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aws of Life campaign victorious

The Lockney Jaws of Life campaign has succeded. The fund raising drive for the emergency equipment for the fire department passed the magic \$8,000 mark with a \$1,500 contribution from the Floyd County Farm Bureau and within hours, the jaws was on its way to

The jaws actually cost about \$8,000 and the Lockney Fire Department received over \$8,500 in contributions. The extra money will be used for other fire department equipment.

The jaws is a gasoline-powered piece of hydraulic equipment that can cut, push and pull. It can be used to remove traffic accident victims from the wreckage of their vehicles or to knock down doors to allow firemen to gain entry into burning buildings during fires. The Jaws can apply 12,000 pounds of

The Lockney jaws campaign began about two-months ago following an accident at Hale Center when a man became trapped with both feet in a combine. The closest jaws was at Plainview and it took an hour and 45 minutes for it to arrive at the accident scene. Once there, it took only five minutes to get the man free. But it was

too late. The man died on the way to a hospital in Lubbock.

Following the Hale Center tragedy. the Lockney Rotary Club asked Lockney Fire Chief Jerry Johnson if the department could use a jaws of its own. When Johnson told the club the jaws would be of great help in emergency situations. the Rotary launched the fundraising drive with a \$2,000 contribution.

The Il Penseroso Study Club followed with a donation of \$1,000 and the student body at Lockney High School collected \$557 worth of pennies for the fund drive.

And there were dozens of individual contributions from private citizens. Finally, last week's contribution from the Floyd County Farm Bureau pushed the drive over the top. "There's only been one time we

really needed it," Chief Johnson says, but there are many times we could use it. It'll help in the less serious cases as well as the life and death situations.' Johnson is pleased the department finally has the jaws in its possession but

he has one other wish. "It's the best piece of equipment," he says, "that I hope we never have to

The Texas Highway Department crews at Floydada were called out about 3 a.m. yesterday. A department spokeswoman says two graders, six trucks with snow blades and two trucks with front end loaders were put into action.

No roads were ever officially classified as closed in Floyd County, but travel nevertheless was extremely haz-

There were no reports of any serious traffic accidents but there were a number of minor collisions. The highway department crews also rescued several people whose automobiles had become stuck or stalled in the snow. There were no reports of any injuries.

The latest snowfall came just nine days after ten inches of snow buried tne county and sent temperatures plummetting into the teens.

Cable TV may be Headed for Lockney

The Lockney City Council may make a decision on a new cable television franchise for the city at its next meeting December 4.

Mayor Claude Brown says there are two applicants for the franchise which was held by Floydada Cable Television. Floydada Cable let its franchise expire without ever starting cable television in Lockney because its costs projections were too high for the number of potential subscribers in Lockney.

The two applicants are Big Springs Cable Television, which has just purchased the Floydada operation, and a second party which Brown says wishes to remain unidentified for the time

Brown says the council will try to make a decision on which firm to award the new franchise to at its next meeting. Brown says if weather permits, construction on the Lockney cable

system could start immediately and cable television could be available within six months.

The Mayor says one major question that still must be resolved is whether the new franchise holder will construct the cable system on existing utility poles, construct new poles or put the cable in under ground. Brown says the city will not force the recipient of the new franchise to do either one since the city wants to see the cable system get started as quickly as possible, because

Getting the cable system going in Lockney will also mean more income for the city since the city will charge the company that receives the franchise a three percent franchise tax.

Brown says he expects to see threeto-four-hundred cable subscribers to

Mackenzie bonds Get voter okay

Heavy voter turnout marked a new coming year it will all be approved." era for four South Plains towns as they passed the Mackenzie Water Authority Bond election by a 5-1 margin Saturday. Floydada voters turned out in a surprisingly heavy count of 323 to 89 in

favor of the bond issue. Lockney had heavy voter participation with 206 to 20 giving them a 10 to 1

Tulia cast 871 votes for and only 147 against. Silverton resident provided the issue's largest single margin of victory

with 320 ballots for to 20 against. The funds from the bond issue will be added to existing monies to finance the construction of a water treatment plant at Lake Mackenzie. This will provide residents for the four towns with an above-ground water source, a crucial commodity in view of the gradual depletion of the underground supply from the Ogallala and Santa Rosa formations

The issue had to pass in all four cities because funding for the original building of the dam came from the four

Tuesday night the Mackenzie Board met to canvas the votes and discuss plans. They are contacting Representatives Charles Stenholm and Jack Hightower and informing them of the election results.

First item will be to secure the one million dollar grant that has already been approved for the project.

Jack Hightower is on the appropriations committee. He has stated that the Mackenzie project is top priority with him. He was particularly impressed that the four towns secured the water rights and built the dam on their own without depending on government funds.

Charles Stenholm said in an interview

last week that appropriation money has been cut by 2% and they will not know until later in the year what area of

government spending will be shorted.

Lon Davis, president of the Macken-zie board, said that he was particularly pleased with the election results. "We told the people exactly how it was and they came out in favor of it. I'm very

Lockney Mayor Claude Brown says he wasn't su.prised with the ten to cne margin of approval Lockney residents gave the bond issue.

"I'm very well pleased," Brown says. "It carried at least as well as we expected. I was a little bit surprised there were a few more against than we thought there would be, but we weren't too far off. The people could see it was needed. Now we've got to get the wheels turning."

The president of First National Bank in Lockney, George Sparkman, says approval of the bond issue should mean long-term economic growth for both Lockney and the surrounding area.

"It should make the area more stable," Sparkman says, "and outside industry will look more favorably on an area with a dependable water source."

"This is basically an agricultural area and passage of the bond issue should broaden that base over the long term," Sparkman says, attracting smaller in-

Sparkman says as other areas run out of water they may find Lockney and the surrounding area attractive for relocation because of the dependable water source. Sparkman says the full positive results of the bond issue passage may not be felt until the next decade.



Two Couples in MGM fire

I suppose this story begins with the first snow of the season. Connie Bearden had been stripping cotton without a break and now that he couldn't get into the fields he felt like getting away for a few days and relaxing.

On the spur of the moment Monday, November 17, Ray Nell and Connie Bearden, and Lewis and Ann Reddy decided to go to Las Vegas.

Ann was reluctant. They were remodeling their house and she didn't want to leave. She finally gave in, and within 24 hours they checked into the luxurious MGM Grand Hotel. Ann was uneasy. "What would we do if there was a fire?" she asked Lewis as

they checked into their room on the 18th floor. Another time during the week as she and Ray Nell were winding their way

through the long honeycomb of passageways she posed the same question. They had 11 a.m. reservations on a flight out of Vegas on Friday. Connie got up early that morning and went downstairs. He read the paper awhile

and watched the few players in the casino. Raynell called home to Floydada to talk to her children before they went to

About 6:30 a.m. she joined Connie downstairs and they went into one of the seven coffee shops and restaurants arranged in a semi-circle around a central They are a leisurely breakfast and then instead of getting on an elevator and

going directly to their room they took a short walk down the Hall of Statues. At the end of the hall they noticed a strong odor. Turning back they saw one of the maintenance men come out into the hall. Smoke was coming through one of the

Two exits were close by. Doors going into the Hali game room were locked. Another exit to the outside was about 40 feet away.

Suddenly a huge black ball of smoke erupted and filled the hallway. They were choking, blinded by the smoke. Ray Nell was close to the maintenance man and he lead her to the exit. She thought Connie was behind her. But he didn't come. She waited, holding the door open thinking the light would pierce the thick smoke so Connie could see his way out.

Finally the maintenance man told her that perhaps her husband had gone out one of the other exits and she ran to it. People were stampeding. Fire engine sirens were coming from every direction. Frightened she ran back and forth, but the exit she had come out of is part of the Wall of Mirrors and she couldn't find it again.

When the smoke blast hit, Connie had dropped to his knees. The air nearer the floor wasn't as thick and it was easier to breath. He began crawling in what he thought was the direction of the exit. A door opened in front of him and he went through, past a woman, and the door shut immediately behind him.

He was in one of the offices. The woman, about 60 years old, was panicy. She had a breathing and heart problem and begged him not to open the door that would let more smoke into the room.

Trying to calm her, he stuffed kleenex around the door. Smoke was drifting in through the ventilation system. They could hear people screaming, and the sirens sounded like they were right outside the door.

They were in the eastern part of the building. The blast of smoke and fire had swept west through the casino. Gutting the lobby and killing at least 10 people.

Upstairs on the 18th floor Ann Reddy had just gotten up. She could hear people running through the halls. A man banged on the door and shouted "Fire. She and Lewis went out into the hall. People were running frantically. Smoke was

A man came from one direction and yelled, "We can't get out that way; I'll check the other direction." He disappeared into the smoke.

His wife was screaming, "Where are you? Where are you?" People were coughing and choking. The Reddy's knew they couldn't stay there so they ran back in their room.

Lewis grabbed towels and wet them to hold over their faces. He started the water running in the tub and the lavitory.

He grabbed the sheets off the bed and soaked them. They stuffed the sheets around the door to keep the smoke out

"I was sure we were going to die." Ann said. The couple knelt together in the The bathroom was flooded but the water wouldn't run into the room. They filled

the wastepaper basket and soaked the carpet. Lewis kept the sheet around the door wet. They kept wet towels over their faces. The room was still filling with smoke. They could hear glass breaking and see it showering down from the upper floors. It was smoke colored and they thought it was exploding and that the fire was right above them.

The window would open only a few inches. Smoke was billowing up from the lower roof and was coming in the window.

A couple across from them was standing at the window. Smoke was pouring out behind them and it was hard to see the couple.

Helicopters were lined up on the ground. Ann counted 10 at one time. They would fly to the roof, back to the ground, unload people into ambulances and fly to the roof again.

One helicopter posed outside the building with a loud speaker. The noise made it hard to hear what they were saying. Finally the Reddy's made out that they were broadcasting, "Stay where you are," "Stay by your windows." "Don't jump."

They tried the phone to get instructions about what to do. The phone was dead. Strangely the television never went off. They watched the newscaster tell about the fire at the MGM. He said hundreds were trapped in their rooms. The death toll

Connie Bearden could still hear the fire sirens. He had been in the office room for 45 minutes. A call had come in. It was a friend of the older woman who had heard about the fire and was checking on her. Hysterically she told them to get ahold of someone and tell them she was trapped

Connie knew that a fire lasting that long was a major one and that they had to get

out. The woman finally allowed him to open the door and try to find an exit. The smoke hung almost to the floor, but there was about a foot of area clear enough that he could see and breath. He found the outside door and went back after the lady. After much pursuasion she agreed to go with him.

Finally outside Connie found Ray Nell. She had seen the Reddy's standing at the window 18 floors up. They were on the north side of the building and not aware of the incredible damage done to the front of the hotel

The smoke in the Reddy's room was getting heavier. They could still see, but it was very difficult to breath. Their throats were sore. Ann's headache was getting

Huge marine helicopters were taking people off the balcony's in swing seats. The Reddys had no belcony on their room. Ann was sure she couldn't have gotten in one of the bucket seats anyway. A man a few windows down was tying sheets and blankets together and draping

them down the side of the building. The make-shift rope now hung down almost to the fourth floor. They never did see if he tried to climb down. Some security men on a lower room were yelling up to the people in the rooms.

Their voices were lost in the noise from the helicopters. People were screaming. The Reddy's had been in their room for two hours when someone began knocking on their door.

Two firemen stood outside. One with helmet and mask. The other bare headed. Both were covered with black soot. They told the Reddy's to hold wet towels to their faces and that they would lead

Ann grabbed her purse and a few items. She hung the shoulder strap around her

neck to keep her hands free. "I'm going to lead you down the hall," the fireman said, "When you get to the

stairwell go straight down. Don't stop for anything. Just keep going. On the landing there was a girl of about 23. Her hysteria was such that her legs wouldn't work. She would just slump to the floor.

Lewis tried to pick her up. Then another man appeared and he got on one side of the girl and the two men began to carry her down the stairs. Ann went ahead. The first floor number she saw was the ninth. She felt they were nearly down. As they got nearer the bottom they could feel the intense heat. Still struggling with the

Once outside Ann couldn't believe it. "Are we really on the ground?" she kept asking. Finally assured that she was, she broke into tears for the first time that day. The Reddy's then began a frantic search for the Bearden's. Finally the two couples found each other. They hugged each other and tearfully thanked God for

past I am reminded of Mama Tashiro. She was a diminutive Japanese lady who was the matriarch of a family who farmed in the Las Cruces, New Mexico

The family moved from Japan to Mexico first and then about the time of the depression came to Las Cruces. They bought land cheap, worked it themselves, and by the time I knew them were prosperous.

A conversation with Mama required a great concentration. She spoke English, but if the right word eluded her she would revert to Spanish, if that language failed her she would use Japanese. She had a sweet melodic voice and it was pleasant just to hear her talk. Facial on and hand motions usually aided in making her meaning clear.

She was married to Kay Tashiro. He was a grey-haired, dignified, gentleman much older than she, and his failing health kept him from taking much part in the farming operation. It was a second marriage. Harry was

her stepson and closer to her age than his father was. So it was Harry and Mama who ran the farm. They raised a big cotton crop each

year, but their main interest was vegetables; onions and lettuce mostly. They had built a large produce shed

in Mesilla Park. At that time it was a small town four miles from Cruces. It has now been encircled by the city on two sides and the overflow from New Mexico A&M on the other two sides.

My Dad shipped produce for the Tashiro's for years. During packaging season Mama not

only oversaw the shed but was generally up on the grader. Otherwise she could be found with a hoe in her hand, or a shovel irrigating.

She wore pants, a man's shirt, and a wide brimmed straw hat as protection against the stark New Mexico sun. She also wore gloves most of the time.

Harry handled most of the business, but it was Mama with her pride of crop who made sure that what was shipped deserved the Tashiro and Tashiro brand name it bore.

They drove pick-ups and Cadillacs. The pickups were driven until they fell apart. The Cadillacs were traded every

There is a story about a new salesman at one of the dealerships who saw Mama and Harry, dressed as usual, come in for the new model car showing. He looked them over, decided it would be a waste of time talking to them. He watched them out of the corner of his eye with the idea of protecting the agency property. They left and to his chagrin he saw them climb into a top-of-the-line, last years, model and drive away.

Mama did dress when the occasion called for it. She owned a full-length, pelt-matched, mink coat, which she wore indiscrimenately for the warmth it provided.

Every three or four years the family would make a pilgrimage to Japan and visit relatives and friends. Mama confessed that she had gotten soft with her life in America and was uncomfortable in the cold Japanese houses. So she slept in her mink coat.

When they returned they would bring as many Japanese articles as customs would allow. One year they gave me a lovely tea set. The frail, China cups, when held up to the light, revealed the portrait of a Geisha in the bottom of the

Cruces has a spring and fall lettuce crop. If the weather is right they will ship into November. On those occasions we would have Thanksgiving dinner with the Tashiros.

Harry had two daughters, who were married and had small children. The union between Kay and Mama had produced one son who was a few years younger than Harry's daughters.

Just as Mama was international in her speech so was the table fare for

Thanksgiving dinner. There would be turkey, stuffing, sweet potatoes and cranberry sauce. Then there would be platters of tacos,



3. Slicing dark meat— Place drumstick and thigh on separate plate and cut through connecting joint. Both pieces may be individually sliced. Tilt drumstick to convenient angle, slicing

4. Slicing thigh—To slice thigh meat, hold firmly on plate with fork. Cut even slices parellel to the bone.

5. Preparing breast-In preparing breast for easy slicing, place knife parallel and as close to wing as possible. Make deep cut into breast, cutting right to bone. This is your base cut. All breast slices will stop at this vertical cut.

6. Carving breasts-After breast. Carve downward, each new slice slightly up on breast. Keep slices thin and





Weathermen are forecasting a bad 1980-81 winter and increased heating costs. To combat larger fuel bills, insulate. The best place to start is in the attic. An under-insulated attic drains energy, letting heated at energy, letting heated air through the roof in winter and acting as a giant solar values measure the resistance of the flow of heat. The greater the R-value, the less energy lost. R-values of R-30 - R-35 are considered ideal for our winter climate. winter climate. However it may not be economically feasible to get over R-20 . . . considered to be an acceptable goal. Without compressing, measure the attic's insulation depth. Most kinds of insulation used in an attic (batts, blankets, poured loose fill) have an R-value of 3 - 3.1 per inch thickness. For example, if your insulation is one of these and has a depth of 3 inches, the R-value for your attic is R-9, considerably lower than the goal of R-20.

Thanksgiving is more than a "day"; it's a way of life. A teaching of St. Cyril of Jerusalem (386 A.D.) shed some light on the beauty of a grateful heart.

He compared the spirit of God to water. It was an image he chose because of Christ's words, "The water that I shall give him will become in him a spring of water welling up to eternal life." (John 4:14)

"Water," said St. Cyril, "comes down from heaven as rain, and although it is always the same in itself, it produces many different effects: one in the palm tree, another in the vine, and so on, throughout the whole of creation. It does not come down now as one thing, now as another, but while remaining essentially the same, it adapts itself to the nature and need of every creature that receives it. In the same way the Holy Spirit, whose nature is always the same, simple and indivisible, apportions grace to each man as He wills. The idea that your basic natural gifts are enhanced by the Holy Spirit was taught earlier by St. Paul. It's an interesting concept worthy of meditation.

When human weakness or personal shortcomings prevent you from doing what you'd like to do, don't think of yourself negatively. St. Paul had the same problem, "The good that I would do, I never do." St. Cyril is consoling on this point:

"The Spirit makes one person a teacher of divine truth, inspires another to prophesy. . The Spirit strengthens one person's self-control, shows another how to help the poor, teaches another to fast and lead a life of asceticism, makes another oblivious to the needs of the body, trains another for martyrdom. . . In each person the Spirit reveals His presence in a particular way for the common good."

From this we see that it is possible to be weak in one or more area, while being gifted in another. No one receives all the girts. Yet how many people feel discouraged when they come across real holiness or outstanding generosity in another? They are unfair to

As I reflect on the teaching of St. Cyril, I realize how important it is for us to thank God for what we have, whatever it is. Certain gifts are obviously stronger in some people than in others, giving balance to the whole. And since the gifts of the Spirit are given for the common good, we can all rejoice in the gifts of others.

The Spirit, like water, is everywhere the same. We thank God for all His gifts, especially for the ones He has given you. Happy Thanksgiving Day.



Government sets **Crop regulations** by Barry McWilliams

The U.S. Department of Agriculture now has announced that growers of either wheat or feed grains in 1981 will be required to plant within their established Normal Crop Acreage (NCA) in order to qualify for loans, disaster coverage or price deficiency payments under government programs.

A pending announcement on whether cotton producers also will be shackled by the same requirement is not expected until after December 2. There is industrywide opposition to the requirement for cotton, plus opposition from state officials of USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS), but a Washington source November 20 told Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. that as far as the current Administration is concerned "it looks now like you're going to get it."

And the American Cotton Shippers Association indignantly reported from Washington November 17 that "Unless the cotton industry and sympathetic legislators overrule him. USDA Economic Czar Howard Hjort will be successful in his attempt to limit plantings and thus embargo the production of cotton in much of the Belt.

The "embargo" of production refers to 10 cotton producing states where the NCA requirement reportedly would force farmers to reduce acreage of basic crops by from eight percent to as much

as 26 percent. Texas as a whole, and especially the High Plains, would be much less severely affected. Statewide plantings of wheat, grain sorghum, corn, barley, rice and upland cotton in 1980 totaled 20,366,459 acres as compared to the states' total NCA's of 23,922,420. In the 25 High Plains counties represented by PCG, 6,900,325 acres were planted to these crops in 1980, considerably below the area's aggregate NCA of 7,485,413 acres. It is assumed the remaining acreage was planted to soybeans, sunflowers, sugar beets, vegetables, etc.

Only two of PCG's 25 counties show planted acreage significantly above their NCA's. Those counties, Bailey and Cochran, according to local ASCS officials, are counties in which there was considerable double cropping due to early losses of wheatland, replanted to cottor or losses of cotton replanted to grain sorghum. In those cases only the planting of one crop is counted against the farm's NCA.

Nevertheless, PCG is fighting the NCA requirement on the grounds that it is unnecessary, difficult and costly to administer and will cause a hardship on a number of individual producers who for one reason or another have NCA's much smaller that the acreage they'd like to plant or have plans to switch planting patterns.

"We still have hopes that the mounting evidence against the wisdom of a cotton NCA requirement next year will be heeded by Secretary Bergland and company," says PCG President Joe D. Unfred of New Home, "but if it isn't, there's still a possibility that the incoming administration can be induced to reverse Bergland's decision or at least modify the regulations to reduce unwarranted government interference with farm management decisions.

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

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
