School board approves 33 percent tax hike

Board has approved a 33.3 percent

The board voted unanimously in its regular session to set the tax rate at 72 cents per hundred dollars assessed

The regular session immediately followed a special session of the school board at which the board unanimously approved a budget for the 1980-81 school year of over \$1.43 million.

The tax increase was needed to cover a \$156,000 increase in the school

In addition to the budget increase, the school district also lost \$79,000 in income, according to superintendent Dub Hallmark, through the state-wide property re-evaluation.

As expected, the Lockney School Efforts to cutback, such as not replacing four teachers and eliminating three bus routes, were not enough to cover the tudget increase when combined with the loss of revenues through the re-evaluation.

Council awards franchise

Lockney, at long last, may soon have The City Council late yesterday

afternoon awarded a new cable franchise to Jerry Ford of Floydada. The council unanimously voted to award the franchise to Ford over Big

Springs Cable Television, which recenty bought the Floydada system and had sought the Lockney Franchise.

Lockney Mayor Claude Brown says there are several reasons why the

Council chose to go with Ford over Big

Springs. 'Jerry Ford comes well recommended," the Mayor says. "He'll be a community man. He's got local money behind him and Jerry will give us local ownership. That'll mean quick ser-

Ford, who had been manager of the Floydada Cable System before it was purchased by Big Springs, had said that if he was awarded the franchise, he could have a cable system operational in Lockney in 120-days or the first of May, if weather conditions permit. Mayor Brown, however, says he believes it'll take about six months for the service to

Ford has indicated his cable system will cost \$11 per month for one television with a one-time hook-up charge of \$10. It will cost \$1.50 per month for each additional outlet plus a \$12.50 one-time hook-up charge for

Ford has gained financing for his system from First National Bank of Lockney and he has reached an agreement with Southwestern Public Service Co., to use their utility poles for his

The Ford cable system is tentatively slated to include:

Channel 2: Home Box Office or Showtime would be available as an option at an additional cost of \$10 per

Channel 3: 24-hour weather channel. Channel 4: WTBS, Atlanta, Georgia. Channel 5: KTXT, Lubbock, Public Broadcasting System. Channel 6: to be announced later but

might be used by a local church. Channel 7: KMAC, Lubbock. Channel 8: Christian Broadcasting

Network. Channel 9: WGN, Chicago. Channel 10: WOR, New York City. Channel 11: KCBD, Lubbock. Channel 12: to be announced.

Channel 13: KLBK, Lubbock. The decision to award the cable franchise to Ford came after the council

declined to transfer the old franchise held by Floydada cable to Big Springs. The old franchise was awarded to D.H. Pope December 8, 1977. Pope was operating the Floydada system at the time but never built in Lockney.

Pope, who appeared before the council last week with officials of Big Springs, said he was never able to start

the Lockney system because of high interest rates, and the relatively low amount of revenue the Lockney system might have earned.

In order to clear the way for Big Springs to apply for the Lockney Franchise, Pope signed a release at last week's Council meeting releasing the city from any agreement with him on

City Attorney Paul Lyle said Lockney could probably have voided the ordinance awarding the franchise to Pope for flack of performance, but Pope's signature on the release expedited awarding the new franchise.

Jim Lancaster of Big Springs Cable told the council his company was interested in the Lockney franchise only because it had the Floydada franchise since company officials felt Lockney could not support a system by itself. Lancaster said Big Springs would not have a local office and would have operated the Lockney franchise from

The charges Lancaster listed for a Lockney system were generally less than those that will be charged by Ford. but Lancaster said it would take Big Springs at least a year to get a system operational in Lockney. Big Springs would have also had to set its own poles because it is involved in a lawsuit with Southwestern Public Service.

Rural residents victims of burglaries

Until recently rural residents have escaped the burglaries that are plagueing town dweliers in ever increasing

Not so any more. Thieves have begun watching farms and learning the owner's routine. Then when the place is deserted they select whatever they want

Floyd County has been hard hit the last few weeks. The sheriff's department is alarmed at the robberies that have occurred and the enormous task of trying to patrol the entire county.

The answer: neighbors looking out for neighbors and farmers refusing to buy so-called bargain items.

Veteran lawmen agree that the only way to slow the outbreak is for farmers to cooperate with the law and to communicate better among themselves.

This past week one area farmer became suspicious of an unknown car driving over his farm. He then saw that car and a pick-up driving around his neighbors farm. The pick-up he recognized as belonging to the other farmer. He contacted the sheriff's depart-

ment. Officers were able to apprehend the burglars as they drove away from the other farmers barn with two new

They had parked the pick-up back at

The suspects were Mexican nationals

The High Plains of Texas is the area hardest hit. Members of the Texas Rangers give two reasons for this; the region's vast agricultural resources and the nearness of the High Plains to

Mexico, the destination for many of the Tires and personal items are not the only things stolen. Farm chemicals, herbicides and pesticides, are also high on the list of items that can be resold

One unusual feature about farm crime is that thieves often are local

people who stay out of jail by making restitution to the farmer. The farmer often would rather have

the money than see the thief in jail. Texas Ranger Jim Null of Plainview

said that it's not uncommon for a thief to steal 5 to 10 gallons of herbicide and

then sell it directly to another farmer at preferable that only one agent go to the a very low price. This is difficult to stop. Only farmers can stop that type of crime by refusing to buy bargains.

Whether there is a gang working in Floyd County or whether it is individuals is hard for the sheriff's office to

determine. Some of the thiefs are similar and are probably committed by the same persons

'The important thing is to alert the farmers to the present danger." Sheriff Cardinal said, "and to ask them to be on the watch out for each other."

"Without the help of that farmer we wouldn't have been able to catch those fellows with the stolen tires.'

Many rural homeowners have reported that their telephone would ring and then the calling party would hang up when the phone was answered.

Commissioners set tax rate

County Commissioners met in two sessions Monday, December 8. Regular Court was held in the morning and early afternoon.

At 5 p.m. Commissioners met again for the special posted meeting to set the county tax rate. Rate was set at 31 cents per \$100 valuation for the year 1980. Taxpayers will not be receiving their statements until January, but those who

want to pay taxes earlier may do so starting December 15 at the tax office. There will be a 3% discount allowed for taxes paid thru January 31, 1981. A 2% discount for taxes paid in February and a 1% discount for taxes paid during

the month of March. Jett Major, county extension agent, met with the court to discuss out of county travel. It was agreed that the agents only travel to the out of county stock shows that they feel necessary and

out of county stock shows. Major also said that the cotton samples taken from the county would cost \$1.25 per sample to be ginned. Flovd County has 59 samples this year and the court agreed to pay for the ginning




Later, after consideration, Milton indicated that it would be best for the new precinct 3 commissioner, Tomas Warren, to pick out the truck he will be

Jury deadlocks in Ready trial

The Lloyd Dale "Skipper" Ready trial ended about midnight Friday with a 6 to 6 deadlocked jury vote.

Those of you who were interested have already read the accounts of the trial in the Lubbock Avalance-Journal. You also probably read the sensational stories printed last April when the

incident took place.

If you read the account carefully you probably wonder how six of your fellows citizens could vote Skipper Ready innocent.

Therefore in defense of those six jurors I hereby offer this "country

newspaper" account of the trial. I spent four days in and out of the court room. I talked to nearly everyone who wasn't handcuffed. (In this particular trial that eliminated several key witnesses). And I don't know how the jury could have gone anyway but the

CONFLICTING TESTIMONY

The first thing that struck me was no one seemed interested in truth. The jury was spoon-fed testimony. Inuendos were thrown out and then just left in the

Everyone seemed to be lying. They Cameron family testimony was exactly opposite that of the Ready's.

The Cameron family of four all told the same story. In his closing argument the attorney from the District Attorney's office gave the impression they believed John T. Cameron because they didn't think any four people could have made up such a bizzare tale and have kept the facts all straight.

The main detailed part of that story rested with John T. Cameron. He is a dapper, well-dressed, man who reminded one of the Ben Vereen character of "10-Speed" on the short lived T.V. series "10-Speed and Brown Shoe."

Anderson repeatedly referred to the statements given to the police by the family right after the incident. The statements of the two teen-age boys, Damon and T.J. who are 16 and 18: were only about three-quarters of a page whereas their mother and Cameron's statements were up to three

Well, the boys were only involved in about three hours of the three day ordeal. So their part of the story, which they did have perfectly coordinated, wasn't too complex.

The mother, Betty, didn't get home on the incident didn't take that much in

By the D.A.'s own admission, the police investigation was lax. They didn't finger-print the guns. They didn't

scientifically determine which gun had been used to shoot Skipper Ready until the second day of the trial and that was at about 10:30 at night. They didn't question the apartment managers where the incident took place.

That young couple lived in apartment connected by wall to the Cameron apartment. They were the ones awakened by Betty early the next morning. They were the ones that had seen Cameron a week before with a gun, slapping it in the palm of his hand. Not until a week or so before the trial did any law enforcement officer try to

contact them about the incident.

When defense attorney Anderson said in his closing remarks, "I am astounded! Astounded; that this case has come to trial." I couldn't have agreed more. My opinion is it was the most sensible statement made during the entire four days.

The charge was kidnapping. That is what the trial was all about. No one was on trial for shooting Skipper Ready.

Ready's father, who is a well-respected, retired, businessman in Lubbock, testified he had given his son \$200 that day as a loan until Skipper's check from the oil field came in. Yet there was no \$200 found on

Ready. His billfold was missing. The family testified Ready had bound their hands behind them with black electrician's tape. Yet when the police arrived Ready was the one bound with tape. No one seems to know what happened to the tape that was around the wrists of the three male members of the family. It was never found.

Immediately after the incident, when police arrived, witnesses testified the mother and two sons were joking and laughing about it. Cameron however, was in a terrible state.

His testimony at the trial was such that it was difficult for one to comprehend the monstrous treatment he had received in the hands of Ready and his wife. He actually broke down in court with deep sobs that echoed throughout the room. A recess had to be called while he composed himself.

He testified he was frightened by the guns, terrorized by the snakes, and had. never been so scared in his life."

It was such a traumatic ordeal for him that eight months after it happened, he

armed robberies. A man who a few months later was arrested for shooting

McWilliams was a defense witness who is now in jail. He testified that Cameron had bragged to him about shooting Skipper Ready.

The whole trial was unbelievable. At one time I tried to count up how many times the defendant and witnesses had been in jail and prison. How many separate trials they had been in cr are now facing. How many crimes they have been arrested for. How much money they have cost the taxpayers for the state of Texas.

Now for the six jurors who voted guilty. I don't mean to be defending Skipper Ready. He has served time in prison. He's been arrested numerous times. He is now under indictment for a 1976 murder that the D.A.'s special investigators say they have recently tied







TFU head won't Seek another term

ABILENE, (Special) - Texas Farmers Union President Jay Naman, who has served the statewide farm organization for 19 years, has told TFU Executive Board members meeting here today that he will not be a candidate for reelection when the general membership holds its annual convention in Dallas, January 8-10.

Naman, a 55 year old cattle raiser from Waco, said his decision was "based partly on what I consider the best interest of Texas Farmers Union and partly on personal consideration." He further stated that he intends to continue his involvement in agriculture and remain an active participant in the **Farmers Union**

Several candidates are expected to announce for the post which will be filled through the votes of convention delegates representing chartered county chapters across Texas. Texas Farmers Union, with a membership near 10,000, is one of 22 states in the National Farmers Union which represents around 350,000 farm families.

The general farm organization experienced dramatic growth in Texas after Naman took office in 1961, expanding from a membership of only several thousand concentrated in north and northwest Texas to its current geographic spread from the Panhandle to the Gulf Coast. Serving as both president and chief executive for the state organization, Naman has also held an automatic position on the National Farmers Union Board of Directors. He additionally has served in an elected position on NFU's Executive Board and

sat one term as Chairman of the Executive Board.

In making his statement of intent to step down in January, Naman predicted, "family farmers and ranchers should soon see the 'golden years'. They shall, if they are responsibly organized and represented with credit


Tractor contest

Dry weather this summer and fall has hardened soils and made the use of a soil sample probe difficult. Recent snows have added moisture and mellowed soils to improve soil sampling. The snows delayed cotton harvest in Floyd County and have made soil sampling untimely for some. Generally, the most difficult task of soil testing is finding the time to take the soil samples.

A soil analysis is important for a farmer who has never scil tested, and it is still valuable to resample fields which have been tested. Soils that were tested four to five years ago provided farmers with recommended fertilizer rates for optimum profit based upon lower crop prices and lower fertilize costs. However, the crop profit situation has changed. Soil fertility levels have increased or decreased so that old recommendations no longer fit field and crop conditions.

Farmers who use fertilizer success-

fully have their fields tested every two to five years. This allows for the detection of declines as well as excessive build-ups. If a field is to be used under intensive production, a soil test should be run each year. This recommendation applies for fields with special

Soil tests cost only a fraction of your fertilizer or production cost. It is probably the best investment a producer will make. Money spent on the wrong fertilizer results in less net profit

Anyone interested in soil tests can obtain information sheets to accompany soil samples, instructions and mailing cartons at the Floyd County Extension Office, located in the Agricultural Building east of the courthouse.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion or national crigin.

Farm exports may Rise next year

In fiscal year 1981, exports of U.S. farm products are expected to increase about 20 percent from last year's \$40.5 billion, resulting in the 12th consecutive year of record export values. Agricultural imports are also expected to set a record at \$18.5 billion, leaving the agricultural trade surplus at \$30 billion--\$7 billion larger than in fiscal 1980. Export volume is forecast at a record 170 million tons in fiscal 1981, up from 164 million last year. Feed grain shipments are expected to increase about 3 million tons to 74 million, while wheat shipments could rise 4 million tons to more than 41 million. Small gains are forecast for rice exports. Export volume may decline for soybeans, cotton, tobacco, and vegetable


U.S. export volume and value this year will be shaped primarily by the following: 1) the drought-reduced U.S. harvest of feed grains, oilseeds, and cotton; 2) reduced wheat production and export prospects in Australia and Argentina; 3) a second consecutive year of poor grain crops in the Soviet Union; 4) a decline in Chinese grain production and a substantial increase in total Chinese imports; 5) continued slow economic recovery in the major developed markets; 6) a sharp deterioration in the current trade accounts of most developing countries; and 7) slower growth in foreign livestock

production. Higher prices will likely account for four-fifths of the increase in the U.S. farm export value this year, with volume increasing about 4 percent. Although foreign grain production is up somewhat this year, the 12-percent drop in the U.S. grain harvest--in the face of record export demand-has driven up export grain prices. Wheat prices are

expected to be 5 to 10 percent higher than in fiscal 1980, while corn, sorghum, and soybean prices are projected up about a third. Soybean export volume may decline 5 to 8 percent due to higher prices, increased supplies in Brazil and Argentina, and reduced U.S. production. Rice exports increased sharply in fiscal 1980 because of unusually large shipments to Korea of 725,000 metric tons, and exports to Korea may be even larger this year because of a sharply smaller rice crop there. Cotton exports, which showed the biggest increase of any U.S. crop in fiscal 1980, will experience a dramatic decline in the current fiscal year as reduced supplies, the resulting higher prices, and a weak world economy dampen demand for U.S. cotton.

The recently signed grain accord with China (January 1980-December 1984) will establish China as the largest U.S. wheat market (about 6 million tons). Annual exports of 6 to 8 million tons of wheat and corn were agreed upon, with wheat accounting for 80 to 85 percent of the total; China may import up to 9 million tons of U.S. grains without prior notification. The USSR has already completed purchases of 8 million tons of wheat and corn allowed under the terms of the U.S.-USSR grain agreement, which is in its final year. The Soviet grain crop is now estimated at 185 million tons--the second consecutive poor harvest--portending another year of aggressive Soviet buying on world

U.S. agricultural imports are expected to increase more than \$1 billion to \$18.5 billion in fiscal 1981. Sugar imports are expected to rise about \$1.5 billion, the result of anticipated increases of 8 percent in volume and nearly 80 percent in unit values.



Center pivot sprinkler system

Meeting set for Monday On center pivot sprinklers

Irrigators with center pivot sprinkler systems are invited to attend an informal exchange of ideas and information on the benefits and problems of modifying a center pivot system to a low pressure drop line sprinkler system. The High Plains Underground Water Conservation District is hosting a meeting at their Lubbock headquarters at 2930 Avenue Q next Tuesday, beginning at 1 p.m.

The three hour session for interested irrigators will focus on the experiences of irrigators using the modified drop line system and on what to consider before attempting to modify your present system to a drop line sprinkler.

Carl Butler, a center pivot irrigator at Anton, is planning to attend and share his experience of the past year with two unique low pressure drop line systems. One of the systems was a modified center pivot which circled a 640 acre tract over furrowed circle rows in

Hockley County. The second system wa lateral move sprinkler modified with drop lines to row water a 320 acre tract. His modified irrigation systems used a series of rigid and flexible pipes, joints, flanges and socks to lay water down in row in a diffused distribution pattern which prevented soil erosion and virtually eliminated evaporation loss in the water application. Dr. Bill Lyle with the Texas Agricul-

tural Experiment Station at Halfway and Leon New, irrigation specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in Lubbock will be there along with Lubbock County Extension Agent Randy Upshaw. They will discuss with water district staff and participants the tiveness of the drop line system, what is involved in modifying a center pivot, and whether the expense is justified by increased water conservation and yield.

Efforts are underway to Improve livestock health

Measures to protect the health of Texas livestock and poultry are being intensified, Dr. John Holcombe, executive director, Texas Animal Health Commission, announced recently.

Because of its importance, the state is highly vulnerable to introduction of diseases from other states as well as foreign countries. Texas is first in the nation in several categories of numbers of livestock. Value of the livestock and poultry in the state is now estimated to be more than \$6 billion.

Of primary concern to the Texas cattle industry is the introduction and spread of brucellosis into this state from other areas. "As Texas cattlemen increase their efforts to control brucellosis in this state, they can be assured efforts are being increased to prevent this disease from entering Texas," Dr. Holcombe said.

During fiscal year 1980, a total of 5,784 vehicles were stopped for inspection of livestock. During September and October, 1980, a total of 918 vehicles were stopped.

During fiscal year 1980, a total of

18,013 test eligible cows were checked for health papers to determine if they met requirements relating to the Texas Brucellosis Program. "At least 90 percent of the animals entering the state which were checked met the State's regulations." Dr. Holcombe

In fiscal year 1980, a total of 530 complaints were filed for illegal movement, breaking quarantine, or movement without proper health papers. This was an increase of 116 over fiscal year 1979. "And that was due to the intensified efforts in enforcing our regulations," Dr. Holcombe explained. In conjunction with the Texas plan for

brucellosis control, these figures were From September 20 through November 15 this year, a total of 9,832 head of livestock had been checked between the

violations were discovered. "This to us shows that the vast majority of livestock producers in this state are cooperating with the Texas brucellosis plan," Dr. Holcombe said.

The assessor does not grant the exemption unless he/she has a signed application from the person seeking the exemption. Also, the application must be timely filed and completely filled out with information necessary to determine its validity.

A person can qualify for both the \$5,000 exemption and one of the \$10,000 exemptions, but not both of the \$10,000 exemptions (over 65/disabled). The amount exempted is taken off the market value of the property.

For school districts, there is also a mandatory disabled veterans exemption, the legal basis for which is found in Chapter 11,22 of the Property Tax Code and Acticle 8, Section 2(b) of the Texas Constitution. (This exemption is mandatory for all other taxing jurisdictions, also.)

As of 1980, there are two stipulations which accompany this exemption. First, the person applying for the exemption must be a Texas resident, and second, while the exemption can be claimed in each taxing entity which has jurisdiction over the property, the exemption must be claimed on the same piece of property. It is not necessary that the exemption be claimed on a homestead, but if it is, the amount is added onto the homestead exemption(s)

The amount of this exemption can be as much as \$3,000, depending on the percentage of disability. However, this must be subtracted from the assessed value of the property rather than the appraised value.

Local option homestead There is one more exemption which school districts may offer, this one an over 65/disability homestead exemption which can be offered at local option. The legal basis for it is found in Chapter 11.13 of the Property Tax Code and in Article 8 Section 1-b(b) of the Texas Constitution.

The amount of the exemption is a minimum of \$3,000 and should be taken off the market value of the property. The exemption can be voted in by either of two ways either by the jurisdiction's governing body or by the voters of the jurisdiction. The exemption can also be reduced or rescinded, as long as it's done in the same manner in which it was originated.

The disabled veteran exemption and the local option homestead exemption both require timely filing of a correctly completed application. (See additional information below in discussion of Attorney General's Opinion

Exemptions which cities can offer include the mandatory disabled veteran exemption and the local option over 65/disability exemptions. The same holds true for counties, which must also offer a \$3,000 homestead exemption from the portion of the tax rate levied for farm-to-market roads or flood control.

There are specific deadlines for filing for these exemptions. For the mandatory \$5,000 and \$10,000 school district exemptions, the deadline for filing is the end of the rendition period. This extends from January 1 until

According to Attorney General's Opinion H-309 and 548, there can be no deadline for accepting applications for the local option over 65/disability homestead exemptions. These can be claimed at any time until the time the taxes are paid on the property. This also holds true for the mandatory disabled veteran exemption and the \$3,000 county homestead exemption.

Federal minimum wage goes up Jan. 1

A new federal minimum wage of \$3.35 goes into effect on January 1, entitling an estimated 5.6 million workers covered by the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA) to pay increases, the Labor Department said today.

The January 1 increase, from \$3.10 to \$3.35, was provided for in 1977 amendments to the act.

'The minimum wage increase is a matter of equity for low wage workers and assures that they are not forced to bear a disproportionage share of the burden of inflation," Secretary of Labor Ray Marshall said.

Approximately 60 million workers are subject to provisions of the act, which also establishes overtime pay and child labor standards.

In addition, the FLSA allows for the payment of wages below the statutory minimum in order to prevent loss of job opportunities for certain workers.

Handicapped workers, full-time students and student-learners in specified industries may currently be employed at subminimum wages under appropriate regulations. Employers must apply for authority to pay
