Operating under the umbrella company, MBFA Foundation, MBFA Management Consultant Services Corp. centralized operations for five subsidiary corporations. They are Associated Memorial Homes, Texas Homemaker Service, MBFA Communications, MBFA Housing and West Texas Home Health Service.

Trustees of the Foundation were Lang D. Wall, E. Harold Henderson, Claude Meadows, B.A. Hyatt and Charles Boyle. Chartered as a non-profit corporation March 12, 1968, the group created the West Texas Home Health Agency,

which serves 134 counties with offices in Lubbock, Dumas, Seymour, Abilene and Kerrville. This subsidiary was not included in the bankruptcy filing in hopes the well-established and reputable agency would be able to continue delivering home health care services.

While the ultimate fate of the Foundation rests in the hands of its creditors, plans are to sell the radio station in Floydada. Any sale must satisfy demands of the previous owner, Petty D. (Bo) Johnson. Johnson remains indebted to the owners of the original

equipment, B.A. Robertson, Marshall Formby and Alma Holmes. Olsen said several had expressed interest in the station and MBFA would continue to negotiate with Johnson for an acceptable sale price.

Meanwhile, the tower lights are blinking once again, courtesy of B.A. Robertson, although the airwaves remain silent at 900 kilohertz.



Commodities tumble; Worst in 30 years

Commodity futures began recovering this week after the worst nine days ir. some 30-years.

Wheat, sorghum, and soybeans all lost between one and two-dollars over the nine day period culminating in what one futures dealer called "Black Thursday," last week. In that same period, cotton lost five-cents a pound.

Mike Stevens, a commodities broker with Merrill Lynch in Lubbock, says the nine consecutive down days may have been the worst decline in commodity futures since 1949. During the nine days:

-March cotton futures slipped from 94.2 cents a pound to 88 cents. -- March wheat futures dropped from

\$5.65 per bushel to \$4.35. -- January soybeans fell from \$9.50 per bushel to \$7,20. -March corn plummetted from \$4.10

per bushel to \$3.50. Prices began to turn around last Friday. Cotton was much stronger by Tuesday, largely because of a major

sale to China. Stevens says the steadily rising prime lending rate, which hit a record 21 percent Tuesday, was the major factor behind the commodities decline. "The cost of carrying inventory had become so burdensome," Stevens said, it caused the market to collapse."

In addition to the prime lending rate, Stevens said the crisis between the Soviet Union and Poland further weakened the market. The increased wheat acreage was also limited factor, Stevens

If the prime lending rate continues to climb to as high as the 25 percent as some financial analysts predict, Stevens said the effects on farmers will be

"Unfortunately, politicians don't look at the farmer anymore when they're considering policy and the effects on the producer are extremely critical," Stevens said. "When the farmer's got to borrow money for seed or fertilizer or to put cattle in the pen, the effects of that policy are critical," Stevens said, if it eads to an extremely high prime lending rate.

Without a sharp drop in the prime lending rate, Stevens said the best hope for the farmer is if the Soviet grain embargo is lifted.

"We badly need to sell something," Stevens said, "and real soon.

Cotton to Continue in Tight supply

A continuing tight supply-demand balance is in prospect for U.S. cotton during the latter half of 1980/81, and very likely well into the 1981/82 season that begins on August 1, 1981. This season's supply is down sharply due to lower beginning stocks and a smaller crop. Expected disappearance this season of 11.6 million bales (2.53 million metric tons) is also well below last year's level, but is still 0.4 million bales (0.09 MMT) above estimated production. The carryover at the end of this season is likely to be slightly below the beginning level of 3 million bales (0.65

Based on November 1 conditions, the 1980 U.S. crop is forecast at 11.2 (+ 0.4) million bales (2.44 + 0.09 MMT), down from 14.6 million (3.18 MMT) last year. Although harvested acreage is up 3 percent, hot, dry weather in th Southwest and parts of the Delta and Southeast has reduced the U.S. average yield to 408 pounds per harvested acre (457 kilograms per hectare), 26 percent below last season's record high.

U.S. cotton exports this season are forecast at 5.7 million bales (1.24 MMT). down sharply from last season's unusually high 9.2 million (2.00 MMT). Factors behind the anticipated decline include increased foreign production, sluggish world textile activity, and reduced U.S. export availability. U.S.

cotton is currently priced 5 to 7 cents a pound (11 to 15 cents per kilogram) above competing cottons in world

By November 20, U.S. exports plus outstanding sales totaled 3.8 million bales (0.83 MMT), up slightly from August i, but 3.3 million (0.72 MMT) below a year earlier. The People's Republic of China, which took 2.3 million bales (0.5 MMT) of U.S. cotton last season, had commitments for nearly 0.9 million (0.2 MMT) as of

Domestic textile mills are expected to use around 5.9 million bales (1.28 MMT) this season, down from 6.5 nillion (1.42 MMT) in 1979/80. The seasonally adjusted annual rate of use was about 6.25 million bales (1.36 MMT) in September and October, slightly above the August rate, but about 4 percent below a year earlier. Cotton use is likely to slip further this winter due to tight supplies, relatively high prices, and rising product inven-

World cotton production is forecast at 63.7 million bales (13.87 MMT) in 1980/81, down 3 percent from last season. Foreign production is expected to total 52.5 million bales (11.43 MMT), 1.5 million (0.33 MMT) above last season. The Soviet crop may rise from last year's 13.1 million bales (2.85 MMT) to a record 13.8 million (3.00 MMT); production in China is forecast at 10.5 million bales (2.29 MMT), a 0.4-million-bale (0.09 MMT) increase.

World cotton consumption may total around 64.8 million bales (14.11 MMT) this season, nearly a million below 1979/80. Foreign use is forecast at 58.9 million bales (12.82 MMT), near last season's level. However, Chinese consumption is placed at a record 13.8 million bales (3.00 MMT). As a result, China will probably again be the world's leading importer, taking about 3.2 million bales (0.70 MMT) from all sources.

Early season forecasts of a close balance between cotton production and use suggest that prices in 1981 will be particularly sensitive to changes in production prospects and economic conditions. World cotton stocks could decline to 20.5 million bales (4.46 MMT) on August 1, 1981, the lowest level in recent years. Reflecting these tight supplies, world cotton prices are around 25 percent above a year earlier.

Grain farmers eligible For higher loan levels

Producers placing 1980-crop grains in the farmer-held reserve December 3 became eligible for special higher loan levels and interest on those loans will be waived as a result of President Carter signing the Agricultural Act of 1980.
Secretary of Agriculture Bob Berg-

land said wheat producers placing this year's crop into reserve will receive a \$3.30-per-bushel loan, compared to the \$3.00-loan level for wheat not in the reserve program. 1980-crop corn going into reserve will receive a \$2.40 loan, compared to the \$2.25 loan for nonreserve corn. Producers placing 1980crop barley in reserve will receive a 12-cent premium above the \$1.83 loan level for non-reserve barley.

Producers with 1980-crop wheat, corn and barley already in reserve may request the higher price supports at

FAMILY 'GOOD EATERS?' Eat a balanced diet based on the daily food guide to get enough nutrients. Nutrients most often lacking for all age groups are calcium, iron, magnesium and vitamir B6. These are the findings of the Nationwide Food Consumption Survey, 1977-78, conducted by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA). The survey provides nutritionists with information about food-related problems or deficiencies of certain nutrients in the diet. The first three nutrients found deficient in the diets were dried fruits and organ meats. the minerals calcium, iron and magnesium. Minerals are essential for either building or regulating the body

and keeping it functioning

properly.

Calcium is the most abundant mineral in the body. About 99 percent of the body's calcium is present in the bones and one percent in soft tissues (muscles, nerves, skin and connective fibers). Calcium helps clot the blood and regulate the heart beat and nervous and muscular systems. In teeth, calcium and phosphorus form crystals similar to those in bones to give them strength. These minerals in the diet are directly related the hardness of the outer covering of the tooth (Enamel). Important calcium food sources are milk and other milk-group foods, such as cheese, cottage cheese and custard. Two or more servings of milk and milk-group foods provide 75 percent of the calcium needed. When milk-group foods are restricted in the diet due to allergies, intolerances or dislikes, it is hard to provide enough calcium from other foods. Other sources of calcium are dried fruits, leafy green vegetables, molasses and dried beans.

Obtain 15 percent of the needed calcium by eating four or more servings of fruit-and-vegetable foods or 10 percent from eating two or more servings of the meat-group foods. Other food sources of calquantities. For example, it takes about five and one-half heads of lettuce, three and one-half pounds of liver, 22 eggs or eight ounces of cooked collards to provide

By J.D. Peer UMBARGER — A recent aerial goose survey of the Texas Panhandle has given indications of the lack of playa lake water and geese according to a U.S. Fish and

Wildlife spokesman. "We flew most of the traditional wintering geese areas from the Pampa area west along the Canadian river and south through the Dimmitt/Friona region and our total goose count was 30,000 birds," said Larry Wynn, Buffalo Lake National Wildlife Refuge manager.

"The biggest concentrations of geese were southwest, west and northwest of Hereford where most of the water is located," Wynn continued.

Normally, the Panhandle holds nearly 100,000 geese during the winter and Wynn said that the weather and water conditions could be keeping the geese north in Oklahoma and Colorado.

The survey crew also counted 300,000 ducks in the same region west of Hereford during the same flight last week. This drop in the total Panhandle duck population can also be contributed to the lack of water.

The annual mid-winter waterfowl survey will be conducted in January and the wildlife personnel will get another chance to count the total bird populations at that

The concentrations of waterfowl in the Hereford region makes it easier for the waterfowl hunter to get a shot at one or more of the big

geese. geese were Several bagged by hunters participating in the opening weekend of pheasant season. Hunters are reminded that pheasant hunting does not require plugged shotguns or duck stamps, but hunting waterfowl comes under the

migratory regulations. The daily limit for geese in West Texas is five per day and must not include more than two Canada or whitefronted geese in the aggre-

TUNE-UP FISHING GEAR

LUBBOCK - what wild birds like to eat and what you put out for them could be the difference in whether you have birds on your property or not according to a recent Urban Wildlife Research

White proso millet and black oil-type sunflower seeds (type grown here) are the best all-around feed to put out for the majority of the

wild birds in your back yard. The small, oil-type sunflower seeds were found to be more attractive to most bird species than the larger black striped or gray striped sunflower seeds that are usually available in commercial bird

Milo, wheat, oats, cracked corn, and rice are common ingredients in commercial mixes and they are rarely eaten if the millet and small sunflower seeds are present. The study found that peanut hearts was especially attractive to starlings and should not be used in bird food.

These new and interesting findings are based on 179,000 observations of feeding habits of birds. Additional observations are being conducted across the United States and it is expected that birdfood preferences will be similar to the one above.

LUBBOCK - Even though the crappie are biting at Lake Thomas and the stripers are hitting at Amistad, there are days when the West Texas weather will keep you indoors. This period is an excellent time to check, replace and repair

your fishing gear. The number one item to be checked is the line on your reel. If the line is old or frayed, it should be replaced with new line. Before you buy new line, determine what type of fishing you will be doing. For instance, it is better to use light in the tour to-eight pound test for small fish and only use the heavier line for big fish in heavy

When you have the old line removed, clean the grease and dirt from the reel. Check for worn parts and get the correct part number and name from your reel parts list that came with your reel. If your local outdoors dealer does not have the part, try local fishing repair shops or order the part from the reel manufacturer.

The first thing that usually happens to a fishing rod is loose or broken line guides. These can be rewound or replaced by you or a rod repairman.

If your rod is a two-orthree piece outfit, check the connection fittings. Dirt, old oil and wear will tend to make the rod pieces hard to insert or pull apart. Clean the surfaces and if wear is excessive, use a fine emery cloth to smooth and round the edges. Continued pressure on a tight fitting will eventually cause the rod to pull from the fitting requiring a new glue job.

Check your lures and hooks for broken, bent or lost points. Replace them with new hooks or sharpen the old hooks. If you replace with new hooks, check them for sharpness, too.

When you have completed your repair/cleaning job, you will be ready for that next

ject to freezing in extremely cold weather, permitting some water flow during these cold periods may prevent the outside standpipes from

freezing. "The size of the drainpipe should depend on the size of the pond. A four-inch diameter pipe is sufficient for ponds less than one acre in

Residents to receive Federal Income Tax packages

Taxpayers will receive their Federal income tax packages within the next two weeks, the Internal Revenue Service says.

The IRS sends taxpayers either a 1040 or 1040A package, depending on the form the taxpayer filed last year. Taxpayers who need to file a different form this year, because of a change in tax status, can pick up the proper form and schedules om their local IRS office, or from one of the many post offices that stock them. Extra forms are also available by using the order blank in the

back of the tax package. Whether taxpayers use the form the IRS sends them or order a different one, the IRS encourages use of both the peel-off address label and pre-addressed, coded return envelope provided in the

originally mailed tax package. The label and envelope

speed up the processing of the return, lessen the chance making mistakes, and produce a faster refund for the taxpayer.

If there is a mistake on the label's information - the taxpayer's name, address, and social security number or if the envelope is marked with the incorrect form number, the IRS said the taxpayer should make the necessary changes in ink.

The tax package contains complete instructions for filling out the tax return and any schedules which the taxpayer needs to use. If additional information is needed before deciding what credits, exemptions, or deductions should be claimed, there are over 90 free special







Exemptions require application

The assessor does not grant the exemption unless he/she has a signed application from the person seeking the exemption. Also, the application must be timely filed and completely filled out with information necessary to determine its validity

A person can qualify for both the \$5,000 exemption and one of the \$10,000 exemptions, but not both of the \$10,000 exemptions (over 65/disabled). The amount exempted is taken off the market value of the property.

For school districts, there is also a mandatory disabled veterans exemption, the legal basis for which is found in Chapter 11,22 of the Property Tax Code and Article 8. Section 2(b) of the Texas Constitution. (This exemption is mandatory for all other taxing jurisdictions, also.)

As of 1980, there are two stipulations which accompany this exemption. First, the person applying for the exemption must be a Texas resident, and second, while the exemption can be claimed in each taxing entity which has jurisdiction over the property, the exemption must be claimed on the same piece of property. It is not necessary that the exemption be claimed on a homestead, but if it is, the amount is added onto the homestead exemption(s) already granted.

The amount of this exemption can be as much as \$3,000, depending on the percentage of disability. However, this must be subtracted from the assessed value of the property rather than the appraised value.

Local option homestead There is one more exemption which school districts may offer, this one an over 65/disability homestead exemption which can be offered at local option. The legal basis for it is found in Chapter 11.13 of the Property Tax Code and in Article 8 Section 1-b(b) of the Texas Constitution.

The amount of the exemption is a minimum of \$3,000 and should be taken off the market value of the property. The exemption can be voted in by either of two ways either by the jurisdiction's governing body or by the voters of the jurisdiction. The exemption can also be reduced or rescinded, as long as it's done in the same manner in which it was originated.

The disabled veteran exemption and the local option homestead exemption both require timely filing of a correctly completed application. (See additional information below in discussion of Attorney General's Opinion

Exemptions which cities can offer include the mandatory disabled veteran exemption and the local option over 65/disability exemptions. The same holds true for counties, which must also offer a \$3,000 homestead exemption from the portion of the tax rate levied for farm-to-market roads or flood control.

There are specific deadlines for filing for these exemptions. For the mandatory \$5,000 and \$10,000 school district exemptions, the deadline for filing is the end of the rendition period. This extends from January 1 until

According to Attorney General's Opinion H-309 and H-548, there can be no deadline for accepting applications for the local option over 65/disability homestead exemptions. These can be claimed at any time until the time the taxes are paid on the property. This also holds true for the mandatory disabled veteran exemption and the \$3,000 county homestead exemption.

The December holiday season is often followed by a period of depression known as the January blues, says Cindy Wilson, a family life

education specialist. This depression period often occurs because of the heightened amount of activities most people enjoy during the season and because of a variety of other factors, the specialist says. Taking a few steps to prevent or at least soften the January blues can

be very effective, she adds. Mrs. Wilson is on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Here are her suggestions for preventing or softening the January blues:

· Plan ahead to avoid commitments to too many activities during the December holiday period.

* Stay within your budget

during the season rather than incurring heavy debts to keep up with the Joneses, or to have a "happy" holiday period. Material possessions do not mean the holiday season will be a happy one. Avoid going into debt.

 Be realistic in your travel plans. Too much travel dur-

not only dangerous to your health but can tax everyone's relationships when the tra-

• Be aware of and work to avoid stirring up old conflicts within the family or between friends.

· If unable to be with family or friends who live some distance away, make arrangements to be with nearby friends. This can help avoid the feelings of loneliness and depression. However, if you are one who chooses to be cheerfully alone during the holidays, don't feel pressured into joining others.

• Realize that some people have particular problems during this period of the year. Perhaps a loved one is sadly missed, or perhaps memories of holidays gone by bring out inappropriate behaviors. Accept these people and their problems and work toward helping them enjoy the holidays. Be cautious yourself in your behaviors and reactions dur-

ing the holidays. • If you travel during the holiday season, plan at least one day back at home prior to returning to work and school to recuperate from travel and the holidays. This will ease you and the family back into their regular routine and allow some transition time.
