sent temperatures plummeting into the teens.



TEXAS HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT CREWS were out in force as Floyd County got another ten inches of snow for the second time in ten days. Winds gusting to 26 miles per hour reduced visibility to less than 50 feet at times.

Cable TV may be Headed for Lockney

The Lockney City Council may make a decision on a new cable television franchise for the city at its next meeting December 4.

Mayor Claude Brown says there are two applicants for the franchise which was held by Floydada Cable Television. Floydada Cable let its franchise expire without ever starting cable television in Lockney because its costs projections were too high for the number of potential subscribers in Lockney.

The two applicants are Big Springs Cable Television, which has just purchased the Floydada operation, and a second party which Brown says wishes to remain unidentified for the time being.

Brown says the council will try to make a decision on which firm to award the new franchise to at its next meeting. Brown says if weather permits, construction on the Lockney cable

system could start immediately and cable television could be available within six months.

The Mayor says one major question that still must be resolved is whether the new franchise holder will construct the cable system on existing utility poles, construct new poles or put the cable in under ground. Brown says the city will not force the recipient of the new franchise to do either one since the city wants to see the cable system get started as quickly as possible, because of community interest in it.

Getting the cable system going in Lockney will also mean more income for the city since the city will charge the company that receives the franchise a three percent franchise tax.

Brown says he expects to see three-to-four-hundred cable subscribers to begin with.

Wilbur Mize says He won't close

Wilbur Mize, owner of Mize Pharmacy and TV on Main Street in Lockney, says there is no truth to rumors he is going out of business.

Mize says the rumors began circulating in town after he experienced some personal problems. He also says there is truth to the report he is going to sell his house.

Mize has been in business in Lockney 18-years and he says he hopes to be in business in Lockney for another 18 years.

Perry Implement to close

The Perry Implement Co. on Main Street in Lockney will close this weekend after ten years in the community.

But the services provided by Perry will not be lost to Floyd County. The Perry's also operate implement businesses in Floydada and Petersburg and the Lockney services and merchandise will be divided between those two locations.

The Perry's are an independent John Deere dealer and its Deere thinking

behind the closing. "Deere wants to centralize," Perry says. "That's their economic thinking for the future because there are less farmers with more land and no new farmers coming up." As a result, Perry says, fewer stores provide service and merchandise to larger areas. The closing of the Lockney branch will in turn mean larger Perry businesses in Floydada and Petersburg.

The farming equipment at the Lock-

ney business will go to Floydada and Petersburg. Some of the parts and other merchandise will also be moved to the other two locations while some will be returned to Deere.

Mike Perry will be returning to Petersburg where he worked before coming to Lockney last year. His father, John Perry has been operating the Petersburg store while his uncle, Jerry Perry, manages the branch in Floydada.

Mackenzie bonds Get voter okay

Heavy voter turnout marked a new era for four South Plains towns as they passed the Mackenzie Water Authority Bond election by a 5-1 margin Saturday.

Floydada voters turned out in a surprisingly heavy count of 323 to 89 in favor of the bond issue.

Lockney had heavy voter participation with 206 to 20 giving them a 10 to 1 margin.

Tulia cast 871 votes for and only 147 against. Silverton resident provided the issue's largest single margin of victory with 320 ballots for to 20 against.

The funds from the bond issue will be added to existing monies to finance the construction of a water treatment plant at Lake Mackenzie. This will provide residents for the four towns with an above-ground water source, a crucial commodity in view of the gradual depletion of the underground supply from the Ogallala and Santa Rosa formations.

The issue had to pass in all four cities because funding for the original building of the dam came from the four towns.

Tuesday night the Mackenzie Board met to canvass the votes and discuss plans. They are contacting Representatives Charles Stenholm and Jack Hightower and informing them of the election results.

First item will be to secure the one million dollar grant that has already been approved for the project.

Jack Hightower is on the appropriations committee. He has stated that the Mackenzie project is top priority with him. He was particularly impressed that the four towns secured the water rights and built the dam on their own without depending on government funds.

Charles Stenholm said in an interview last week that appropriation money has been cut by 2% and they will not know until later in the year what area of government spending will be shorted.

The fact that the bond was approved by such a wide margin will help in getting the funds soon said Neil Taylor, Manager of the Mackenzie Lake. "We are trying to get it pushed through, but we definitely think that within the

coming year it will all be approved."

He was referring to the one-million-dollar grant and also to the FmHA loan that will be secured by the water contracts.

Lon Davis, president of the Mackenzie board, said that he was particularly pleased with the election results. "We told the people exactly how it was and they came out in favor of it. I'm very gratified."

Lockney Mayor Claude Brown says he wasn't surprised with the ten to one margin of approval Lockney residents gave the bond issue.

"I'm very well pleased," Brown says. "It carried at least as well as we expected. I was a little bit surprised there were a few more against than we thought there would be, but we weren't too far off. The people could see it was needed. Now we've got to get the wheels turning."

The president of First National Bank in Lockney, George Sparkman, says approval of the bond issue should mean long-term economic growth for both Lockney and the surrounding area.

"It should make the area more stable," Sparkman says, "and outside industry will look more favorably on an area with a dependable water source."

"This is basically an agricultural area and passage of the bond issue should broaden that base over the long term," Sparkman says, attracting smaller industry to the area.

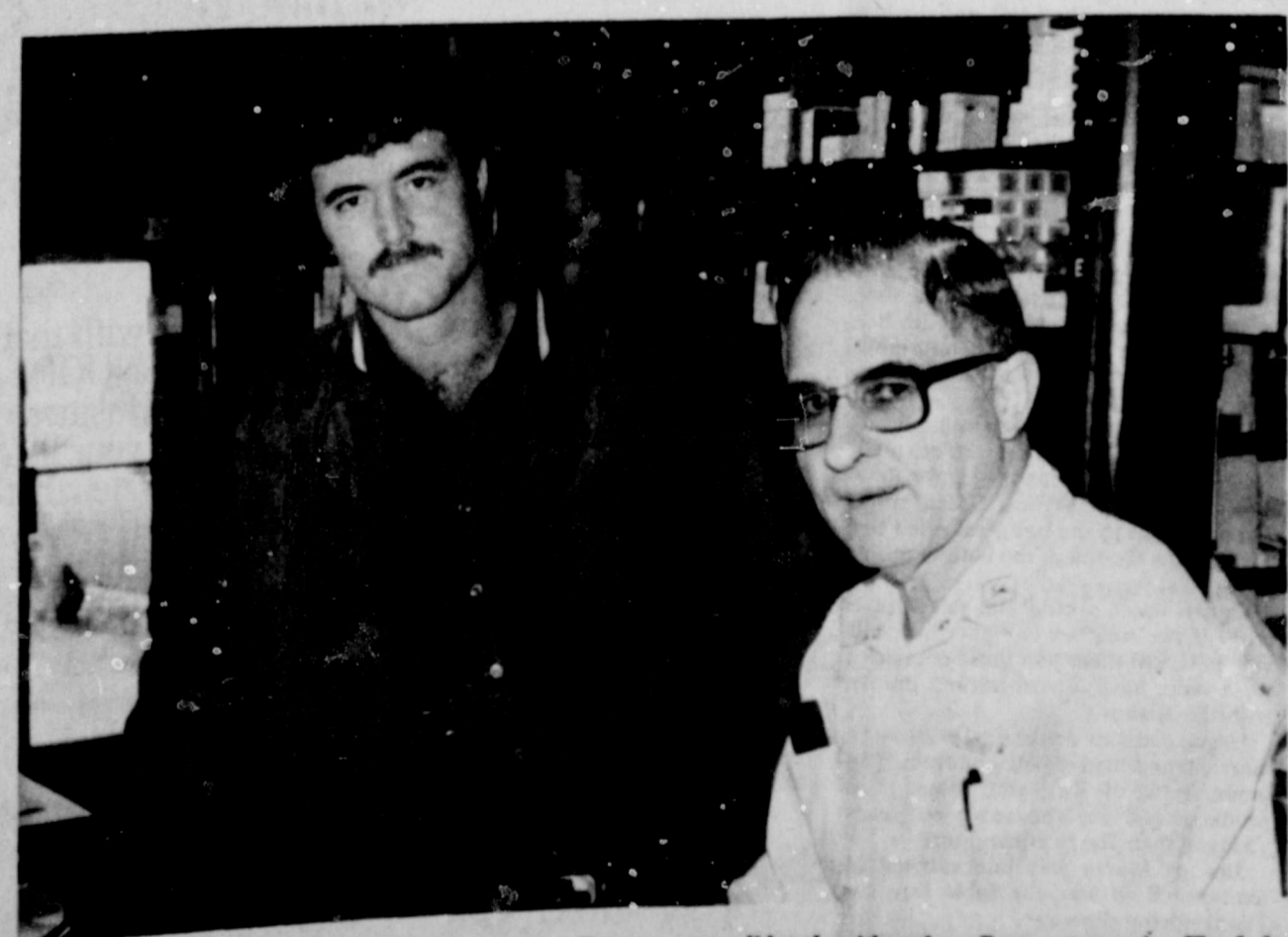
Sparkman says as other areas run out of water they may find Lockney and the surrounding area attractive for relocation because of the dependable water source. Sparkman says the full positive results of the bond issue passage may not be felt until the next decade.

New four-way stop in Lockney

A new four-way stop intersection has been established at Southeast First Street and College in Lockney.

Police Chief Bill McConnell says the four stop signs were constructed because the intersection is blind from three directions and there has been a number of traffic accidents there over the years.

McConnell says there will be a training period before he begins issuing tickets for failure to obey the stop signs.

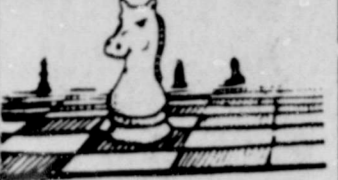

Any 4-H'er who has participated in a 4-H Foods and Nutrition project this year is eligible to enter. Judging will be based on the entrant's knowledge of nutrition and the food exhibited. One winner in each division will advance to the South Plains Food Show December 13 in Lubbock.

HOW TO CARVE ROAST TURKEY

Carving a turkey at the table seems to make a meal just a little more special and festive. This impressive looking task is easy if the carver follows these steps:

1. Let turkey stand for 20 to 30 minutes after roasting.
2. Remove drumstick and thigh—To remove drumstick and thigh, press leg away from body. Joint connecting leg to backbone will often snap free or may be severed easily with knife point. Cut dark meat completely from body by following body contour carefully with knife.
3. Slicing dark meat—Place drumstick and thigh on separate plate and cut through connecting joint. Both pieces may be individually sliced. Tilt drumstick to convenient angle, slicing towards plate.
4. Slicing thigh—To slice thigh meat, hold firmly on plate with fork. Cut even slices parallel to the bone.
5. Preparing breast—In preparing breast for easy slicing, place knife parallel and as close to wing as possible. Make deep cut into breast, cutting right to bone. This is your base cut. All breast slices will stop at this vertical cut.
6. Carving breasts—After base cut, begin to slice breast. Carve downward, ending at base cut. Start each new slice slightly up on breast. Keep slices thin and even.

FIX-IT FACTS

Weathermen are forecasting a bad 1980-81 winter and increased heating costs. To combat larger fuel bills, insulate. The best place to start is in the attic. An under-insulated attic drains energy, letting heated air through the roof in winter and acting as a giant solar collector in summer. R-values measure the resistance of the flow of heat. The greater the R-value, the less energy lost. R-values of R-30 - R-35 are considered ideal for our winter climate. However it may not be economically feasible to get over R-20... considered to be an acceptable goal. Without compressing, measure the attic's insulation depth. Most kinds of insulation used in an attic (batts, blankets, poured loose fill) have an R-value of 3 - 3.1 per inch thickness. For example, if your insulation is one of these and has a depth of 3 inches, the R-value for your attic is R-9, considerably lower than the goal of R-20.

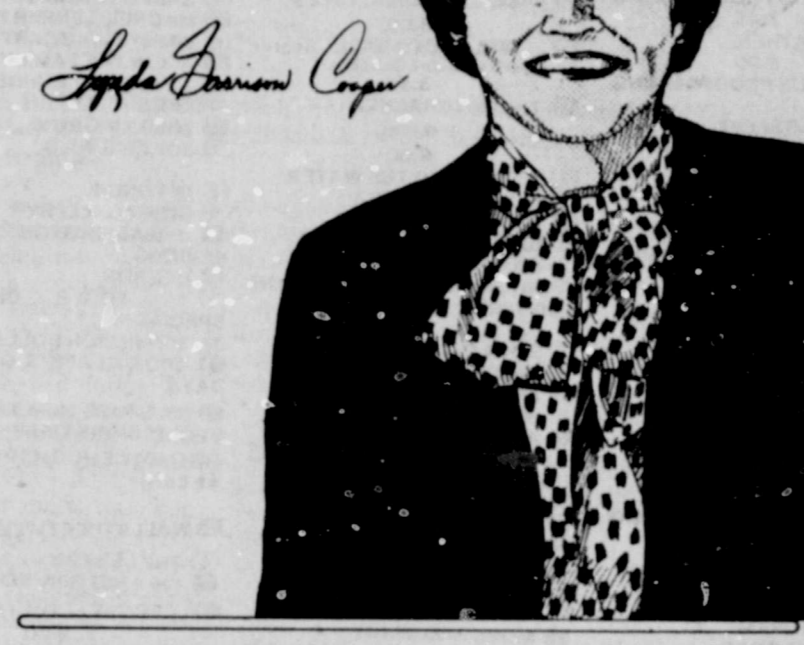

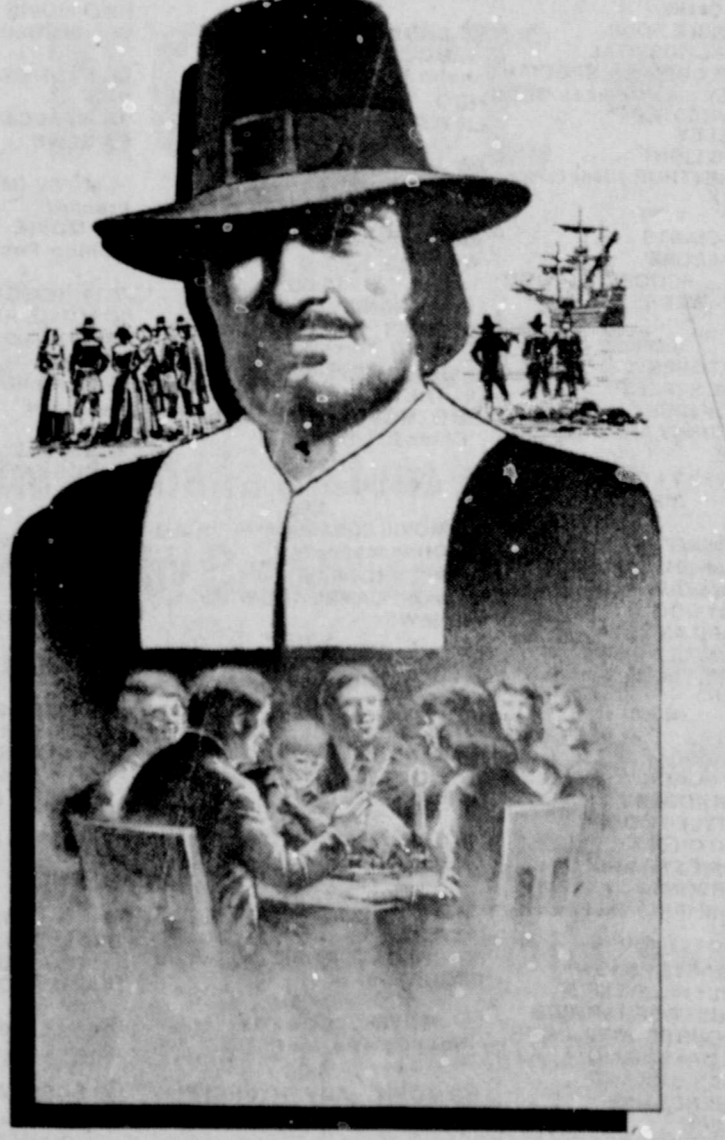

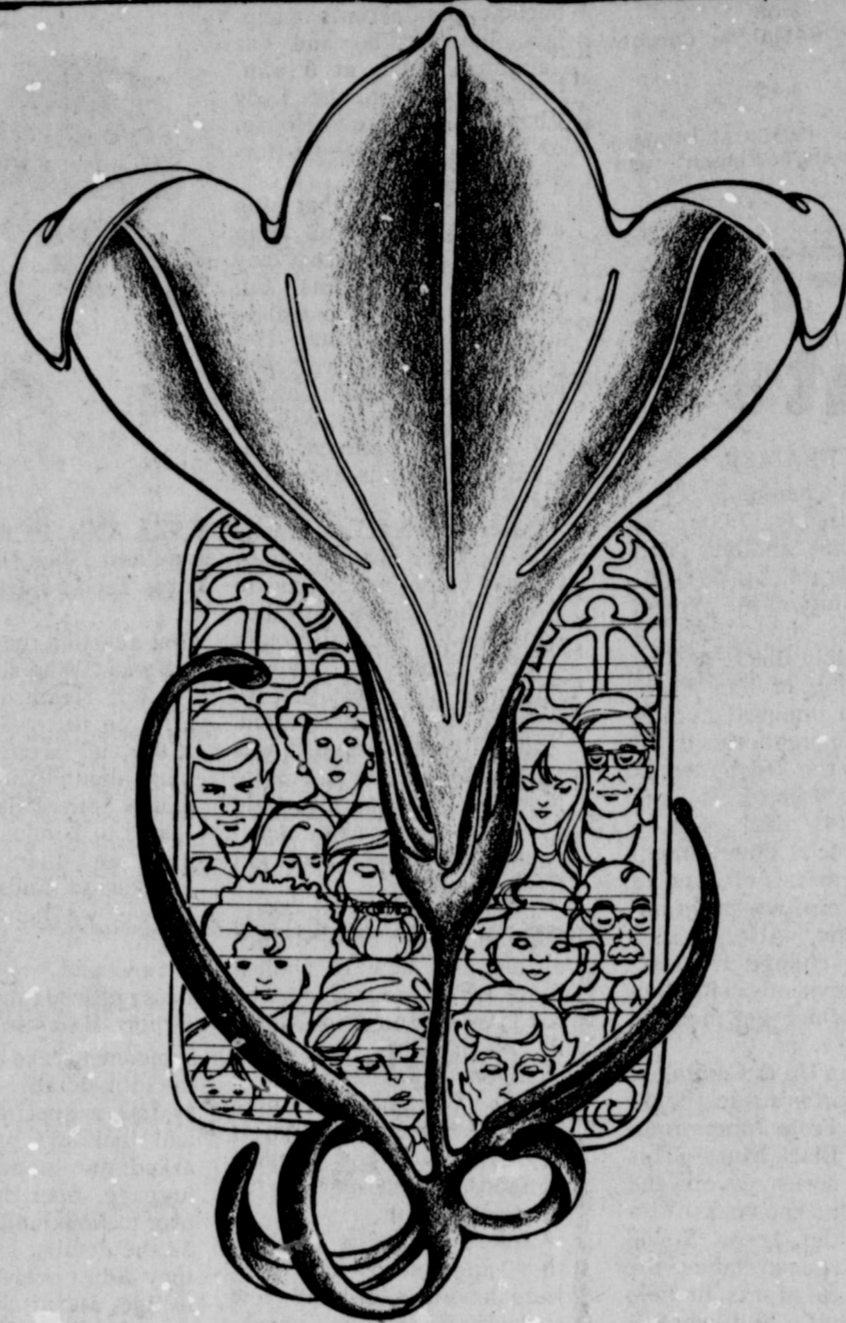

GIFTS FOR ALL

Thanksgiving is more than a "day"; it's a way of life. A teaching of St. Cyril of Jerusalem (386 A.D.) shed some light on the beauty of a grateful heart.

He compared the spirit of God to water. It was an image he chose because of Christ's words, "The water that I shall give him will become in him a spring of water welling up to eternal life." (John 4:14)

"Water," said St. Cyril, "comes down from heaven as rain, and although it is always the same in itself, it produces many different effects: one in the palm tree, another in the vine, and so on, throughout the whole of creation. It does not come down now as one thing, now as another, but while remaining essentially the same, it adapts itself to the nature and need of every creature that receives it. In the same way, the Holy Spirit, whose nature is always the same, simple and indivisible, apportions grace to each man as He wills."

The idea that your basic natural gifts are enhanced by the Holy Spirit was taught earlier by St. Paul. It's an interesting concept worthy of meditation.

When human weakness or personal shortcomings prevent you from doing what you'd like to do, don't think of yourself negatively. St. Paul had the same problem, "The good that I would do, I never do." St. Cyril is consoling on this point:

"The Spirit makes one person a teacher of divine truth, inspires another to prophecy. . . The Spirit strengthens one person's self-control, shows another how to help the poor, teaches another to fast and lead a life of asceticism, makes another oblivious to the needs of the body, trains another for martyrdom. . . In each person the Spirit reveals His presence in a particular way for the common good."

From this we see that it is possible to be weak in one or more area, while being gifted in another. No one receives all the gifts. Yet how many people feel discouraged when they come across real holiness or outstanding generosity in another? They are unfair to themselves.

As I reflect on the teaching of St. Cyril, I realize how important it is for us to thank God for what we have, whatever it is. Certain gifts are obviously stronger in some people than in others, giving balance to the whole. And since the gifts of the Spirit are given for the common good, we can all rejoice in the gifts of others.

The Spirit, like water, is everywhere the same. We thank God for all His gifts, especially for the ones He has given you.

Government sets Crop regulations

The U.S. Department of Agriculture now has announced that growers of either wheat or feed grains in 1981 will be required to plant within their established Normal Crop Acreage (NCA) in order to qualify for loans, disaster coverage or price deficiency payments under government programs. A pending announcement on whether cotton producers also will be shackled by the same requirement is not expected until after December 2. There is industrywide opposition to the requirement for cotton, plus opposition from state officials of USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS), but a Washington source November 20 told Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. that as far as the current Administration is concerned "it looks now like you're going to get it."

FHA state plan gets approved

Approval of the Farmers Home Administration state management plan for fiscal year 1981 which began October 1, was announced recently by W.H. Pieratt, State Director for Texas. National FmHA Administrator, Gordon Cavanaugh had recently notified the state office of final approval. In addition to the state office, there are District and County offices in Texas to serve rural citizens. "Rural" usually means places of less than 10,000 persons, with the exception of the Business and Industry program which may serve communities up to 50,000 population. Last year in Texas, FmHA provided 16,043 loans and grants to families and groups totaling over \$826 million. Group loans include rental housing, business and industry, water and sewer and community facilities. These loans are repaid with interest and provide a means for rural people to help themselves improve their lives and conditions.

'Wait 'til next year' Ag leaders say

While 1980 will go down in the record books as a tough year for most agricultural producers, 1981 offers hope, especially for those in the livestock industry. "Livestock prices should show solid increases next year due to lower total meat production and improved consumer demand," believes Dr. Ed. Uvacek, livestock marketing economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Cash receipts from livestock and livestock products totaled \$69 billion last year in the U.S., 52 percent of all farm and ranch income, notes Uvacek. In Texas 1979 cash receipts from livestock and livestock products surpassed \$4.3 billion, or more than 55 percent of all agricultural income in the state.
