





#### **Gin incineration may** solve the cotton waste problem

Cotton waste used to be a burning problem with gins. The problem: how to dispose of it.

It cost money to haul it off. And it caused environmental problems to burn

So Cotton Incorporated, in conjunction with other private public groups, came up with a bright idea. Why not incinerate the waste and use the resulting heat to dry cotton? This is how the gin incinerator cam about

Sounds simple, but there are problems. For instance, the gin incinerator, with today's technology, is not currently feasible or practical for the smaller gins. But it may very well be in the long run.

As is the case with many innovations, cost is the biggest obstacle facing widespread use of gin incinerators today

One researcher says gin incinerators now are only feasible in gins which are fully utilized. For others, the process is too expensive.

But the wheels are still turning in the research laboratories of Cotton Incorporated and others to make gin incineration cheaper. Associate Director of Processing Reasearch William Lalor noted: "I have no doubt that, as time goes by this technology will be adapted to smaller gins. But we are a long way from that vet.

The heat produced from the process comes from a cheap and plentiful source the waste from cotton gins. Another advantage: transportation costs are eliminated because the waste does not it enters the incinerator. have to be hauled off.

According to Lalor, a few large gins, mainly in California, are considering the installation of sophisticated heat and power generating equipment based on present technology. But less expensive

## **Frame-size and feeding needs**

## play a role in the raisers profits

Overfeeding small-framed cattle and underfeeding large-framed cattle can pound gained. cut into cattlemen's profits.

Failing to recognize the interplay of frame-size and feeding needs, say Texas Tech University researchers, is a common problem which lessens feeding efficiencies and reduces profits.

"By sorting cattle by frame size and slaughtering them at the right time," said Animal Science Prof. Robert A. Long, "you can pull a \$20 bill off the tail of each steer.

These findings are contrary to a long-held tenet of the cattle industry that large-framed cattle produce carcasses with the best cost efficiency. The results of research at Texas

Tech's experimental laboratory at New Deal show that cattle of all frame sizes can be just as effficient if they are fed and marketed according to their frame size. Over-feeding of small cattle and under-feeding of large cattle can be eliminated by considering frame size.

Dr. Long stressed the importance of two genetic traits in his cattle research: frame size and muscling. Frame size refers to the height and length of the steers, based on careful measurements of skeletal features. Muscling refers to the non-fat meat on the bones.

He said that a basic law of anatomy. first discovered by Leonardo da Vinci, states that an increase in the size of an individual bone means a proportional increase in the size of all bones in that skeleton. The same principle holds for muscles.

"If we can look at the forearm of hindquarters of a steer, then we know that every other muscle is equally developed," Long said.

Results from the research indicate that cattle of the same frame size reach optimum slaughter at the same time, provided they are of the same age and condition. Small-framed steers reach optimum slaughter time first, then medium-framed steers, and finally large-framed steers.

"Two steers of different frame size cannot be slaughtered efficiently at the same time," Long pointed out.

In Long's research, he found that steers fed past the optimum slaughter time for their frame size, bring less profit when marketed because of undesirable yield grades. However, steers not fed long enough also brought less profit because they did not attain choice quality

Efficiency, or market profit in relation to feeding costs of the steers, also was studied by Long. He found that cattle fed past the choice quality grade gain weight with increasing inefficiency.

They require more and more feed per

In his earlier research, Long concentrated on determining optimum marketing times for cattle of different frame sizes. His more recent experiments have examined muscling rather than frame size. For these experiments Long is using Charolais cross-bred cattle of the same frame size but with different degrees of muscling. The muscularity of cattle is a genetic trait that is not conditioned by exercise,

Long said. Long is seeking to determine whether heavy-muscled, trim cattle are more efficient at converting feed to meat than light-muscled fat cattle of equal weight. Experimental results so far do not support this belief; so Long and his student research assistants are exploring possible explanations.

Findings concerning the carcass characteristics of heavily muscled versus lightly muscled cattle show that heavily muscled carcasses are leaner, have larger rib-eyes and yield a higher percentage of edible meat, thus bringing a higher price. Lightly muscled cattle fed to the same quality grade as heavily muscled cattle will have less desirable yield grades, Long said.

There is a dual grading system used by U.S. Department of Agriculture graders in appraising meat, Long said. On one hand, meat is judged for quality color, texture and marbling. Choice quality brings \$5 to \$6 more per hundred weight than good quality. The second aspect of the grading system, the yield grade, measures the edible portion of the carcass after the meat has been cut and the waste fat removed. Leaner, heavily muscled carcasses have higher yields, Long said.

"The ideal," said Long, "is a choice quality, well marbled carcass with a lean, desirable yield grade.

In order to monitor the exact quantities of feed consumed by each steer in the experiments, Long is using electronically activated self-feeders that allow the steers to eat as much as they want. Each steer's ear is tagged with a citizens band transmitter. A computer connected to the feeder records how much each steer eats, with different CB radio frequencies identifying which steer is eating.

#### PUBLIC NOTICE **CITY OF FLOYDADA** FAIR HOUSING ORDINANCE ENFORCEMENT PROGRAM

On February 13, 1979, the City of Floydada passed a comprehensive Fair Housing Ordinance which defines specific discriminatory housing practices prohibited by the City of Floydada and provides for investigation of discrimination complaints and penalties for violations of the Ordinance. Copies of the City's Fair Housing Ordinance have been distributed to local realtors, builders, developers and lending institutions and to public agency personnel handling housing programs in the City. Copies of this Ordinance are available free of charge to any interested persons or groups at the office of the City Manager, Floydada City Hall, 114 West Virginia, between the hours of 8 A.M. and 5 P.M., Monday through Friday. To further promote effective enforcement of Floydada's Fair Housing Ordinance, the City has developed a set of specific procedures for handling all formal complaints of discriminatory housing practices filed with the City. These procedures are based on the provisions of the Ordinance enacted by your City Council. Copies of these procedures may also be obtained at the Office of the City Manager during the hours stated above by any interested persons or groups.

Reprints from the December 25, 1969 issue of The Floyd **County Hesperian** by Homer Steen

Emmett Henry was a young Ozarks country, Arkansas, fellow, who came to Floyd County with a young bride and filed on a piece of school land out on the limitless prairie. Later it became known the land was in Roseland District east of Lockney. The couple built a dug out home and set up housekeeping.

Jobs and money were not too plentiful so Emmett spent the first summer in the harvest "down east" in Wilbarger County. Belle, his wife was not scared enough nor lonesome enough to make a big ado about it, but she was relieved and glad when Emmett came in home after weeks of absence. Young Henry was a good-sized man, rugged, quiet, personable and substantial. He made friends easily. So, in the spring of 1896, when an untimely death claimed Dan W. Jenkins, and the office of sheriff was to be filled in the November election, he offered for the place. Chosen over two good men he held the office until 1904, as I recall it, when he decided not to run again.

#### The Christmas Star

When "my folks" brought me to Floyd County in December of 1900 Mr. Henry was the sheriff. It was in those years custom in the community to have a Christmas "star," in the second floor court room of the court house. It was a big gift-giving and gift-receiving event.

For all the early years that I can recall we did not have a Christmas tree. It was a "star" because we could not get a tree but we could build a "star." The "star" was made of one by fours, secured to the floor and to the ceiling. It made a very good display piece for the swains to display gifts to their dulces. During the afternoon several women had worked to give the "star" color and brightness.

Claus left his gifts, that's where you went to receive them. Every kid knew that if he went to the "star" he'd get a gift.

#### Surprise, Surprise!

One Christmas Eve (I'll guess 1902) when we got to the "tree" there was a great big pair of shoes, fully 20 inches long, hung right at the top of the display in the most prominent place. Before long all of us knew about it - whose shoes they would be. But it was a well-kept secret we shared. None of us said it out loud. It would be sprung on the surprise recipient at the right time.

So when all the gifts but one had been announced the handed out there was the big pair of shoes left. One of Santa's helpers climbed up and retrieved them. Then the big booming voice of Bob Walls, the tenor, sang out the recipient's name. "Sheriff Emmett Henry, size 24." Sheriff Henry did have a sizeable foot, he usually wore laced boots and planted his feet rather deliberately as he walked. So the point of the "size 24" was well understood by all.

The sheriff accepted the "shoes" with unaffected good humor, the boys and young men yelled, whistled and stomped their approval. "Applause," as we know it now was not known then as a part of our public response.

The "Shoes" were of Bob Walls' own making. He had taken a piece of half-inch thick plank, fashioned out the 'soles," then used his tin snips to cut uppers of tin to fit, and there you had the over-size "shoes."

I am not sure how long the custom lasted of having the "star" at Christmas time in the court house. Also, I do not know how soon after the town was laid out that the custom began. Kids that I ran with who had been here "all the time" talked as though that was the way it had been "always." "Always" would have been back to 1892. I wonder!

Even if Fido received his two-dose parvovirus vaccine earlier this spring or sum-mer, dogowners should consult their veterinarian about a booster, according to Dr. Robert A. Emmett, president of the Texas Veterinary Medical Foundation.

#### be aware of deductible date

October 1, 1980, marked the start of a new year for CHAMPUS outpatient deductibles. According to D.G. Ayres, Veteraus Service Officer for Floyd County, Civilian Health and Medical Program for Uniformed Services (CHAMPUS) is the Government-sponsored program that provides health and medical care to retired military personnel and their dependents. Under this program, needed medical care in most cases is obtained through civilian sources rather than from military clinics and hospitals. Under the plan, the provate insurance carrier will pay 75% of the cost of hospitalization and other inpatient care, and the individual must pay the other 25%. Payment for outpatient care is by the same 75%-25% ratio, but only after an established deductible amount has been paid by the patient.

The outpatient deductilbe is the initial amount a beneficiary must pay each fiscal year before CHAMPUS costsharing is available for outpatient expenses, such as a physician's services in his office, etc. For an individual. the deductible is the first \$50 of authorized outpatient charges in a fiscal year is \$100 The CHAMPUS year is the

same as the U.S. Government fiscal year, from October 1 through the following September 30. CHAMPUS beneficiaries should therefore be aware that a deductible that was satisfied during FY 1980 (October 1, 1979 through September 30, 1981), cannot be applied to care received after September 30, 1980. Thus, a new outpatient deductible will

have to be met for FY 1981, which commenced October 1. 1980



Dr. Emmett urged dog-

owners to consult their veterinarian immediately for more information about parvovirus vaccinations and boosters.

#### Christmas Cuisine

Traditionally the Breens prepare Indian dishes such as fried bread, and pork stew cooked with pumpkin and dried corn. A dish similar to oatmeal called Sofkiee is prepared by combining parched, ground corn, cinnamon and sugar with milk

poured over it. It is a breakfast dish. Another traditional dish for the Breens is boiled green rice. Its origin will be explained later in this article.

At New Years, a pecan-leaf tea is served. It is prepared by boiling dried pecan leaves and serving what is brewed from the leaves. One drinks this brew on New Year's Day to purify the blood for the coming year. It is served hot, with or without sugar.

The traditional turkey with all the trimmings is also served.

# Glorious Holiday Tradition

The great dimly lit hall is filled with an aura of magic and wonder . . . one feels thrust back in time. Crowds ebb and flow through its vast recesses but the Medieval Sculpture Hall of The Metropolitan Museum of Art is hushed. Towering and magnificent, a twenty foot, blue spruce, the focal point of the Museum's annual Baroque Christmas display, stands resplendent with angels and cherubs and Neapolitan crèche figures.

First exhibited at The Metropolitan Museum of Art, in New York City, over twenty years ago, this handsome holiday spectacle has become a firmly established tradition for New Yorkers and out-of-town visitors.

Usually on exhibit through December and January, the annual Christmas display is the result of the generosity and unflagging enthusiasm of Loretta Hines Howard, who began collecting crèche figures in 1925, and soon after conceived the unique idea of combining the German tradition, of decorated Christmas trees, with the Southern European custom of elaborate nativity scenes. This unusual combination was first presented to the public in 1957 and again in 1958, when Mrs. Howard loaned her collection to The Metropolitan Museum. She gave the collection to the museum in 1964 and personally supervises the

tom was nurtured by the Nativity dramas presented at Christmas time, and by the increasing appearance in churches of free standing figures of the Holy Family. The first home crèche was made for the Duchess of Amalfi in the 1560's

The tradition reached the height of its popularity and artistic excellence in mid-18thcentury Naples, where noble families vied to outdo each other in presenting elaborate crèche displays. Here, the finest sculptors, including Giuseppe and Angelo Viva, carved the terra cotta heads and shoulders of the lovely figures for the collection of these noble families. The figures they modeled for the Catello family form the nucleus of the 200 piece Howard collection.

The figures, which average 12-15 inches in height, have pliable bodies of woven twine and wire and limbs of finely carved wood. The luxurious costumes, most of which are original, were sewn by the ladies of the noble families and enriched by jewels, embroideries and elaborate accessories such as gilded scimitars and daggers.





Tommy first came to live with us in September. We tried to make him feel welcomed at the orphanage, but he seemed to be in his own little world. Tommy was always quiet and mostly kent to himself.

One day I asked Tommy if we could have a man to man talk even though he was only nine years old.

We talked into the night and when we had finished, we knew each other like brothers. I found out that Tommy came from a middle class family and that he and his parents had lived in a ranch all their lives. The closest neighbors were about 45 miles from their place.

He told me he felt shy around the other kids, because he had never had friends his age before. I also found out that his parents were killed in an automobile accident. His only living relative was his aunt, but she didn't like kids.

The next day I introduced Tommy to all the kids personally. From that day on Tommy became more opened and joined in all the games with the kids. Gradually our love for Tommy increased. It wasn't till November that we learned of Tommy's

disease. We had to put him in a hospital for treatment.

Tommy immediately became friends with the kids there. In no time at all he was laughing and playing with all of them.

I guess one of the reasons for his happiness was that he lived one day at a time and enjoyed the company of his friends.

Tommy's disease grew worse as time passed. It was a dark day when the doctor came and told me that Tommy would not live to see Christmas.

With tears in my eyes I told the doctor that this could not be for Christmas was only weeks away. Surely Tommy had more than that to live, but the doctor's death sentence was confirmed by the tests.

During the next week we bought Tommy every toy we could afford. I believe Tommy knew he was going to die, but he refused to let go of life so easily.

When Tommy learned of the hospital's Christmas play he immediatly asked me if he could be the tin soldier in the play. I wanted to say no, because the tin soldier, being the hero of the play, meant more work for the person playing the part.

I had to say yes, when I saw the pleading and excitement in his eyes. I helped Tommy practice his lines, but I knew it was to no avail for he would never have a chance to perform in the play. The days passed and to my amazement Tommy managed to hold on and perform on Christmas Eve.

After the play, I was surprised to learn that Tommy, still in his tin soldier costume, was giving his toys away to the kids as gifts.


